Our quiet unassuming Dr. Rodgers just can't understand why all the recognition and honor is being given him. But his thousands of friends and patients know why, and remember that all of his adult life has been devoted to caring for the medical needs of others and especially those of the Gorman area.

During his twenty-seven years in Gorman, Dr. Rodgers has given of himself unselfishly and untiringly to serving all who needed him. To many of us he has been more than a doctor. He has been our counselor and friend.

He has an office full of records on us and our children. He has our "history" in his cabinet and is instantly alerted to danger signals and his warnings have saved us from having to go to the hospital for something serious, and he is always on the other end of

the telephone when we need reassuring. He comes to us when we're in trouble.

We, in Gorman, think he is a wonderful person to have around and that is why we want to say "Thank You, Doc," and we are trying to show you in our small way home much you are appreciated.

Dr. Rodgers learned at an early age to work hard, long hours. Following his graduation from Gorman High School in 1927, he entered Weatherford Junior College and attended Hardin-Simmons University, Texas Tech, and McMurry, working part time to aid his way through college by driving school buses, doing tailor shop work, coaching, and performing many other odd jobs.

During the time he was teaching at Alameda, he married Miss Buryl Blackwell, who was also a teacher in the school. They had known each other since childhood, and were married May 20, 1932.

Dr. Rodgers now heads the Blackwell Hospital, Inc., founded in 1919 by the late Dr. George Blackwell, father of Mrs. Rodgers, and the late Dr. Edward Blackwell.

Mrs. George Blackwell still resides in Gorman and is a daily visitor at the hospital.

During the war years, when doctors were scarce, he worked the clock around trying to care for all who needed him. From a recent report things have not changed much for him. For instance, during the recent flu epidemic, and on February 5, 1965, he saw 35 patients, and admitted ten of them to the hospital, performed two major surgeries and set a broken arm.

He must hold some sort of a record on the number of babies he has delivered as his alumni, at a recent meeting, honored him for having delivered the most babies in a given period. Mr. Buel Bryan, hospital administrator, states that to date Dr. Rodgers has delivered 8,386 babies since beginning his practice here. More than enough to populate Gorman seven times.

The first baby delivered was Marvin Earl Moseley, born August 4, 1938, son of Mr. and Mrs. "Shorty" Earl Moseley of De Leon. The last baby he delivered to date is that of his own granddaughter, Delena Marie, born May 29, 1965, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Don Rodgers. The records also show that the most babies he delivered in one month was eight in August, 1938.

A man of civic pride, Dr. Rodgers has not had time to be as active as he would like to be. He has served several terms on the Gorman School Board and is generous in helping finance all community projects.

Dr. Rodgers is a well known registered Hereford breeder, and many of his herd have taken top honors in area livestock shows.

His hobby is bridge, and his collection of trophies attest to his ability to hold his own with the best of players.

He also has other interests that keep him busy. He and Buryl have four children, George, Edward, Jim and Linda, and his six grandchildren are frequent visitors in their home.

His father, Don Rodgers, lives in Gorman and he frequently sneaks away from the hospital to have lunch with him and Mrs. Rodgers, the former Mrs. A. M. Allen.

Dr. Rodgers, in the eyes of his co-workers and fellow man, possesses the qualities that make him a great man.

AUSTIN—Political and Legislative history has been written in the 59th law-making session just ended.

Highlights:

● A \$3,600,000,000 budget providing for expanded services in every area of state government and affecting every citizen.

● Record improvements in higher education, including creation of the powerful coordinating board of Texas colleges and universities.

● A \$101,000,000 salary raise for school teachers, \$70,000,000 of which will be paid by the state.

● A sweeping overhaul in the entire system of state mental hospital and tuberculosis control administration.

● Major public welfare expansions including a proposed constitutional amendment to permit full state participation in the new federal medical care program for the aged, blind and disabled. A provision of the amendment would qualify non-citizens who have lived in the state for 25 years or more.

● Overhaul and extension of the state's program for water control and development.

● Congressional and legislative redistricting which will change the makeup and complexion of future legislatures, shifting the balance of power from rural to urban areas.

● If voters approve proposed constitutional amendments, the Senate will be enlarged from 31 to 39 members and terms of the governor and other state-wide-elected officials now limited to two years, as well as those of state representatives, will be extended to four years.

Gov. John Connally emerged as the most powerful governor in modern Texas history.

Despite its record achievements, the 59th session handed a relatively-modest tax bill to Texas citizens.

Cigarette smokers will bear virtually the entire share of the cost. Tax was increased from eight to 11 cents a pack -- the nation's highest state tax. This will raise \$70,000,000 to \$73,400,000 in new money during the coming biennium.

A one-time gain of \$6,000,000 will be achieved by setting of a 15 months from-date-of-death limitation on payment of the inheritance tax.

Teacher pay raise also will require financing at the local level. Present estimate is that the owner of a \$15,000 home will pay \$2.52 more in annual property taxes to school districts.

BILLS PASSED —

Among the new laws passed during the final days of the regular session of the 59th Legislature were:

● Continuation of the Bay Study Committee, which is concentrating on the problems of water pollution;

● Regulation of the taking and processing of oysters and other shellfish for sale;

● Creation of Permian State College, if higher education coordinating board approves, at Odessa;

● Asking members of Congress from Texas to vote for keeping the section of the Taft-Hartley Law which permits Texas to outlaw closed union shops;

**A Great Disservice
To The Workman**

William T. Green, of Ft. Worth, President of the Texas Manufacturers Association, on hearing of the President's new labor message, said, "This is the greatest disservice any responsible governmental official could do to the workingmen of this nation and to the businesses that provide them with employment.

"Right to work laws were never aimed at destroying Unions in this country. Rather they were brought into being to maintain a healthy balance between labor and management. This they have done.

"Actually, the issue boils down to one point—compulsory unionism as opposed to voluntary unionism. Union officials feel they cannot gain the power they so avidly seek without compulsory unionism, therefore they want Section 14b of the Taft-Hartley Law repealed.

"There has been a general shift in governmental power and control over the past 20 years from the local and state scenes to Washington, D. C. With it has come some surrender of personal freedoms. There has also been a corresponding shift in power and control from labor union members to their leaders. With this shift, freedom of action by union members is moving in the direction of forced compliance with the decisions and policies being made by a few union leaders — frequently contrary to the overall wishes of their membership.

"A concerted effort must be made by all Americans who are truly interested in the future of the United States to thwart this power-grab attempt on the part of union leaders that now has the sanction of no less than the President of the United States."

● Prohibition of the use of .22 caliber rimfire ammunition to hunt deer, elk, antelope and wild sheep in counties not regulated by the Parks and Wildlife Commission;

● Prevention of city councils from making residence within the city limits a condition of employment;

● Legalization of free games on pinball machines;

● Requirement for testing of all babies born in Texas for phenylketonuria (PKU), an inborn error in system which, if uncorrected causes brain damage;

● Parents liability up to \$5,000 for malicious and wanton damage by their children.

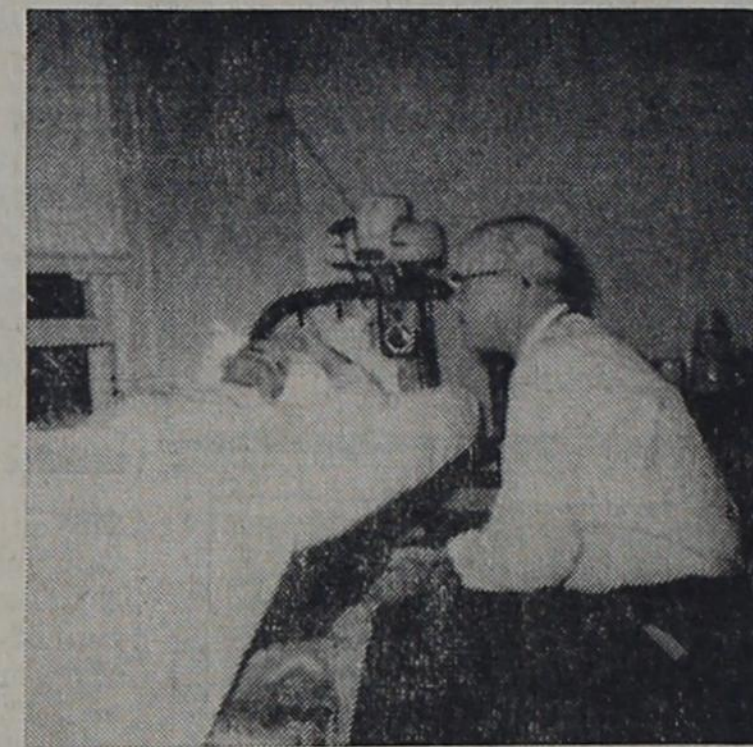

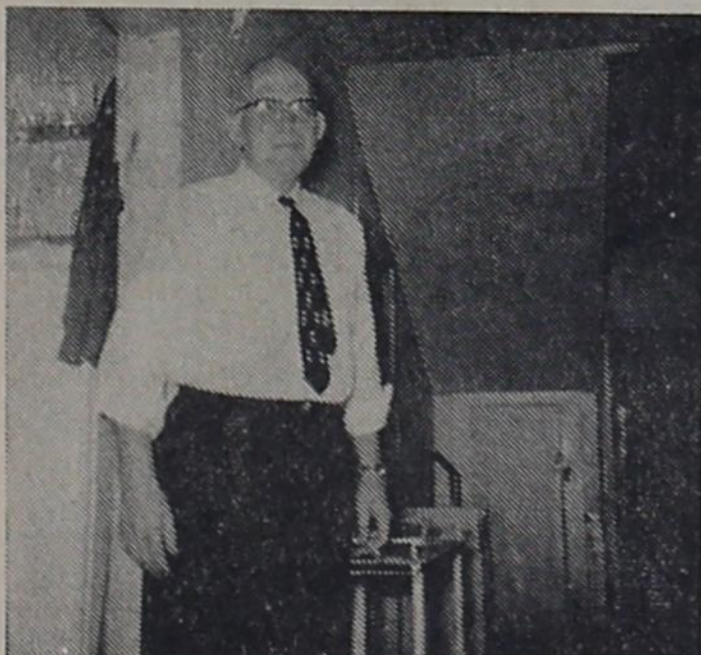


Picture of Dr. Rodgers in 1938

Browsing with Bev

Last week I ended the series of articles on selecting, sewing and caring for new fabrics. I hope you found the information useful.

This week, let's take a look at bees. Most of us are familiar with the liquid extracted honey — honey that has been separated from the comb. But another form becoming increasingly popular is crystallized honey. This is also called, creamed, candied, fondant, or spread. This type of honey spreads easily, but doesn't drip. Here's a couple of recipes to try using honey.

HONEY CINNAMON TOAST

This one is a real good breakfast idea. Place fresh bread on a broiler. Toast on one side. Turn slices and spread with a combination of honey and butter or margarine. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Toast spread side and serve piping hot.

This is delicious on fruit salads. Combine 1-2 cup liquid honey with 3 tablespoons lemon juice and 1-4 cup of vinegar. Mix together 1 teaspoon paprika and 1-2 teaspoon each dry mustard, salt and celery salt. Add dry ingredients to honey mixture. Slowly add 1 cup salad oil and beat until all ingredients

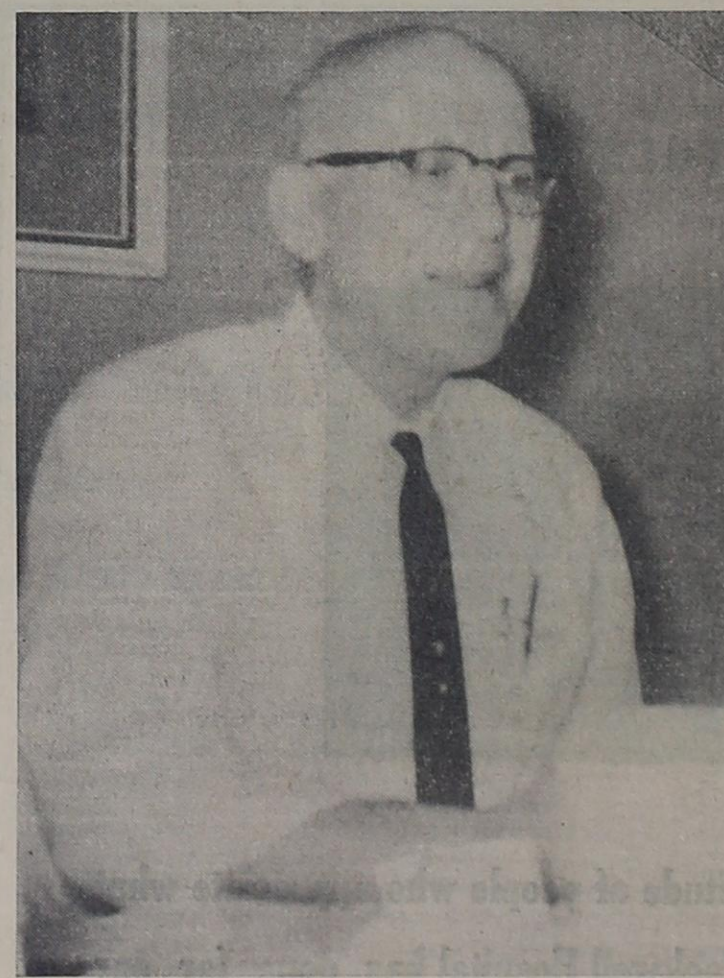

Improved Lighting Can Prevent Accidents

The high accident rate among older Americans could be cut thru improved strategic lighting in the home. The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, Inc. has stated in a Senior Citizens Month message.

The combination of aged eyes and inadequate illumination is a significant in accidental falls that kill more than 10,000 elderly persons each year, Roman Boerger, President of the Texas Society reported. May was proclaimed as Senior Citizen Month by President Johnson.

"A person in his sixties needs about two and one-half times more light than a 20-year old," said Mr. Boerger. "In most cases as we get older, we do get brighter reading lights but neglect other areas of the home vital to continued safe living."

Mr. Boerger cited a report presented at the 1965 annual conference of the National Society showing the accidental death rate per 100,000 population climbs from 55 among young adults to 90 in the 65-74 year age group and then soars to 276 accidental deaths per 100,000 in the 75-year and older category.

The report, prepared by Norvin C. Keifer, M. D. and Manuel Rodstein, M. D. of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, noted that accidental falls

kill almost 11,000 persons and over annually. Poor illumination and the decreased visual acuity of the older person contribute to these falls, particularly on stairways, the physicians said.

U. S. Naval Reserve Offers Young Men Active Summer

Young men with no particular vacation plans this summer might be interested in the U. S. Naval Reserve with its active duty for training program, according to a suggestion by Lieut. Alton R. Goddard, commanding officer of Naval Reserve Surface Division 8-40 (S) in Brownwood.

The Naval Reservist is eligible for two weeks on active duty each fiscal year, and since the military year begins each year on July 1st it is possible for the reservist to spend four weeks of the coming summer on active duty with the regular Navy.

Mr. Goddard pointed out that new recruits would probably spend their first two-week period at San Diego California, at the Naval Training Center. The later two-week tour could be at any one of numerous shore bases or aboard ships for trips to Caribbean ports or Atlantic or Pacific points.

The Naval Reservist attached to the Brownwood facility receives a day's pay for each Wednesday night drill attended. Mr. Goddard pointed out. When he goes on active duty for two weeks, he receives the same pay and travel allowance that regulars get. In addition, Mr. Goddard said, the Reservist is fulfilling his military obligation.

The Navy is interested in young men between 17 and 20 years of age who are at least high school seniors. Mr. Goddard said these men could continue their studies while receiving the military training, and when the time comes for them to go on active duty they will benefit from the advancements they might have made in pay grade and rating.

Mr. Goddard said the Naval Reserve office is open every week day and Wednesday night at the Navy building on Howard Payne College campus. He invited young men as well as military service veterans to call at the office to investigate the opportunities offered by the Naval Reserve program.

The following editorial, clipped from the May 10, 1965 edition of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram was mailed to us with a letter from De Leon, Texas. We think it is a wonderful tribute to doctors.

Naturally we think the Editor of this article had Dr. Rodgers in mind when he wrote it.

FAMILY DOCTOR IS A SPECIALIST

For several years the public has been bothered about the declining numbers of family doctors, or general practitioners. The situation is not improving. Instead the decline is continuing. A comprehensive report by the Wall Street Journal reflects the growing concern and describes activities of communities to entice young doctors and programs to encourage medical students to engage in general practice.

Some of the objections to general practice, from the student's point of view, are reported to be a lower expected income, a lower status as compared with that of specialists and the broad field in which the general practitioner must be educated.

The Journal's report quoted one student as saying: "I'm overwhelmed by the volume of knowledge I need to be a good doctor, so I'll specialize and learn my field cold. I'd be spreading myself too thin in general practice." Another is quoted as saying: "To me, today's GP is little more than a medical traffic cop directing patients to this or that specialist."

The general practitioners should be assured that their patients do not regard them as medical traffic cops but as personal physicians. Perhaps the term general practitioner is unfortunate, though it is not inaccurate. The general practitioner is a specialist, too.

The American Academy of General Practice has decided to establish a certification board, which might be something in the way of certifying general practitioners as specialists. That is something laymen would regard as proper. The patient rarely refers to his personal physician as a general practitioner, but rather as "my doctor." That is exactly the special field of the family doctor. He knows his patients as people, and that means much to the patients.

Most laymen may have little knowledge of the workings of blood systems, glands, nerves, joints and lungs or of organisms that invade the body, but each has a lifetime of experience with himself. That is an exclusive knowledge which the personal physician is best equipped to gain. The doctor cannot learn it in one interview. It takes a longer acquaintance.

There certainly is a need for doctors who specialize in certain fields of medicine. The general practitioners know when to call upon the ones called specialists.

But the general practitioner has a special field in personal relationship with his patients.

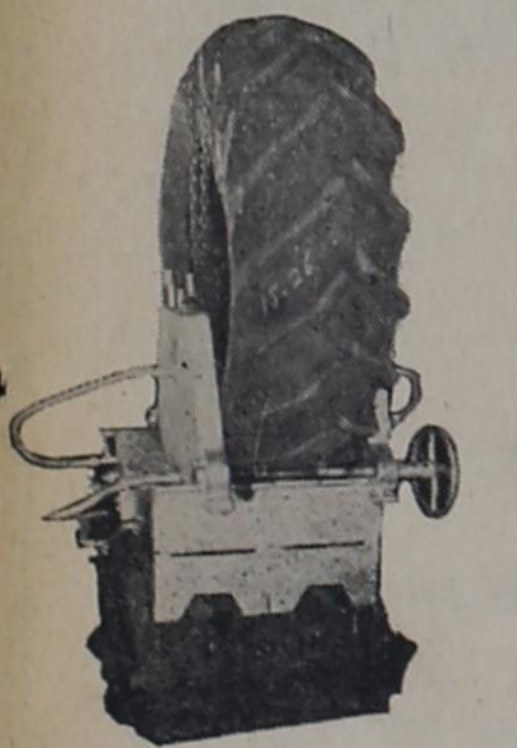

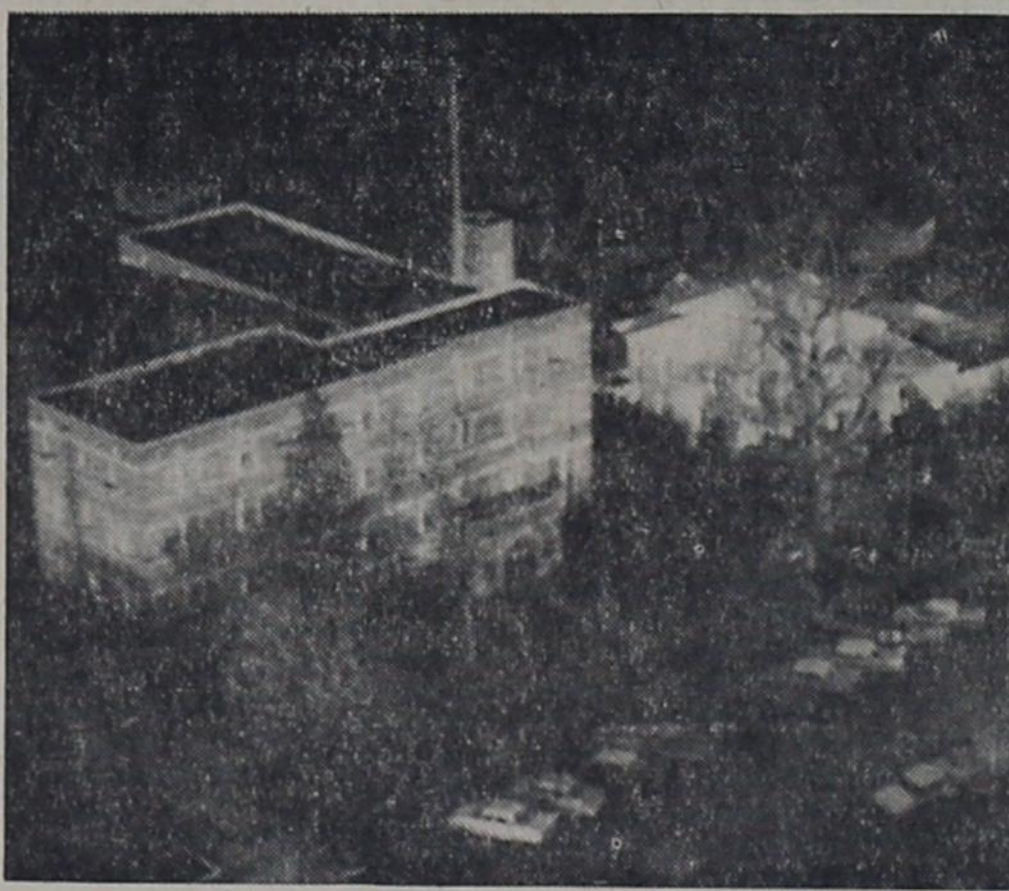

Browsing with Bev

Knits have really been popular this year and are predicted to be even more popular in seasons to come. They are especially suited for the person who travels. We have seen knits that are looped, lacy, ribbed, brocaded and don't forget the ever-popular jersey knits.

There are two types of knits; Single knits and Double knits. Here's how to tell the difference: Single knits are usually light weight and it is difficult to tell

the right from the wrong side — both look almost alike. Single knits usually need to be underlined or lined, sometimes both.

Double knits are usually more firmer than single knits. They are knitted using two sets of yarns. There is a definite right and wrong side to double knits and usually they do not require an underlining or lining.

In selecting knits, remember the lengthwise rib is the straight grain of the fabric, so make for sure the lengthwise rib is fairly straight and not twisted out of shape. In selecting a pattern choose one with few details.

Pre-shrink knits, except those that are bonded, before cutting the pattern. A new process — which involves compressing the fabric and making it highly resistant to shrinkage in normal laundering — has been developed to keep cotton knits from shrinking when machine washed and dryer dried. Investigations by the Good Housekeeping Institute show that new processed knits, which are released under the descriptive names of "pac-nit" and "perma-knit" — shrink about 1 percent, whereas conventional knits shrink about 10 percent. The computations were based on the knits being machine washed and dried 20 times each.

To open tubular knits, cut along a lengthwise rib close to the fold. Do not cut along fold. Press as much of the fold out as possible usually not all of the fold will press out, so lay pattern pieces to where the fold will be less noticeable. In cutting your pattern, lay your fabric as flat as possible and avoid stretching the fabric. Remember, knits stretch more in width than in length.

The sewing machine tension should be medium to light. Use 12-15 stitches per inch or a small zig-zag. Use cotton mercerized thread with cotton knits and synthetic thread with man-made fiber knits.

While sewing knits, use seam tape on shoulders, waist and at other points where you do not want the knit to stretch. Use iron on interfacing under buttonholes and zipper, to stabilize the material and keep it from stretching.

In cutting and sewing jerseys, place pins in the seam allowance so pin marks won't show. Use a short stitch, about 14-15 per inch and a sharp fine needle. Sew at a slow, even speed to keep material from puckering.

In pressing knits, lift and lower the iron in the direction of the lengthwise rib — do not stretch or pull fabric while pressing and do

not steam-press.

Knits need proper laundering. Use warm — not hot — water and low to moderate setting on the dryer. This will result in less shrinkage. When using an automatic dryer for cotton knits, do

not dry them bone dry. Remove the garments just before they are completely dry and pat and pull them gently into shape.

The acrylic or nylon knits can be dried completely in a dryer with relatively little shrinkage.

They will wrinkle badly if left in a dryer which has been turned off, however.

Wool knits are rarely machine washable. They need special soap for cold water and they need to be blocked and dried flat.

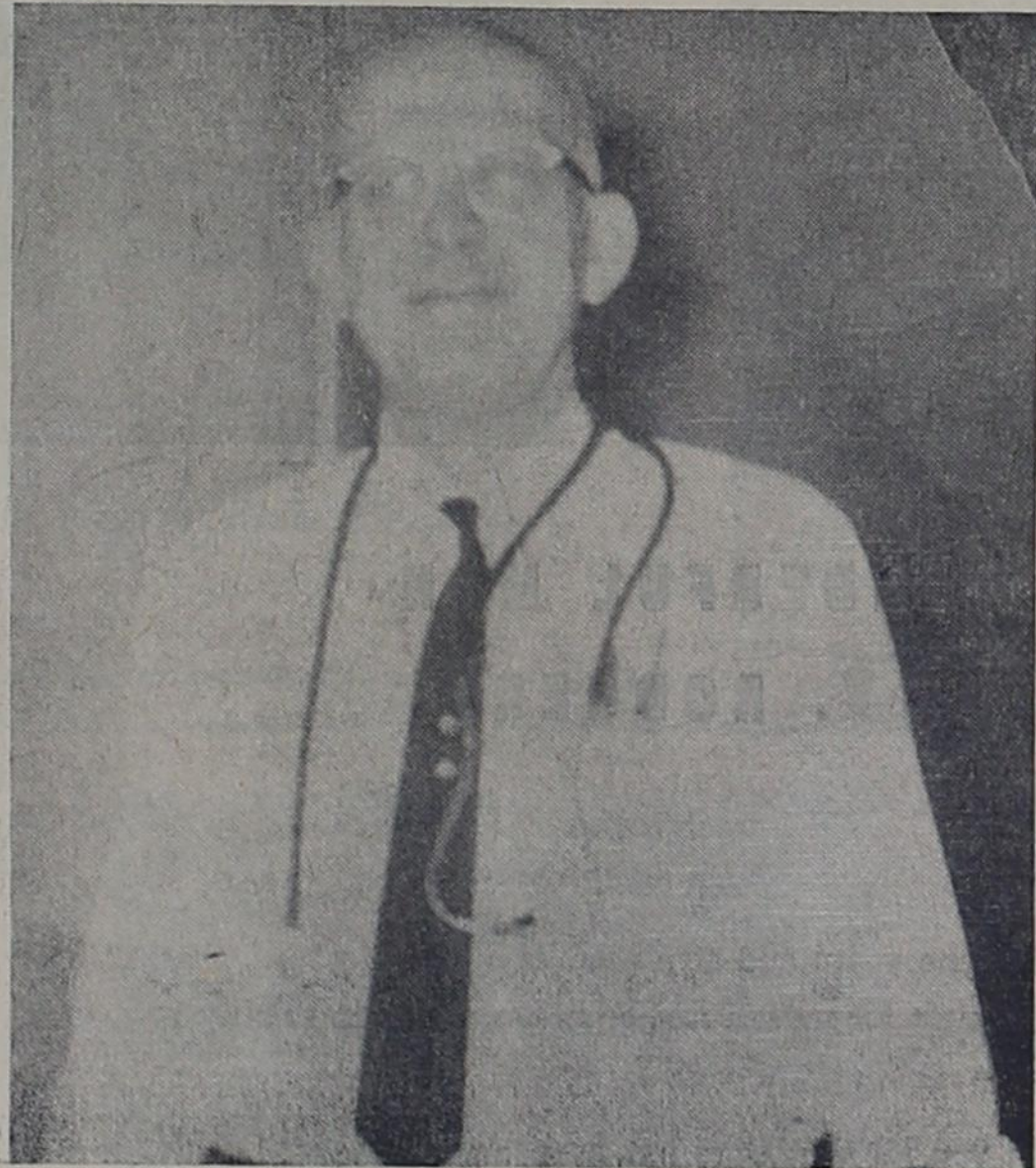

WASHINGTON, D. C. — A VERY SMALL BOY (ME) remembers hearing a very wise man (my

father) say that a man was usually pretty good if he paid his debts and liked to fish.

THESE ATTRIBUTES ALONE DO NOT MAKE THE PERFECT

MAN but it seems a pretty good place to start an appraisal.

IN THESE TROUBLED TIMES A FEELING OF TRUANCY might pervade one, should he go

fishing. On the other hand, it would seem that the good Lord would probably overlook such dereliction, if it is one, in this Month of May when the bees are buzzing, the birds singing and the air is soft. Surely not even a cloistered monk could resist the call of the outdoors.

A SEVENTEENTH CENTURY WRITER, Gervase Markham, wrote *The Pleasures of Princes Or Good Men's Recreations*. He commended fishing in these words, "That pleasure which is most comely, most honest and giveth man the most liberty to Divine meditations — is the art of angling which hath been the sport or recreation of Gods, Saints of most Holy Fathers and of many worthy and reverent Divines both dead and this time breathing."

ELSEWHERE IN THE BOOK THE PURITAN writer, eager to justify his love of fishing, observed that it was the calling of the Holy Apostles and, therefore, could not be sinful. No longer are we so fearful of wasting God's precious time that we must justify an impulse to go fishing. It is good for troubled souls and rest of mind. Even if no fish rise to take the bait, the trip is not in vain. Flowers blooming on every ridge and little valley, tender green leaves casting their mottled light on the ground, are something to see on the way to and from.

IT IS A TIME TO BREATHE DEEP AND FEEL NATURE all around, and maybe just forget for a little while that there are problems to be solved, challenges to be met — responsibilities to be assumed shortly. But for the time, you have a world of your own, and perhaps even made to your liking.

IT WOULD BE SAFE TO ASSUME THAT everyone who likes to fish would have a lot of flowing streams, lakes and even an ocean in his world, and a little leisure time. They would also like a great deal more of peace and tranquility, with a path to the fishing place dotted with dogwood, sunflowers, bachelors buttons, wild violets and a little crape myrtle thrown in. They would have less hot asphalt and cement, and no one would include a cannon's roar. Most would probably not even include controversy of any kind, but knowing that it must come.

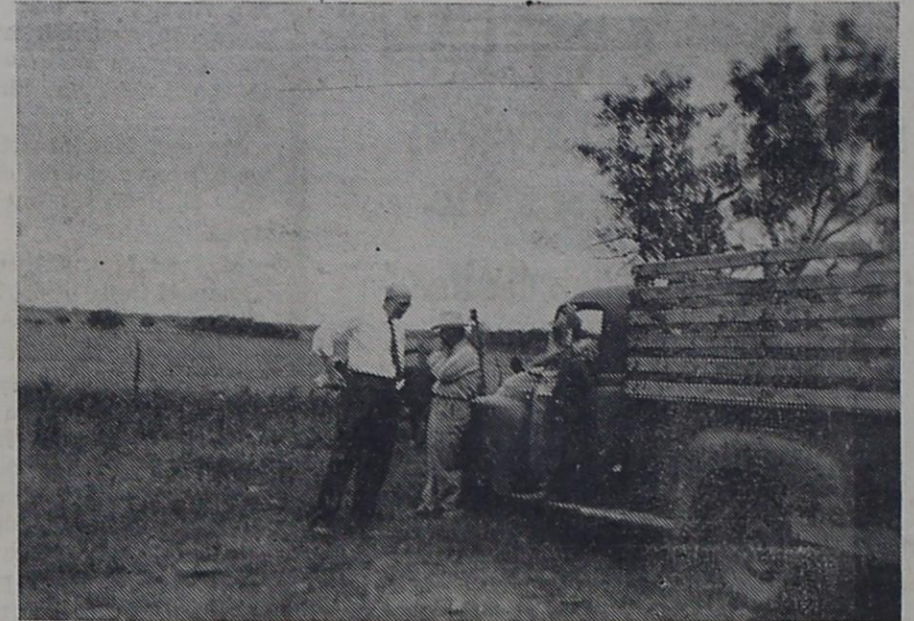

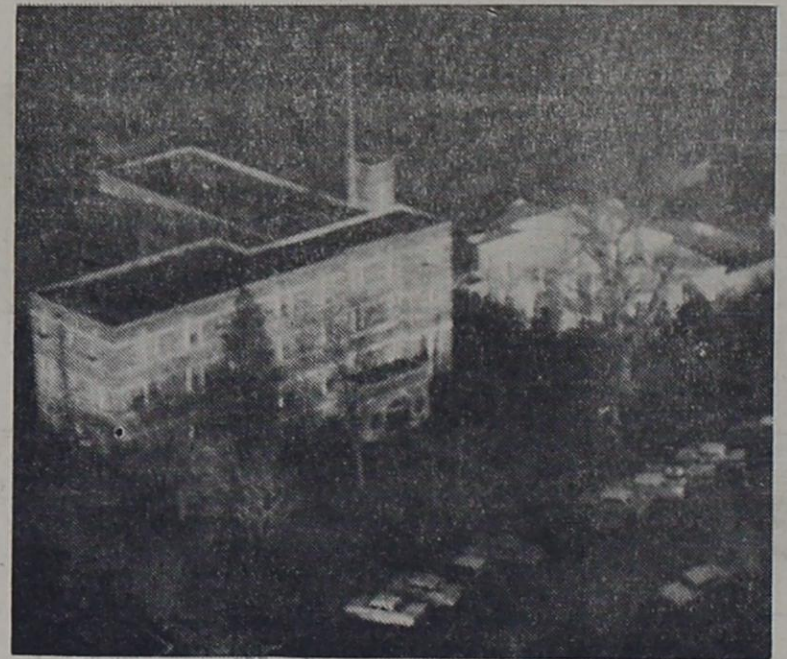

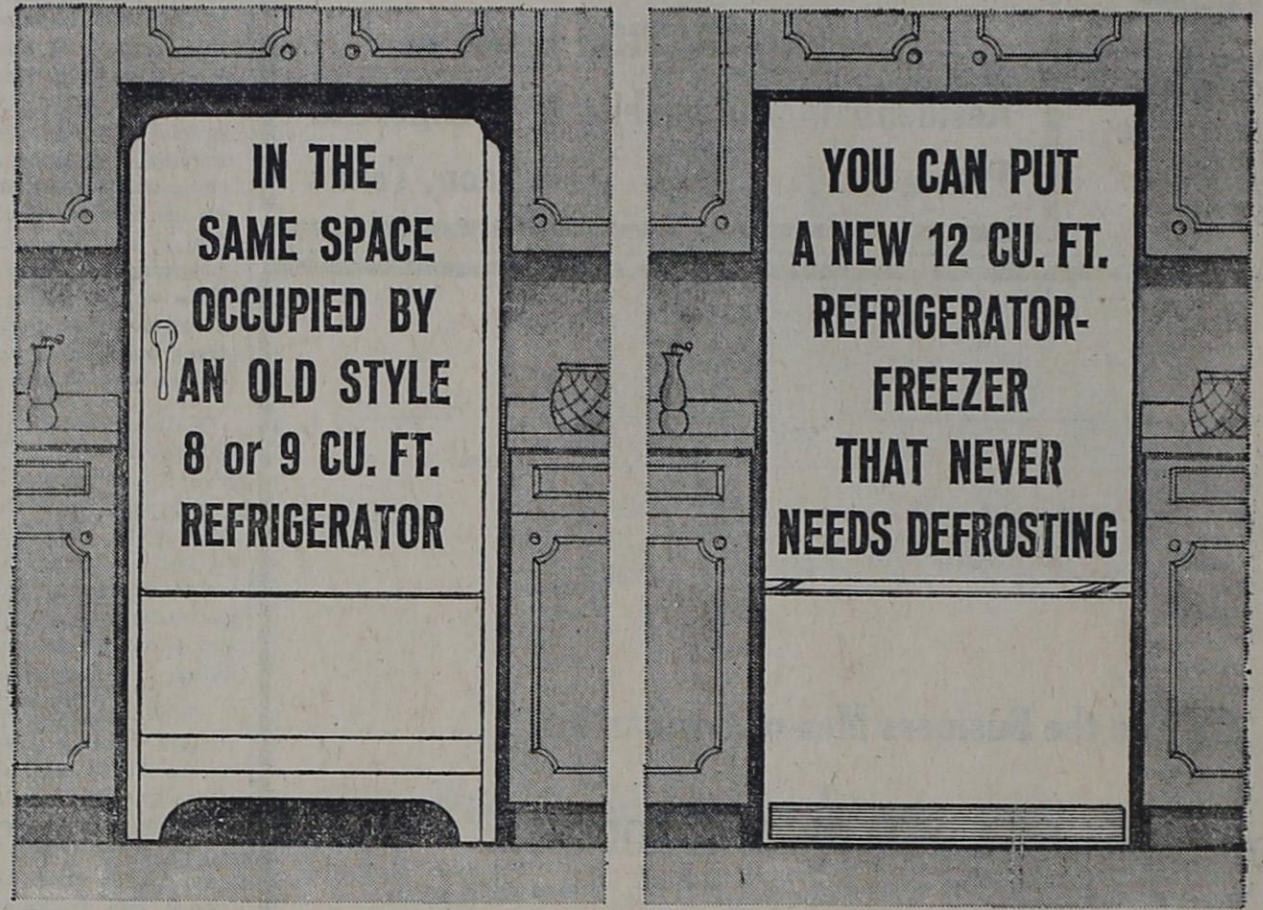
