Sunday and Monday Rains Ease Heat Wave

Scattered showers brought high temperatures down from record highs of last week and good moisture to many farmers and ranchers in the area.

Gorman received 3.8 inches for a two day total while farms to the south and north of Gorman received four inches. The J. D. Caldwell farm recorded four inches and D. B. Warren's rain gauge read 4.2. Farmers in the Kokomo area were not as fortunate, reports from that area were from .02 to 1 inch.

Roscoe Reeves reported two and one-half inches at his farm east of Gorman. Will Haynes in the Duster Community had a reading of one and one-half inches.

Stanley Porter, eight and one-half miles SW of Gorman, reported a two day total of 5.1 inches. Graydon Baze, west of Gorman, had a reading of .08.

Most farmers say it is very unusual to receive large measurable amounts during the month of July. The moisture was most welcome by peanut farmers as past week temperatures of over 100 degrees had begun to burn peanuts.

4-H Youth Prepare For The Nation's Biggest Industry Employment

SPECIAL - Would you believe that farming employs 6 million workers — more than the combined employment in transportation, public utilities, the auto industry and the steel industry? That one farm worker produces food, fiber and other farm commodities for himself and 35 others?

The U. S. Department of Agriculture says you had better believe it! Farming is the biggest industry in the U. S. What's more, American agriculture has advanced more in the last 50 years than in all the prior years of our history.

In these last 50 years the nation's 4-H Club members have kept up with the new agricultural practices and have produced their share of food and fiber. Scores of the nation's successful farmers today got their start in 4-H, according to the Cooperative Extension Service which supervises 4-H Club work.

Right about now some 106,000

The 1966 scholarship winners will be chosen from among all young 4-H farmers are getting ready to harvest crops including corn, oats, soybeans, sugar beets, cotton, sorghum, milo alfalfa, and truck garden produce of sweet potatoes, tomatoes, cabbage and squash.

In the process, several thousand compete for county, state and national awards provided by the 4-H Field Crops program sponsor, Arcadian Products Department, Allied Chemical Corporation.

These junior farmers don't just plant the seeds and reap the harvest. They make soil tests, practice conservation by rotating and terracing, restore arid and eroded land, learn to judge crops, maintain farm machinery, and also study marketing.

Many of the older 4-H'ers have outpaced more experienced farmers with higher yields. Some are already in partnership with their dads or are renting acreage of their own.

With the aid of 4-H scholarships provided by Allied Chemical, six young people each year are helped with college expenses, agricultural short courses or other educational endeavors.

Medicare Enrollment Should Be 3 Months Before Reaching 65

"Medicare enrollment will be a continuing process from now on," said R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager for the Abilene area. The general enrollment period that ended May 31 was an all-out effort to enroll those persons who were already age 65 or older.

Persons not yet 65 will have 7 months in which to enroll for doctor bill insurance, Tuley continued. The individual's enrollment period for that part of Medicare will run from the third month before his 65th birthday month to the third month after it. Thus a person who will be 65 in October, 1966, may enroll from July 1, 1966, through January 31, 1967.

"There is no special enrollment period for the hospital insurance part," he went on, adding that a person past 65 could sign up for that even after he becomes an inpatient at a participating hospital. There are no premium payments involved for the hospital insurance half of Medicare.

Whether or not a person has retired or has ever worked under social security has no effect on Medicare coverage, but failure to enroll in the 3 month period before age 65 will result in a delay of from one to three months in acquiring the medical or doctor bill part of Medicare coverage. A higher premium cost will apply for those who do not enroll at their first opportunity but decide to come in during a later October-December period in 1967, 1969, or other odd-numbered years. Persons nearing age 65 are urged to ask their social security office for the free booklet on Medicare, Tuley added.

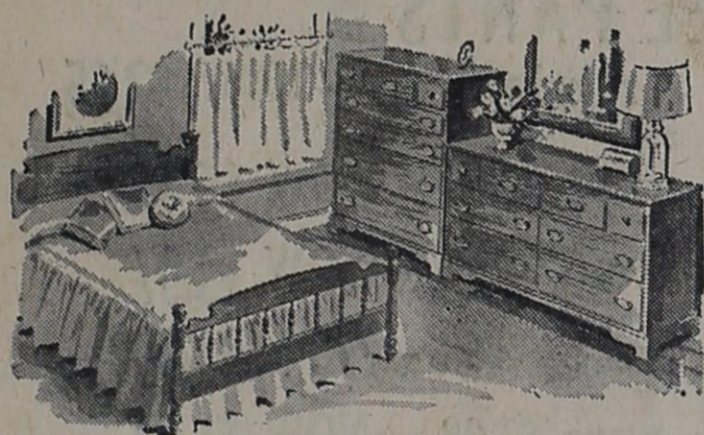

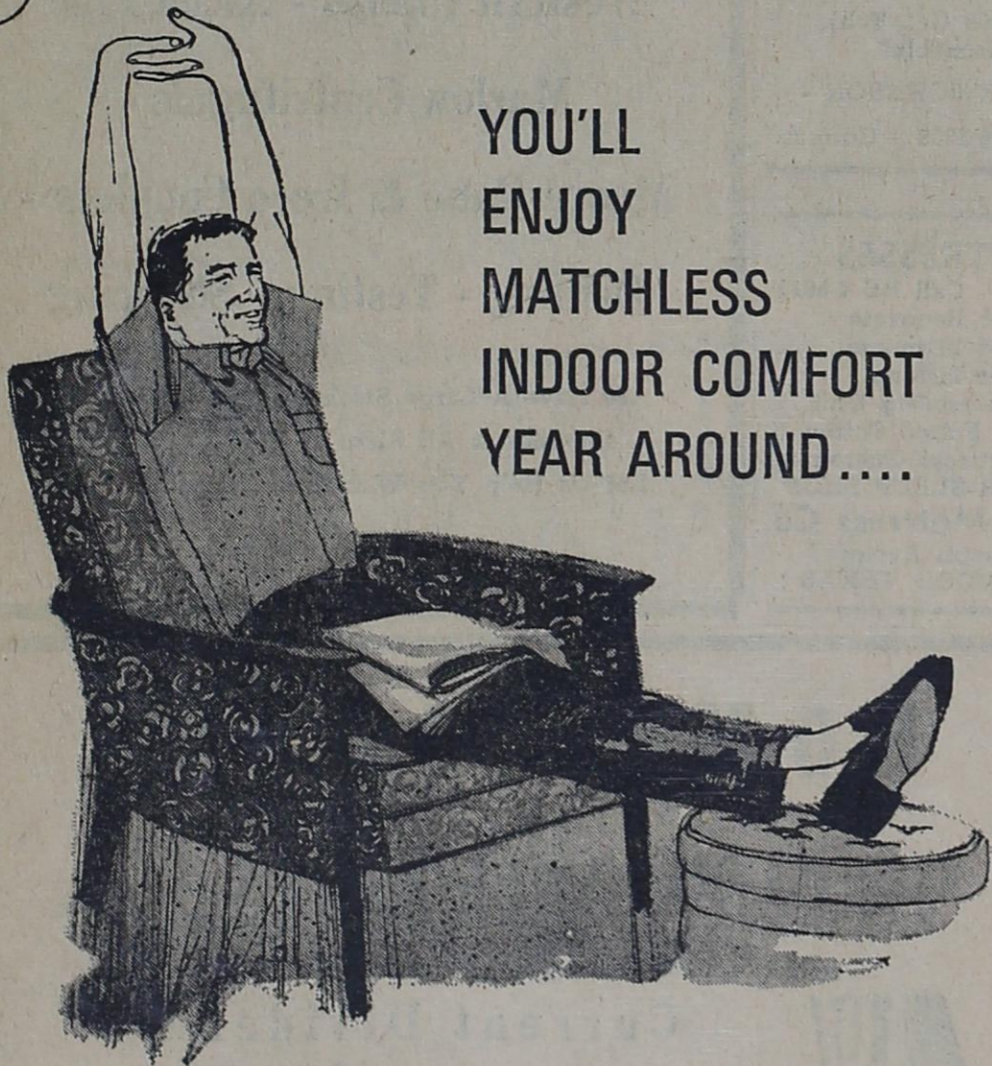
