Opposed to federal intervention or assistance, but recognizes that the federal government does have a place in limited, specified areas.

For the expansion and preservation of the free enterprise system and basically is concerned in developing an improved business climate conducive to an expanding economy.

A staunch defender of the profit motive which is essential in the preservation of the free enterprise system, believing that business profits determine investment, create job opportunities, and that investment is a necessary ingredient of progress.

For a free marketing economy, in all phases of business.

Convinced that the cost of government definitely is a cost of doing business and must be minimized.

For the development of a business atmosphere favorable to all levels of business.

For the preservation of our natural resources, which make this one of the nation's greatest producing regions. Especially does the West Texas Chamber of Commerce emphasize the importance of conservation in oil and gas, water, soil and raw materials.

Cognizant of the significant role of local chambers of commerce in regional progress, and pledges to support local chambers of commerce in constructive efforts compatible with W.T.C.C. policies.

The Leon School, located three miles southeast of Gorman, went the way of most until all that remains are memories and friendship and family ties.

The first school was built on the branch of the Leon Creek because of the access to water. It was consolidated with the Lebanon School in 1917 and the new school was built on higher ground. The school was located where the Rayford Burgess farm home now stands and the water well that supplied water to the some eighty students is still in use.

Mr. S. D. Miers, early day settler, gave the three acres of land for the new school. The school continued to consolidate and go urban and the school was closed in 1934, not because of lack of funds for teachers, but for lack of students.

Former teachers at Leon School include John Cooper (deceased), Ambrus Morgan and the two Mohn sisters of De Leon, Mrs. Kate Gray Murphy of Gorman, Louis Browning (deceased), Leland Stoeker, Ruby Robinson, a Mr. Leslie, Paul Holdridge, Ruth Hopper, Bob Boucher (deceased), and Mrs. Rosa Boucher, and Mr. Dave Harper. Mr. Cooper was also a teacher for many years in Gorman Schools.

Families that will be represented at the homecoming will be the Richardsons, Bells, Watsons, Warrens, Miers, Burgess, Rawls, Hirst, Gilmores, Johnsons and Lindleys. We are indebted to Miss Effie Gilmore of Gorman for supplying the names of former teachers and early settlers in the Leon Community.

**Annual Sheep & Goat Field Day Is Scheduled For Friday, July 30**

An Angora goat judging contest will be a feature of the annual Sheep and Goat Field Day at Ranger, July 30 according to Dr. John Foster, chairman of the planning group. Several classes of goats will also be shown.

B. S. Dudley, Jr. Ranger Vocational Teacher, will be in charge of this event, Foster said. All attending may participate in the judging contest, he said.

The Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Agricultural Agents are co-sponsors of the affair. Three have been held previously. The field day will be held at the old Tiffen Gas Plant, 3 miles northeast of Ranger on the Hagemann Ranch road.

Other items on the program include status of the screwworm program, toxic weeds and shrubs of Central and West Texas to sheep and goats, future price outlook for wool, mohair and mutton, price supports on mohair and wool and the activities of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

To discuss or demonstrate the items on the agenda will be Dr. J. B. Henderson of Coleman, Area Veterinarian, Texas Animal Health Commission; Al Garrett, Mason, County Agricultural Agent; John G. McHaney, A&M University, College Station; Dr. W. T. Hardy, Sonora, superintendent of the Ranch Experiment Station; J. G. Meredith, Eastland ASC office manager, and Gaylord Hankins, Rock Springs, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

The meeting is scheduled to get underway at 9:30 a. m. on the above date.

**TSC Second Summer Semester Set July 19**

STEPHENVILLE, (Spl) - Registration for the second six-week summer session at Tarleton State College will be held Monday, July 19, in the Science Building Lecture Room. Classes start Tuesday.

Offerings in summer school include more than 30 courses in 12 fields, according to John Whiting, registrar. An enrollment increase is expected over that of the same period last year, he said.

The enrollment forecast is based, in part, on expanded course offerings in elementary education. Included here are Education 303-10 Nature and Conditions of Learning; Education 422-10, Mathematics in the Elementary School; and Education 445-10, Secondary School Curriculum and Methods.

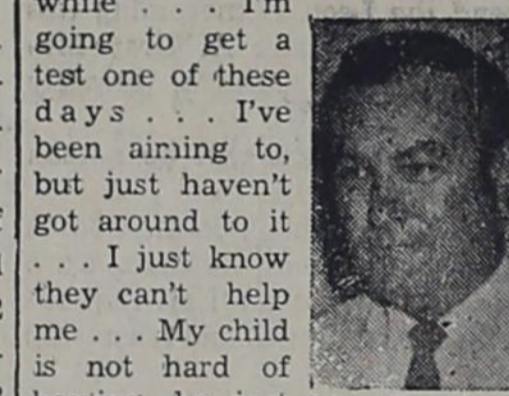
Enrollment for the first six-week term of summer school reached 511 - a 42 per cent increase over enrollment for the first summer school term in 1964. 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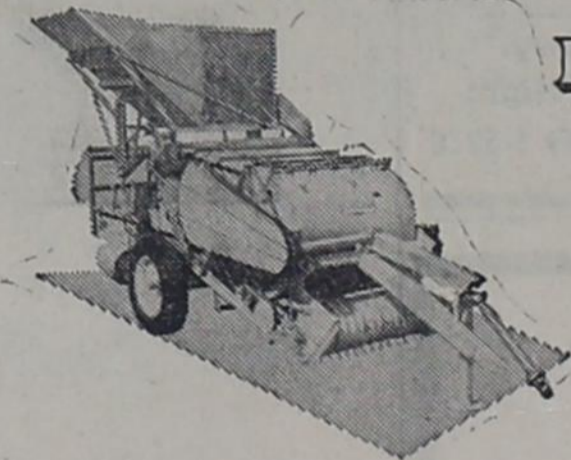
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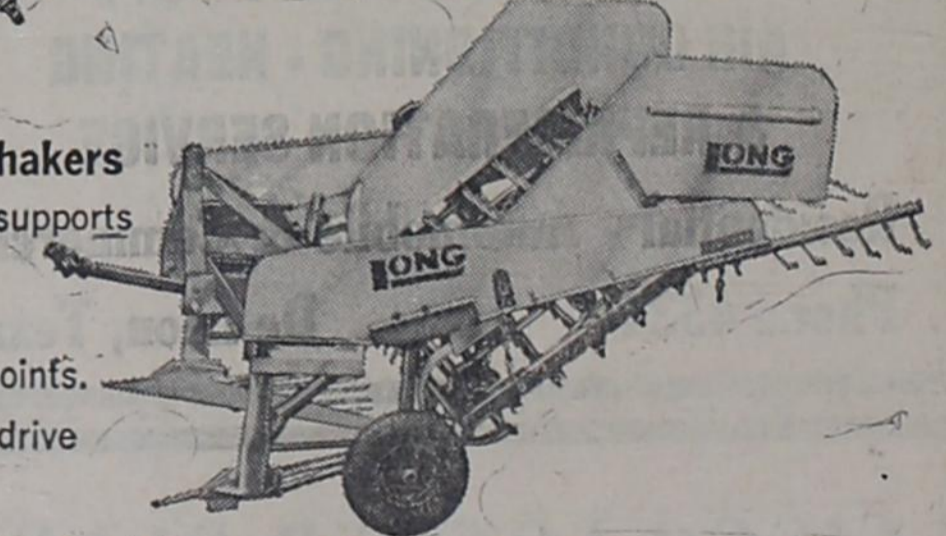


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## As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THE COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE of the House of Representatives is now struggling with a new Farm Bill. Some Sections of the measure have been approved by Subcommittees, and some by the full Committee.

THE PRINCIPAL AIM IS TO REDUCE SURPLUSES of all commodities now in excess supply and, at the same time, maintain decent prices for the farmer. As a matter of fact, this has been the objective of farm programs from their beginning.

IN ALL THESE EFFORTS THERE IS THE PARADOX of the acute problem of rapidly rising world-wide famine.

IN THE NEXT FEW DAYS THERE IS SUPPOSED to be a report issued by a Task Force, appraising the food situation around the globe. There are indications that the experts looking into this matter will describe it as a desperate problem.

IN ALL OF LATIN AMERICA, POPULATION is outrunning increased food production. In nations where food is already scarce, population is growing by 3 percent a year, while food output fails to increase.

PERHAPS A SINGLE FACT WILL ILLUMINATE THE PROBLEM SOMEWHAT.

ONE-FIFTH OF ALL THE WHEAT AMERICA now produces goes to India. It keeps alive about 60 million people. Without this grain there would be mass starvation. In India, as in Latin America, it is simply the inability to produce food as fast as they produce people.

THE PROBLEM CAN BE ANALYZED, BUT THE SOLUTION is another thing. Experts analyzing the prospective disaster are exceedingly pessimistic for effective international cooperation. It is clear that the only nation which really concerns itself with the problem is the United States.

SCORES OF NEW GOVERNMENTS, CUT LOOSE FROM Western European control, have problems far beyond their limited capabilities. To feed all of them is beyond our own capabilities, and yet, we are a nation of surplus food.

A NUMBER OF REMEDIES ARE BEING SUGGESTED. One is to step up the "Food for Peace" Program which now runs at about \$1 1/2 billion a year, mostly charged to the Farm Program. Another consideration is to revive and step up the old Point IV Program inaugurated during the Truman Administration. Neither holds a great deal of hope of more than easing famine in two-thirds of the world.

THE ORIGINAL POINT IV PROGRAM WAS DIRECTED MAINLY at teaching rudimentary methods of agriculture. In India, for instance, a steel point as wide as one's hand attached to the longest end of crossed timbers, enabled the Indian farmer to increase his tillable soil from 4 to 18 acres.

IT IS ONE THING TO SPEAK OF INFORMING 3 million American farmers through our efficient

IN ADDITION, ALTHOUGH IT MAY SOUND STRANGE, suitable farming land is running out in Africa, Asia and Latin America. The only resort is for better yield.

PROPER POPULATION CONTROL WOULD OBVIOUSLY be the long-range answer. The fact remains, however, that the habits of varied races, tribes and religions reduce birth control efforts to a mere demonstration. In addition, medical science has greatly reduced infant mortality and raised the life expectancy to heights unbelievable a short time ago.

STARVATION ITSELF MAY BE NATURE'S REMEDY, but imagine the turmoil and tragedy which must inevitably accompany it.

THIS IS A PROBLEM WHICH APPROACHES a dilemma on the part of our Government and all humanitarians. It is presenting itself so rapidly it is difficult to even imagine. The experts say that the calamity will be upon the world in the 1970's with its awful consequences, unless better answers are found than are now in sight.

WITH ALL THE PROBLEMS ATTENDING THE SOLUTION of surplus food, what a blessing we in America enjoy.

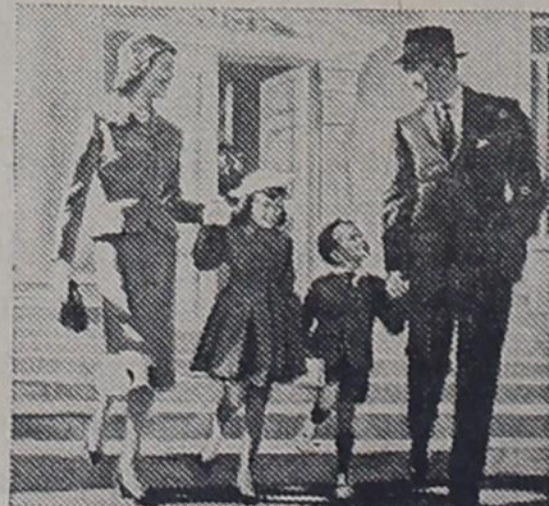

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## Nuclear Science Symposium Challenge Texas Students To Seek Careers In Nuclear Science

Austin, Texas (Spl) — A challenge to scientifically-inclined Texas high school students to seek careers in the broad fields of nuclear science was made in the closing sessions of the Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools that was held recently at the University of Texas. Nearly a dozen outstanding scientists and educators addressed the 300 students and 200 high school science teachers in the four-day symposium co-sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas.

The students were told that this nation is on the verge of an age of "energy unlimited" in which man will have almost unlimited power to extend and transform his environment. They heard Dr. Gerald F. Tape, member of the US Atomic Energy Commission, urge them to complete many of the tasks that present day scientists have started.

Other speakers included Dr. W. E. Drummond, professor of physics at the University of Texas, one of the nation's outstanding authorities in the field of plasma theory as applied to nuclear research. He described the major step that has been taken in the development of education in the new science of plasma physics as a result of the financial support being given research at the University of Texas and Texas A&M University by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

THE TAERF, composed of 10 investor-owned electric power companies in Texas, including the Texas Electric Service Company, is supporting a major research effort aimed at harnessing the thermonuclear (fusion) reaction — the source of power of the hydrogen bomb — for the eventual economical generation of electricity.

This research is being carried out in the laboratories of the General Atomic division of General Dynamics Corporation at San Diego, California, and at the University of Texas and Texas A&M University, where Texas scientists work in cooperation with General Atomic scientists in the long-range fusion effort.

Describing a watermelon isn't quite so easy as it sounds. For watermelon shapes range from round to oblong; color ranges from a light green to almost black — solid color, striped with a paler green, or marbled.

Too, the flesh may be white, cream-color, honey-color, yellow, pale red, red or scarlet. The seeds can be white, white with two black spots, cream-colored tipped with brown and striped with brown around the edges, yellow with a black stripe around the margin and with black spots, dark brown, reddish-brown, russet-brown, black, "sculptured" or as if engraved with ornamental characters, pink, or red.

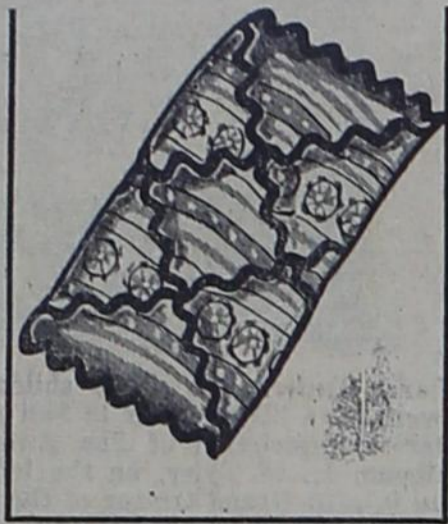
But there's one thing all good watermelons have in common — delicious taste. And you'll be seeing a lot of watermelons during the next few weeks.

On hot summer days, nothing beats icy cold watermelon for instant refreshment. Cut in slices or juicy wedges, it's considered one of the favorites of summer.

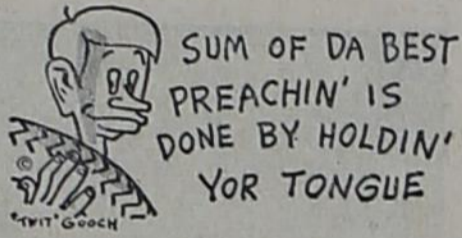
