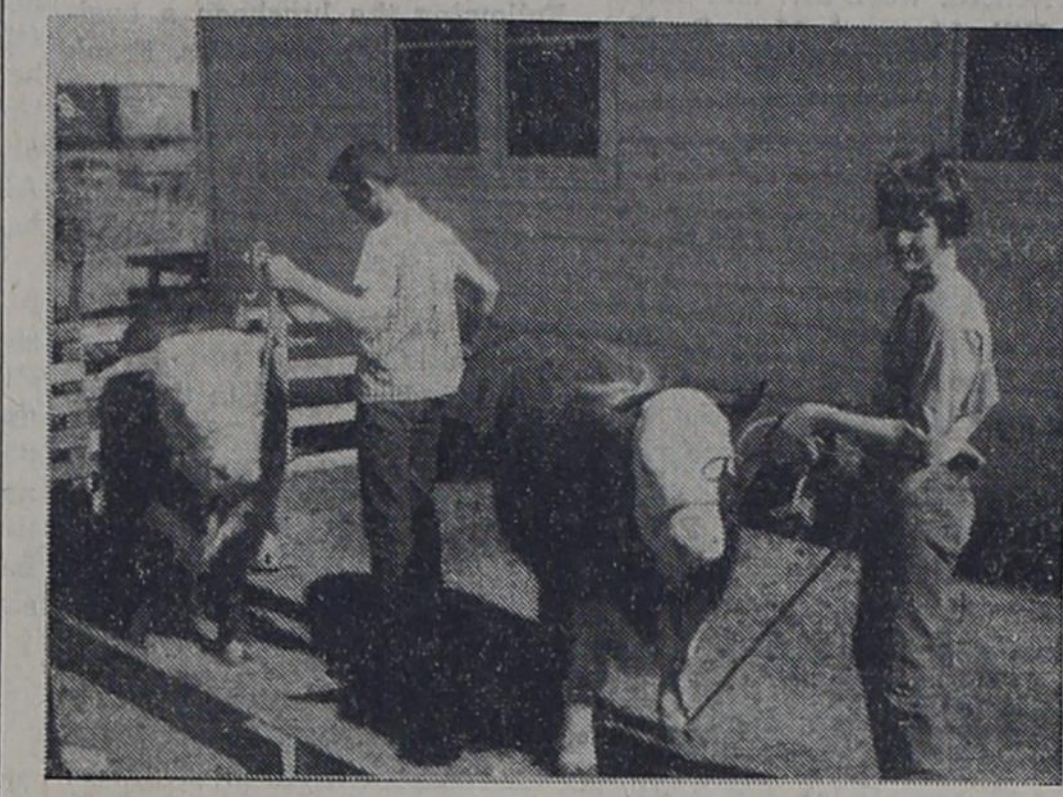
Rev. Sanders dropped out at Carbon (10 miles) with blisters on both feet.

Signed In Great Plains Program

The Great Plains Conservation Program is bringing new hope as a tool for the rebuilding of Eastland County agriculture. Since the program was launched the first of January eight contracts have

been completed and signed at the Eastland office of the Soil Conservation Service. Landowners who have signed contracts are W. D. Gattis of Scranton; B. A. May, south of Eastland; A. W. Harris of Scranton; A. J. Rogers of Cheaney; Truett Norris of Carbon; R. Don Montgomery of Nimrod;

Herman Eison of Gorman; and J. D. Griffin, south of Eastland. A total of twenty-seven landowners have made applications for contracts, all of which are in various stages of development. Similar progress is being made in the Rising Star Work Unit Area.

A Great Plains Contract represents the ultimate in conservation planning and cooperation between the landowner, the soil conservation district, and the Federal Government as represented by the various agricultural agencies. Provision is made within a contract for a complete conservation program item by item in order to treat each acre on the farm according to its needs as well as the use of each acre within its capabilities. All this in accordance with the landowner's desire to fit his system of operation.

The total program includes the conversion of 136 acres of old cropland to permanent grass, mesquite control on 293 acres of severely infested mesquite range-land, control of 113 acres of post oak timber, and a small amount of terracing still needed on his cropland. Grass reseeding will be done

with all the brush control acreage and on another 98 acres where the brush is already under control. One pond and several fences are to be built to facilitate his grassland management. Each job is scheduled year by year until the whole program is on the land.

County. A definite trend may be seen toward the conversion of more and more cropland to permanent grass, along with better management and improvement of native pasture. The eight Great Plains contracts signed thus far provide for the conversion of over 700 acres of cropland to grass. As Eastland County agriculture converts to grassland farming no doubt the Great Plains Program will be a tool toward more permanent agriculture.

As we look forward to the future there can be little doubt that grassland development and application of complete conservation programs can do much toward stabilizing agriculture in Eastland

Typical of Great Plains contracts is the contract with W. D. (Bill) Gattis at Scranton. This was the first contract signed in Eastland County. Bill is a young farmer who has been in process of applying a conservation program for many years. When Bill returned from the service several years ago his father, W. J. Gattis, presented his son a new pair of work gloves and proceeded to inform his son that from that day on Bill would do all the farming and he would spend his retirement in the country store he runs at Scranton. Bill proceeded to take over the family farm and build his family a new home. As opportunity came along he purchased additional land which joined the old family farm until it expanded from the original 230 acres to 872 acres. In addition another 160 acres of land is leased.

To Bill the development and conservation treatment of this land has been a big challenge. Too often the progress has been slow due to financial and other obstacles. His new contract provides a schedule for a complete job within the next five years.

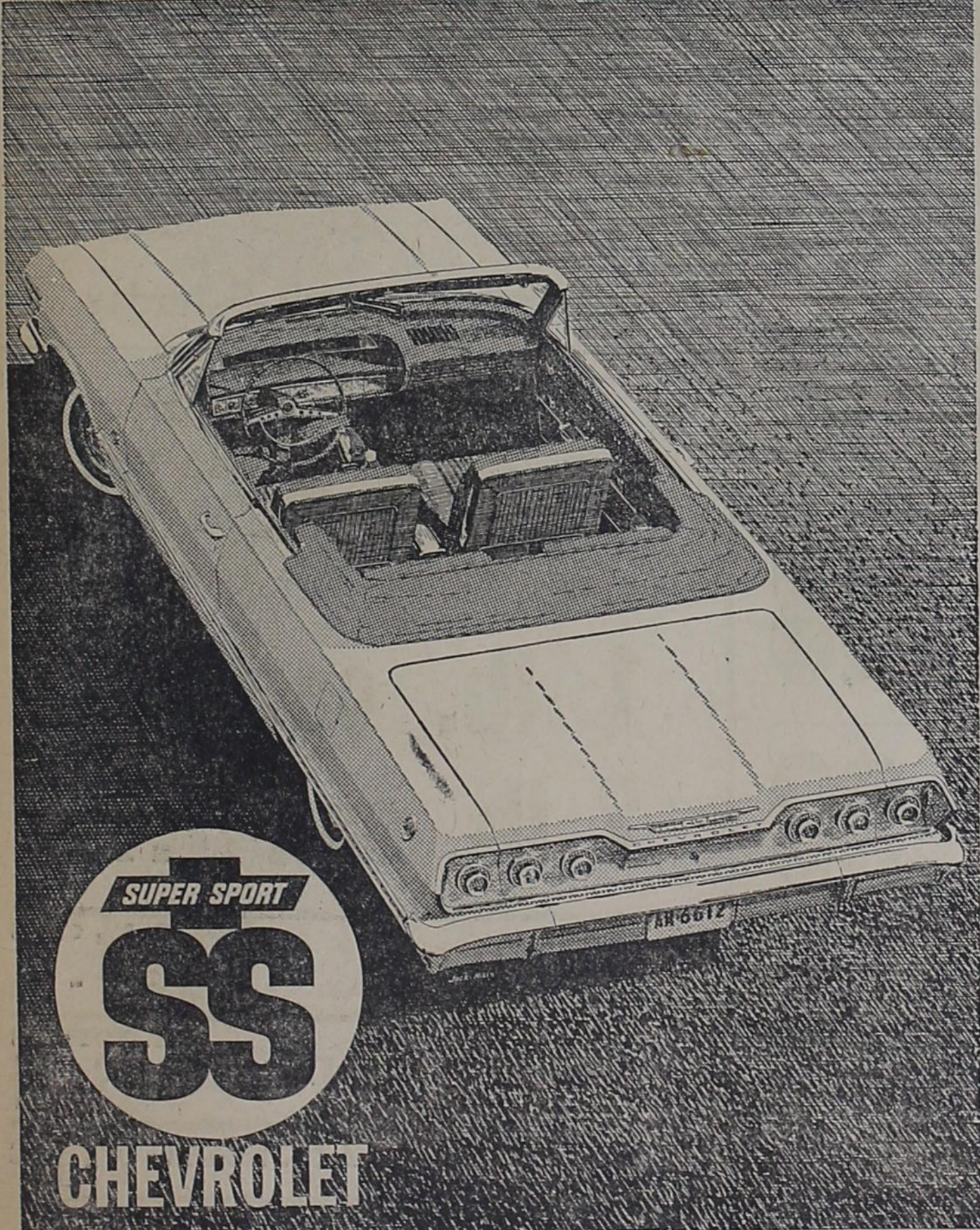
