Barbara entertained the judging committee in her home (as did other 4-H members competing for this honor) back in the summer to show them what she had learned and was doing in 4-H work. This medal is a very coveted award and is one that urges the recipient to go farther to even greater rewards on a higher level.

Judge Scott Bailey presented the awards to all the outstanding members in the gym decorated to resemble a French Cafe with the "Viva La 4-H" in green and white streamers above the speaker's table. A cafeteria style meal was enjoyed by candlelight. Experiences of the State Lab was related by each of the six delegates from Eastland County. Most agreed it was an experience that you couldn't put in words and they each hoped others would have a chance to enjoy it.

Those receiving awards from Gorman were Teddy Jordan, in Achievement; Christi Fuller and Barbara Williams in Clothing; Brenda Browder in Dress Revue; Bobby Williams in Leadership; and Danny Snider in Swine. Certificates were presented to Teddy Jordan for 5 years of 4-H work and to Bobby Williams for 7 years in 4-H work.

Bobby Williams read a tribute to Leaders that very well described the unpaid jobs that so many throughout the county are doing. Immediately following many leaders were awarded certificates as a token of the appreciation of the work they are doing. Among the Gorman recipients were Mrs. Bob Browder and Mrs. Rooney Williams.

The highlight of the evening was the announcement of the Gold Star Boy and Girl as this is a deep dark secret until the last minute. Carter Hounsell of Rising Star received the boy's award. Barbara Williams followed in her brother's footsteps as she accepted her Gold Star from Judge Scott Bailey just as Bobby did 4 years ago. These outstanding youngsters are not chosen because of the amount of ribbons they have received, but from their development, growth, and participation in all phases of work. Barbara was recognized for her many projects including food, clothing, leadership, poultry, food preservation, swine and beef cattle. Also her participation in the many county eliminations, dress

revues, favorite food shows, the county camps, district activities and her part as a Junior Leader in helping younger 4-H members get started. The Panthers won their first District 17-B game of the season on Friday night and up their season record to 5 wins and 1 loss, by winning handily over the Blanket Tigers by a score of 47-0.

The Panthers wasted no time in getting on the scoreboard as they scored on their first possession going 40 yards in 6 plays after James Jay gave the Panthers the ball on an interception at the Blanket 40. Robert Reeves went the final 3 yard over tackle for the tally. Daryl Hirst kicked for the extra point.

On their next possession after taking over the ball on another interception by Jay on the Blanket 48 the Panthers scored in only two plays with Robert Reeves going the final 47 yards on a beautiful off tackle play with

4 minutes and 47 seconds left in the first period. The kick for point failed and the score stood at 13 to 0 at the end of the first period.

The Panthers added another marker with 3:29 left in the second quarter. The Panthers took over on their own 22 yard line. Jackie Harrison, leading ground gainer of the night, picked up 41 yards on a burst through the middle. 2 more plays of 1 and 11 got another first down and one play of 15 yards set up first and goal from the eight yard line. From there Harrison scored in one play, going 8 yards off tackle. Harrison also added the two extra points on a run. The half-time score stood at 21 to 0.

The Red and Blue got another tally on the opening drive on the second half. They took over on their own 16 and scored in 7 plays with Robert Hunt taking a perfect pass from Hirst for 43 yards and the tally. Hirst passed to Leslie Sharp, who played a fine game at split end, for the two extra points.

The Panthers added another TD just as the third period ended after another interception by Jay on the Blanket 45. They scored in five plays with Harrison hitting the goal from one yard out. The kick for point failed.

The next Panther tally came about 5 minutes deep in the final quarter with David Guthery going the final one yard. The drive covered 31 yards in three plays. A pass for extra points failed.

The final Panther marker came with 2 minutes left in the fourth period. The Panthers moved 33 yards in one play on a beautiful 33 yard aerial from Hirst to Jay. The try for points failed and the final score read Gorman 47 and Blanket 0.

The entire team showed what they could do with team effort in this game. The entire squad did a fine job and the reserves also got some experience.

James Jay had a fine night on interceptions, picking off 4 Tiger aeriels, two of which set up Panther tallies. Tommy Simmons, Jim Tom Garrett, Robert Hunt, John Shell, Ed Sutton, Dwayne Snider, Jimmy Warren, Robert Reeves, Louis Torre and James Jay were all tough on defense.

## Ross Wilson Heads Peanut Grade Comm. Of National Committee

Ross Wilson, Manager, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, Gorman, has been selected chairman of the Grade Standards and Indemnification Sub-Committee of the National Peanut Administrative Committee. The PAC is an 18-man industry group that administers the peanut quality control program under the provisions of the Peanut Marketing Agreement. Wilson's sub-committee is assembling peanut grade data obtained from the USDA and peanut inspection stations in the various peanut producing states. Consideration will be given to tightening damage tolerances on shelled edible peanuts and on farmers stock peanuts which shellers purchase from farmers for the edible market.

Other members of the sub-com-

mittee are J. E. Mobley, peanut grower, Shorterville, Alabama; Robert Pender, peanut sheller, Greenwood, Florida; John Haskins, peanut sheller, Durant, Oklahoma; W. J. Spain, peanut sheller, Suffolk, Virginia, and William V. Rawlings, peanut grower, Capron, Virginia. Peanut manufacturers who are serving as advisors to the committee are Ralph H. Maulin, Derby Foods, Inc., Chicago, Illinois; W. S. Chaplain, Williamson Candy Company, Chicago, Illinois, and E. P. Johnstone, Lance, Inc., Charlotte, North Carolina.

The sub-committee will hold its initial meeting in Atlanta, Georgia on November 16 and will make its recommendations to the full Peanut Administrative Committee not later than December 15. If changes are made in peanut grade standards, such changes will not be effective until the 1967 crop year. Any proposed new standards would have to be agreeable to the Secretary of Agriculture following their acceptance by the Peanut Administrative Committee.

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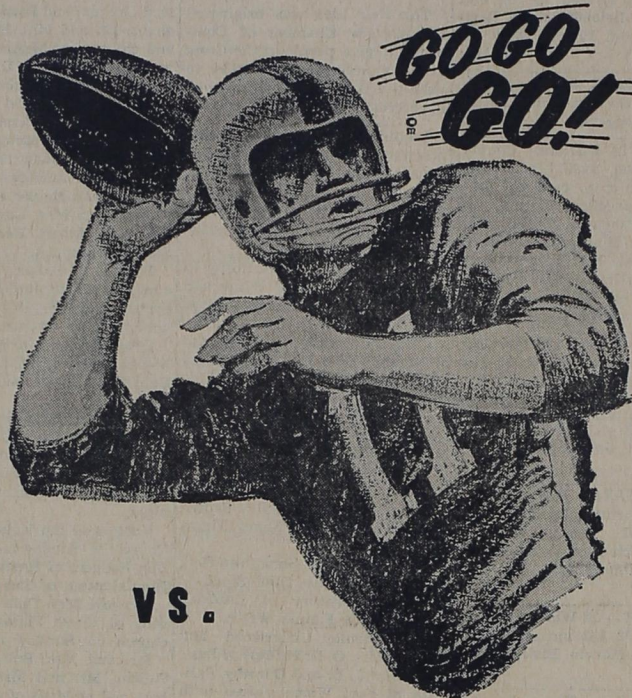

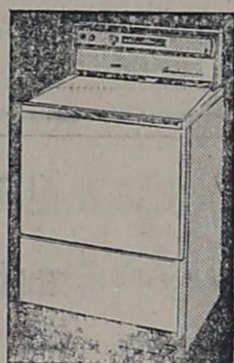
