## Extra Water For June Okayed By City Commission

The Gorman City Commission in its last meeting voted to allow 1,000 gallons of water during the month of June to each meter holder at no cost. This practice has been customary, during summer months, for many years, but action was delayed this year by the Commission pending determination of the output of the new city water well. There still remains some question in this regard, but if the well produces satisfactorily, the extra 1,000 gallon of water is expected to be allowed throughout each of the summer months.

The Commission also voted to charge churches in the city only for the water used in excess of the minimum allowance. In other words, the \$3.50 fee for the initial 2,000 gallons used will not be charged.

The Commission is contracting with Mr. R. C. Boswell to draft a new city map of streets, waterworks, gas mains, etc.

In other action the Commission appointed Mr. Charles Duran to a second term on the Upper Leon Municipal Water Board. Serving with Mr. Duran on the board is Mr. Othell Clark. Each member city of the District has two representatives on the board. This board will manage the affairs of the District in supplying water from Lake Proctor Reservoir to Dublin, Hamilton, Comanche, De Leon and Gorman. Contract negotiations are scheduled to begin next week with the various cities.

In other business the Commission appointed Mrs. Dorothy Hatcher, Mr. Odie Brightwell and Mr. Wilbur Shell to the Tax Equalization Board for the ensuing year.

Mrs. Newby is a qualified teacher and has had four years teaching experience in Public Schools.

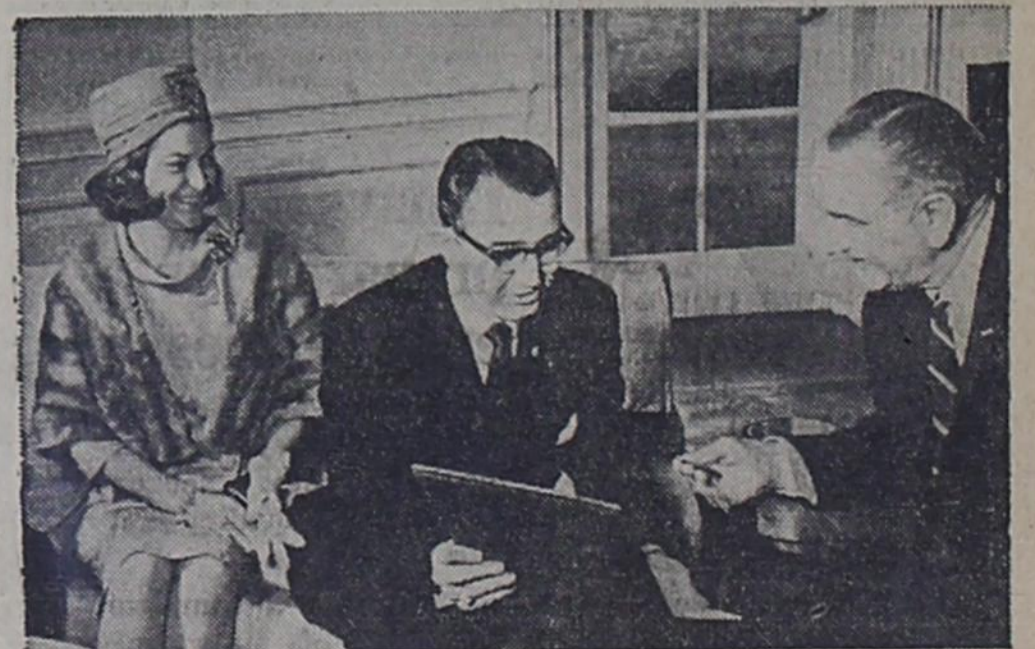

Edward F. Harrison of Gorman, has reported the sale of 2 registered horned Herford cows and 1 registered horned Hereford bull to breeders in Texas.

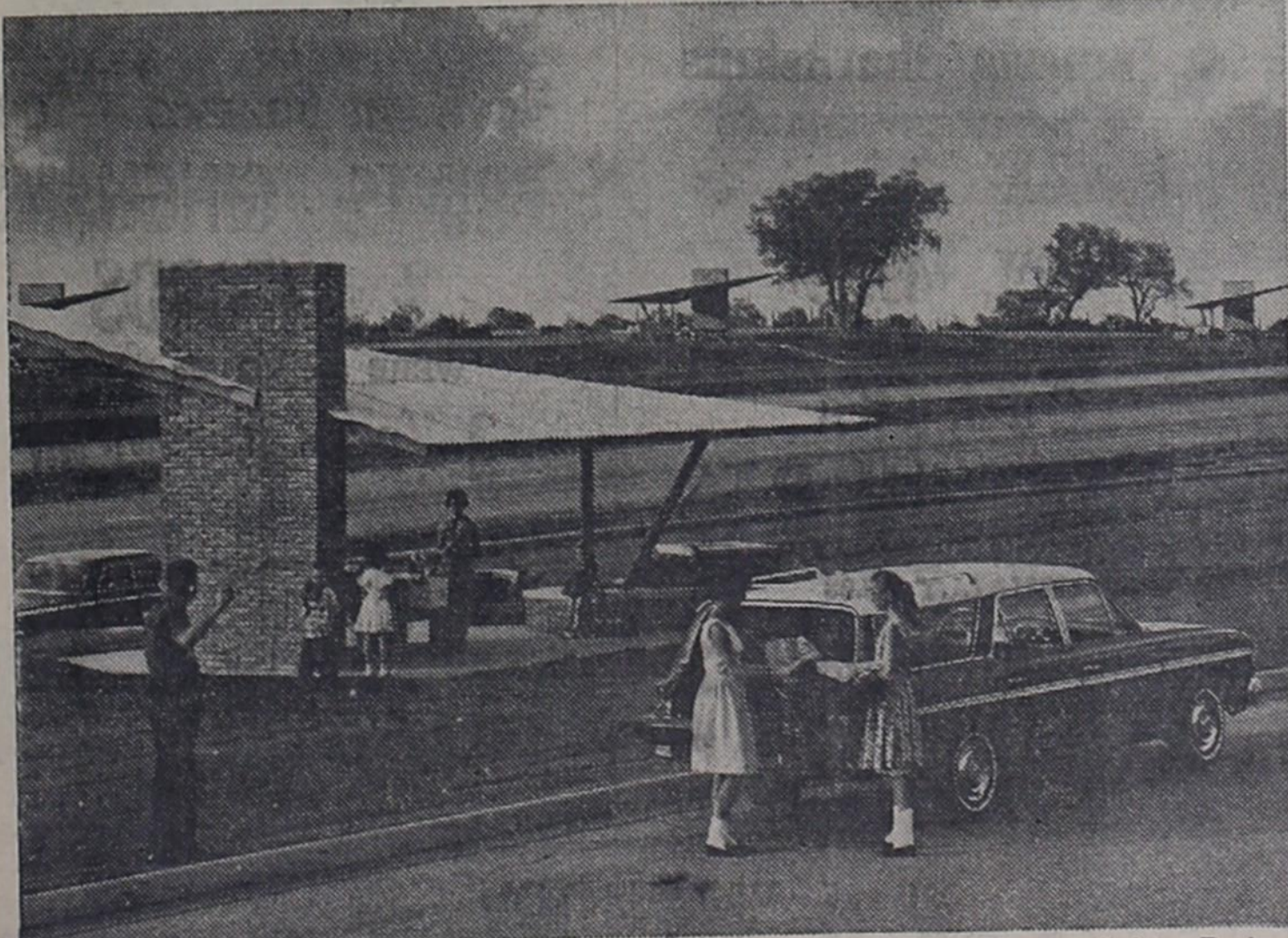
## From One President to Another

The growth and peace-seeking efforts of the world's largest service organization were discussed.

Lion President Green reported to President Johnson on the 400,000 service projects completed by some 18,000 Lions Clubs throughout the world last year. 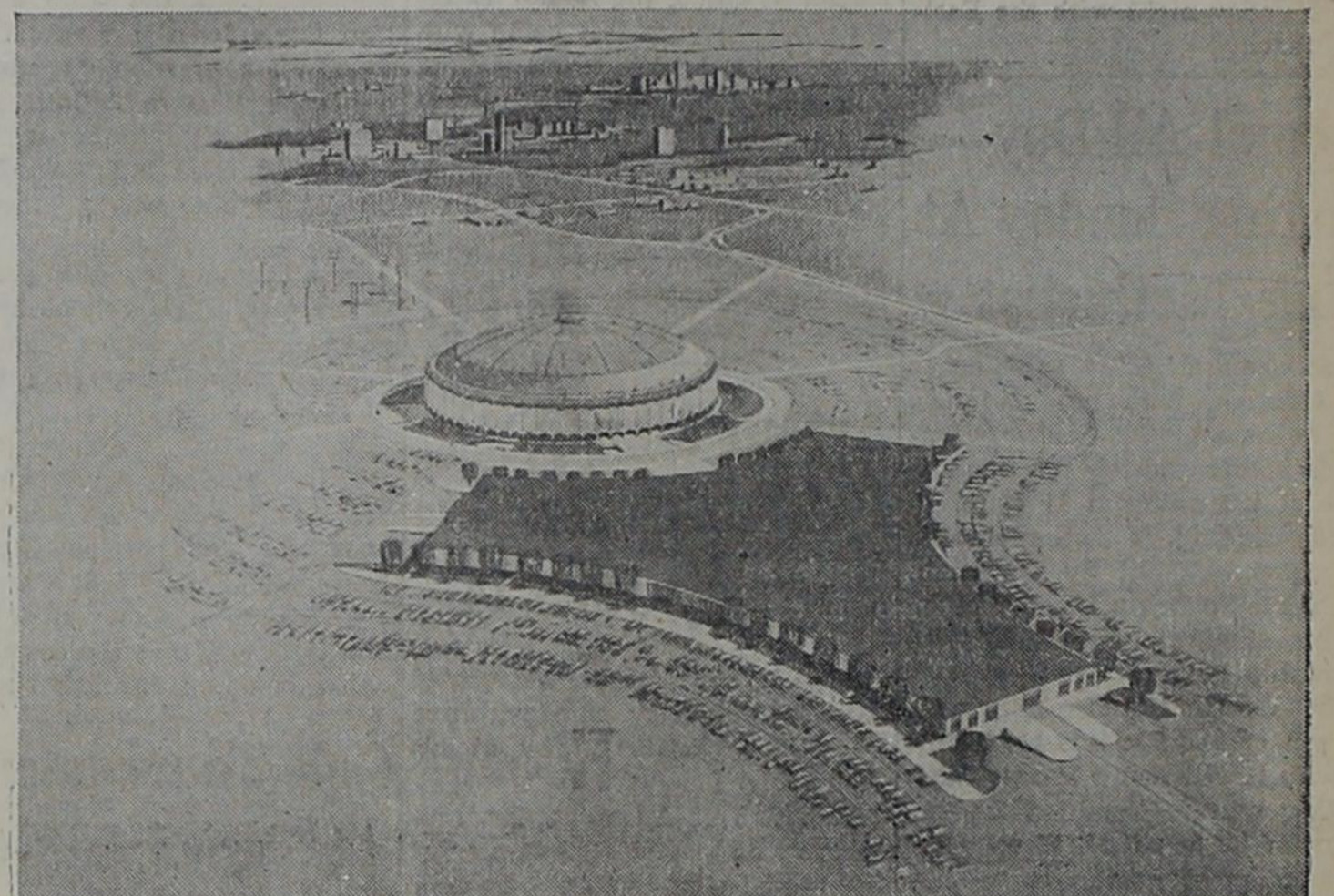

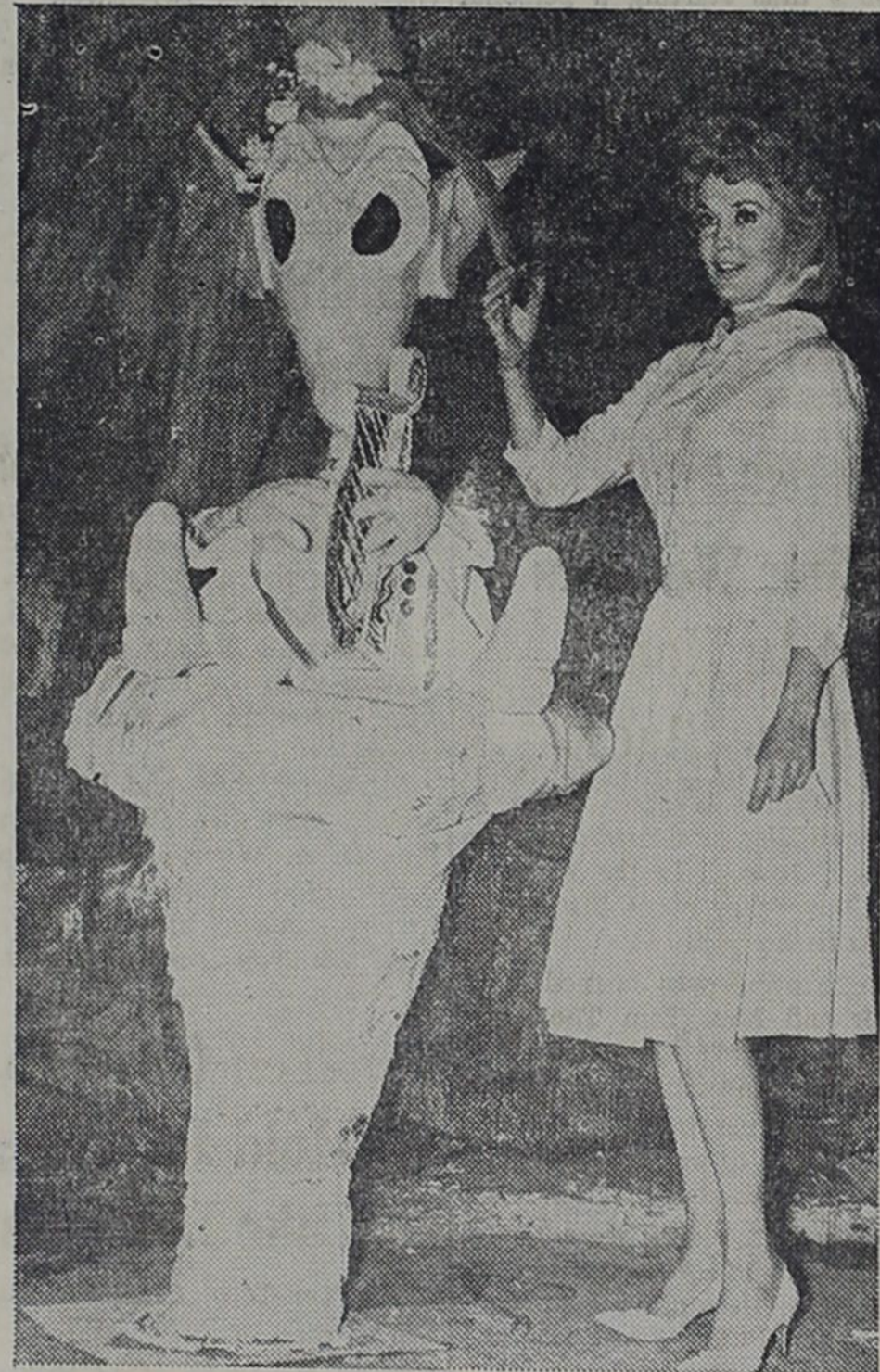

### THE SPEE-LUNKERS CAVE READY FOR SIX FLAGS SUMMER SEASON

Six Flags Over Texas newest project, "The Spee-lunkers Cave" will be open to visitors on June 1, the day the Park officially commences its summer daily operation schedule.

Costing \$300,000 the unique creation is the brainchild of Six Flags art director Randall Duell. Construction on the 600 foot man-made cave has been underway for eight months and some 60 engineers, artists, electricians and special effects technicians will wind up their efforts next week.

The Cave has been termed "a marvel of man's imagination, engineering and animation" by newsmen who inspected the three-quarter finished project last week. Miss Donna Douglas, star of the Beverly Hillbillies TV show was also present for the tour and saw first hand the strange 30-inch high animated Spee-lunkers who inhabit the cave.

"Visitors will journey through the Cave," explained Mr. Duell, "aboard round Indian Bull boats. Inside the Cave it's completely dark save for the special fluorescent lights and paint which bring about a fascinating display of the

secrets to be witnessed by the visiting 'explorers.' The boats are propelled 3 1/2 feet per second by the force of the water through the use of two centrifugal pumps which are rated at 1,800 gallons per minute.

"A colony of 28 Spee-lunkers operate the Cave and being most talented little people, they are able to play instruments, do the 'Twist,' make rock candy from cave crystals, play cards, engage in turtle racing and absorb nourishment from cave air by osmosis through their oversize ears.

"Also inhabiting the cave are huge lobsters, flying bats, trees that dance the 'Twist' and a broken hull of a sunken ship whose crew still carries on some of the skylarking activities that most sailors engage in at one time or another.

"The ride culminates in a terrific storm at sea in the cave where the wind hits 35 knots per hour and the water is turned into a froth. Lightning flashes across the Cave and visitors are subjected to all of the feelings and anxieties of a storm at sea."

The entire project was built on the premises at Six Flags and the extraordinary talents of man in creating fantasy are brought into full focus by the Spee-lunkers Cave.

## The Star Spangled Banner

Arrest of drunken British soldiers led to writing of National Anthem

There were no linotype machines. As the printer set each piece of type by hand he started humming the melody of an old English drinking song. It was called "Anacreon in Heaven" and it seemed to just fit the poem he was setting.

On the day before Baltimore's lawyer Francis Scott Key had gone out in Chesapeake Bay in the cartel ship "Minden" with a letter to the British admiral asking the release of American citizen Dr. William Beanes. The Maryland physician was being detained for being instrumental in the arrest of a bunch of drunk English soldiers. Though lawyer Key was treated courteously, his mission was ill-timed. The British were about to bombard Baltimore. So they told lawyer Key he could have his doctor friend but he would have to wait until they bombed the daylight out of Key's home town.

he thought was the destruction of Baltimore and Fort M'Henry. But the first thing he saw when dawn broke through the mist that morning of Aug. 15, 1814, was the huge American flag still defiantly floating over the fort two miles away. In a burst of inspiration he took the letter from his pocket, turned it over and started writing.

Released and rowed ashore, Key edited his poem, wrote over it "Defense of Fort M'Henry" and hurried to the printer. That afternoon it was circulated on hand-bills all over town. Under the title the printer had set a line suggesting the tune "Anacreon in Heaven" and that night it was sung on the stage of the Holiday Street Theater. Vocalists say it's the hardest tune in the book to sing but for 117 years nobody was able to get away with changing it and, in 1931, Congress officially proclaimed as the National Anthem of the United States . . .

Ob, say, can you see, by the dawn's early light,  
What so proudly we hail'd at the twilight's last gleaming,  
Whose broad stripes and bright stars, thro' the perilous fight,  
O'er the ramparts we watch'd, were so gallantly streaming?  
And the rocket's red glare, the bomb bursting in air,  
Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there,  
Ob, say, does that Star-Spangled Banner yet wave  
O'er the land of the free, and the home of the brave.

And where is that band, who so vauntingly swore  
That the havoc of war and the battle's confusion,  
A home and a country should leave us no more?  
Their blood has wash'd out their foul footsteps' pollution,  
No refuge save the hireling and slave  
From the terror of flight or the gloom of the grave;  
And the Star-Spangled Banner in triumph doth wave  
O'er the land of the free, and the home of the brave.

Ob, thus be it ever when freemen shall stand  
Between their lov'd homes and the war's desolation;  
Blest with vict'ry and peace, may the Heaven-recur'd land  
Praise the Power that hath made and preserved us a nation!  
Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just;  
And this be our motto: "In God is our trust!"  
And the Star-Spangled Banner in triumph shall wave  
O'er the land of the free, and the home of the brave.

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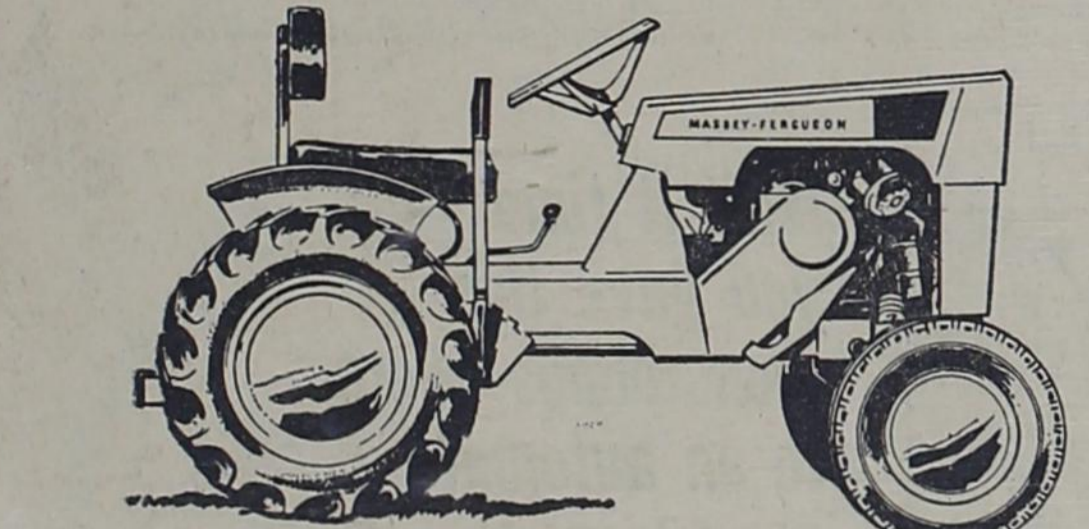

**SEEKS REDUCTION IN FOREIGN OIL IMPORTS**

The Senator asked Udall for some definite action in the way

of drastically reducing foreign imports so this vital domestic industry may survive."

In the letter to Udall, Tower said the present situation "cannot continue or the domestic oil and gas industry will perish. It is almost impossible for an independent to survive in this business today, and it is becoming increasingly more difficult for the smaller companies to stay in business."

Tower asked for a report from the Department of the Interior on steps now being taken that would "offer some relief to this industry."

Tower asked the President "as a fellow Texan and as President of these United States" to give consideration to the domestic oil and gas industry.

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**TEXAS ELECTRIC CO-SPONSORS NUCLEAR SCIENCE SYMPOSIUM AT AUSTIN**

AUSTIN (Special) — Far-reaching technological developments that are just beginning and will require the creative thoughts of young people in the fields of engineering and science were described to more than 500 Texas high school science students and teachers at the fourth annual Texas Nuclear Science Symposium. Wednesday, June 10, they completed a four-day meeting at the University of Texas and heard some of the nation's outstanding scientists describe the latest developments in nuclear physics and controlled thermonuclear research.

The symposium was co-sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation -- an organization made up of Texas Electric Service Company and nine other investor-owned electric utility companies and the University of Texas.

One of the speakers, Dr. W. E. Drummond of San Diego, California, theoretical physicist at the General Atomic division of General Dynamic Corporation, reported that a new wave of optimism is over-taking scientists around the globe who are engaged in efforts to harness the tremendous power of the hydrogen bomb for peaceful purposes. Experiments now being carried out in controlled nuclear research have confirmed new theoretical principles and dramatically demonstrate the feasibility of achieving control of the thermonuclear (H-bomb) reaction for the generation of electric power, Dr. Drummond said.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation has been engaged since 1957 in a jointly-sponsored research program with General Atomic. The program is the world's largest privately-financed research effort in the field of controlled nuclear fusion and is being directed by some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists at General Atomic laboratories at San Diego. The Foundation also is sponsoring a major research program in atomic energy to be conducted initially at the University of Texas and Texas A & M.

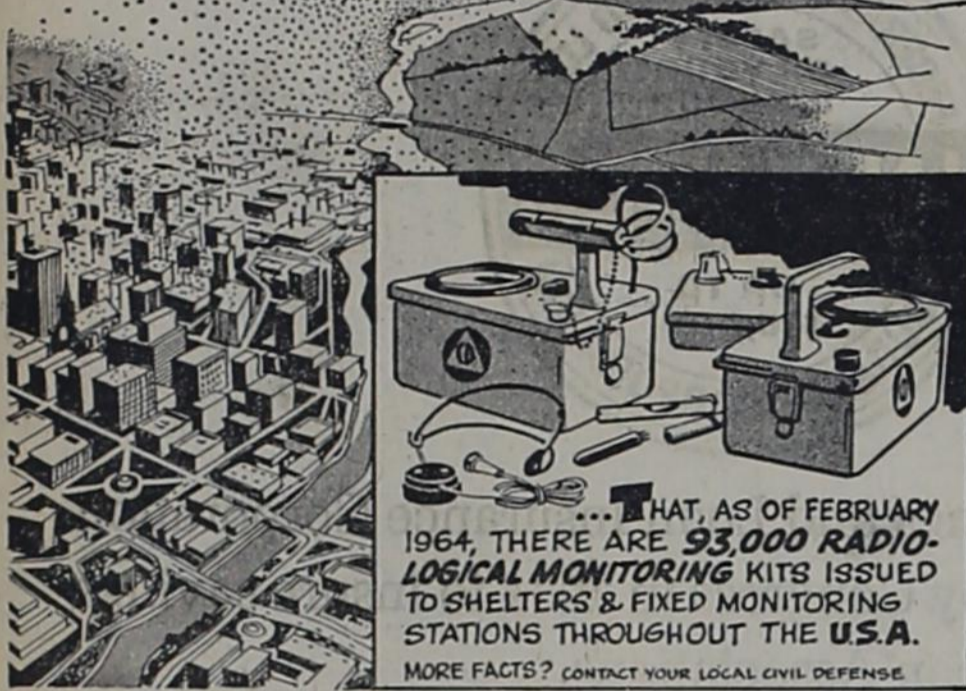

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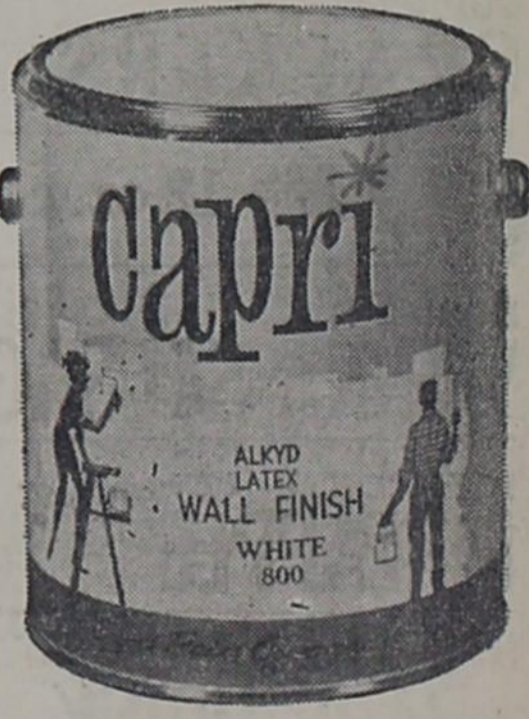

At the meeting in Abilene officials will discuss steps being taken to help young farmers take over the farms of retiring elders, progress made in developing rural community water systems, and the housing assistance given senior citizens in rural areas.

The Farmers Home Administration through a network of 1,500 county offices located throughout

rural America, provides credit assistance in farm and financial management to owners and operators of family farms and aids farmers and rural residents in improving rural housing and other rural community facilities. The agency's funds supplement the credit provided by other lenders. State Directors and county supervisors of the agency serve as chairman of RAD technical action panels organized to help rural communities develop their local economies.

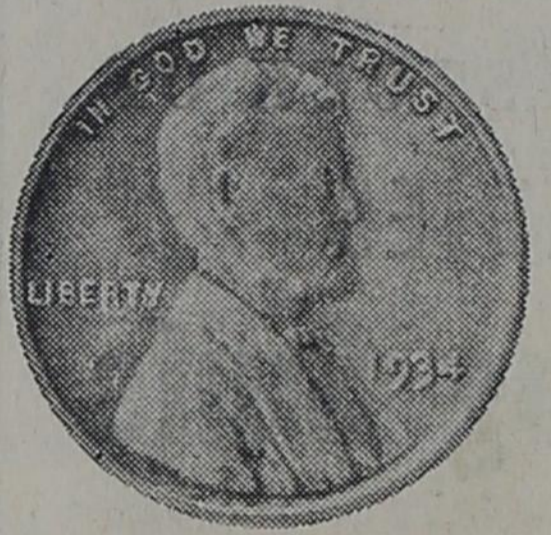
