Acting Governor of Texas Tom Creighton Tuesday proclaimed Gorman as the "Peanut Capitol Of The Southwest." The official memorandum read, "Gorman, Texas is the headquarters of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association with 10,000 members in seven states, and also serves the Southwest headquarters of the Federal-State Inspector Service for peanuts.

Gorman is the biggest marketing center for peanuts in the Southwest, being the home of Gorman Peanut Company, one of the major shelling and drying plants in the nation.

Therefore, I, as Acting Governor of Texas, do hereby designate Gorman, Texas as PEANUT CAPITOL OF THE SOUTHWEST.

It is the highest position that may be held by a member of the state legislature.

Abandonment Hearing By MK&T Railroad Is Deferred

In a telephone conversation late Tuesday with Ross Wilson, Chairman of the interested municipalities committee, W. H. Thie, General Counsel for the Katy Railroad Company, advised that the Abandonment Hear-

ing set for May 10 has been deferred for at least one year. Mr. Thie stated that this was a decision of the company management. Wilson told Thie that the municipal groups involved would be happy to meet with Katy people at any time to discuss problem areas and to try to work out items of mutual interest to the railroad and the various towns and shippers along the route.

since Katy announced its abandonment plans last December. Meetings have been held with officials of other railroad companies, the Texas Railroad Commission, the Texas Attorney General, the Railway Brotherhood and with a committee of Katy officials. Plans were being made by the group to formally oppose the abandonment in the May 10 Hearing which was scheduled for Fort Worth. A meeting of representatives of all interested towns was held in Gorman April 14 at which time detailed plans were made for opposing abandonment of the line.

It is believed by local officials that the recent decision by Katy to postpone abandonment proceedings will prove to be of great benefit. This will provide an opportunity for all interested parties to make a joint effort toward solving or reducing existing problems.



Notaries Public Must Re-Qualify By May 15

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1967 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1 and May 15, 1965, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1965. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the applicant to qualify at the beginning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

Browsing with Bev

Last week we took a look at the classification of the natural fibers. This week, let's study the man-made fibers. Remember, it's important to learn the Generic name (the name underlined>, the characteristics of each family and the trade-mark names in each family.

ACETATE (& TRIACETATE)

Characteristics: Crisp or soft, depending on end use. Drapes well. Dries quickly. Subject to fume fading, unless solution dyed. Low durability.

Triacetate is less sensitive to heat and acetone and possesses good wet strength.

Uses: Light and medium weight clothing. Used in home furnishings.

Care: May be laundered, wet cleaned or dry cleaned. Will glaze and melt at low temperature in ironing or pressing.

Trade-mark Names: Avicolor, Avisco Actate, Celanese Actate, Celapeon*, Celaspin, Dupont Acetate, Avele, Color-seated Acetate* Estron, Cromspun*, Arnel 60, and Celalof.

* - Solution- dyed.

ACRYLIC

Characteristics: Soft, warm, lightweight and resistance to wrinkling. High bulking power, silky texture, if desirable. Resistant to effects of sunlight. Dries quickly. Low absorption. Good dimensional stability.

Uses: Tailored outerwear, knitted wear, pile fabrics.

Care: Remove oily stains before washing. Water borne stains easily removed. Body oils and perspiration penetrate fibers and are hard to remove.

Trade-mark names: Acrilan, Creslan, Orion, Zefran, Zefkrome.

MODACRYLIC

Characteristics: Soft, warm, quick drying and durable. Resistant to wrinkling and to chemicals.

Uses: Deep-pile and fleece fabrics.

Care: Very sensitive to heat. Remove oily stains before washing.

Trade-mark names: Acres, Dynel, Verel.

METALLIC

Characteristics: Glitter.

Uses: Decorative Accent.

Care: Laundered or drycleaned. Iron with low temperature.

Trade-mark names: Chromeflex, Fairtex, Lame, Lurex, Malora, Melton, Mylar.

NYLON

Characteristics: Has exceptional strength and elasticity. Permanent shape retention. Woven fabrics often hot and uncomfortable to wear.

Uses: Hosiery, lingerie, sweaters, wind jackets, dress fabrics. In combination with other fibers.

Care: Washes easily. Care must be taken to maintain whiteness. Press at low temperature. Avoid long exposure to sunlight.

Trade-mark names: Antron, Cadon, Caprolan, Cumulof, Lyloft, Nylon, Enka.

POLYESTER

Characteristics: Sharp pleat and crease retention. Some have resistance to pilling. High in resistance to wrinkling and abrasion. Resistant to moth and mildew. Cause static electricity.

Uses: Wash and wear apparel. Often in combination with other fibers.

Care: Easily washable. Needs little ironing or pressing. Remove oily stains before washing.

Trade-mark names: Dacron, Fortel, Kodol, Vycron.

OLEFIN

Characteristics: No water absorption. Resistant to mildew. Low melting temperatures. Shrinks in dry cleaning solvents.

Uses: Shoe fabrics, non-woven fabrics, draperies, carpeting, brocades.

Trade-mark names: DLP, Herculon, Reecon, Royalene, Polypropylene.

RAYON

Characteristics: Cool, comfortable to wear. Easily manipulated. Moderately durable. Wrinkles easily. Flammability, a danger in brushed, napped fabrics. Solution dyed rayons highly resistant to fading. Low resiliency, and wet strength. Polynosic - High wet strength.

Uses: Light and medium weight clothing.

Care: Dry clean. Can be laundered, but does not withstand treatment that can be given cotton or linen. Tends to shrink.

Trade-mark names: Avicolor, Avil, Bemberg, Cardura, Coloray, Corval, Cupioni, Maynel, Navco, Veri-Dull.

RUBBER

Characteristics: High degree of stretch and recovery.

Uses: Foundation garments and swimwear.

Care: Wash frequently with mild soap. Avoid constant overstretch.

Trade-mark name: Lastex.

SPANDEX

Characteristics: Exceptionally strong, but light in weight. Resists abrasion. Resistant to body acids.

Uses: Foundation garments, swimwear, men's wear, ski pants, other sportswear.

Care: Machine washable in warm water. May be machine dried.

Trade-mark names: Glospun, Lycra, Vyrene.

Next week we'll begin studying the selection, sewing and care of some of the newer fabrics on the market.

**Texas Farm Bureau
President Speaks On
Gov. Farm Proposals**

WACO (Spl) — Administration farm program proposals sent to Congress on April 5, would "severely penalize commercial producers of farm and ranch commodities in Texas," stated C. H. DeVaney, President of the Texas Farm Bureau.

"Proposed use of sliding scale direct payments, coupled with lower price supports and the threat of dumping surplus stocks on the market would force our Texas producers to comply with greatly reduced allotments, wrecking efficient production units while guaranteeing high prices to marginal producers through consumer food taxes," he said.

The Administration legislative recommendations with regard to wheat, feed grains, rice, wool, cropland adjustment, and sale or lease of acreage allotments "are apparently designed to give our export markets to our competitors and to cut all producers down to

the same size," DeVaney continued.

"It doesn't take much imagination," said DeVaney "to see that these proposals, if enacted into law, would be a crippling blow to the agricultural economy of such areas as the High Plains, the Rio Grande Valley, the Coastal Bend, and the Central Texas Blacklands."

"We in Farm Bureau," concluded DeVaney, "will continue to work for enactment into law of our program designed to retain and increase our markets at home and abroad, and to secure for our producers a market price well above support prices."

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

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

There has probably never been a more charming bureaucrat in Washington in all history than Mrs. Esther Peterson, the presidential advisor on consumer affairs.

Highly intelligent, most articulate, and very personable, she is a fantastically able platform performer. In fact, if in entertainment industry instead of politics, she might easily be a competitor with Helen Hayes for title "first lady of the theatre."

Of course, it is hard to imagine why the Federal government needs an office for consumers. It would seem obvious that all people are consumers of something or other. Thus compared to Senators and Congressmen who only represent a part of the people, the office must be higher than the Congress, as what Congressman can claim the whole nation for a constituency.

However, it is interesting to note some of the activities of the office for consumers. Just as invasion of advertising has to a large extent diverted the Federal Trade Commission from important tasks it is supposed to perform, advertising has become a very big thing in the affairs of the office of consumers. Last year it was attempted to get the Federal Communications Commission to issue an edict prescribing exactly how much advertising a radio or TV station can run.

The Congress passed a law prohibiting the FCC from making any such ruling.

But in a recent speech Mrs. Peterson commented on this legislation saying "Can self-regulation work in an area where there is such limited guidance from government?"

This is a very provocative and interesting statement. It means "Can the members of the broadcasting industry, largely made up of independent entrepreneurs, run its own business, or should government tell each operator how to operate?" Thus in a nutshell is expressed the entire bureaucratic concept, namely, that nobody, but nobody, is as competent to run a business as a government employee.

Actually, there are two very strong regulatory agencies working on the broadcasting industry. One is that if a station's programming becomes too clogged with advertising, then it fails to attract listeners. The second regulation is that if this happens, then it fails to attract advertisers. In other words, the law of supply and demand works quite freely in the broadcasting industry.

As a matter of fact, this law is working right now.

Because many stations have been running too much commercial content, many big advertisers are now forsaking the airways to place their advertising budgets in newspapers.


