There Are Some Red Faces Now Says Burleson

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THERE ARE SOME RED FACES around after secret proposals made to the Communist North Vietnamese were recently made public. It was revealed that the President's emissary, Henry Kissinger, had offered Hanoi many of the same things the extreme doves have been demanding. It seems the President was willing to make just about every concession espoused by the "peace" advocates, short of complete capitulation.

ONE POINT IN MR. NIXON'S PLAN, as presented by Mr. Kissinger, was a \$7.4 billion foreign aid program for

all of Indo-China, with \$2.4 billion earmarked for Communist North Vietnam. The significance of this point was somewhat lost among the others making up the proposal. In fact it is the most amazing of the main seven points involved.

SINCE WHEN HAS THE PRESIDENT—any President—or his representative in this case, been endowed with the authority to make any such commitment? Where is their authority to appropriate, earmark and spend taxpayers dollars except by the Congress? This illustrates the usurpation of power by the Executive which has been in process for the last several years, including war-making.

THE NORTH VIETNAMESE HAVE CONSISTENTLY shown a rather sophisticated grasp of American politics. They have played on the dis-

sension in this Country over the war to the fullest extent. In many ways they have successfully depended on this divisiveness to hold hostage our prisoners and to prevent total destruction of their Country. At the same time, they probably know that Mr. Nixon may not be able to deliver on his \$2.4 billion offer.

IT IS AS IF OUR BOMBING ASSAULTS had seriously damaged North Vietnam but the fact is they are not badly hurt by reason of our policy of limited attacks against it.

AT A TIME WHEN FOREIGN AID is being reduced to friendly nations, the North Vietnamese probably, and correctly, have an idea that of the \$7.4 billion total for Indo-China, their \$2.4 billion might be pretty hard to come by. And, where would they be if the Congress balked at appropriating this kind of money? Where would we be if we walked out of South Vietnam, leaving our prisoners in North Vietnam and unable to furnish the money pledged for a "peace" settlement?

AT A TIME WHEN THERE seems to be a sentiment in the County and the Congress to reduce foreign aid and channel the savings into domestic programs of one sort or another, it is highly doubtful that another huge program of this dimension will be approved for Indo-China. There are active considerations in the Congress, and particularly in the Senate, ranging from reduction to the elimination of foreign aid. Looking at what the United States has always done in the past to aid former enemies, the North Vietnamese may expect such a policy to continue, regardless of what they do but if they are perceiving as it appears, they may get the message that such massive handouts are not likely. With the billions burnt up in the war, it would be cheap to pay off the North Vietnamese communists with \$2.4 billion to withdraw their forces from South Vietnam; to cease their aggression and to release our prisoners but before the ransom is paid they should have

Soil Samples For Nematode Control Urged

AUSTIN — Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reminds peanut farmers who usually produce about \$50,000,000 worth of peanuts in Texas that now is the time to send soil samples for nematode analysis.

Samples should be sent to the Texas Department of Agriculture's De Leon Research Lab, 301 West Navarro, De Leon, Texas 76444. Unless controlled, nematodes can cut peanut production sharply, and every precaution, such as the nematode analysis should be taken, Commissioner White cautioned.

Peanut production ranks sixth in importance of all crops in Texas. Peanuts are grown in 117 of Texas' 254 counties.

Soil samples for nematodes analysis should be packed in air-tight plastic bags, should be moist and should have the grower's name, address, field name and location of the sample plainly stated.

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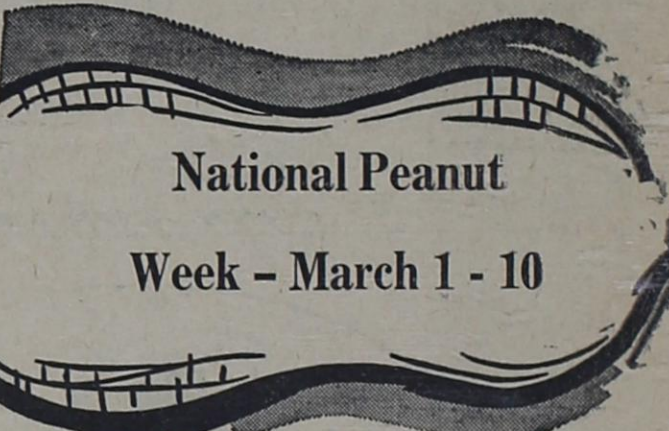

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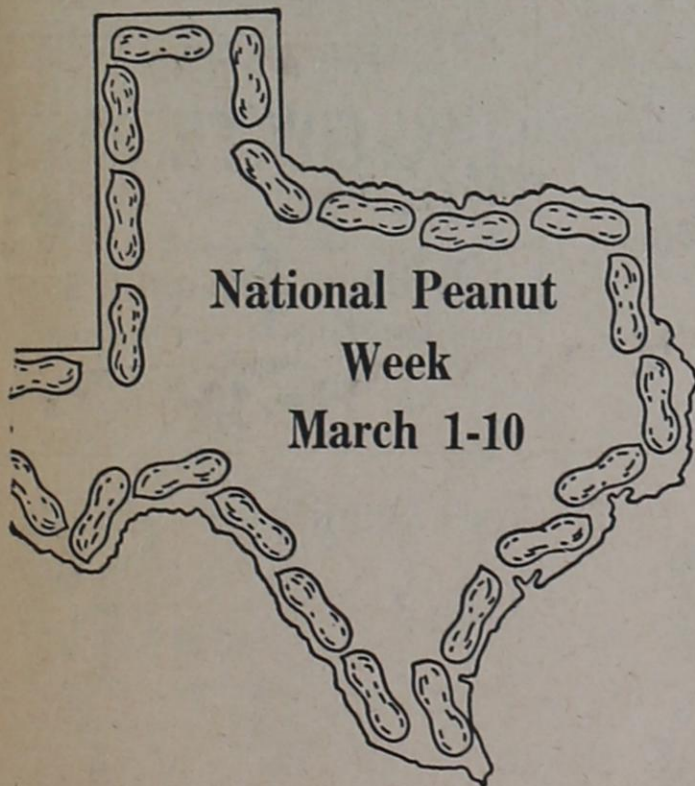

Mrs. Gorham Gives Program For W. S. C. S.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service met in the home of Mrs. W. T. Shell on Monday morning to enjoy a presentation of lecture and slides, by Mrs. Leta Gorham, to climax their recent series of studies on Africa.

Mrs. Gorham and her husband have spent several years as Methodist missionaries in Central and West Africa. They are presently living in Stephenville, where Mr. Gorham is an instructor in French at Tarleton State College. The Gormans have four children.

Mrs. Gorham began by noting that most people still have an 1890 view of missionaries as being preachers only. She pointed out that all the Methodist churches in the Congo are served by Congolese ministers, district superintendents and bishops. Present day missionaries fulfill their calling in teaching, nursing, healing, serving where needed — and witnessing to their Christian faith by word and deed within the framework of this calling. A missionary must accept and become a part of the local customs and life style, and he must learn to speak the language of the people. Only then can he communicate on a person-to-person basis.

Artifacts and clothing were displayed by the speaker. Many of the articles had been made expressly for her as gifts of love from the women she worked with. Color slides of the beautiful countryside, the homes of the people, the everyday life which her family shared — these helped to make real, in the minds of all, the facts that have been studied in this series.

A covered dish luncheon was served after the program, and the president, Mrs. G. C. Acrea, presented a gift to Mrs. Gorham as a token of the Society's appreciation for her presentation.
