County Pecan Show Set At Ranger For December 11-12th.

RANGER — The Twelfth Annual Eastland County Pecan Show will be held December 11-12 in the Joseph Building in Ranger, according to W. T. Brown, president of the Chamber of Commerce, and C. E. Smith of Rising Star, president of the growers association, co-sponsors of the two-day affair.

Classes have been set up in the rules and regulations for 34 different papershell varieties of pecans, including the popular Choc-taw, Wichita and Comanche, developed in recent years.

The show has been held for the past several years in Ranger. Members of the association annually vote on the town for the show. Cisco and Rising Star also invited the show to be held in their respective towns this year.

Originated by County Agent J. M. Cooper in 1952, as a stimulus to the development of the pecan industry in the county and area. The show was held in Cisco for several years.

Entries of pecans are accepted from growers not only in Eastland, but adjoining counties as well. The annual Eastland County Pecan Queen Contest will be held at the Ranger Junior College in connection with the show.

Details of the show were recently worked out by the officers and directors of the growers, Mrs. Beverly Nicholson, County HD Agent, and the agricultural committee of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, according to Dr. John Foster, chairman.

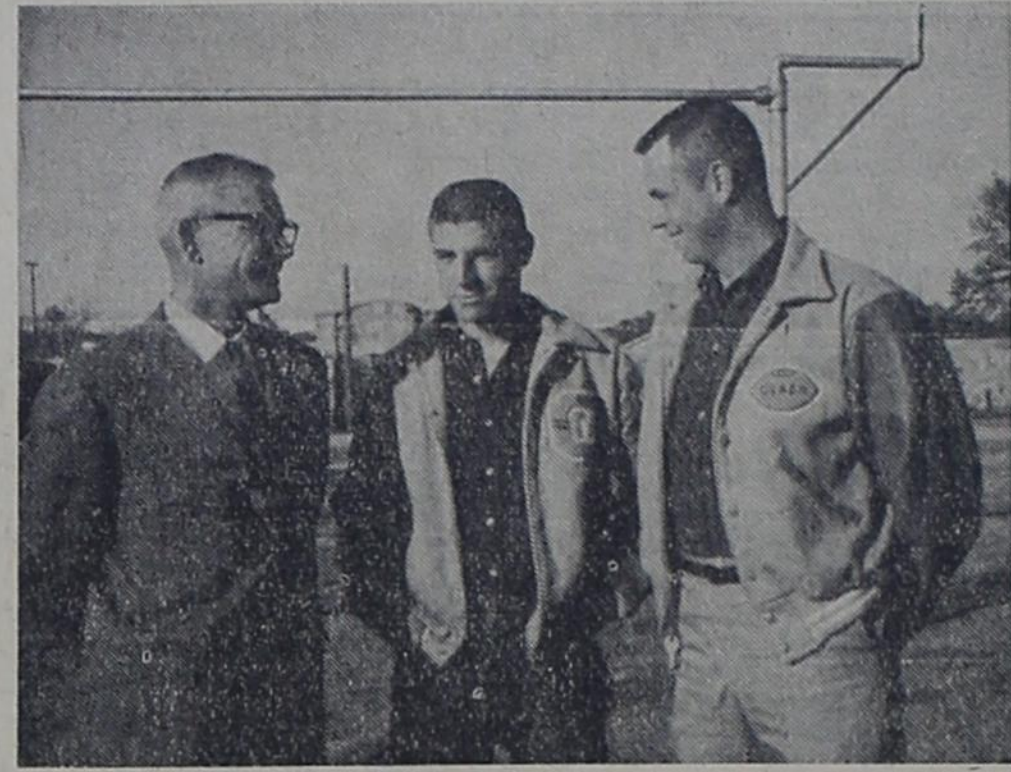
A quart fruit jar full of nuts constitutes an entry. They must be entered by noon on Dec. 11. However, they may be left at the county agent's office at the court house prior to this time, it was explained.

One trophy and several plaques will be awarded to the top winners of the show through the courtesy of the National Shellers and Processors Association of Chicago, jointly with several others from over the state.

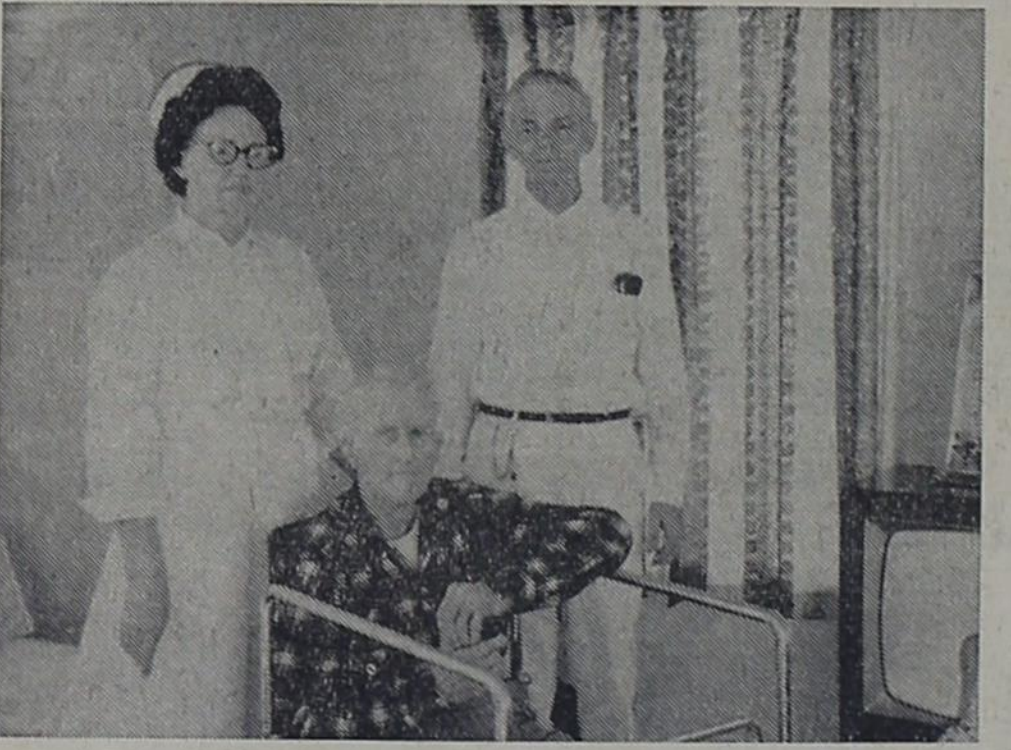
In addition to Gary's athletic ability he is above average scholastically with an 85 grade average.

Gene's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Cullen Rodgers, who live on a farm near Gorman.

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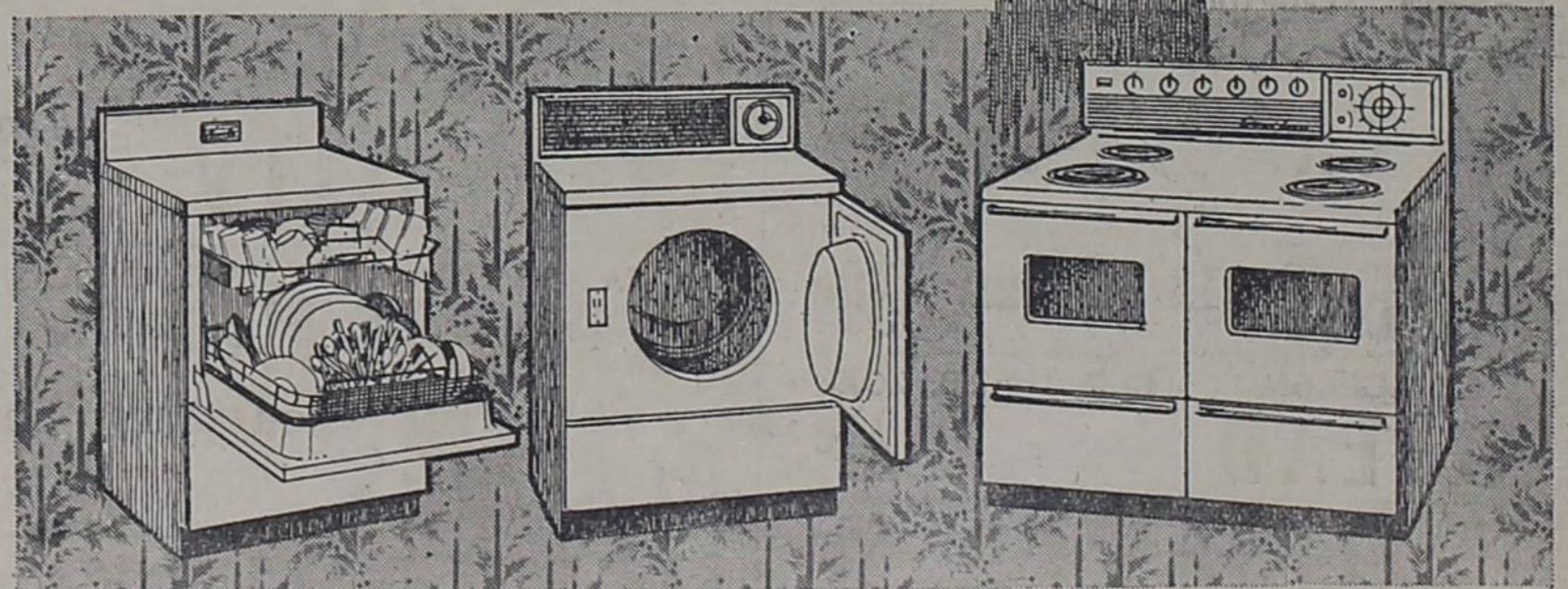
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On the evening of Feb. 4, 1874, a group of 10 people gathered at an English home for a going away party for one of the empire's most noted hymn writers.

During the evening the poetess took the opportunity to study each member of the gathering. She observed that the happiest of the group were those who had found their respective places in life and were using their talents accordingly. While, on the other hand, the most unhappy were those who had not discovered their talents or, in her opinion, were not using their abilities in proper channels.

Frances Ridley Havergal lived in the belief that her talents were a trust of God and were to

be used only as He would have them used. Many another artisan had used his talent just as sincerely. It was, in fact, the work of a painter with his version of Christ on the cross, that inspired Miss Havergal to write her first notable hymn, "I Gave My Life for Thee."

After the guests had gone the 38-year-old poetess retired to her room. Her observations had led her to a renewed conviction that her gift of writing verse was God-given and to the theme of one of her greatest hymns. As was the case most of her short life (she died at 43) Miss Havergal was ill. But she began to write. By dawn Frances Ridley Havergal had completed another of her immortal hymns which is given here in part.

Take my life, and let it be
Consecrated, Lord, to Thee;
Take my hands, and let them move
At the impulse of Thy love.

Take my feet, and let them be
Swift and beautiful for Thee;
Take my voice, and let me sing
Always, only for my King.

Take my love; my Lord, I pour
At Thy feet its treasure-store;
Take myself, and I will be
Ever, only, all for Thee.

Lord, I give my life to Thee,
Thine forever-more to be;
Lord, I give my life to Thee,
Thine forever-more to be.
