

WOLVERINES TOP STRAWN; PLAY PUTNAM AT CISCO TONITE - 7:30

The Carbon Wolverines showed a real powerful offense and a very stubborn defense last Friday night in handing the Strawn Greyhounds a sound beating before the Homecoming fans at Strawn. This win also clinched the district crown for the Wolverines, even though they have one more regular season game to play with Putnam.

Carbon took the opening kickoff and drove for an early score with Ronnie Hughes passing to Jerry Cook in the end zone for the final ten yards. This play was set up with a series of wide running plays by Hughes. Alvie Allison put the ball through the uprights for the two extra points.

Carbon then kicked off to Strawn with Allison kicking the ball into the end zone, where Danny Hobbs quickly jumped on the live ball for another 6 pointer for Carbon. The try for points failed and the Wolverines led 14 to 0 in the first quarter with 4 minutes gone on the clock.

Strawn bounced back for a score with Marty Salazar passing to Johnny Gailey for 10 yards and the tally. The try for points failed. In the second stanza Ronnie Hughes rambled for 10 yards for Carbon's third marker. The try for points failed and the half ended 20 to 6 in Carbon's favor.

Special Referendum Reminder To Farmers

A referendum will be held on Tuesday, November 23, 1965 to determine if marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1966, 1967 and 1968 peanut crops and for the 1966, 1967 and 1968 cotton crops.

Farmers (as well as their wives) who are engaged in the production of either of the crops may vote in the referendum.

A special vote by cotton producers to approve or disapprove the sale or lease of cotton allotments will also be taken. This provision does not apply to peanuts.

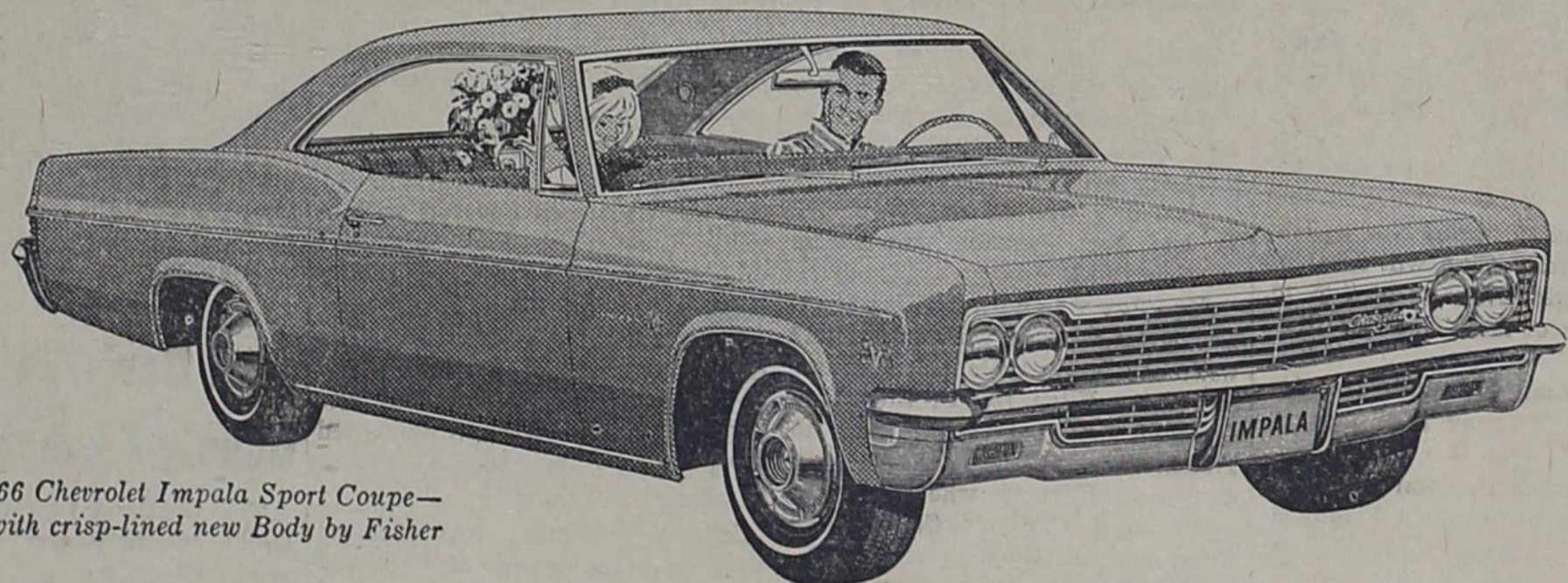

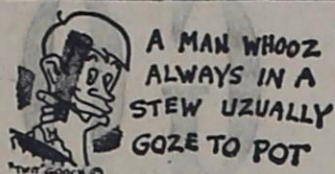

Dublin Hosp. School Of Nursing Ranks Seventh In State

Results of the October 28-30, 1965, examination conducted by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners have just been announced by Mr. H. M. Cardwell, President of the Board.

Since the inception of the Vocational Nurse Law on September 7, 1951, a total of 33,569 licenses have been issued. 13,287 such licentiates qualified through waiver requirements; 19,481 of the total graduated from a year's vocational nurse training or had two years in professional nurse school, and 801 are reciprocity licentiates from other states.

Postmaster Says Mail Early For Christmas

Christmas parcels sent by surface transportation to members of our Armed Forces overseas should be mailed as soon as possible. For air-mail parcels the period is no later than December 10. Greeting cards for the Armed Forces overseas should be mailed within the periods designated for parcels if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas.

The term "Armed Forces overseas" includes personnel of our Armed Forces, members of their families, and authorized U. S. Civilians employed overseas, who receive their mail through an APO, New York, N. Y.; San Francisco, Calif., or Seattle, Wash., or Fleet Post Office, New York, N. Y., or San Francisco, Calif., or Navy Post Office, c/o Postmaster, Seattle, Washington.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard, or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper which materially strengthens the package. Each should be tied with strong cord. A slip showing list of contents and addressee should be enclosed in the parcel.
