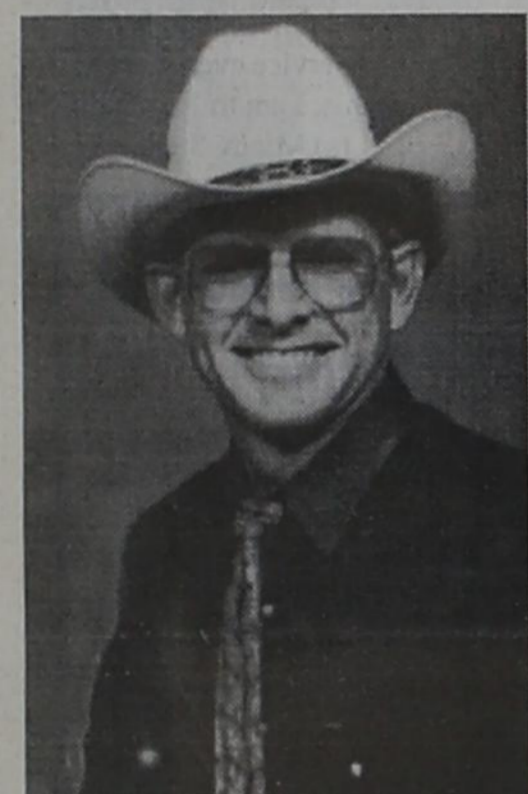

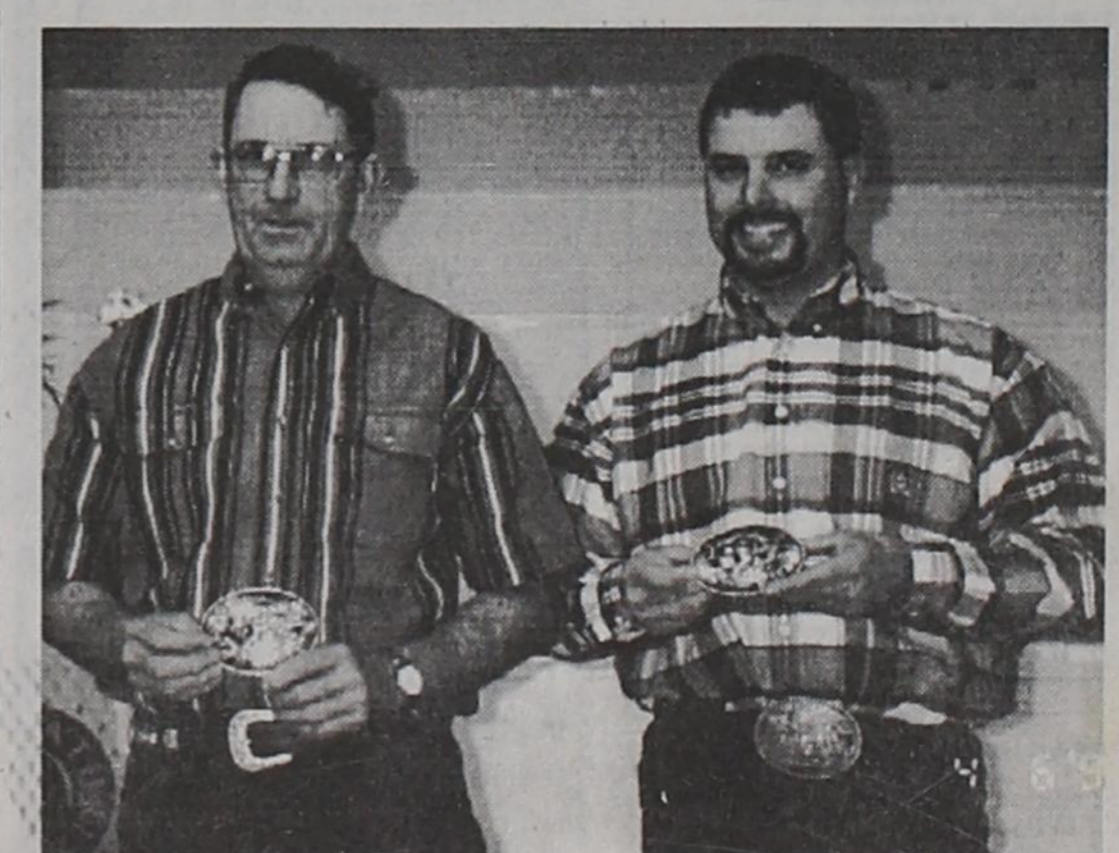

Mrs. Smith was born January 16, 1905 in Comanche County to the late Elbert Stewart and Ethel Sloan Stewart.

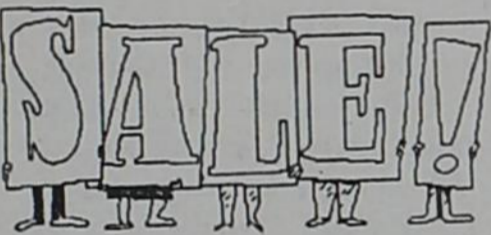

A couple of weeks ago, we had the misfortune of our house burning down. I had never experienced anything like that before and it was truly devastating at the time. The one thing that stands out in my mind now from that experience is how fortunate we are to have our volunteer fire departments in Eastland County. So many times in the past, I have seen the fire trucks on their way to a fire and simply thought to myself "I hope everything is O.K."

Only now do I realize the sacrifices made and commitment these volunteer firefighters have. At anytime, day or night, they are available and willing to drop anything, no matter what they are doing, to race to a fire.

Our fire happened to be about 6:00 Friday night, the first day of spring break. We were getting ready to go to our son's all star basketball game. I'm sure that every one of the volunteers who came out to help us also had family activities planned. Never once did I hear any of them complain about missing family activities, finally getting to rest at the end of a long week or how they were just about to eat dinner when they got the call. We had volunteers from Ranger, Gorman, Olden and Eastland all show up and work together to do anything they could. After more than two hours, they were still out there in the cold and rain making sure nothing was left unattended. Although our house was a total loss, they did everything they could. Besides putting out the fire, they had many words of encouragement and helpful ideas about recovering anything possible.

When I finally got home, covered in soot and smelling like smoke, I thought of all those volunteer firefighters who were also just getting home. In the back of my mind, I thought that although they had just gotten home, they were ready and willing to go out again that night if the call came.

We are so fortunate to have these men and women who are willing to come when called. Next time I pass a fire truck on the way to a fire, I won't only think "I hope everything is O.K, but I will also think of how fortunate we are and how thankful I am that they are willing to make the sacrifices they do." The word volunteer means someone who does a job or gives services freely and without pay. The fact that they are also willing to give of their personal lives and time with their families makes their service even more of a sacrifice. For this, I am truly grateful!

Beware of Profit Poachers!

As we continue through an extremely dry summer, combined with falling cattle prices, it often pays to look at our cattle operations for ways to "trim the fat" and become more efficient. One area that you should focus on is parasite control, including both internal and external parasites. Each year, the USDA estimates that cattle producers lose approximately \$2.5 billion in lost production due to parasites. Typically, we think of parasite control during the Spring or Fall. However, more and more research suggests that we can maximize our parasite control products by treating cattle when most of the parasites are in the cow and not as active on the ground. We are currently in that time of the year, middle of summer.

If we look at the normal parasite life cycle, adult worms in the intestinal tract of the cow lay eggs that are passed to the ground in fecal material. These eggs then hatch and develop into immature larval stages. The cycle contin-

ues when these larvae crawl onto the grass, which is consumed by the cow. Once back in the cow, the larvae become adults, and the process starts all over again. Unfortunately, this cycle never completely stops, but it does change over the middle of the summer, depending on the parasite.

In the Southern U. S., the most costly internal parasite is *Ostertagia ostertagi*, commonly known as the Brown Stomach Worm. The Brown Stomach Worm is a unique parasite. It has figured out that during the middle of the summer, it is too hot and too dry for the eggs and immature worms to survive on the pasture. Therefore, as an immature worm, the Brown Stomach Worm stops its life cycle. It does this by burrowing into the wall of the stomach and going dormant. You will commonly hear this stage referred to as the "inhibited L4 stage". While dormant, the immature worm causes very little problem for the cow. However, in mid-July, the worm senses that the

fall is approaching and begins to complete its life cycle. While still in the wall of the stomach, the immature worm will expand in size 3-5 times, destroying the acid producing cells that line the wall of the stomach in the process. These cells are gone forever, and are replaced by fat cells that do nothing to aid in nutrient digestion. For this reason, it is extremely effective to treat cattle with a parasite control product that kills these dormant worms before they go into this expansion stage. The best time for this treatment is between the end of May and the middle of July. In addition, this is also a great time to treat for external parasites like horn flies and cattle grubs.

It is also important to point out that a Mid-Summer Treatment, cattle producers are often able to delay fall parasite treatment until late November or December. This late fall/winter treatment also does a tremendous job as we are again allowing our environment to work with us, instead of against us. This will be the focus of an upcoming article.

Remember, as market conditions change, so must our management practices. Thank of it this way, If you always do, what you've always done; You'll always have, what you've always had!

For more information, consult your veterinarian or animal health supplier. They will be able to point you to the best product to use for a Mid-Summer Treatment, as not all products are labeled to kill this inhibited Brown Stomach Worm.

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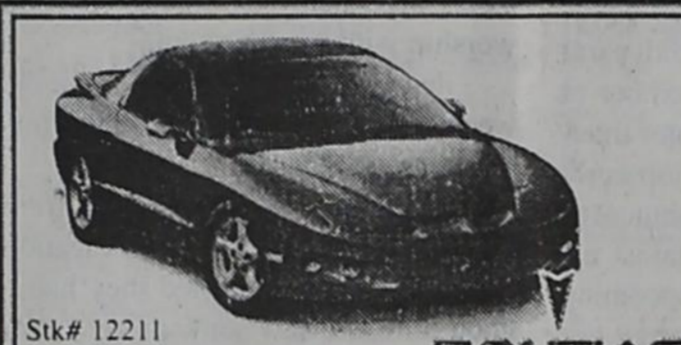
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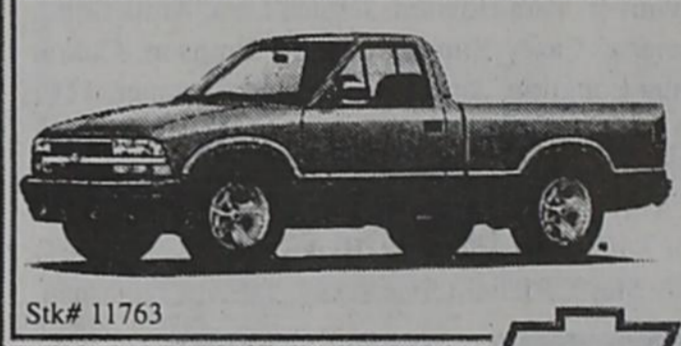
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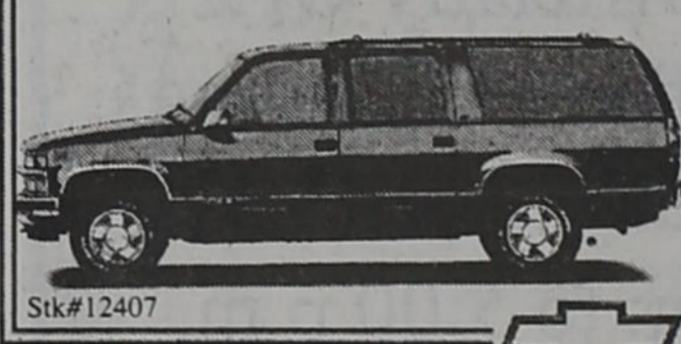
