## JUNIOR HIGH CAGERS WIN OVER OLDEN; PLAY MORAN MONDAY

The fighting Gorman Junior High basketball teams led here on Monday night by bombing Olden 26-14 in the boys game and the girls stayed in the fight, winning with a score of 34-7.

The two games were played before a full gym. The crowd was

estimated to be one of the largest crowds to ever attend a Junior High game.

Gorman attempted 13 free shots and made eight for a percentage of 62.

Johnny Shell was high point winner for Gorman with 12 points. Daryl Hirst was second with 8, with Doyle Shipman making 4 and Bobby Williams 2.

At the beginning of the half of the girls game the score was 3-7, and it looked like it was going to be a close game, but the Gorman girls went wild, making 66 2/3% of their free shots and did good on the field goals also.

Karen Collins scored 12 points for high point honors. Lana Stacy made 11, Katrina Watson 6, and Mary Kirk 5.

Referees for both games were Mr. Bill Little and Mr. Mike Newby.

The Gorman Junior High boys are tied for first place in district and the Gorman girls are running in second place behind Carbon.

The Gorman teams will meet the Moran teams on Monday night at Moran.

## Ross Wilson Speaks To Excelsior Club On Conservation

Mr. Ross Wilson appeared as guest speaker for the Excelsior Club Tuesday evening when the club met in the Milton H. Fairbetter home. His topic, Conservation, is one to which he has given much thought, since becoming associated with the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association. This with his knowledge of world history has made him an able speaker on the subject.

Mr. Wilson opened his address with the statement, "Few subjects have a wider circle of friends than does Conservation. Then, why bother to make a speech about it," he pondered and continued, "it is true farmers practice, business men promote, Boy Scouts are taught about it and Woman's Clubs study it. But - - conservation needs an inventory. People need to understand that conservation is a social problem.

"Folks other than the farmers must understand and work at the job. American agriculture is the envy of all the nations of the world. Conservation and scientific farming has made it so. Again it is true that there has been farm subsidy but a fifty year statistic shows the farm subsidy small in comparison to other government subsidies.

"People are the key to conservation. They are the dominant factor. They are the end and the means. Food is a necessity for life. In our own time, we have seen peoples give their freedom for food.

"Land with water provides life. Seven thousand years of western civilization can be traced by its exploitation of land and peoples." Mr. Wilson reminded the women that agriculture economy was only one phase of conservation, citing as others: Esthetic, Moral and Spiritual. The woman's place is in understanding, practicing and supporting efforts for conservation of these essentials for making and living in a better America."

## Robert Whitt Wins 1st In Calf Scramble At San Antonio

Area 4-H boys were highly successful this past Sunday in the Calf Scramble competition at the 1964 San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo. Eastland and Comanche Counties furnished five of the ten winners out of twenty contestants. All competed under the 4-H Banner.

First Place winner in this event was Robert Whitt of Gorman. Second place was won by Andy Hamilton of Ranger. Third place winner was Larry Schaefer of Garden City, Texas. The next three places were to three Comanche County boys, Jimmy Armstrong, Richard James and Tom Dudley. Also competing from this area were Bobby Ray Williams of Gorman and Willie Cantrell, Jr. of Ranger.

One of the greatest of the "crowd pleasers" during the Rodeo performances is the Calf Scramble sponsored by the Handy-Andy Super Markets.

When you put twenty healthy and energetic boys in a ring and outfit them with nothing but a rope halter as their only means to subdue a calf, excitement is bound to prevail.

Here's the way this event works at San Antonio. Ten husky and frisky calves, all weighing in average of three hundred pounds each, are turned loose in the arena. On the other end of the arena behind a chalked starting line stand twenty FFA and 4-H Club youngsters anxiously awaiting the signal from the starter to "GO."

It is soon very clear that ten of the young men are destined to halter and put his stake on a calf; and, there are ten young men who will be standing after the event is over with empty halters. This the boys know and keep in the back of their minds while awaiting the signal.

The rules clearly state that when one of the contestants has latched onto one of the furry bundles of defiant energy this calf cannot be touched by any other contestant unless the animal squirms loose or breaks away from the young boy's hold.

After the young contestants have applied the halter over the calf, the humor of the event and the entertainment it provides is just beginning. Now it is the job of the youngster to push, pull, lead, or through some form of maneuvering, get his calf over the finish line and be declared a winner.

The prizes these contestants receive are in the form of purchase certificates for livestock. The purchase certificates range from the top award of \$50.00 down to the eighth through tenth prizes of \$15.00.

Ages of the contestants are 12 to 15 inclusive, and they are selected as contestants by 4-H and FFA Club area supervisors. The Prize Certificates must be applied to the purchase of livestock to be used in the winner's 4-H or FFA project. Title to the livestock passes to the boy only after he has demonstrated his interest in caring for it and his ability to follow competent instructions in raising livestock.

## Voting Certificates Deadline March 6

The Twenty-Fourth Amendment to the Constitution has been approved. The amendment eliminates the poll tax as a requirement for voting on National issues. Any person who is otherwise eligible for a poll tax in Texas, may receive one free (marked "Poll Tax Not Paid") if they apply for it on or before March 6, 1964. Persons who register and receive the free poll tax will be eligible to vote for members of Congress, the President, and Vice President. A person must be eligible to pay poll tax in order to be qualified to receive the free poll tax.

Persons wishing to get a free poll tax receipt will have to go to the Tax Assessor-Collectors office in the Court House at Eastland to secure same. The deadline is March 6th.

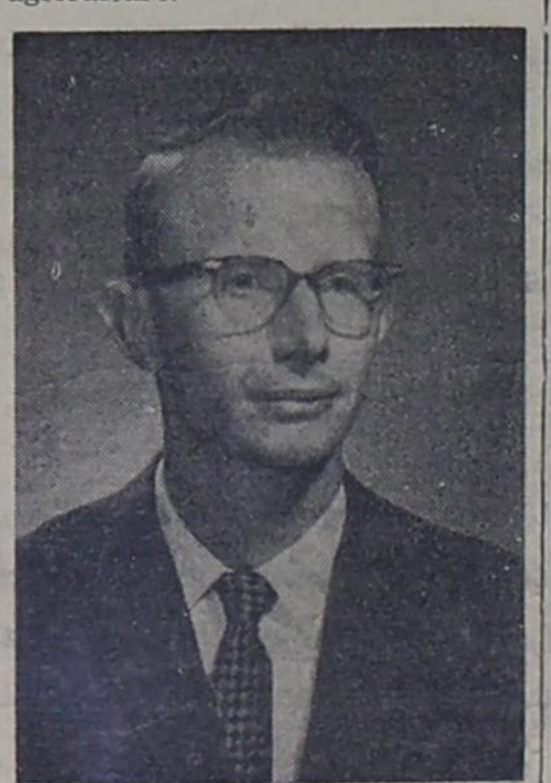

## FARM MANAGEMENT SHORT COURSE SLATED HERE FEB. 17-20

A farm management short course for adult farmers and their wives will be held February 17th through the 20th. Under the sponsorship of the Gorman High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. W. R. Taylor, Superintendent, and Mr. E. C. Bramlett, teacher of vocational agriculture.



Carl G. Anderson, Jr., farm management specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Economics at Texas A&M University will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M.

Mr. Anderson holds two college degrees in Agricultural Economics, a B. S. degree from Texas A&M and an M. S. Degree from L. S. U. He conducted research in the field

of farm management at L. S. U. In addition to college work and research work in farm management, Mr. Anderson has had several years of on-the-farm experience.

The short course at Gorman is scheduled to begin February 17th at 7 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of 4 will be held February 17-18-19-20. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Anderson will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to E. C. Bramlett.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Supt. of Schools, Mr. W. R. Taylor, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Bramlett. An enrollment fee of \$2 will be charged; no fee will be charged for wives accompanying their husbands. Farm Management Short Course Certificates will be presented to each farmer and/or wife who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Anderson states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but he expects to cover such topics as procedures used in estimating costs and returns for crop and livestock enterprises, how to estimate costs of owning and operating farm machinery, keeping and using farm records, income tax management, how social security affects farmers, and planning your credit program.

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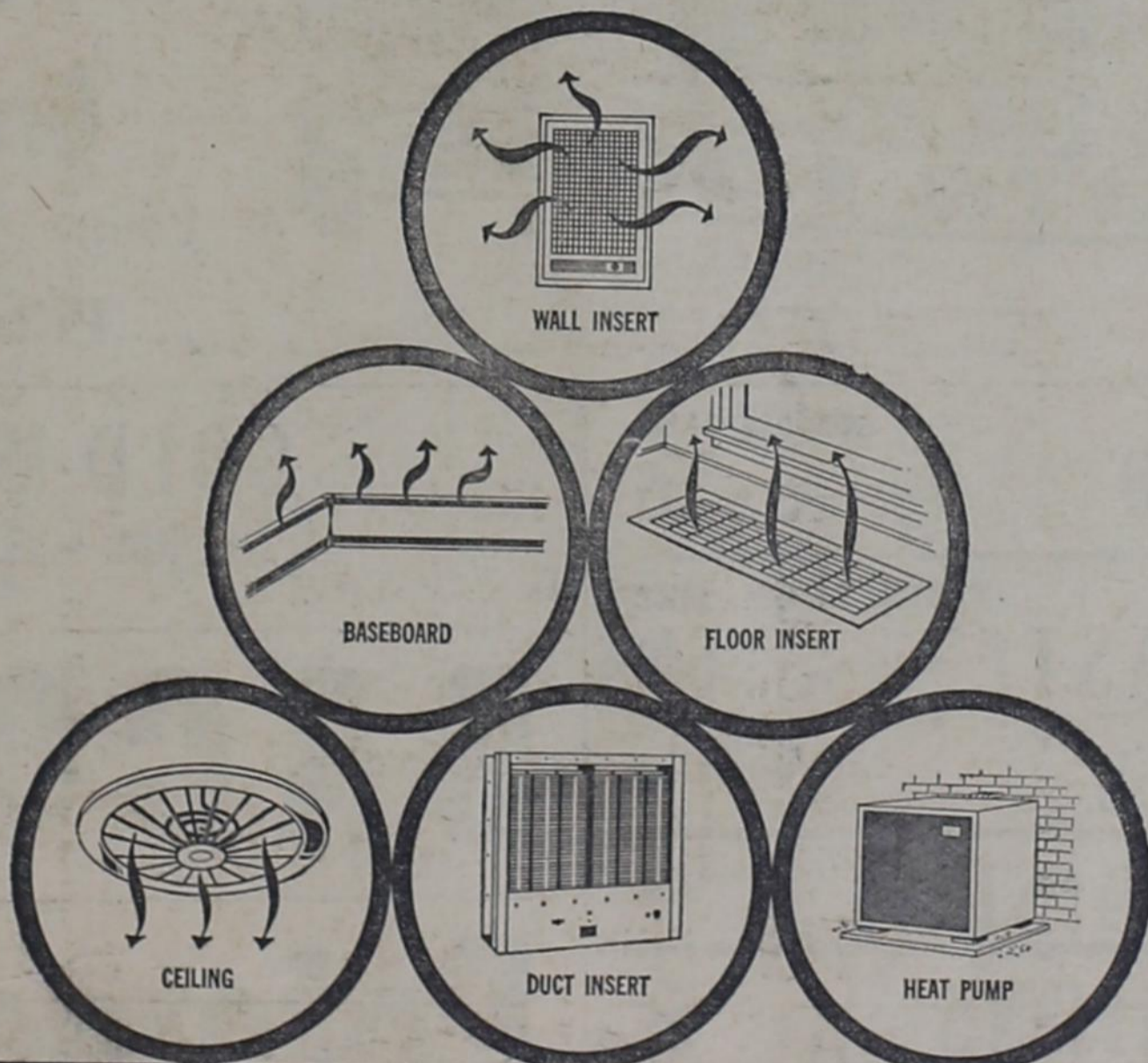
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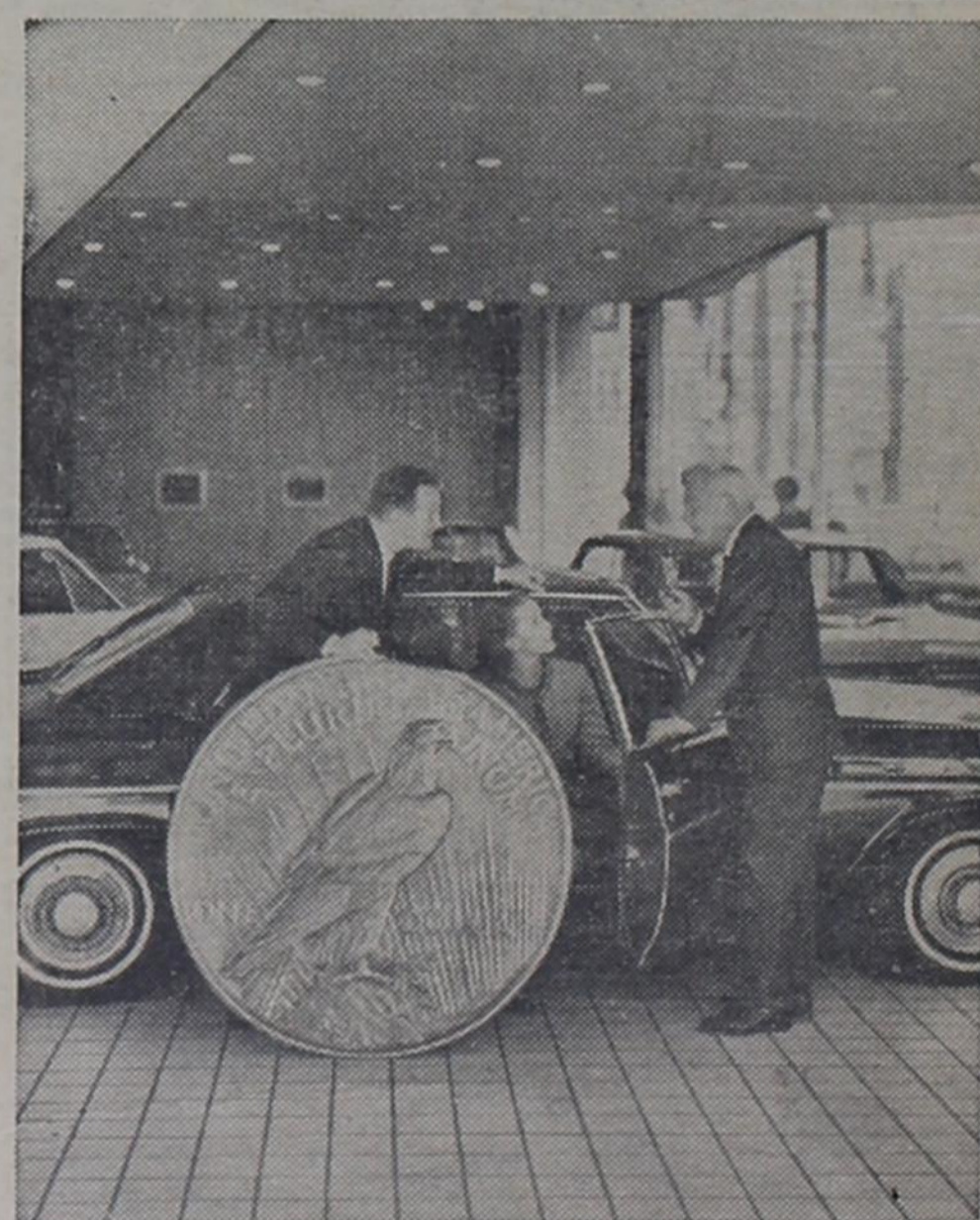
