



VIETNAM NAVY CROSS AWARDED TO LATE SGT. WILLIE D. TYRONE

Tyrone of Route 1, Gorman, also were present for the presentation.

PARRIS ISLAND, S. C., Dec. 3 — The Navy Cross, the nation's second highest military decoration for heroism, was posthumously awarded to Staff Sergeant Willie D. Tyrone here December 3 for his bravery in Vietnam.

Accepting the medal was his wife, Mrs. Willie D. Tyrone, now residing at 2424 Vermont Ave., Savannah, Ga.

Staff Sergeant Tyrone served at Parris Island from 1957 to 1959 as a drill instructor.

The citation, which accompanied the medal, read: "The President of the United States takes pride in presenting the Navy Cross posthumously to Staff Sergeant Willie D. Tyrone, U. S. Marine Corps, for service set forth in the following:

For extraordinary heroism as Assistant Advisor to the Vietnamese 39th Ranger Battalion while serving with Advisory Team Seven of the U. S. Military Assistance Command, Vietnam on the night of 30-31 May 1965. When the battalion was subjected to heavy small-arms, mortar and 57-mm recoilless rifle fire, Staff Sergeant Tyrone, with complete disregard for his own safety, moved about to point out targets and improve the position. Although painfully wounded in the shoulder, he refused evacuation, and when the Battalion Commander and Battalion S-3 (Operations Officer) were also wounded, and the Battalion Advisor killed, creating a critical command situation, Staff Sergeant Tyrone, in spite of his wound, assumed the advisory responsibility alone. He maintained radio contact through out the night and continually encouraged his comrades by his words and valiant example. When the Viet Cong launched a strong counter-attack early in the morning, he was mortally wounded, but continued to inspire his comrades by firing his weapon, killing at least an additional ten of the enemy before he died. Staff Sergeant Tyrone's conspicuous bravery reflected great credit upon himself and the Marine Corps and were keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service. He gave his life in the cause of freedom."

The citation was signed by the Honorable Paul H. Nitze, Secretary of the Navy in behalf of the President of the United States.

Major General James M. Masters, Sr., Depot Commanding General, made the presentation during a regimental parade and awards ceremony.

DEATH OF A SOLDIER

I read your article on the current "rainy season" tactical situation in Vietnam (International, June 14) with a mixed sense of pride and regret. I refer particularly to your stirring description of the death of U. S. Marine Corps Staff Sgt. Willie D. Tyrone, one of the finest staff NCO's in the Marine Corps with whom I have had the privilege to serve. I regret his death personally

because he was a real man whom I shall always remember exactly the way you described him, a big lean, calm Texan who, through the Corps he loved, served his country with quiet patriotism. But I am also relieved that, if he had to die, the way he died was the image of the way he lived. For Sergeant Tyrone was the best of what a Marine is supposed to be: a professional man of arms, proud to serve in the Corps anywhere for his country, calm and steadfast under fire or in any "tight" situation, absolutely loyal to his men and his officers and unmindful of his own safety when he saw his duty.

I therefore read with pride that Willie D. Tyrone was true to the end. For he was not capable of forgetting his men, his Vietnamese Rangers or his leader, Special Forces Capt. Christopher O'Sullivan. This country owes an irredeemable debt to Americans like Willie D. Tyrone, who was a patriot if ever there was one.

The church is located directly across the street from the Weatherbe Funeral Home and she and the girls heard the ambulance leave and saw it come back with the body. She did not know it was her husband who had died until friends told her minutes later, however.

Bailey was born November 24, 1936, in Chillicothe, and married LaJoyce Hamilton of Gorman in April, 1958 in Eastland. He had lived in the Gorman area many years before moving to Rotan two years ago.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Stephen Max 6; his mother, Mrs. Geneva Bailey of Gorman; and two brothers, Billy Ray Bailey, with the Air Force in Japan, and Kenneth Lee Bailey, in the service at Burns Flat, Oklahoma.

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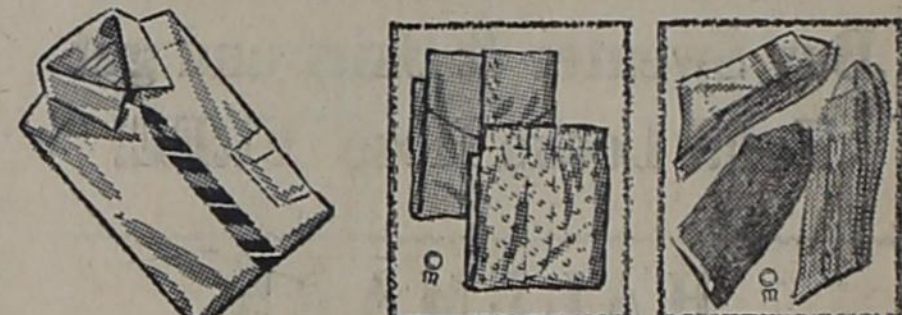
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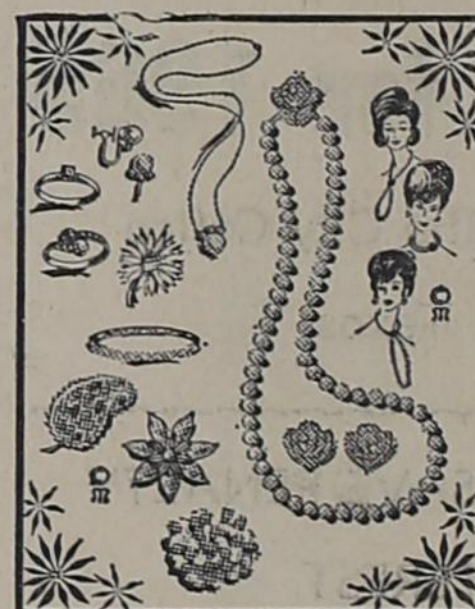
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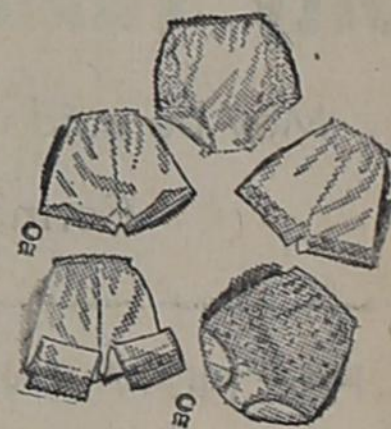
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Woman's Study Club Enjoy Christmas Party With Annual Dinner

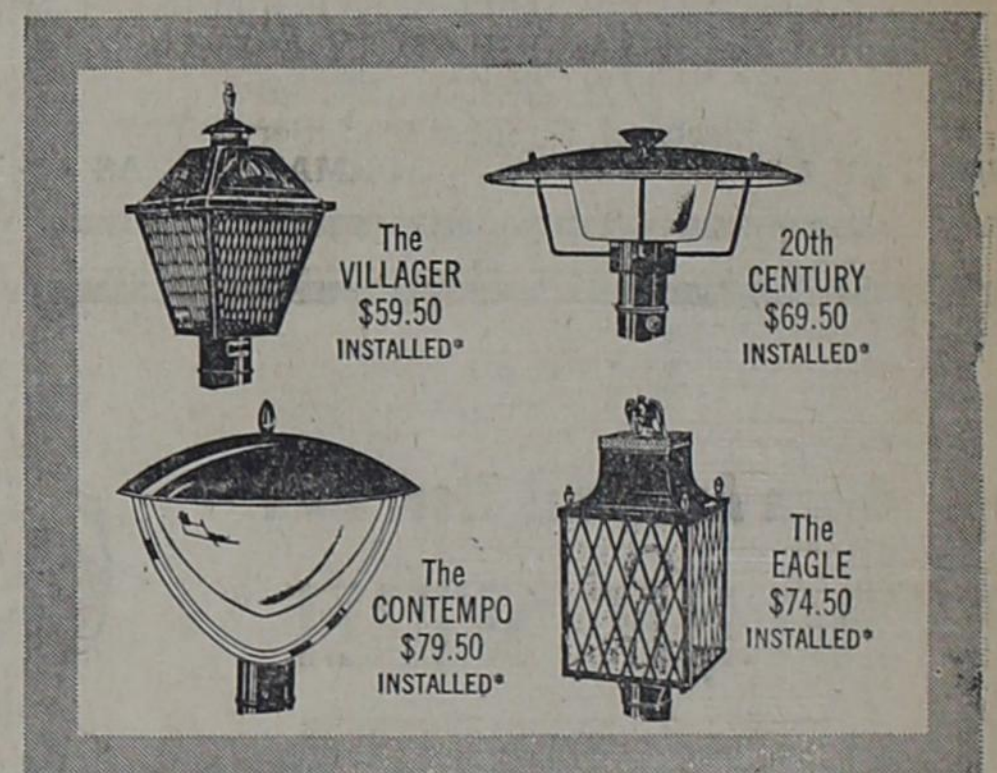
