County Historical Survey Committee Meets In Eastland

The initial meeting of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee was held Friday afternoon at 2 p. m., February 1, 1963, in the Commissioners Court Room at Eastland with Mrs. Bernie McRae, Chairman, from Cisco, presiding.

She introduced Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey and expressed to him appreciation on behalf of the committee members for the privilege of having the opportunity to serve as co-workers with him on the county committee.

Judge Bailey spoke briefly on the aims of the committee to sponsor projects of historical nature and, in turn, introduced the speaker for the afternoon, Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, of Abilene, Chairman of the State Historical Survey Committee. Dr. Richardson spoke on the origin of a State Committee in 1953 and then on its becoming a state agency in 1957. He enlarged upon the purpose of organizing committees in the counties over the state, and on being successful so far in having co-ordinating members in more than 200 counties. He also stated that January 19, 1963, was officially declared as Historical Preservation Day by Governor John Connally, who will present to each member of a county committee a Certificate of Recognition for service rendered during their two year term.

Mrs. McRae announced that a museum for the county would be the first project to be considered and then outlined the state suggested program of work. The Chairman then asked the committee members to stand with hands joined as she read the Committee Motto, namely, "Let us join hands as a group, pledging to carry out this important and valuable work, wishing to go on record as being progressive and united."

Charles Freyschlag of Eastland was appointed as Vice Chairman and Mrs. Lee White from Rising Star, was asked to serve as secretary. Mrs. Ed T. Cox asked that her resignation be accepted by the committee and Mrs. McRae appointed Mrs. Cox's daughter, Mrs. Mildred Amis, also of Eastland, to serve in her place.

Members of the committee who were not present for the meeting were Mrs. Cox, Mrs. G. W. Hart, and Charles Freyschlag, all of Eastland, and Mrs. A. H. Powell of Ranger.

The next meeting announced by the Chairman will again be in Eastland, at 2 p. m. on Friday, February 15, 1963.

The public has an invitation to attend these meetings whenever and wherever possible, and patrons interested in loaning or contributing any item of historical nature toward the establishment of a museum may contact any member of the committee, Mrs. McRae, or County Judge Scott Bailey, the chairman stated.

School Board Meet Held On Monday

A decision was made to invite a group of taxpaying citizens of the school district to a discussion meeting to be held in the School Auditorium on Monday night, February 18, beginning at 7:30 p. m. The purpose of the meeting will be to acquaint the group with the facts surrounding the financial status of the district and to solicit the understanding, advise and cooperation of the group.

Mr. W. G. Baker was appointed as presiding judge to hold the Trustee Election on April 6, with Mrs. Viola Eaker and Mrs. Estelle Craddock as clerks and Mrs. Rooney Williams as an alternate clerk.

The deadline for filing for a place on the official ballot for the Trustee Election was set at March 6th. at 5 p. m., the place of filing to be in the office of the County Judge in Eastland.

The authorization was given for the use of a school bus to carry a group of the local teachers to the district Teachers Conference in Wichita Falls on March 8, providing the group pays for all operating expenses of the bus and provided that there is insurance coverage on the bus for the trip.

Mr. Algie M. Beeman, 77, president of the Henrietta First National Bank since 1957, died Wednesday, February 6th. at Clay County Memorial Hospital after being hospitalized there since Dec. 7.

Funeral services were held on Friday at 1 p. m. in the First Methodist Church in Henrietta with the pastor, Rev. A. Bailey Duncan, officiating, assisted by Rev. Edwin Hunter of Dallas, a retired minister, and Herman Pope, minister of the Henrietta Church of Christ.

Burial was in Sanger, Texas. Born May 9, 1885 in Amity, Ark., Beeman taught school at Hankins Normal College at Gorman prior to entering the banking business at Hamlin in 1912.

He was married to Ethel Raye Banister of Quanah. They moved to Henrietta in 1957 when he assumed presidency of the bank. Before moving to Henrietta he had been vice-president of the First National Bank at Grand Prairie and was a founder of the bank there. He was also president of the bank at Sanger for ten years prior to his residence at Grand Prairie.

Beeman was a member of the official board of the First Methodist Church, was past president of the Henrietta and Clay County Chamber of Commerce and was a member of the chamber board of directors at the time of his death.

He was also a member of the Kiwanis Club, the Gorman Masonic Lodge, and was active in civic work in Henrietta.

His survivors include the widow of the home; a son, Algie M. Beeman, Jr. of Knoxville, Tenn.; a daughter, Mrs. Hugh E. Pate of Sanger; a sister, Mrs. Jettie Williams of Kermit; one grandson and one great-granddaughter.

W. F. Bennett To Speak At Ag Meet In Rising Star

Peanut farmers of the Rising Star area are invited to hear Dr. W. F. Bennett, Soil Chemist of the A&M College Extension Service, discuss fertilizers and soil testing at a meeting in the agricultural building in Rising Star Monday night, February 18th, at 7:00 p. m.

The meeting has been arranged by H. L. Geyer, Rising Star Vocational Agricultural teacher, and Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper for the benefit of farmers in that area of the county.

Essential fertilizer elements such as nitrogen, phosphates and potash, and the part they play in plant growth and development, will be discussed in detail. Also included in the discussion will be the trace elements such as Boron, Iron, Manganese, Zinc, Cobalt, Calcium, Iodine and others.

How to take a soil sample, how much to take, where to send it for analysis, how much does it cost, what results to expect from taking a soil test and following the recommendations and other aspects of soil testing, will conclude the program. Dr. Bennett has charge of the soil testing laboratory at A&M College. He will be enroute from Lubbock to College Station but has consented to stop off at Rising Star for the meeting.

Fertilizer dealers, as well as farmers, are welcome to attend the meeting.

Veneta Mitchell To Teach Vocational Nursing at Cisco Jr

CISCO — Mrs. Veneta Mitchell, registered nurse, has joined the faculty at Cisco Junior College and will teach vocational nursing, according to announcement by president G. C. Hogue.

Mrs. Mitchell, a native of Carbon, graduated from Methodist Hospital School of Nursing in Lubbock in 1942. Upon graduation she served as an army nurse from 1943-44. For the past six years Mrs. Mitchell has been employed in Cisco as a private duty nurse.

During the 20 week pre-clinical period of the vocational nursing program Mrs. Mitchell will instruct the 21 students currently enrolled in various subjects and skills required before a graduate can become a licensed vocational nurse.

She will also work with the students at intervals as they progress in their clinical work, which will be done in one of the four affiliated hospitals.

Subjects that Mrs. Mitchell will teach include vocational adjustments, community health, body structure and function, nutrition, common emergency needs, administration of medicine, the life span and vocational skills. The vocational skills course consists primarily of study and practice in the following areas: medical and surgical, obstetric, pediatric and new born nursing.

Of the 21 students enrolled, seven are from Albany, six from Eastland, four from Breckenridge and four from Cisco. The course is designed to cover a full 52 weeks of study, qualifying the graduates to take the state board examination for licensed vocational nurses.

Screwworm Fund Drive Reaction Reported As Good

MISSION — Early reports indicate that livestock producers and sportsmen are giving their all-out support to the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation's drive to prevent the Screwworm Eradication Program from having to be terminated because of the exhaustion of funds. Even some California livestockmen have sent in their contribution for \$500.

The Foundation has set its sights on collecting the remaining \$1,000,000 of their \$3,000,000 goal by March 1 and is conducting an intensive campaign to achieve that goal. By that date, the \$2,000,000 already collected will be practically expended and the program may have to be stopped. Federal funds cannot be used unless they are at least matched by State and private money.

Marvin J. Bridges, executive director of the Foundation, said he had personally talked to the majority of the county animal health chairmen during recent weeks, and judging from their comments, he is confident the livestock industry will rise to the challenge that is facing it. Bridges said some of the counties have already collected up to 50 percent as much as they had in the previous drive. He said a group of California Livestockmen expressed their interest in the eradication program and sent a check for \$500. The Perry Foundation of San Antonio has made a contribution of \$50,000, it's second to the program.

Governor John Connally recently stated he would await the result of the fund drive before considering an emergency appropriation by the State Legislature. He said he believes the livestock producers and sportsmen have an obligation to fulfill their commitment, and to demonstrate that belief he gave a personal contribution, his second as a Texas rancher.

The Foundation's president, C. G. Scruggs, said the Governor's statement makes it imperative that the money be raised by March 1. Every livestock producer, regardless if he had donated before or not, will be asked to contribute again on the basis of fifty cents per animal unit. Many of the state's sportsmen are actively participating by contributing one dollar for each deer they killed during 1962.

"We cannot afford to let this valuable program die just when its success is so readily apparent," Scruggs remarked. He pointed out that screwworms in 1962 had been almost totally confined to the Southwestern states, whereas in the previous year, 17 states reported infestation. He urges livestockmen and sportsmen to contact their local county animal health committee and make their donation immediately.

1963 Feed Grain Program Offers Advance Payment

Producers who take part in the 1963 feed grain program will receive payments for diverting acreage from the production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley. William F. Bryant, Chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today. Part of the estimated payment to be earned for such diversion may be paid in advance when the producer signs up to participate. The rest of the diversion payment and all of the price-support payment will be made next summer.

The chairman said that this program provision should be of substantial benefit to growers who can use some extra ready cash during the spring planting season. Signup for the program runs from Feb. 1 through March 22.

Besides the payment for diversion of eligible cropland to approved conserving uses, the feed grain program for 1963 offers program participants a price support payment on the normal production of the acreage planted to feed grains in 1963. They will also qualify for price support loans or purchase agreements on their entire production from the feed grain acreage.

The minimum diversion for participation is 20 percent of the farm's 1963 feed grain base. The acreage of corn, grain sorghum, and barley (1959-60 average acreage, as adjusted) will be combined into one total feed grain base

for each farm, and a farmer may divert one or more of the feed grains in the total base. His payment will be made at the per-acre rate for the grain diverted. Farmers who planted their 1963 barley crop last fall will be able to participate in the 1963 program by reducing the total acreage planted to the three feed grains by at least the minimum amount.

Payment on the first 20 percent of the acreage diversion will be made at 20 percent of the county support rate on the normal production of the diverted acres. On diversion above the minimum amount, payment will be at 50 percent of the county support rate. The diversion payment plus the price support payment will give farmers approximately the same payment they received for participating in the 1961 and 1962 programs.

While participation in the 1963 feed grain diversion program is voluntary, the price support payments and loans — as well as the diversion payments — will be available only to feed grain growers who carry out the program's provisions.

Farmers who are interested in the feed grain program should get in touch with their ASCS County office at their earliest convenience.

Mention the word "sale" and shoppers react in various ways. Efficient shoppers often buy at sales. Retail stores, especially department stores, feature a number of sales annually in an effort to increase sales volume.

These sales are of various types. They may be special purchase sales, clearance, annual, anniversary, seasonal and stimulative.

When and why are the various sales held?

CLEARANCE SALES are held to move fashion merchandise, goods that are being discontinued, or merchandise that has been left over from the previous season. These sales offer savings ranging from 25 to 50 percent.

SPECIAL PURCHASE SALES may be either pre-season or post-season sales of goods which a store has bought at special or reduced prices in the wholesale market. They normally offer savings of 15 to 20 percent.

ANNUAL SALES may also be called regular stock or department manager's sales. They offer goods from regular stock at reduced prices for a short period of time. While this type sale offers the smallest reductions — usually 10 or 15 percent — they are considered by store people to be the most reliable sales.

ANNIVERSARY SALES commemorate the founding of the

store, and may occur at any point during the selling season. Their aim is to increase sales by offering a large variety of goods at special prices.

SEASONAL SALES are regularly repeated each year. August and January coat sales are examples of this type sale which offer saving to the consumer.

STIMULATIVE SALES are intended to boost selling during dull periods, and are found under various names including back-to-school sales, Mother's Day sales, etc.

Sales terms often differ from those used to describe regularly stocked merchandise. "Irregulars" and "seconds" are terms used to identify merchandise that falls below standard specifications. If you shop carefully, those may be good buys. Examine items before buying, however.

Consider these factors when you shop at a clothing sale: Do you need the item. Does it meet your needs? Is the color suitable and becoming? Does it fit to your satisfaction? What alterations, if any, will be needed? If soiled, can it be cleaned? If damaged, can it be repaired successfully? Does it fit into your wardrobe? Will you have to purchase new accessories to complete the outfit?

You will want to consider fiber content when you purchase goods of sale. Check information about performance. What special finishes have been applied, is the shrinkage control adequate, what about colorfastness, and what about the type and amount of care required?

You also will need to check taping, interfacing, grainline, adequacy of size, width of seams and hems, stitching, fastenings and trims.
