Elmer V. (Jack) Hetzell of Jacksboro announced today that he is a candidate for the House of Representatives for the Texas 54th District.

He stated these reasons for desiring the post.

- "I believe that this is what God wants for my life."
- "I want to be another positive influence in the House for integrity and ethics in politics."
- "It is my belief that more and other godly men should take a more active part in state, local and national government."
- "My concern for gross waste and extravagant spending by state government, inequitable financing of schools and excessive bureaucracy."
- "I sincerely believe that another few years dedicated to better our state would seem proper for me, having served more than 20 years military."

My qualifying experiences are: A love for people and concern for individuals regardless of race, creed or color; Have some twenty-three years experience as a senior administrator; Considerable experience as an instructor, four years of which was at A&M University of Texas; Was licensed to preach in 1954 and ordained in 1959; Ministered in many countries, i.e., Germany, France, Greece, Turkey, Japan, Korea, Holland, Belgium, Italy, and England, as well as across the United States, having ministered in more than three hundred churches of various denominations across the state of Texas.

It is my belief that a representative should be representative of the people by the people and for the people. Texas has been controlled by one party since the reformation, which gives imbalance and causes party officials to have the idea that they own the state, this causes them to feel that anything that they do (honest or dishonest) is right.

The State of Texas should have a true two-party system, which can only be brought by electing a Republican majority.

Mr. Hetzell is married to the former Lillian May Burgess of Winchester, England. They have two children, Rodney David Hetzel, Cleveland, Ohio, and Jacqueline Marie Hubbell of Jacksboro.

## Truman Kirk Announces For 91st Dist. Judge

Truman P. Kirk, 47 year-old Cisco attorney and businessman, announced today his plans to be a candidate for District Judge of the 91st District Court of Eastland County.

In making this announcement, Mr. Kirk made the following statement to the press: "My experience, my background, my qualification as an attorney, my reputation for fair, sober and impartial dealings and my strong desire to work for the best interest of Justice for ALL our People . . . gives me the necessary judicial temperament to qualify me to be your Judge. I pledge to be a Judge who will apply the law and the facts with 'Fairness and Justice' in each case, as it comes before the Court, without favoritism."

Mr. Kirk, announced for this same office in 1968, but was "disqualified" by Judge Temple Driver of Wichita Falls, Texas, after the jury dead-locked 8-4 in favor of Kirk's position in regards to a contest of residence brought against him by Earl Conner, who then ran unopposed for this office.

When questioned about this, Kirk said, the Judge on a case is much like a referee of a football game, he has to call it as he sees it. I can't say that I agreed with Judge Driver, then, or now, but I didn't have the time or money, to appeal his decision, at that time. But now we have a New Race, and under these circumstances, I don't feel as though I will be running against an incumbent but against a football game, it's now the second half and I now have the ball and I want to win and serve the People of Eastland County as their District Judge. I know that I am fully qualified and no one can find any technicality to disqualify me now. I feel that now the "Good People" of Eastland County will have a chance to choose and that they will elect Truman P. Kirk to be their District Judge on May 6, 1972.

Mr. Kirk, and his family are members of the First Baptist Church of Cisco. Mr. Kirk is a member of the Cisco Lions Club and is president of the Oil Belt University of Texas Exes.

Mr. Kirk is married to the former Evelyn Marie Ross Kirk, who taught in the Eastland Public Schools in 1968-69 and now teaches 4th grade in the Cisco Intermediate School.

The Kirks have four children: Ken, age 18, a graduate of Cisco High School 1971 and now a student at Baylor University; Karen, age 16, a Junior at Cisco High School; Kaylene, age 12, a 7th grader at Cisco Junior High; and Kevin, 11.

Truman P. Kirk began his business career as a paper boy for The Abilene Reporter News of Abilene where he became a Paper Route District Manager while still in high school.

After graduation from Hardin-Simmons University with a degree in government and business, he served as newspaper circulation manager for the Big Spring Herald and the San Angelo Standard-Times, before he enrolled in Law School at the University of Texas in Austin, where he graduated in the upper one-third of his class; was editor of the Law School Newspaper; worked in the Library; and also worked as Promotion Manager for the Austin-American Newspaper, while attending school. He received the "Consul Award" which is given for "outstanding contribution of a student" to the Law School.

After graduating from the University in 1956, Kirk served the City of Odessa for four years as City Attorney.

In 1960, Mr. Kirk returned to Abilene and served two years as an attorney for the City of Abilene, then resigned and was elected, and served, as City Commissioner and Councilman until 1965.

In the summer of 1965 he set up his law offices in Cisco, and taught government for four years at Cisco Junior College, and he and family live in Cisco at 104 West 6th Street.

## Election of TPPB Board Members Near

The Texas Peanut Producers Board is required by law to hold biennial elections for the purpose of electing board members. At the first meeting of the Board October 1, 1969, lots were drawn by members to determine the tenure of office of the initial board members. As a result of this drawing Lyndell Coan of De Leon, Billy Carruth of De Leon, and Ben Cook of May were elected for terms of two years. These members are all from District No. 1 which includes these counties: Brown, Comanche, Mills, Hamilton, San Saba, McCulloch, Mason Llano, Coryell, and Gillespie. Therefore, two members will be elected to represent this district and one to represent the State at Large. Election of these members must be completed and tabulated by May 1, 1972.

All producers of peanuts within the area defined including owners of farms on which peanuts are produced, are eligible to vote in the election if such producer would be required under HB 525 to pay the assessment.

Any producer of peanuts who is qualified to vote in the election who desires to be a candidate for membership on the Texas Peanut Producers Board, shall file with the principle office P. O. Box 398, Gorman, Texas 76454, an application to have his name printed on the ballot to be used in the election. The application must be signed by the candidate and by at least 10 peanut producers who are qualified to vote in the election and must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election. All ballots must be postmarked by midnight April 28, 1972.

No candidates, unless so nominated, shall have his name placed on the official ballot. However, this does not prevent the writing of the name of any candidate on the ballot by any qualified voter at the election, and spaces shall be provided on the ballot for such write-in candidates.

## USDA Plans To Exclude Peanuts From Skip-Row

WASHINGTON, January 13 — The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today it plans to exclude peanuts from the skip row planting provision beginning with the 1972 crop program. This will mean that where peanuts are planted in a skip row pattern the entire field will be counted as peanut acreage.

The action is being taken in order to prevent abnormal increases in yields and hold down program costs, USDA officials explained. Commodity Credit Corporation has acquired about 35 percent of the 1970 crop of peanuts and present indications are it will take over a larger percentage of the 1971 crop.

Field studies indicate that yields increase by 10 to 20 percent when peanuts are planted in skip row pattern, making every row an outside row thereby improving growing conditions.

USDA has no authority, as it has in the case of other crops, to reduce the minimum peanut allotment of 1,610,000 acres to avoid surpluses resulting from higher yields. Peanut yields have been rising at the rate faster than consumption.

While skip row planting of peanuts is not widespread now, the promise of improved yields would tend to promote the practice unless the regulations are changed, USDA indicated.

## Denese Grady is Betty Crocker Homemaker

Denese Grady has been named Gorman High School's Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for 1972. She was chosen on the basis of her score in a written knowledge and attitude examination taken by senior girls on Dec. 7, and will receive a specially designed award charm from General Mills, sponsor of the annual educational program. Additionally, she is now eligible for state and national honors.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow, to be selected from all school winners in the state in judging which will center on performance in the Dec. 7 test, will be awarded a \$1,500 college scholarship. Her school will receive a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica from Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. A scholarship of \$500 will go to the second-ranking girl in the state.

This April, the 51 Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow representing every state and the District of Columbia — each accompanied by a faculty adviser — will be given an expense-paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C. Personal observation and interviews during the tour, added to the earlier state-level judging results, will culminate in the announcement of the 1972 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow at the conclusion of the tour. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000, with those of three runners-up raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

In addition to the awards for school, state and national Homemakers of Tomorrow, a special \$1,000 Nutrition Scholarship has been added to the Betty Crocker Search program this year. To earn this award, a girl must be planning a college major in nutrition or a related field, rank among the highest in her state in the overall Search examination and achieve the top score, from those meeting the first two criteria, on the test's nutrition questions.

During the 18 years since the program's inception, enrollment has totaled over eight and one-quarter million, and, with this year's grants, scholarship awards will reach almost \$2 million.

They have given us geographical protection making it practically impossible for another nation to attack us. In our history they have given us time to build up our strength when danger seriously threatened. The tempo of modern technology has changed all this, as it has changed so many other things. It has stripped this Country of our friendly protecting oceans.

**THE BEARER OF BAD NEWS** is always punished. In ancient times one who bore adverse reports to the ruler, even though the truth, might be put to death. Today he simply becomes an "alarmist" but if there is one subject about which the American people must have a conscientious concern it is our military position compared to that of the Soviet Union.

**"PEACE IN OUR TIME"** became a slogan after declared by Neville Chamberlain. What followed was six years of bloody conflict, which came near wrecking western civilization. We must hope that lessons of appeasement and unpreparedness have not receded into the dimness of shadows of past history.

**IF HISTORY TEACHES US ANYTHING,** it surely must be that weakness invites attack; that it takes only one aggressor to plunge the world into war against the wishes of peace-loving countries.

**SOME OF OUR WEAKNESSES AND VULNERABILITY** have been pointed out in this space from time to time. Another one has recently been proved. A defecting Cuban pilot flew a Russian MIG Fighter plane to a Florida Air Base in 1969 and more lately a Russian-built transport flew from Havana to New Orleans carrying some uninvited delegates to a sugar conference. The question is how were these unannounced flights made without triggering an air alert.

**THE CHAIRMAN OF THE ARMED SERVICES COMMITTEE** of the House of Representatives gives the answer. There is virtually no air defense system along our southern border and the Gulf Coast.

**A DEFENSE DEPARTMENT STATEMENT** attempts some reassurances. It says that the Soviet Union could not launch a major manned bomber attack without the United States knowing about it. Besides, it is reasoned, strategic manned bombers are not worth worrying about in this age of far more formidable nuclear missiles.

There are visible efforts by both the Russians and Chinese communists to gain a foothold in Latin American Governments.

**EVEN IF OUR COUNTRY WAS NOT VULNERABLE** to a manned bomber attack, the Soviet submarine presence off our shores, capable of launching missiles half-way across our Nation, should be enough to bring us out of apathy to the possibility.

**IF THIS IS NOT ENOUGH,** THERE is reason to believe that the Russians will soon have bombers capable of flying over the United States at the speed of sound and back without refueling.

**IF SOME OF THE STRATEGISTS** believe that manned bombers are obsolete, it is obvious that those running the business of military preparedness in the Soviet Union do not.

**UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF THOSE** both in and out of government who think the manned plane is obsolete and unnecessary, the B-1 bomber has not been put into production. Those who believe that it is safe to let down our defenses gamble with the very future of our Nation.

**THE RUSSIAN BEAR MAY NOT BE** yet 10 feet tall and fully matured but he is exercising and growing rapidly. The future of our Country is too dear to take chances on only living for the moment.

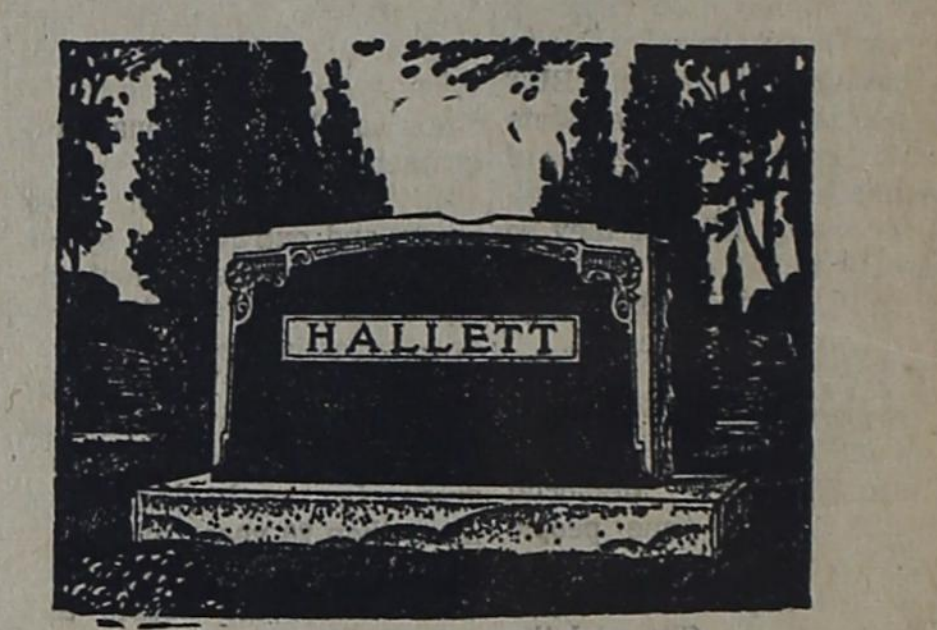

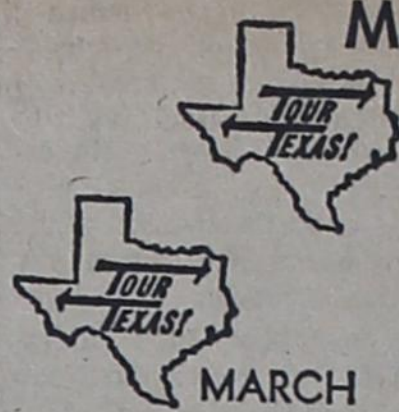

March 3-4 The 24th Heart of Texas Band Festival, Brady. Highlighted by a mass parade around Brady square, this event last year drew 16 bands and 1,400 participants. Begins Friday night with show band contest, ends Saturday afternoon with concert and awarding of trophies.
