If it is, vote for alcohol and perhaps your wishes will come true. The way you vote and act about this matter will determine the kind of town you will have for your boys and girls to live in.

FINAL RITES FOR MRS. D. HARPER ON WEDNESDAY

Mrs. W. D. (Nora Ann) Harper, 73, a native of Comanche County, longtime resident of Gorman, and a former school teacher, died at 10:10 p. m. Monday in Lawndale Nursing Home following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Wednesday, September 2 in the First Baptist Church with Rev. Don Turner, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Cross Plains, and Rev. Huron Polnac, pastor of the Gorman First Baptist Church, officiating.

Burial was in the Gorman Cemetery.

Mrs. Harper was born Nora Ann Moorman on the farm of her parents three miles south of Desdemona in Comanche County, later becoming the townsite of Jake Hamon in the oil boom days of the 1920's.

She attended Hankin's Normal College and North Texas State College, was married to W. D. Harper on May 19, 1913 in Desdemona Baptist Church by the late Rev. Melvin Cox, and taught school with her husband at Salem, St. Joe, Oliver Springs, Kokomo, Hog Creek and Lebanon.

They had lived in Gorman since 1915, except for ten years during 1931 to 1941 when the family moved to Abilene and operated a lumber yard.

A son, Rev. Winfred Harper, a Baptist Missionary, lost his life in 1958 in a drowning accident while serving in Tanganyika, Africa.

Always a regular attendant at church services until her health curtailed her activities, her special interests were caring for the sick and orphans as she remembered the words of the master as she served her fellowman. "As ye have done it unto the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

In days gone by she frequently visited the children at Buckner's Home and taking gifts she knew they would enjoy.

She has served as president of the Missionary Union, Superintendent of the Home Department of the Baptist Church, taking the literature of the folks unable to attend regular church services. She also was a teacher for the TEL Sunday School class.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, Winston of Big Spring and Dan of Fort Worth; two daughters, Mrs. LaDola Fleming of New York and Mrs. W. A. Foster of Houston; two sisters, Mrs. Eva J. Harper of Livermore, California and Mrs. John D. Palmer of San Antonio; two brothers, C. C. Moorman of Albany and E. C. Moorman of Cisco; eight grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Just as I Am

The doctor stopped his carriage at the Angelican parsonage in Brighton, England. But there was nothing in his medicine kit to help the paralyzed sister of the Rev. Henry V. Elliott. He was calling to offer his usual word of cheer and to leave one of the little leaflets he had bought to distribute among his shut-in patients.

The leaflets were selling all over England, he said, and were being translated into many foreign languages. And for a good cause, too. Someone had written a poem to help finance the building of a school for children of poor clergymen. It said so at the top of the page. . . . "Sold for the benefit of St. Margaret's Hall, Brighton." Under that, the line, "Him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out." Then came the six-verse poem.

Tears welled in Charlotte Elliott's eyes as she read the lines. Her memory went back to the

day her brother had organized a bazaar to start his school. Everybody in town had helped. That is, everybody except her . . . a 46-year-old spinster who could hardly drag about the room. Lonely and helpless, she had written a poem to console other invalids. She had sent it to a publisher in the hope that from its sale she could contribute a few shillings to her brother's school. And now, her little poem was bringing in more revenue than all the bazaars the town could give.

The doctor was pleased with his call. He had left his patient so happy that she was crying.

The following year Charlotte Elliott published a whole book of hymns and she wrote many another before she died at the age of 82. Perhaps the good doctor might have wept a little himself that day in 1834 had he known it was his patient who had written. . . .

Just as I am, without one plea,
But that Thy blood was shed for me,
And that Thou bid'st me come to Thee,
O Lamb of God, I come! I come!

Just as I am, though tossed about
With many a conflict, many a doubt,
Fightings and fears within, without,
O Lamb of God, I come! I come!

Just as I am—poor, wretched, blind;
Sight, riches, healing of the mind,
Yea, all I need in Thee to find,
O Lamb of God, I come! I come!

Just as I am—Thou wilt receive,
Wilt welcome, pardon, cleanse, relieve,
Because Thy promise I believe,
O Lamb of God, I come! I come!
