Driver Training Course To Begin Here On June 20

Thirty students have signed up for the course in Driver Training to be offered this summer. The group includes 24 students from Gorman Schools and 6 students from De Leon Schools.

The starting date has been set for Thursday, June 20 at 7:30 a. m. at Gorman High School.

Instructor for the course will be Mr. Bill Little, high school principal-elect for the coming school year.

The classroom portion of the course will cover thirty hours of instruction and is scheduled, at this time, to extend over three weeks, five days per week, two hours per day, beginning at 7:30 each morning.

In addition to the thirty hours of classroom instruction, each student will be required to do six hours of "in-car observation" and six hours of "behind-the-wheel training." This experience will be scheduled individually.

The entire course is expected to extend over about six weeks.

An automobile for the training program will be provided through the courtesy of Smith Brothers Chevrolet Company of Gorman.

Adequate liability insurance coverage will be provided by the school.

Cost of the course to students has been set at \$15 each.

One-half of a high school credit will be given for satisfactory completion of the course. Students completing the course satisfactorily and passing the required tests will be granted a limited operators license.

Students must be at least 14 years of age before the tests can be given.

Also, parents with a teenage boy who has completed the driver training course will be able to purchase liability insurance at a lower rate than without the driver training certificate.

A DAY OF DEDICATION

(Reprint from Stars and Stripes — National Tribune.)
Following a custom which was established in 1886, Americans all over the nation on May 30 will pay reverent homage to those men and women who, having served their nation in time of war, now lie in restful sleep in cemeteries all over the world.

On Thursday, as we pause to remember and honor those who have departed, should be not only a day of remembrance but one also in which we should rededicate ourselves to the high ideals that have been part and parcel of the basic philosophy of this nation since its birth in 1776.

Wars are fought and won with the blood, the valor and the determination of those gallant fighting men who endure the hardships and privation of bloody conflict in order that their beloved country may still remain the bulwark of freedom and democracy as exemplified in our American republic.

While we have in the United States the greatest amount of personal liberty known to any citizen in the world, we must remain vigilant and determined in our resolution to retain this priceless heritage. The greatest threat to human dignity is communism. The tenets of this doctrine are in direct violation of all that we hold dear in America.

If we are to instill into the youth of our nation the ideals and principles which have served to make this nation great, then we must set an example in the loving care and sacred memories which we bestow upon the graves of those who have departed.

In recent years much has occurred to change the world scene. New nations have attained their freedom. Others have been overpowered through attacks by an unscrupulous aggressor. All of this points up to one indisputable fact — that men and women throughout the world are ready to die if necessary rather than to be denied individual freedom.

On this Memorial Day let us remember that the struggle for which they died has not yet been won, and we must by consecrated devotion endeavor to uphold and defend those high ideals for which they gave their lives.
