Bob Walsh is doing an excellent job on TV and Radio, and in his visit throughout Texas, publicizing the story of the farmer and livestock producer. Will give more of his story next week.

This week I am publishing the following House Bills which Mr. Naman stated the Farmers Union was keeping a close watch on and striving to protect the farmers interest. As we are vitally interested in and depend on the farmer for peanut butter, etc., we thought you would be interested in these bills.

Feed Lot Licensing

H. B. 94 By Homes, Field, Jamison, et al. Beef Cattle Feed Licensing Act.

S. B. 65 - By Hightower. Establishes standards for the licensing of feed lots of over 1,000 head capacity to protect feeders from the harassment of nuisance litigation. (F. U. Favors)

Soil and Water Conservation

S. B. 66 By Hightower. Confers the right of eminent domain to governing bodies of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Amended in Committee to restrict right to district organized. (F. U. Supports) (Referred to Subcommittee)

S. B. 67 By Hightower. Authorizes the State Soil and Water Conservation Board to receive and expand money for certain purposes, and promulgates rules for the expenditure of money, entering into agreements, and administration of property. (F. U. Favors)

S. B. 152 By Hightower. Provides for the appointment by the board of a Soil and Water Conservation Supervisor to fill the unexpired term when a vacancy occurs. (F. U. Favors)

S. B. 153 By Hightower. Provides for bonding and audit reports by the Board of Supervisors of a Soil and Water Conservation District (F. U. Favors)

H. B. 137 By Cain. Sets forth requirements for a permit from the Water Rights Commission to "alter, enlarge, extend, or make an addition to any canal, ditch, dam, reservoir or any other work" even if the amount of water appropriated is not altered. (F. U. Opposes)

Pollution

H. B. 43 By Dickson, Rosson and McDonald. Prohibits the disposal of salt water on public lands and roads, and sets up permit requirements and regulations applying to persons hauling and disposing of water containing salt or other mineralized substances. (F. U. Favors)

Air Control Board Regulation No. 1 - outlawed open burning and emission of sulphurous gases "effective immediately" with provisions for appeal by those unable to get control devices by Dec. 31. Ruling has particular application to cotton gins.

H. B. 310 By Dickson, Rosson and McDonald. Sets forth strong penalties and enforcement procedures for causing fires or allowing them to spread. Provides that failure to prevent fire from spreading to the property of another shall be prima facie evidence of negligence. (F. U. Opposes)

City Sales Tax

H. B. 207 By Traeger. S. B. 129 By Christie and Hightower. Empowers cities to levy a sales tax on a local option basis. (F. U. strongly opposes this measure because it disenfranchises rural people and requires them to pay a tax without receiving additional services). (Favorably reported out of Senate Committee, and referred to Sub-Committee in House).

H. B. 457 By Jones. An enabling act that will amend the con-

Daylight Saving Time

H. B. 275 By Smith, Wayne, et al. Provides that Texas will continue under standard time by exempting the state from the provisions of the federal law relating to Daylight Saving Time. (F. U. Favors)

Sheep Imports

S. B. 183 By Hardeman, Word and Ratliff. Establishes health requirements for obtaining permits to import sheep into Texas from other states. Designed to prevent the spread of scabies. (F. U. Favors)

Minimum Wage

S. B. 82 By Bernal and Mauzy. Establishes a minimum wage of \$1.25 per hour and the regulation for enforcement of the wage. Does not exempt the family farmer or distinguish from industrialized farm. (F. U. Opposes)

Annual Session of the Legislature

H. J. R. 18 provides for annual sessions of the state legislature. (F. U. Opposes)

State Coordinating Board for Agriculture

Proposal for a "super board" for agriculture was made by the Interim Committee. No legislation yet introduced but advocates state such a board is needed to coordinate agricultural matters to make research, education, etc. more efficient. (F. U. questions need.)

Farm To Market Roads

Governor Connally, in his message to the Legislature, asked for repeal of the Colson-Briscoe Act, which provided for an automatic allocation of \$30 million during the biennium for new farm-to-market road construction out of the general tax resources. The Governor asks that the farm-to-market road program be left to the discretion of the Highway Commission. (F. U. Opposes.)

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
