consumption. While skip row planting of peanuts is not widespread now, the promise of improved yields would tend to promote the practice unless the regulations are changed, USDA indicated.

UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF THOSE both in and out of government who think the manned plane is obsolete and unnecessary, the B-1 bomber has not been put into producion. Those who believe that t is safe to let down our defenses gamble with the very future of our Nation.

THE RUSSIAN BEAR MAY NOT BE yet 10 feet tall and fully matured but he is exercising and growing rapidly. The future of our Country is too dear to take chances on only living for the moment.

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
