### Activities Concerning Gorman Public Schools

Mr. Garrett states that the open house and visitation night at the Gorman Public Schools was a success. The turnout was good and all seemed to enjoy the exhibits in both buildings. Many people went through the exhibits of new teaching equipment that was on display in the high school building. There were about 250 parents registered.

Even though the turnout was good at the night program, the number of parents visiting during the day was disappointing. Mr. Garrett stated that parents could get a general idea of the operation of the school if they would visit classes occasionally. Don't wait until the next Public School Week to visit us.

### ELECTION NEWS

This year for the first time the local school board candidates and the county trustee candidate will be on one ballot. There are to be two local trustees elected from the first slate of candidates listed on the ballot and one County-at-Large trustee elected from the second or bottom portion of the ballot.

Absentee voting is now in progress and will continue through Tuesday, March 28. Persons who will be out of town on April 1, election day, and those who are unable to come to the polling place because of illness may vote absentee. You may vote in person at the local superintendent's office or ask that a ballot be mailed to you. Voting hours are from 8:00 a. m. to 3:45 p. m. Monday through Friday, except those days the office is closed because of a school holiday. The office will not be open on Friday, March 17, Friday, March 24, or Monday, March 27. These three days are school holidays.

The teacher's aide could not be elected at this time because money has not been approved for the Title I program as yet. Other bus drivers will be elected at a later date.

Among other business, the board voted to purchase a new chassis and have the 48 passenger body from bus No. 36 reworked and put on the chassis. The school will save about \$1,000 over a complete new bus.

### COUNTY LIVESTOCK SHOW DUE RECORD ENTRIES THIS WEEKEND

Plans are all completed for the 1967 Eastland County Livestock Show to be held at the county livestock show barn in Eastland Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 16, 17 and 18, according to Sam Kimmell, president of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association. The association is the sponsor of the livestock show. Directors of the association plan and conduct the annual livestock show for the benefit of the 4-H and FFA youth and the livestock industry of Eastland County. Everyone is invited to become a member of the association by paying the annual dues of \$1.00 per person.

The number of entries of livestock will be an increase over last year's entries reported H. L. Ferguson, general superintendent of the show. The show is open to all 4-H and FFA members of Eastland County who attend a public school in Eastland County. They must have fed, fitted, and cared for the animal under the supervision of a vocational agriculture teacher, county agent or assistant county agent.

Entries are limited to two animals of any one kind per exhibitor in both breeding and fat divisions except for FFA chapters and ...H Clubs.

There will be an open Angora Goat and open Breeding Beef Cattle show. Adult and junior exhibitors in Eastland County and adjoining counties are eligible to show livestock in the open show. Exhibitors in the open show will compete for ribbons only.

All livestock are to be on the show grounds and properly entered in their respective places by 10 p. m. March 16. Judging of livestock will be done on March 17 and 18. The auction and presentation of special awards will be held at the Eastland Livestock Auction Barn at 7 p. m. Saturday, March 18. No exhibitor may sell more than 1 lamb, 1 steer and 1 barrow at the premium price.

A drawing will be held for a dressed beef at the livestock show auction Saturday night. A name will be drawn from the membership of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association.

The public is invited to attend all activities of the Eastland County Livestock Show.
