**ASCS Chief Reports 32,000 Acres Peanuts Planted In County**

Eastland County has a potential of \$2,200,000 income from its peanut crop this year - "if it rains soon" - Gilbert Meredith, local manager for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service committee, told the Eastland Lions Club last Tuesday.

His office reports that 32,035.5 acres are planted to peanuts this year, he said, and with an average of 21 bushels (last years yield) and an average price of \$3.30 (some higher, some lower), the net income should exceed \$2 million, he said.

Number of acres planted is up considerably from last year, he pointed out, and if rains come, the crops should be very good.

Outlining the roles of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Meredith said that four agencies; his office, the Extension Service, the Farmers Home Administration and the Soil Conservation Service, are represented in this county.

## Browsing with Bev

 Last week we discussed cheeses, so this week, lets take a look at storing cheeses.

Cheese is much too good to waste, so use every bit of it. All natural cheese should be kept refrigerated. Use soft unripened cheeses - such as cottage, cream or neufchatal - within a few days after purchase, since they're quite perishable. Ripened or cured cheeses keep well in the refrigerator for a few weeks if protected from mold contamination and drying.

When possible, leave the original wrapper on the cheese. Wax paper, foil, or plastic wrap also will protect the surface from drying. If natural cheeses do dry out and become hard, grate and keep refrigerated in a clean, tightly covered glass jar. You will find many uses for the grated cheese in garnishes and accents.

Natural cheeses may mold without spoiling - just cut off the mold and use the rest. Blue, gorgonzola, roquefort or stilton contain particular molds that are carefully developed to produce characteristic colors and flavors. These molds are eaten as part of the cheese.

Be sure to keep strong odored cheeses such as limburger stored in a tightly covered jar or container. These are fast curing cheeses and it's best to use them fairly soon.

### ASC Office Taking Applications For Cost Shares Of Cover Crops

The Eastland County ASC office is taking applications for cost-shares under the winter legume and rye cover crop practices.

Practice D-1, establishing annual winter legumes in the fall of 1965 for protection from erosion, is limited to cropland which needs sufficient cover to protect from wind and water erosion during the winter months. The cover must be left on the ground until April 1, 1966, and then may be turned under.

Practice F-1-a, seeding rye to establish a cover for the control of wind erosion, is limited to land currently seeded to peanuts. This practice may be applied after peanuts are harvested to protect the land from wind and water erosion.

On either practice you must come by the office and file your application before starting the practice in order to be eligible for cost-sharing.

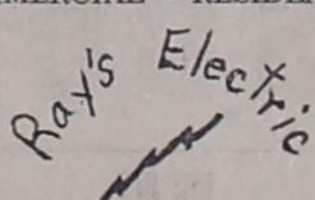


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## Pecan Growers Tour Slated For September 24th At Rising Star

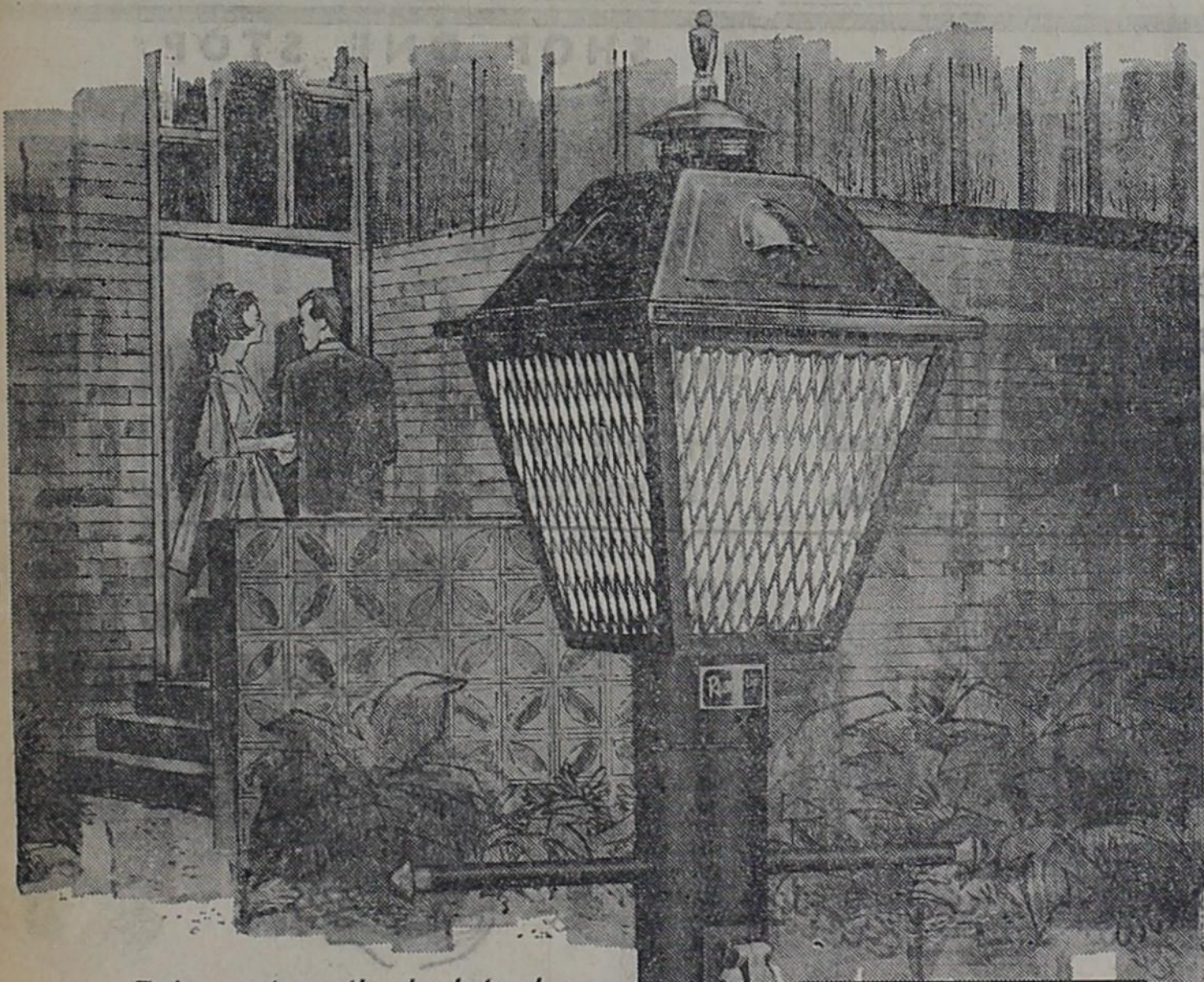

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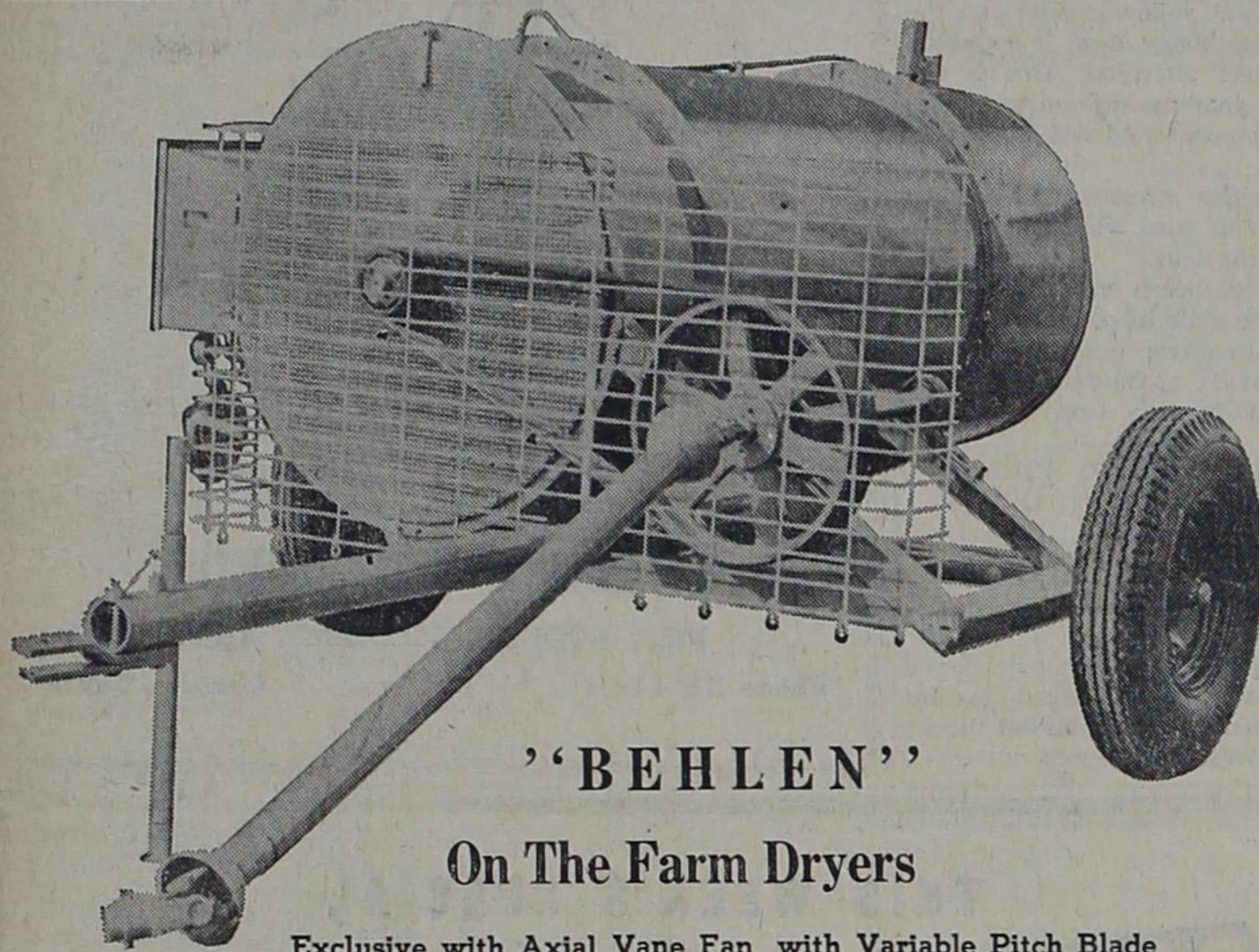
