Mike Rodgers To Take Part In M-F Program

Dallas, Texas, May 14 — Hundreds of vocational agriculture students in the Cornbelt will be learning about the farm machinery industry during their summer vacations this year — and getting paid for it.

Mike Rodgers, 17, of Gorman, Texas, is one such student. He is participating in Massey-Ferguson Inc.'s Youth Business Opportunity Program. Student Rodgers attends Gorman High School. He and his family farm 240 acres in peanuts. His sponsoring dealer in the company program is Wright Implement Company.

The program, according to C. F. Blatnik, company branch manager in Dallas, was developed to provide students "with a unique opportunity to better understand the role of business in agriculture today and the importance of modern farm machinery in successful farm operations."

Participating students are sponsored by their local Massey-Ferguson dealers. They learn about farm equipment retailing and customer service, as well as the proper operation of the company's farm tractors. Each student is then given a tractor to demonstrate to neighboring farmers. He is paid by the sponsoring dealer for each tractor demonstration.

In August some 100 students in the program will be given a free

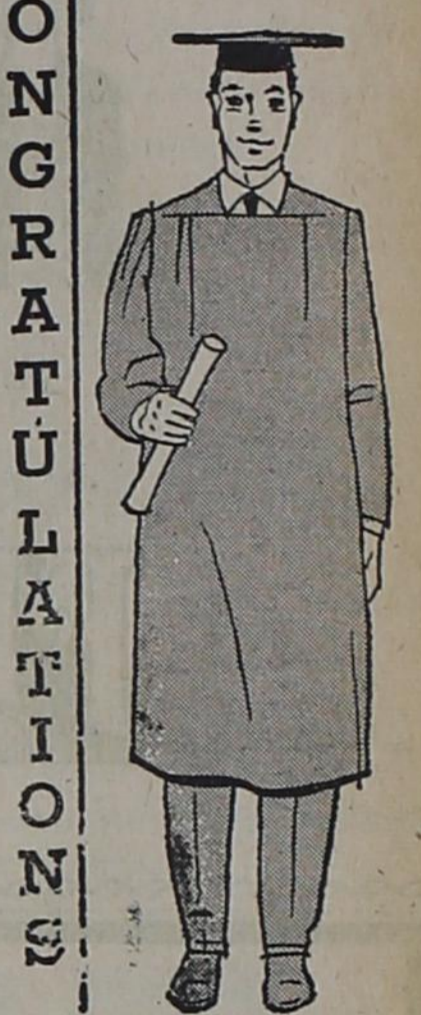
Mrs. W. T. Shell was installed Monday as president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Methodist Church at an installation and pledge service held at the church.

Carriers To Distribute Livestock Survey Card

Postmaster Graydon W. Baze reminds rural patrons of the Gorman Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Baze explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are D. R. Clark, Route 1; W. O. Parr, Route 2; and A. O. Clark, Route 3.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Baze concludes.
