WASHINGTON, D. C. - THIRD IN A SERIES ON THE ORIGIN, interpretation and application of legal concepts:

THE TENTH AMENDMENT OF THE CONSTITUTION:
"The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."

THIS ARTICLE IS THE KEY TO THE Constitutional Revolution and the diminution of State rights which has been taking place for the last 30 years.

THE PRESIDENT OF THE AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION IN 1962 said in his Presidential Address, "The balance of power between the Federal and State Governments has shifted dramatically since the Constitution was adopted in 1787."

TWO PREVAILING CONDITIONS HAVE OBVIOUSLY been the reason for changes. One is the growing power of the Federal Government over the Nation's economic and social affairs. The other is the growing application of the rights guaranteed to individuals by the first eight Amendments to the Constitution. For instance, for the Supreme Court to have said in 1800, or even in 1925, that every State must, in criminal cases, provide legal counsel for those too poor to pay for it would have been unthinkable. But, even the American Bar Association, long recognized as a force among conservative lawyers, praised the decision by the Court, which was appealed from the State of Florida. They approved it as a great advance in the administration of criminal justice.

THE SUPREME COURT HAS BEEN INVOLVED in both aspects of this Revolution. In the late 1930's it removed the limitation it had previously placed on Federal Power. In the years since, the Court has been placing additional restrictions on both the Federal and State Governments in their relationship with individuals.

IN THE EARLY DEPRESSION PERIOD OF THE 1930's, many critics felt the Court was hampering the Nation's growth. It struck down Laws concerning rate regulation, child labor, working hours, agricultural and industrial regulation. It interposed its ower against the will of a great majority in Congress,

and presumably against that of the people.

IN THE LATE 1930's, the Court backed away from these earlier actions and made it possible for Congress and the President to exercise a power they had been seeking. It was then that the power of State Governments — or States' rights — may have suffered its greatest decline.

WHEN THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT STEPPED into broad economic areas, the State Governments had to step out. In many instances State Governments were unable to cope with changes in their environment, such as the growth of cities and commerce which flowed across State lines in a way that was never thought of when the Constitution was written.

ONCE THAT PART OF THE CONSTITUTIONAL REVOLUTION was accomplished, the Supreme Court turned its attention to the reverse side of the coin of increased Governmental powers — the impingement of Government on individual liberties.

BY APPLYING MANY OF THE RESTRICTIONS OF THE Bill of Rights to the States, the Court has brought the legal processes of the States closer to those of the Federal Government. Prior to this period the guarantees of freedom of religion, the right to assemble and petition for redress of grievances, the protection against unreasonable searches and cruel or unusual punishment had never been enforced against the States.

UNTIL THE FLORIDA DECISION, the Supreme Court had never taken cognizance of the right to counsel by one accused of crime. Similarly, the 14th Amendment's guarantee of equal protection of the Laws had not been broadened in its application to racial problems and voting guarantees, particularly as it applies to all Elections - Federal, State and Local.

Excelsior Club Mark 50th. Anniversary At Guest Tea On Tuesday

The Excelsior Club marked their Golden Anniversary on Tuesday, April 27th. with a guest tea at the home of Mrs. George Blackwell.

Former presidents of the club were special guests.

A charter member, Mrs. J. E. Foster, remembers that meetings were first held in central locations, as the back room at First National Bank and in a Sunday School room.

Mrs. J. B. McIntyre, a former teacher at Hankins Normal College, was the first president and the yearbook was entitled American Literature and Short Story. For the second year the club elected to study English Literature and South America.

A second charter member, Mrs. E. C. Sutton, reminisced with humor but real feeling, "It may sound funny now, but getting to the club meeting through grass burrs knee-high, what with no sidewalks, didn't give us any pleasure. High-top shoes helped a little, maybe, a very little. Our fingers were pricked and our gloves were ruined from the pulling of burrs from our ruffled and lace petticoats and from the hems of our shoe-top skirts.

Too, I think silk hose, the kind with silk to the knee, came to Gorman about 1915 and opera pumps became accepted street wear, only we had more lanes than streets. I guess we were the elite without silk-stocking avenue, for just a-

bout everyone could boast of being an early settler."

And she continued, "Our club didn't have any competition. Not even the business men had organized. Not like today, I suppose no town is more club conscious than Gorman with the Woman's Study Club, Business Men's Club, the GCC, HDC, 4-H, Boy Scouts, R&R, the Duplicate Bridge, to name a part of the organizations."

Then Mrs. Foster recalled, "We had a recess during World War I. Red Cross activity was the thing, knitting and wrapping bandages. But with the war over we came to life. Mrs. J. F. Hankins succeeded Mrs. McIntyre as president and we went right on studying Literature, Southern Poetry.

Our dues were 2 dollars, but two in a family could get in for the price of one. The object of the club is to promote the moral, civic and intellectual conditions of the community. You know civic development costs money. Seems we were forever making, baking and selling. Our bazaars and bake sales went off pretty well. We tried sponsoring Chautauqua groups from colleges, but the home folks stopped buying tickets. They felt home talent was equal if not better than imported.

The oil boom hit us pretty soon after the doughboys returned from France. It wasn't too long until we cashed a bond we had bought and used the money to buy a stage curtain for the school."

Mrs. Sutton listed among the many accomplishments of the club, the laying of cement walk from town to the school, the purchase

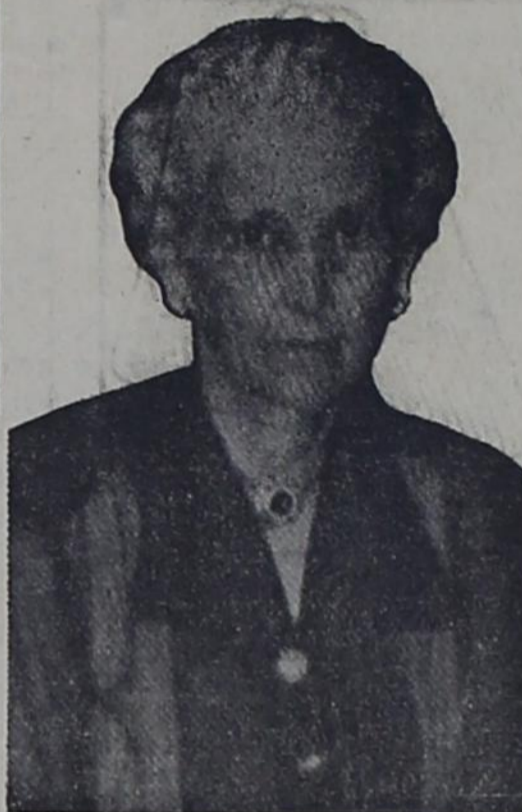
of folding chairs for the auditorium which also served a gym, and the erection of street signs with provision house numbers for residents.

And Mrs. Foster said, "Piping of water to the cemetery is not the least of the clubs contributions to civic improvement." Adding her bit and giving credit where credit is due, Mrs. Sutton explained, "B. E. Wilson, John Layton and Andy Kinney (all deceased) gave their labor and used their teams in getting this job done. We had a tabernacle at the grave yard then, under which many funerals were held."

In 1962 the Excelsior Club held an organizational meeting of all city clubs for planning Gorman's Diamond Jubilee and donned for the two-day event in 1963, pioneer apparel.

Mrs. Dona Moorman, a former postmistress and native of the area, is president of the club.

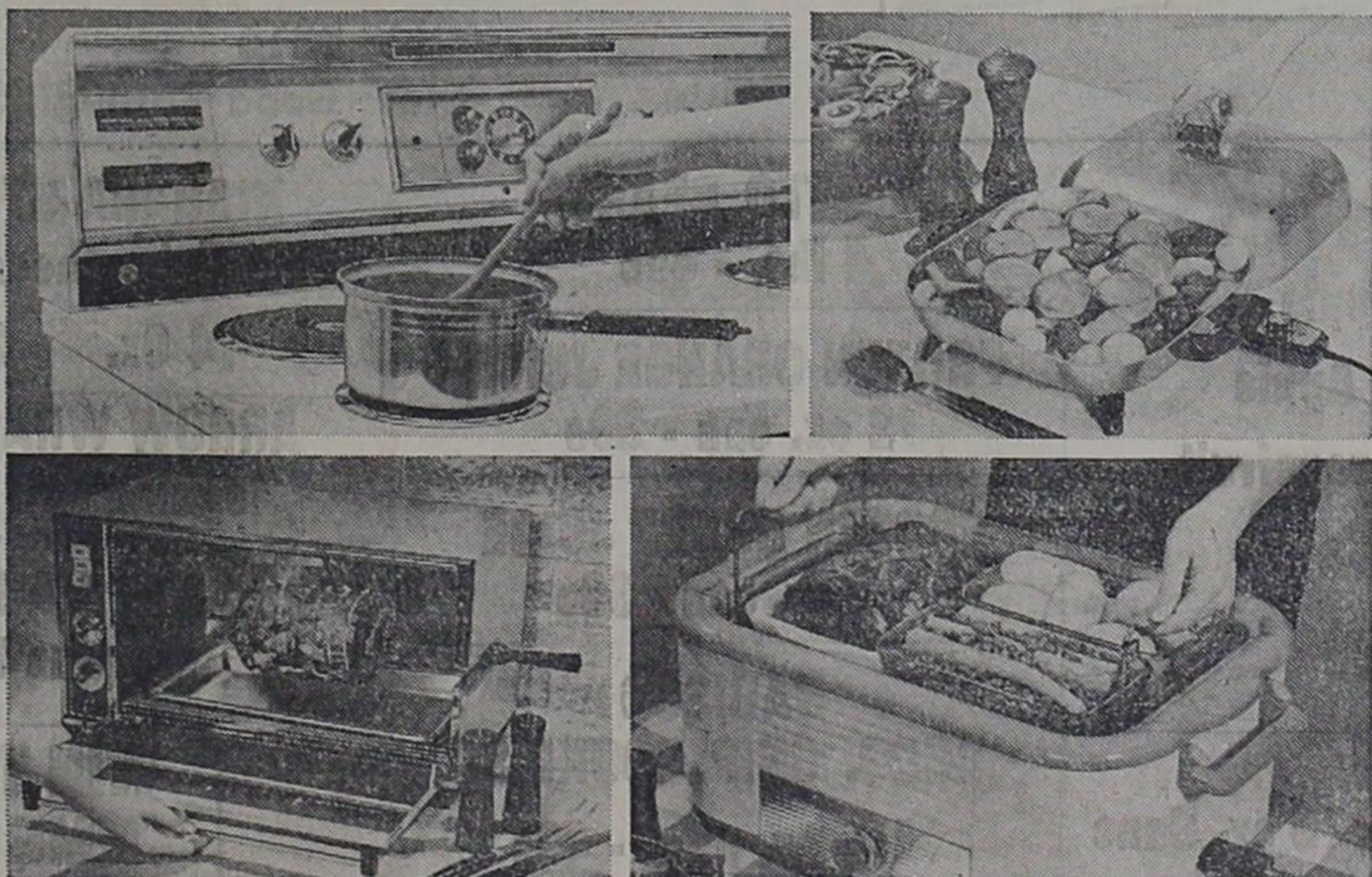

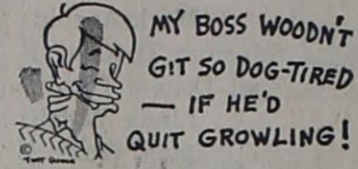
Gorman Area Receives Much Needed Moisture
