


OF 650 FREE VOTERS

Registration under Texas' new "free vote" law reached 650 in Eastland County, as the deadline for registration passed at midnight March 17th. The county has 4,276 eligible voters, other than those not required to register.

Available figures from Mr. Altom, county tax assessor-collector show that 72 free vote certificates were issued for Gorman Voting Box No. 4 instead of the 172 as reported to the Progress office in an unofficial count last Wednesday. Gorman box had 379 paid poll taxes, five exemptions with a voting strength of 456 plus those over 60 who are not required to register.

A breakdown for other local No. 6 shows 19 free registration certificates issued, 67 paid poll taxes with 86 eligible to vote in the forthcoming elections, plus those over 60 years of age who are not required to register in order to vote.

Kokomo Voting Box No. 7 registered six free vote certificates, 27 paid poll taxes, making a total of 33 eligible voters plus those over 60 years of age.

Carbon Voting Box No. 5 registered 18 free certificates, 124 paid poll taxes and three exemption certificates, making 145 qualified voters plus those not requirer to register.
