Van Zandt reportedly was piloting a Trans-Meridian Airways plane which crashed on take-off at Tehran, Iran. The U. S. Air Force Reserve pilot was employed by the Lebanese government to train personnel of the airline. The downed plane was enroute to Beirut, Lebanon.

Van Zandt's body will arrive at Love Field on Saturday and will be brought to Gorman.

Services will be held at 3 p. m. Monday, March 25 and burial will be in the Gorman Cemetery beside the grave of his mother.

Gas Peak Day Load Hits New High

AMARILLO, TEX., March 18 — A record peak day load of 370,287,000 cubic feet of gas was put through Pioneer Natural Gas Co.'s pipeline system this past January 11, according to figures released today by Billy G. Grant, superintendent of the company's gas measurement department in Amarillo.

During a severe arctic snap throughout Pioneer Natural's service area in middle January, temperatures dipped to 16 below zero at Lubbock. In Amarillo and surrounding areas, the mercury dropped to 9 below. Other areas throughout the system, which serves 41 Panhandle-South Plains counties, had similar numbing weather.

Early Inspection of Motor Vehicles Is Urged By Garrison

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texas automobile owners to "do their shopping early" this year to reduce the last minute rush for inspection stickers.

All vehicles coming under the provisions of the Texas Vehicle Inspection Act must secure the 1963 Inspection sticker by April 15, 1963. After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and will be subject to arrest, Garrison said.

He reported that approximately one half of the inspection period has expired and about one fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

Need to add spice to your meals?

You can help sharpen appetites by using spices in your cooking.

Spices lend subtle flavor to foods if they are introduced with a light hand. It is well to become familiar with the large spice family.

Spices are usually classified as roots, buds of flowers, fruits, barks or seeds of pungent plants. The herbs are the aromatic leaves of plants which grow in the temperate zone. Bay leaves and mint are the familiar ones. Marjoram, basil, chervil, oregano and saffron are just a few of the many herbs which may find a place on your pantry shelf.

Some of the "seed" spices that may give variety are celery seed, sesame, poppy and caraway seeds.

Among the "berry" spices are the peppercorns from which come both the black and white pepper, without which a meal would seem incomplete. Since it is a familiar seasoning on many tables, you may find it interesting to learn how it grows.

Black pepper is the dried fruit or berries of the pepper vine, which is found in tropical climates. The berries are picked while still green and then dried in the sun.

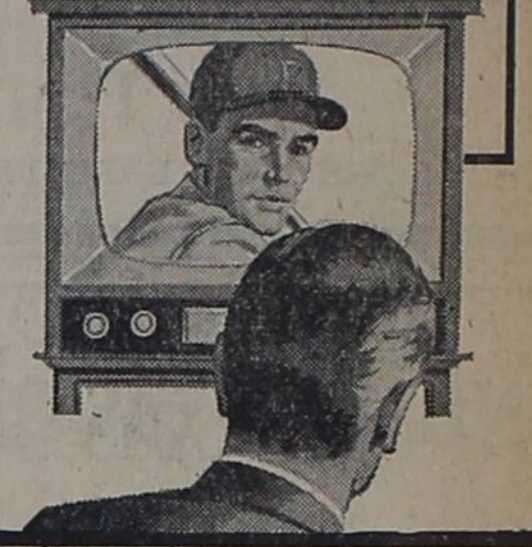
White pepper is the ripened seed of the berry which is fermented, then washed to remove the skin and pulp and spread on mats to dry in the sun. Most of the pepper we use comes from the Far East. It is a well-liked and well-used spice and may be delicately added to all foods with the exception of sweet desserts.

After spending two months in Pine Mountain, Georgia we are glad to be back home. We only

wish we could have brought some of the showers or torrential rains.

We experienced the Peach State's coldest winter. Scarcely a leaf of wild honeysuckle, an important pasture supplement for cattle, was left on the vines. Cherokee rose bushes, hundreds of

years old, will struggle sometime in reaching a stage of prolific growth and bloom.

But the pines, standing sometimes sixty feet high on the mountains, are verdant still and the hardy azaleas are readying for flower. Jonquils are far ahead of equinox bursting into a star saucer and yellow cup neath bare giant pecan and red oak.

The house in which we lived had belonged to my father's aunt, Sarah Trammell Lee, who when widowed early in life, brought her children to Texas. The late Dr. Wm. P. Lee of Cisco, who lived to be 94 years old, was her son.

My Aunt Mary Lou Trammell and my sister, Mabel Trammell, who bought the place for sentimental reasons in the 1930's, are presently in Washington, D. C.

Despite the beauty of the place "Gone with the Wind" is an applicable term. The White Sulphur Springs are no longer kept, some land has dropped into swamp, much farm land is in soil bank and acres of young pine are in government control. Negro help keeps the same place as a hundred years ago.

Before returning home I went to Washington for several days. While there my sister and I spent part of a day in the Capitol. We visited with our Congressman and friend, Omar Burleson, and his staff.

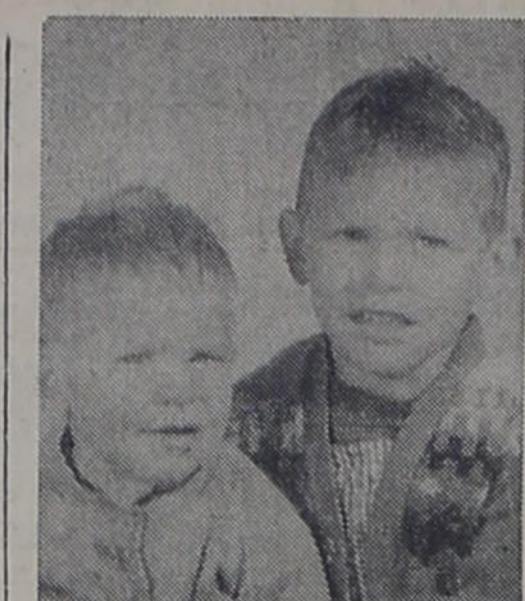

The clerk (if I heard him correctly) said that this was the only class in the 17th. District that had made a trip to the Capitol.

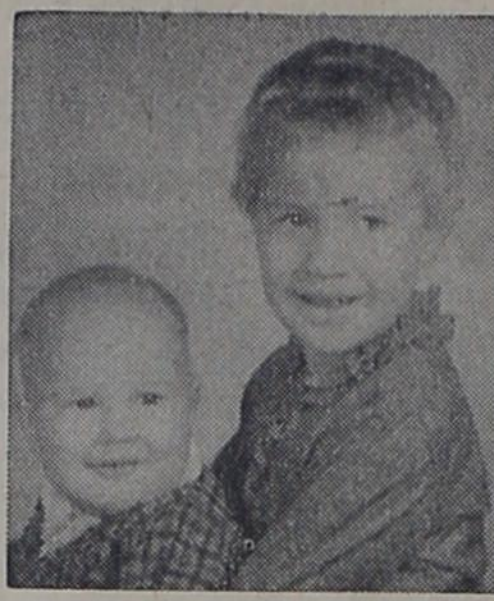
