

An Open Letter To Barry Goldwater

October 22, 1964

Dear Mr. Goldwater:
The other day when you suggested that you would be willing to use some phrase other than that shop-worn cliché of "soft on communism" in referring to our President, someone in the audience suggested the word "treason" and you replied "That's it!"

I guess that's when the deep resentment I have been feeling about the calculated campaign of vilification against our President turned into pure nausea. I stayed awake until 2 a. m. feeling sick, and thinking about what you were doing.

You must have finally felt a touch of nausea yourself, when, on the next day, you cancelled the "smut" film your campaign crew had prepared for nationwide showing. I guess I am pleased to learn that you do have a limit.

In your heart, Mr. Goldwater, you know that neither President Johnson nor his administration is in any way guilty of treason, and that this, even for campaign tactics, is something of a record "low."

This brings me to the point of this letter, "morality", an issue which you, sir, have chosen to inject into this campaign. It is an issue which only one of tremendous personal integrity can affectively pursue; and although you have tried mightily to project a posture of piety, I want to point out that you have not been very convincing.

You have cried out against government spending and waste, and then you have rattled the saber, even saying that nuclear war is inevitable, an attitude which has to call for a tremendously expensive military force.

Even more remarkably, you have spoken glibly of ending the draft.

Is this your idea of integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have cried out against massive Federal projects only to support them when they will be located in and benefit your home state.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have cried out in support of the exercise of local responsibilities as opposed to Federal "interference," and then you suggest that it is the Federal responsibility to maintain law and order in our local communities.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have had much to say about crime and lawlessness in many United States cities, notably Washington, D. C., and yet your own hometown in your own

home state turns up the fourth most crime-ridden city in the whole country.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have cried out against riots and lawlessness time and again, and yet your voting record in the Senate reveals a consistent vote against programs designed to correct the causes of crime.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You've cried out bitterly against immorality in high places, and yet

you have not uttered one word in condemnation of your running mate, who, as a Congressman, fought for legislation to benefit an organization which had been paying him \$7,500 annually for many years.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

In three speeches in January, you came out in favor of voluntary Social Security, something which makes one wonder about your wisdom, because this can only lead to bankruptcy of the system. Significant, however, is that in February in New Hampshire, you had the audacity to say, "I don't know where this voluntary business crept it."

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

When asked on a TV program in 1963 if, as President, you would favor getting out of the United Nations, you answered, "I would. At this point, having seen what the United Nations cannot do, I would have to suggest it." In June of this year, you said, "I've never advocated withdrawing from the United Nations." Your first remarks are recorded on tape.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

First you said, "I don't want to hit the moon — I want to lob one into the men's room in the Kremlin and make sure I hit it." Later you said, "It's absolutely essential that we get a man on the moon for military reasons if for no other."

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You once said that one Eisenhower in a generation was all the nation could survive. Had you erased that feeling from your heart when you were seeking Ike's support? How about that interview with the General which you had taped for campaign purposes, and then edited out several Eisen-

hower statements because they did not suit your position?

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

As you know in your heart, Mr. Goldwater, these are only a few of your inconsistencies, and you must know that they are very unbecoming to a man who wants to move into the White House by smearing its present occupant on the issue of morality.

What about Lyndon Johnson? He's not perfect and has never claimed to be so. On other hand, and you must know this in your heart, he is a great leader, and was selected by a majority of the most exclusive club in the world, the United States Senate — your club — as their leader.

I have read the "hate" stuff and I have yet to find a serious charge that is supported by evidence which would stand up in court. It is 98.9% pure smut — based on rumors, half-truths, innuendoes and pure lies.

Bobby Baker and Walter Jenkins? Can a man be held responsible for the actions of all the individuals whom he has associated with in 32 years of government service? Let us not forget that even President Eisenhower could not escape this sort of experience. Neither, for that matter, could Jesus Christ.

So, please, Mr. Goldwater, out of common decency and so that your campaign memories won't come back to haunt you in the years ahead, stick to your more noble campaign issues. Like taking the government out of agriculture, education, automation, transportation, pollution of streams, the waste of national resources. Like repudiating the foreign policies of Truman, Eisenhower, Kennedy and Johnson, and

leading the nation on a massive crusade to destroy Communism all over the world, even though it takes us to the brink time and again.

One closing thought — offered by my wife: Might it not encourage lawlessness in our land when one of the leading presidential candidates constantly belittles and demeans our Judiciary and our

Executive branches of government — even to the extent of charging treason?

Oh yes, thank you for providing the voters of our nation with a choice. You have made it an awfully, awfully easy one.

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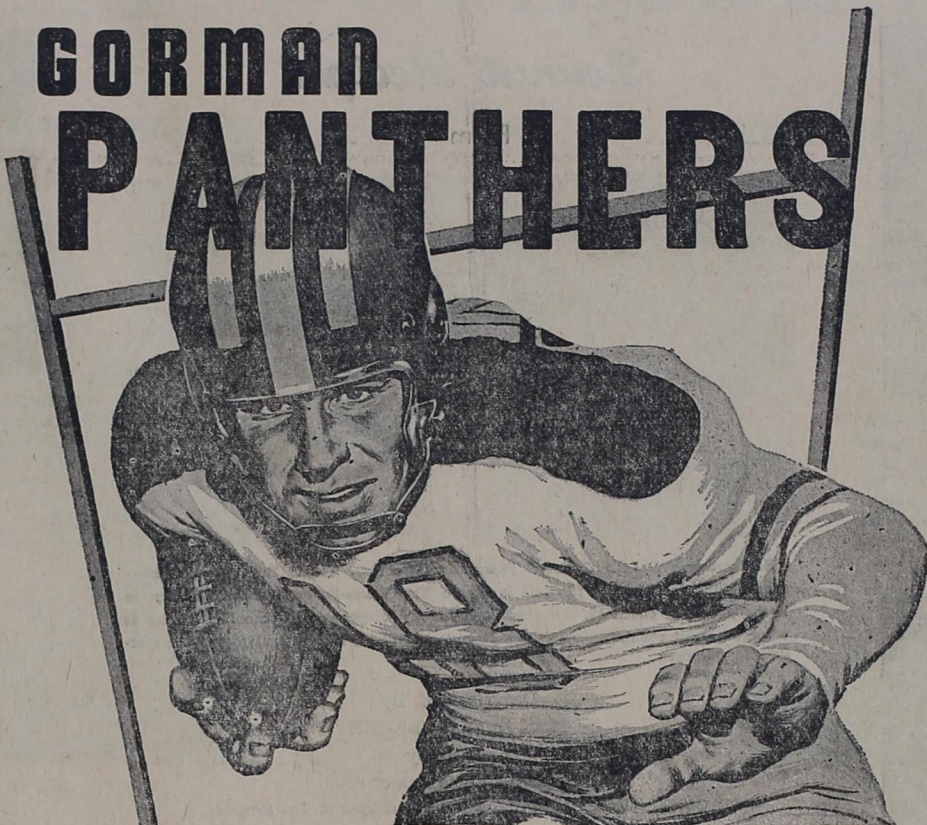

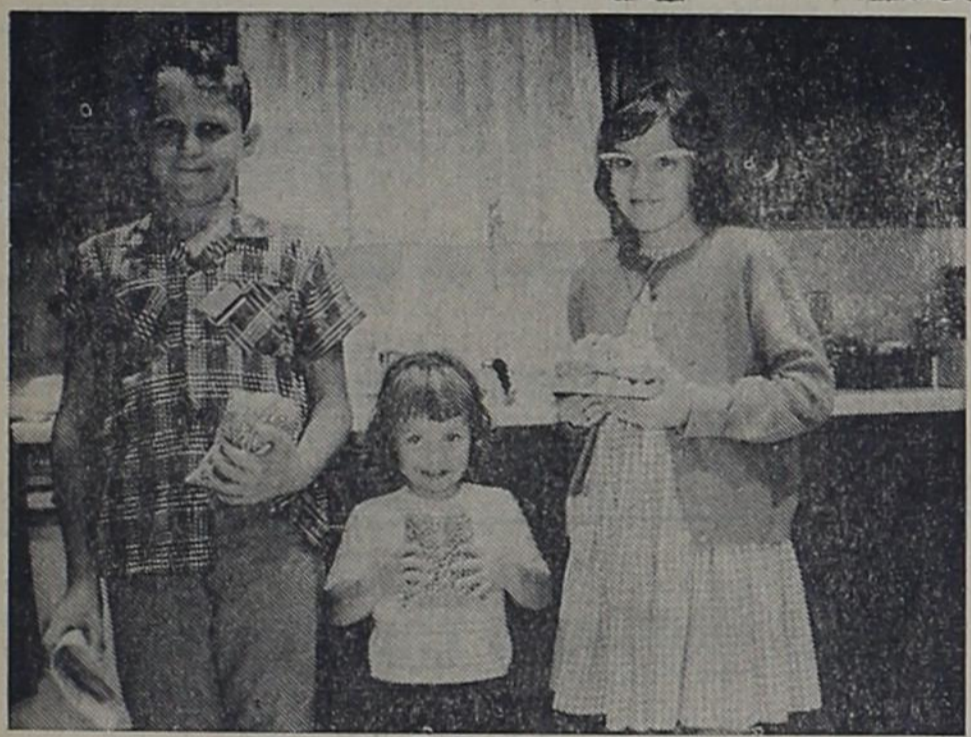
PEANUT DEMONSTRATION ENJOYED BY VISITORS AT FAIR KITCHEN WINDOW

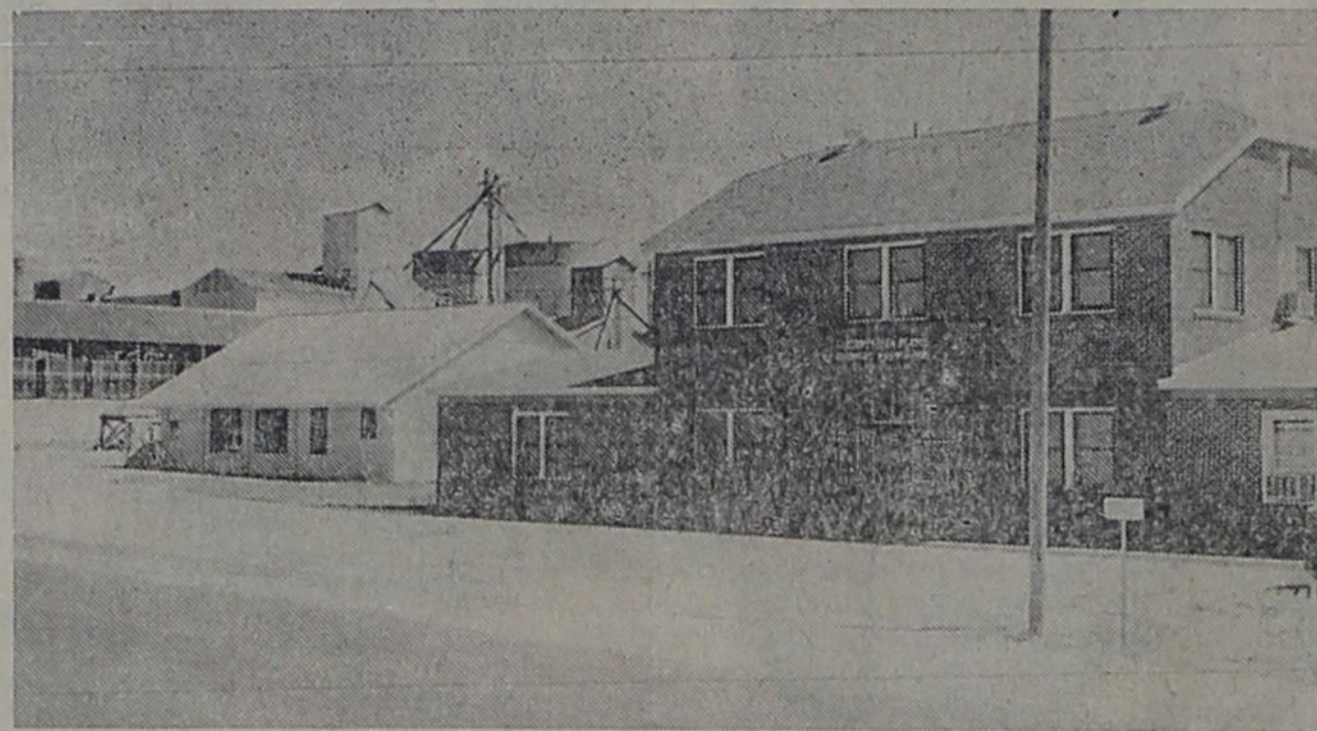

PEANUT-CARROT-ORANGE SALAD
2 cups coarsely grated carrots
1 cup coarsely chopped peanuts
1/2 cup raisins
Salad dressing
Lemon juice, if desired
3 to 4 oranges, cut in sections
Combine carrots, peanuts, and raisins with mayonnaise or peanut butter salad dressing and lemon juice to moisten. Arrange on lettuce with orange sections around edge. Six servings.

PEANUT-STUFFED PRUNE SALAD
18 cooked prunes
1/2 cup cottage cheese
1 tsp. grated orange rind
1/4 cup chopped peanuts
1/4 tsp salt
Mayonnaise or peanut butter salad dressing
Pit and chill prunes. Combine cottage cheese, grated orange rind, peanuts, and salt. Moisten with the dressing and stuff into the prunes. Six servings. Spread lettuce. Six servings.

WELSH RAREBIT
1 cup milk (or tomato juice)
2 tablespoons butter
12 cup chopper fat
12 cup chopper peanuts
12 cup grated cheese
12 teaspoon salt

Make sauce of butter, peanut meal, flour, milk and salt. Add cheese and heat over low fire until cheese has just melted. Serve on crackers or toast.

POTATO-PEANUT SOUFFLE

2 cups mashed potatoes
1 cup hot milk
12 cup sugar
2 eggs
3 tbsps. butter
1 teaspoon nutmeg
12 teaspoon salt
12 cup chopped peanuts

Scald the milk and dissolve the sugar and salt in it, add the butter and stir into the potatoes; beat until light and fluffy. Separate the eggs; beat the yolks and add to the potato. Beat the whites stiff; cut and fold into the potato and pour into a buttered baking dish. Cook in a moderate oven until the souffle is set. Add the marshmallows at the last and brown.

PEANUT APPLE CAKE

Time: 30 minutes
Temperature: 350 degrees F.
2 cups bread crumbs
1/4 cup sugar
2 tbsps. butter or margarine
12 cup peanuts, finely chopped salted and roasted

2 cups sweetened apple sauce
Mix bread crumbs, sugar and shortening. Toast lightly in 350 degree oven. Mix toasted bread crumbs and peanuts. Arrange alternate layers of crumb mixture and apple sauce in a buttered loaf pan, having a top layer of crumbs. Place in a 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. Turn out on serving plate, cut in slices and serve with sauce or whipped cream.
Variations: 1. Cinnamon may be added to the apple sauce.
2. Grated orange rind may be used for flavor variation.

Try this one, too!

CRYSTALIZED PEANUTS

2 cups shelled raw peanuts
1 cup sugar
1 cup water

Put all ingredients together in heavy sauce pan and boil over medium heat until all liquid is evaporated. Some stirring will be required when liquid becomes low to prevent peanuts from scorching and to make sugar crystallize. When all liquid is gone and peanuts have a good coat of sugar on them, pour upon a large platter or cookie sheet and stir through with spoon once or twice to break peanuts apart.

Mrs. Baker's recipe for
PEANUT BRITTLE
(Kernel Gene's favorite)

3 cups white sugar
1 cup White Karo
12 cup water
3 cups raw peanuts (heaping)
3 tbsps. butter
1 tsp. salt (heaping)
2 tsp. soda (heaping)

Boil sugar, Karo and water until thread spins. Add peanuts and stir continuously after peanuts are added. Cook until it turns a brownish gold. Take from fire, add butter, salt and soda. Pour onto buttered board and cool.

PEANUT BUTTER

CUP CAKES

12 cup butter or other fat.
12 cup peanut butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
4 teaspoons baking powder
12 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups sifted soft wheat flour

Cream together the fat, peanut butter and sugar and add the beaten eggs. The sifted dry ingredients are added next alternately with the milk and vanilla. Bake in greased muffin tins in a preheated (350 degree) oven for 20-30 minutes.

PEANUT BUTTER

HONEY SAUCE

1/4 cup honey
12 cup water
1/4 teaspoon salt
13 cup peanut butter

Combine honey, water and salt. Bring quickly to a boil, and boil 2 minutes. Cool. Place peanut butter in bowl, add syrup gradually beating with rotary beater until smooth. Store in covered jar in refrigerator until ready to use. Can be used for ice cream, puddings to dress up cakes. Economical because no sugar is necessary.

If honey is hard to find, substitute molasses or cane syrup.

APPLE BETTY

WITH PEANUTS

4 cups stewed apples
4 tbsps. butter
12 cup sugar
1 cup bread crumbs
1 cup ground peanuts
12 teaspoon salt
12 teaspoon cinnamon

Combine bread crumbs and peanuts, then arrange all ingredients in layers, and bake at 375 degrees F. until browned.

OATMEAL PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

Time: 10-12 minutes
Temperature: 375 degrees
3/4 cup peanut butter
3 tablespoons shortening
12 cup brown sugar
12 cup granulated sugar
3/4 cup sifted all-purpose flour
14 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
13 cup water
1 1/4 cups oats, quick or regular, uncooked.

Cream peanut butter and shortening; add sugars gradually, creaming entire mixture well. Stir in sifted dry ingredients and water alternately. Add uncooked oats. Chill dough and roll dough thin on lightly floured board and cut with cookie cutters. (If preferred, dough may be formed into rolls before chilling, slice rolls 1/4 inch thin). Bake on greased baking sheet in a moderate oven (375 degrees) 10-12 minutes. For party dress, frost cookies with powdered sugar and milk icing. Trim with candied cherries and chopped nuts.

PEANUT & CHEESE ROAST

2 cups chopped peanuts
3 canned pimentos, chopped
Milk
1 cup grated cheese
1 cup bread crumbs
Salt

Mix peanuts, pimento, cheese and bread crumbs. Moisten with enough milk to form into a roll. Brown in the oven, basting occasionally with butter and water.

PEANUT CANDY

from Edith Funk, Sadler, Texas

3 cups sugar
1 1/2 cups peanuts porched and ground
1 cup sweet milk
3 tbsps. sorghum molasses (old fashioned kind)

Cook sugar, molasses and milk to a soft ball. Remove from heat, let cool, add the peanuts and beat until creamy. Pour onto wax paper or greased slab.

Have you served broiled ham with well seasoned mashed sweet potatoes — sweet potatoes that have crushed peanut brittle mixed with them or sprinkled over the top, generously? If you haven't had it — try it and remember, pork products are plentiful. I find it very easy to put the potatoes in the broiler pan under the rack above in the usual manner.

This completes the third year Kernel Gene and Thereasa have had the pleasure of demonstrating and passing out peanut recipes to folk at the State Fair of Texas. Many people from out of state were constantly asking how peanuts grew and also asked for extra copies of the peanut recipes to give to friends.

PEANUT - RICE CROQUETTES

1 tbsps. fat
2 tbsps flour
1/2 tsp. salt
Pepper or 2 or 3 drops tabasco sauce, if desired
1/2 cup milk
2 cups cooked rice
3/4 cup finely chopped or ground salted peanuts
1 egg, beaten
Beaten egg and fine crumbs
Fat or drippings for frying

Melt fat and blend in flour and seasonings. Add milk and cook slowly until the sauce is very thick, stirring constantly. Cool. Add rice, peanuts and egg and shape into croquettes. Dip in beaten egg, roll in crumbs, and brown in fat. Serve with cheese sauce. Six servings.

PEANUT COLESAW

Add 3/4 to 1 cup chopped peanuts to coleslaw for six.

PEANUT DEVILED EGGS

Add several tablespoons of chopped peanuts to the filling for 6 deviled eggs.

PEANUT-POTATO SALAD

Add 1/2 to 3/4 cup peanut halves to potato salad for six. Peanut butter may be used.

TRY - Peanut butter, mayonnaise, chopped crisp bacon, sliced tomatoes, lettuce, bread.

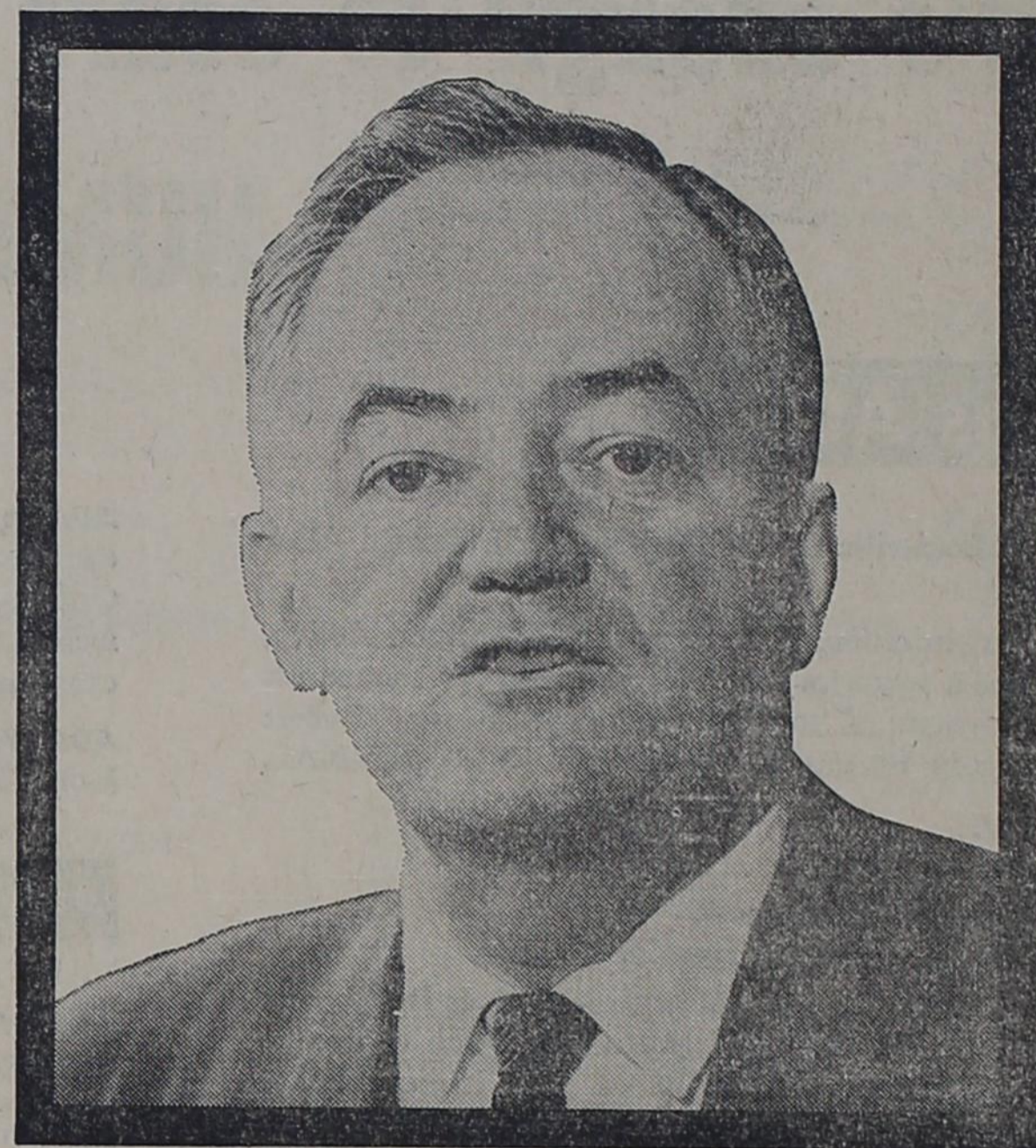
PEANUT & LETTUCE SALAD

Place shredded lettuce on the salad plate. Spread ground, raw peanuts over the lettuce and serve with mayonnaise, sour cream dressing or cooked salad dressing.

What is ADA?

A writer from the Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL defined ADA this way:

"The political organization, Americans for Democratic Action, (ADA) has become a synonym for fellow-traveler, for communist sympathizer, for advocate of 'soft' policies toward Russia." Robert L. Riggs, Washington Bureau, Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL.

ADA stands for:

- Domestic socialism.
- One world government.
- Blindness to the Communist threat.

ADA is a national left wing political organization. It is the most influential of all home-grown organizations attempting to change our traditional American government into a socialist dictatorship. Though not admittedly a "secret organization," no membership list can be obtained from their national headquarters in Washington.

U. S. Senator Strom Thurmond said about the ADA: "All the actions and policies advocated by the ADA point to federal socialism."

WHO FOUNDED ADA?

ADA was founded in 1947 by a group of ultra-liberals, including Hubert Humphrey; Chester Bowles; radical labor leader David Dubinsky; New York City editor, James Wechsler, once an official of the Young Communist League; Harvard historian Arthur Schlesinger, Jr.; Walter Reuther of the UAW; Morris Ernst of the American Civil Liberties Union; Joseph L. Rauh, Jr., liberal Washington lawyer; and many others.

HUMPHREY AND ADA ONE AND THE SAME

Hubert Humphrey, perhaps more than any other person in high elective office, stands for and symbolizes the extreme left in American politics.

Humphrey, a founding father of ADA, was Chairman of ADA in 1949 and 1950. Every year since, he has served as National Vice-Chairman. During fifteen years in the Senate he has voted the ADA position on 191 occasions, and against it only 3. Humphrey demonstrated his subservience to the ADA when he said "this great organization has seen fit to chastise me. Perhaps I did not understand why at the moment, but their judgment was undoubtedly better than mine."

Norman Thomas, six times a Socialist Party presidential candidate, said this year: "Humphrey is the type of Democrat I like, and one who would be a Socialist if he got to England." Chicago Tribune, May 30, 1964.

ADA WORLD, (ADA official publication) March, 1964 reported: "The nation's great gathering of liberal-labor leaders will begin May 15 in Washington, D. C., at the ADA Seventeenth Annual Convention. Walter Reuther, Hubert Humphrey and Martin Luther King will address the convention."

Congressman Otto E. Passman (Dem.-La.), 10 years Chairman of the House Appropriations Sub-committee: "...Hubert Humphrey is a Socialist if I ever saw one. America is not creeping, but running toward Socialism." — Dallas News, Sept. 11, 1964.

ADA Is Blind to Security Risk. "We urge that all government employees removed as loyalty or security risks under the Executive Orders of Presidents Eisenhower and Truman and other Government programs be given the opportunity to have their cases re-examined."

ADA Wants to Recognize Communist East Germany. ADA wants East (Communist) Germany recognized as an independent nation.

ADA CALLS FOR ONE-WORLD GOVERNMENT

ADA Would Replace American Armed Forces With United Nations Army. "We recommend development of an armed force as a permanent agency of the United Nations to replace national armed forces."

ADA Would Open U. S. to All Foreigners. "The United States and headquarters of the United Nations should be open to all foreigners having business with it. We urge the abandonment of the present restrictions upon the admission and stay of foreigners."

ADA Urges U. S. Disarmament enforced by United Nations Police Force. "Our aim must be to achieve general and complete disarmament . . . It must be recognized that no safeguards can provide 100% protection against error or treachery. For this reason it is necessary to build the capacity of the United Nations to enforce disarmament arrangements."

ADA wants America to abandon the Panama Canal and give it to the United Nations.

No man supporting these views should hold the office of President or Vice President of the United States.

ADA ENDORSES JOHNSON

The ADA "enthusiastically and unanimously endorses the Johnson-Humphrey ticket." (ADA World, Sept. 1964)

President Lyndon Johnson, in a welcoming telegram which was read to the 17th annual ADA convention: "You (ADA) have now endured, despite frequent premature burials by your critics, to see many of your ideas become policies, your policies become programs, and your programs become laws."

A vote for Lyndon Johnson is a vote to make Hubert Humphrey President.

Lyndon Johnson had a serious heart attack in July, 1955. Doctors say that the average life expectancy of a man Johnson's age following such a heart attack is less than 10 years. (Ask your own doctor about this.) Therefore, medical odds are that if Johnson is elected in 1964, Humphrey will be President before the term expires.

ADA Would Discontinue Communist Investigations. "We urge that the Un-American Activities Committee of the House of Representatives be discontinued."

"We propose repealing the Smith Act, the Internal Security Act of 1950, and the Communist Control Act of 1954."

"We urge the abolition of the Attorney General's list of Subversive Organizations."

ADA Says Teachers Could be Communists. "Former membership in a Communist organization, or refusal to testify under the 5th Amendment, should not be automatic grounds to disqualify a teacher."

ADA Advocates Aid to Communist Countries. "We urge efforts to expand trade with Communist nations and the amendment of the Battle Act to give the President standing authority to extend loans and grants to the Communist countries of eastern Europe."

ADA Welcomes Castro. "Actions by the United States to intervene militarily or to support military invasion by Cuban exiles or by others would not only be wrong but self-defeating . . . We should welcome the Castro regime into the South American Alliance for Progress."

ADA Opposes Loyalty Oaths. "We oppose loyalty oaths other than the traditional oath taken by government employees to support the constitution and laws of the United States."

Goldwater Stresses Need For Morality In Government

AUSAIN, Tex. — In the last phase of his promising presidential campaign, Senator Barry Goldwater continued to stress the need for morality in government at all levels.

"Certainly, simple honesty is not too much to demand of men of Government," Goldwater said. GOP leaders saw a personal tragedy in the Walter Jenkins case but pointed out the disclosures raised serious questions of national security and Jenkins' alleged involvement in the Bobby Baker scandal.

Texas GOP Chairman Peter O'Donnell Jr. asked: "If Walter Jenkins and Bobby Baker are examples of Mr. Johnson's ability to size up men, what can we expect if he sits down opposite the new leaders of the Kremlin?" William S. White, close friend and biographer of the President, wrote of Jenkins last December: "He attends the super-secret National Security Council."

Security officers in Washington have warned for years that Communist agents seize on moral weakness as a means of blackmailing government personnel for information they seek.

O'Donnell asked if the FBI had made a security check on Jenkins

Browsing with Bev

A splash of color can cheer up the cook as well as brighten the meal. And one of the best brighter-uppers around is the lively red of fresh tomatoes. Use them lavishly this time of year and use them with beef. The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports both foods in abundant supply.

The two foods are old friends. Their flavors complement each other in many a favorite recipe. For a starter try these:

Pour 2 1/2 cups of tomatoes over a pot roast the last hour of cooking. It makes first-class gravy especially if a clove of garlic and a little thyme are cooked with the meat.

Add 1 cup of tomatoes and your favorite seasonings to 1 1/2 pounds of ground beef for meat loaf. Use about a cup of soft bread crumbs as a binder. Put extra flavor and moistness in ground beef patties by adding 3/4 cup of tomatoes to 1 pound of ground beef. Use 1/2 cup of uncooked, quick-cooking oats as a binder and season to taste. This combination offers a deliciously "different" flavor and helps you stretch a pound of meat to serve 6.

Pour 2 1/2 cups of tomatoes over browned round for Spanish

when he joined the White House staff last November. "If not, why not?"

"The most simple security check would have revealed Jenkins' previous arrest on a similar morals charge in 1959," said Tad Smith, state campaign coordinator for Goldwater-Miller. "How many other Johnson aides are now serving without having adequate security checks?"

O'Donnell pointed out that Mr. Johnson had protected Jenkins from testifying before the Senate Rules Committee investigation of Bobby Baker.

"According to sworn testimony, Jenkins used pressure to secure kickbacks in the form of advertising revenue for Lyndon Johnson's television station.

"Executive privilege no longer protects Jenkins and he should be required to testify on everything he knows about Bobby Baker and the alleged kickbacks to Johnson's station," O'Donnell said.

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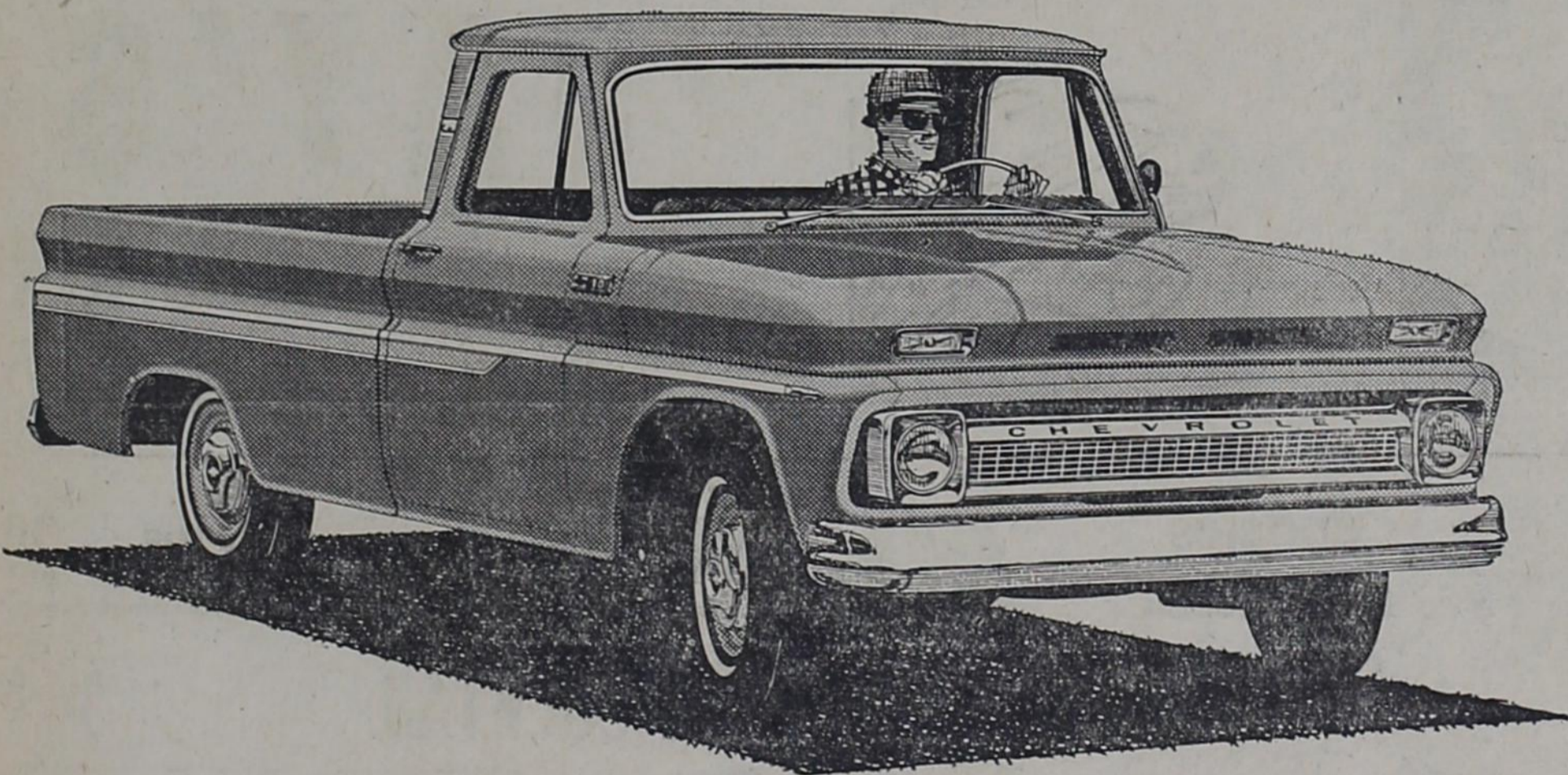
