

The Gorman Panthers Boys Basketball Team came us short last Friday night against Ponder at Weatherford Junior College, but still concluded on the the most successful seasons in recent memory. The Panthers roared through District 28-A with an undefeated 8-0 record followed by a nine point victory over #14 state ranked Munday. Gorman continued their stellar play with a 64-51 upset over Huckabay. For the season, Gorman average margin of victory was a dominating 21 points. Their 26-5 record is one the best for Class A in the entire state and will surely land them a top 20 finish in the state rankings at seasons end.

Coach Darin Harley praised the team for their tremendous work ethic throughout the year. "These young men worked very hard all year to achieve their goals. Both our varsity and junior varsity won the district championship. Coach Wright and I demanded a great deal from these athletes. They met and exceeded every challenge we set for them.
