Fire Dem'stration At Gorman High Set Friday At 10

Students of Gorman, Carbon and Desdemona schools will have an opportunity to see for themselves how fire can be man's best friend or his worst enemy by observing a graphic fire demonstration to be presented at Gorman High School at 10 a. m. on Friday, Nov. 8th., W. R. Taylor, supt. announced today.

The demonstration, in seven pants, will be given under the direction of Joe Smetana, Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bu-

A variety of demonstration equipment will be placed on tables 16 feet in length to illustrate seven basic points: (1) what fire is; (2) how to control fires; (3) the fact hat nothing is fire-proof; (4) kitchen fires and their control; (5) fuel vapors; (6) the power of petroleum products; and (7) household wiring and overloaded electrical circuits.

Smetana will point out that fire is like a three-legged-stool - it can't work with one of the legs missing. The "legs" fire depends on are: (1) fuel, (2) heat, and (3) air. Yet, in American homes these three things come together in deadly and destructive combination every 57 seconds - an average

of 1,500 home fires every day,

according to Smetana. "That is eight times the number of fires in factories and stores. Worse yet, four out of five of all fire deaths occur in homes, and for every death there are about day and will not be open for busi- 100 serious injuries," the TFB Safety Director explained.



THE UNITED STATES SU-PREME COURT is in its second week of a new session. One of the first actions of the Court was to refuse to review an appeal of two death sentences for rape. In this decision a dissent was filed by Justices Goldberg, Douglas and Brennan. Their dissent was based on the VIII Amendment to the Constitution, which forbids "cruel and unusual punishment" for crimes. The Justices noted that what is "cruel and unusual punishment" changes with the advance of civilization. Mr. Justice Goldberg raised the question as to whether this excessive punishment violates the "evolving standards of decency that mark the progress of our maturing

IN OTHER WORDS, JUSTICE GOLDBERG seemingly does not believe that any case of rape, regardless of the heinousness of the crime, deserves punishment by death. Incidentally, in one of the cases before the Court in which the dissent was filed, the victim was a little nineyear old girl.

IF SUCH AN ACT VIOLATES OR IS INDICATIVE OF THE "evolving standards of decency that mark the progress of our maturing society," then we must have matured too much.
