

## George Bolt Receives Eagle Scout Award



George Bolt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Bolt, received the Eagle Scout award at the Firemen's and wives dinner held at the Brown Jug Cafe Monday evening, June 7th.

Fire Chief J. S. Ripley conducted a brief business meeting and turned the meeting over to W. C. Browning, program chairman.

Browning and Mr. E. C. Bramlett explained the Eagle Scout rank and how George achieved it. Mr. Bolt, Explorer Scout Advisor for Gorman Troop No. 38, spoke urging continued active interest from parents, community and boys in the Boy Scout Program for Gorman.

There are five Eagle Scouts recorded in the files of the Gorman Explorer Troop No. 38: George Bolt, 1965; E. C. Bramlett, Jr., 1964; Woodrow Browning and Stanley Bell, 1955; and Joe Meahaffey during his freshman year in High School.

In order to become an Eagle Scout the Boy Scout Handbook lists the following requirements:

1. Life Scout for six months. (George received his Life Scout Badge in May, 1964).
2. Must have earned 11 required Merit Badges set up by National Boy Scout Council.
3. Earn any other 10 Merit Badges from the Scout Handbook.

Required are: 1. Citizenship in the Community; 2. Soil and Water Conservation; 3. Personal Fitness; 4. Cooking; 5. Camping; 6. Swimming; 7. Citizenship in the Nation; 8. Nature; 9. First Aid; 10. Life Saving; and 11. Safety.

George had earned the above eleven and ten extra: 1. Public Health; 2. Friendship; 3. Bee Keeping (thanks to Larry Pullin); 4. Art; 5. Painting; 6. World Brotherhood; 7. Stamp Collecting; 8. Scholarship; 9. Coin Collecting; and 10. Chemistry.

### ON STAFF AT PHILMONT SCOUT RANCH

In 1941 Waite Phillips donated 137,000 acres in the slopes of the Rocky Mountains as a camp for Explorer Scouts to "perpetuate faith, self reliance, integrity and freedom" in the lives of growing young men. Included in the boundaries of this grant, which is now Philmont National Boy Scout Ranch, is an ancient Indian Cliff Dwellers "dig" which is being excavated by the archeology department of the University of Texas. There is one side of a pre-historic inland sea where, under the guidance of a camp geologist, the boys find and study shark teeth, cretaceous mud balls, fossils of all sorts, ancient lava flows and rock structure of yesterday and today. The ruins of early gold mines are kept intact and here the boys are taught where gold came from and how it is mined. The boys pan gold for themselves from the residue in the streams and take home souvenir gold dust. The Old Santa Fe Trail was through this camp. There the Scout can learn the feel of the pioneer for there are only trails for the Boy Scout overnight camp outs and three or four days from the nearest community. There is a weather station where the boys become informed. Its main purpose is to keep the campers informed of weather conditions on the trails while they are out with a group of boys, hiking thru the camp on prescribed trails. Roughing it on the hikes the boys have an opportunity to enlarge

upon many camping skills they have already learned in their council summer camps. There are also courses in horseback riding, fishing, forestry and several others in addition to the many, many courses taught at the council Boy Scout Camp.

An average of 18,000 Boy Scouts attend the camp. The staff is made up of 300 young men and national leaders. To be on the staff a young man must have shown interest in scouting, must have recommended camp experience in local council and must have graduated from high school. Scouts from every state file an application with Philmont Scout Ranch. The local Boy Scout Council (Gorman is in the Comanche Trail Council) sends a file on the Scout who has made application to the Philmont Scout Camp managers, there his name is chosen on the basis of the investigation of the boy as a scout and the need in the camp of the experience the boy can contribute to the staff.

Bill Garner of Eastland, a sophomore at Tarleton State College, and George Bolt of Gorman, a Brotherhood member of the Order of the Arrow, an Eagle Scout and a 1965 graduate of Gorman High, are members of the Comanche Trail Council of Boy Scouts chosen to be on the staff at Philmont. George has spent four summer sessions at Comanche Trail Council Camps at Billy Gibbons. During the summer of 1964 he was a member of the camp staff at Billy Gibbons. He has been a Den Chief with the Gorman Cub Scouts and a Junior assistant Scout Master of the local Boy Scout Troop No. 38 and a member of the Explorer Scout Post 38 for four years.

George left Friday, June 11 with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Bolt for Cimmaron, N. M. where he will spend the summer as a Ranger on the staff at Philmont Scout Ranch.

## Eastland County Over Goal In Screwworm Eradication Campaign

Eastland County wound up its share of the voluntary phase of the screwworm eradication program with contributions in excess of askings, according to Oscar Schaefer, county chairman of the program.

A tabulation released by Glyn Gilliam, Ranger banker and secretary of the program in the county, showed total contributions of \$3,041.50. The county had been asked to contribute \$3,000.00 to keep the program under way until the governments of the United States and Mexico take over the eradication work in July.

Gorman led in contributions with \$744.70; Rising Star contributed \$701.51 and Cisco \$606.87. Ranger contributions totalled \$592.83 and Eastland \$395.65, according to the tabulation. Community totals are not significant, however, Mr. Schaefer pointed out, since some of the smaller communities had much larger cattle raising areas from which to secure contributions.

"We are very proud of the record which our county has made in supporting the screwworm eradication with cash contributions," said Schaefer. "As secretary Orville Freeman said in a meeting with Mexican Secretary Juan Gil Preciado at the eradication center at Mission the other day, it is one of the best investments ever made in agricultural research and the biggest single breakthrough in controlling pests through the peaceful use of atomic power."

He added that the banks of the county would continue to accept contributions.

The Mexican and American agricultural secretaries met at the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation Center at Mission to initiate plans for a take-over of the eradication program jointly by their governments.

Over the southwest at large contributions to the final phase of the voluntary program were more than double the \$300,000 asked, Mr. Schaefer said.

In the four years that the program for control of the screwworm has been in operation it has resulted in a reduction of cases of infestation from 6,308 in Texas in 1962, to 45 in the first five months

Also to the Army & Navy Surplus of Cisco for use of the large pumping hoses used by Mr. Hamilton, and to the Eastland Ceramic and Pottery on East Main for use of the large pump which was loaned to us.

I was sincerely hoping that we would be able to get the pool open but our efforts failed. Again I express our regrets to our youth. Maybe something will be done in the future to make it possible for you to have a swimming pool. I sincerely hope so.

of 1965, Mr. Schaefer pointed out. There have been no reports of infestation in this county this year, the nearest case being at Menard.

However, the number of infestations reported in May increased 120 percent over the number recorded in May of 1964, an indication of the necessity of procuring the control program vigorously, said the county chairman.

The pest is controlled by the release of sterile male flies which mate ineffectually with the female fly. Irradiation with an atomic product accomplishes the sterility.





## Sgt. Willie Tyrone Is Lauded By Senator Robert Kennedy

Reporter-News Capital Bureau Abilene Reporter-News June 15 -

WASHINGTON - The story of an Abilene Marine killed in Viet Nam is now a part of the Congressional Record, placed there by Sen. Robert F. Kennedy (D-N.Y.)

Sgt. Willie Tyrone, whose family lives at 1712 S. 17th. in Abilene, died, according to a New York Journal-American story, because he refused to endanger the lives of others who tried to rescue him after a battle against the Viet Cong.

His family includes his wife, Joan, and two daughters, Donna, 5 and Linda, 4. Funeral was held in Abilene last week.

Kennedy said about Tyrone, "I hope that every American will take this opportunity to learn firsthand of the sacrifice and contribution of Sergeant Tyrone."

Tyrone was an adviser to the 39th. Vietnamese Ranger Battalion which was ambushed on its way to relieve a beleaguered outpost in the war-torn country.

The Marine had sent a message saying that he was wounded and ammunition was running out. Helicopters were dispatched, but Tyrone waved them off because the Viet Cong were too close.

Tyrone said he had only a flesh wound in the arm and did not want to risk the lives of the crew by letting the helicopter land.

Within a few hours, the Viet Cong attacked and killed every ranger in the battalion.

Kennedy placed the New York newspaper account of Tyrone's death in the Congressional Record.

ONE WAY OR THE OTHER this philosophy is involved in our Foreign Air Program. Too much of it has been a fish for a day. Not only has it not done any lasting good, but our Nation gets no credit for it.

ALMOST AS FUTILE, AND MORE EXPENSIVE, has been the effort to jump over centuries some undeveloped and inexperienced countries at self-government, and into a modern society. They are not equipped to govern themselves in any advanced system, much less to utilize complicated machinery and equipment.

THE REMAINING PART OF FOREIGN AID, having to do with self-help in matters of education, health and technical assistance, has been a much cheaper experiment. Like the latter part of the proverb, it teaches them how to fish. Much of this type of aid has been worthwhile.

FOR DIFFERENT REASONS, THE COMMUNISTS HAVE for a long period of time extended this sort of help to areas where conditions were ripe to indoctrinate people into Communism. This method of operation is as old as Lenin. Lenin laid out a plan for communization of countries by organizing farmers co-operatives, introducing better farming techniques, teaching the illiterate how to read and write, and arousing the peasants in conflict with the landowners. This continues to be the practice plus entertainment such as plays, skits, dances and songs, all carrying a message in folk song.

THE COMMUNISTS ARE IN NO GREAT HURRY AS WE ARE. They begin with the smallest operation and gradually expand their activities until revolution is ready.

AT ANY MOMENT THEY ARE READY TO AGITATE in any nation which shows signs of having fermented unrest. Examples for the moment are Java in Southeast Asia, but closer to home in Venezuela, Colombia and Guatemala. Trained guerrillas move into a rural area and start buying produce from farmers at prices above that which they have ever received. This establishes friendships.

THE NEXT STAGE IS TO BEGIN AGITATING the people about deep-seated grievances against the landowners and against the government. When the people are excited enough, guerrillas stage attacks against small outposts of the army. Such attacks bring lar-

ger detachments of the military into the area.

BECAUSE THE LACK OF SUPPLIES, soldiers are forced to confiscate food and lodging, which acts antagonistic to the local populace. With the help of the peasants, army units are usually ineffective against the hit-and-run guerrilla tactics.

AS IN THE CASE OF SOUTH VIET NAM and Java, Communists go a step farther by holding public executions of natives who do not cooperate with them. The people conclude their security lies with the guerrillas.

THE NEXT STEP IS TO INCREASE ACTIVITIES AGAINST the central government, with the backing of the people from areas under their control.

AS IN THE CASE IN SOME LATIN AMERICAN COUNTRIES the Communists provoke and inspire general strikes in the cities to coincide with attacks in more remote areas of the country.

BY THESE TOTAL EFFORTS THEY ARE ABLE TO BUILD major crises which call for all-out government use of massive force and, as in the case of the Dominican Republic, for example, the government calls on the United States for assistance.

WHEN THIS ASSISTANCE IS GIVEN, they then use the action as propaganda in other nations to make them despise the United States.

OUR POLICY IN SOUTH VIET NAM IS to offset these sort of tactics, but better answers have got to be found than we now have to head off these developments in countries of the Western Hemisphere.

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
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
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# Across the centuries

*the Sermon on the Mount comes to you  
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**S**EENING the crowds, he went up on the mountain, and when he sat down his disciples came to him. And he opened his mouth and taught them, saying:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

"Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied.

"Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy.

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God.

"Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are you when men revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so men persecuted the prophets who were before you.

"You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trodden under foot by men.

"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hid. Nor do men light a lamp and put it under a bushel, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.

"Think not that I have come to abolish the law and the prophets; I have come not to abolish them but to fulfill them. For truly, I say to you, till heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. Whoever then relaxes one of the least of these commandments and teaches men so, shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but he who does them and teaches them shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven. For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.

"You have heard that it was said to the men of old, 'You shall not kill; and whoever kills shall be liable to judgment.' But I say to you that every one who is angry with his brother shall be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother shall be liable to the council, and whoever says, 'You fool!' shall be liable to the hell of fire. So if you are offering your gift at the altar, and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift. Make friends quickly with your accuser, while you are going with him to court, lest your accuser hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you be put in prison: truly, I say to you, you will never get out till you have paid the last penny.

"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you that every one who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, pluck it out and throw it away; it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body be thrown into hell. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better that you lose one of your

members than that your whole body go into hell.

"It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' But I say to you that every one who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, makes her an adulteress; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.

"Again you have heard that it was said to the men of old, 'You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform to the Lord what you have sworn.' But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. Let what you say be simply 'Yes' or 'No'; anything more than this comes from evil.

"You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you, Do not resist one who is evil. But if any one strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also; and if any one would sue you and take your coat, let him have your cloak as well; and if any one forces you to go one mile, go with him two miles. Give to him who begs from you, and do not refuse him who would borrow from you.

"You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven; for he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust. For if you love those who love you, what reward have you? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? And if you salute only your brethren, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? You, therefore, must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect.

**B**EWARE of practicing your piety before men in order to be seen by them; for then you will have no reward from your Father who is in heaven.

"Thus, when you give alms, sound no trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may be praised by men. Truly, I say to you they have their reward. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"And when you pray, you must not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, that they may be seen by men. Truly, I say to you, they have their reward. But when you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"And in praying do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do; for they think that they will be heard for their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him. Pray then like this:

*'Our Father who art in heaven,  
Hallowed be thy name.*

*Thy kingdom come,  
Thy will be done,*

*On earth as it is in heaven.*

*Give us this day our daily bread;*

*And forgive us our debts,*

*As we also have forgiven our debtors;*

*And lead us not into temptation,*

*But deliver us from evil.'*

For if you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father also will forgive you; but if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses.

"And when you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces that their fasting may be seen by men. Truly, I say to you, they have their reward. But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by men but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

"Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal; for where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

"The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is sound, your whole body will be full of light; but if your eye is not sound, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness!

"No one can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon.

"Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And which of you by being anxious can add one cubit to his span of life? And why be anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O men of little faith? Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the Gentiles seek all these things; and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things shall be yours as well.

"Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Let the day's own trouble be sufficient for the day.

**J**UDGE not, that you be not judged. For with the judgment you pronounce you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get. Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when there is the log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye.

"Do not give dogs what is holy; and do not throw your pearls before swine, lest they trample them underfoot and turn to attack you.

"Ask, and it will be given you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For every one who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened. Or what man of you, if his son asks him for a loaf, will give him a stone? Or if he asks for a fish, will give him a serpent?

If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him? So whatever you wish that men would do to you, do so to them; for this is the law and the prophets.

"Enter by the narrow gate; for the gate is wide and the way is easy, that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few.

"Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves. You will know them by their fruits. Are grapes gathered from thorns, or figs from thistles? So, every sound tree bears good fruit, but the bad tree bears evil fruit. A sound tree cannot bear evil fruit, nor can a bad tree bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. Thus you will know them by their fruits.

"Not every one who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name? And then will I declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you evil-doers.'

"Every one then who hears these words of mine and does them will be like a wise man who built his house upon the rock; and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat upon that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on the rock. And every one who hears these words of mine and does not do them will be like a foolish man who built his house upon the sand; and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell; and great was the fall of it."

And when Jesus finished these sayings, the crowds were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them as one who had authority, and not as their scribes.

**Browsing with Bev**

Several of you have recently requested information on methods of freezing potatoes.

**PREPARATION OF NEW POTATOES FOR FREEZING**

Select potatoes the size of walnuts. Scrub well in cold water to remove skins, or wash and scrape. Pre-heat in boiling water: 5 to 8 minutes, depending on size.

**Cooling:** Cool in cold running water 5 to 8 minutes.

**Packing:** Pack dry without water.

**PREPARATION OF FRENCH FRIED POTATOES FOR FREEZING**

Use mature potatoes suitable for French frying. Wash, peel and cut into sticks 1/4 inch square. Pre-heat sticks in boiling water for 2 minutes.

**Cooling:** Cool in cold running water 3 minutes.

**Packing:** Pack dry, without water. — OR — Select potatoes suitable for French frying.

**Preparation:** Fry in deep fat to light golden brown. Drain thor-

oughly on absorbent paper. Cool to room temperature.

**Packaging:** Pack in moisture-vapor-proof frozen food containers.

**Thawing and heating:** Remove from package, place on baking sheet, reheat in hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 5 minutes.

**SWEET POTATOES**

**Preparation:** Use medium to large mature potatoes that have been cured. Wash and cook until almost tender in water, pressure cooker or oven. Cool. Peel, cut in halves, slice or mash. To prevent whole sweet potatoes for slices from darkening, dip for 5 seconds in a solution containing 1 tablespoon citric acid or 1/2 cup lemon juice to 1 quart of water. To keep mashed sweet potatoes from darkening, mix 2 tablespoons orange or lemon juice with each quart of mashed potatoes. Package and freeze immediately.

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


