

SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTION SET SATURDAY - CITY COMMISSION ELECTION SLATED FOR TUESDAY

Two local elections will take place here within the next few days. Voters in the Gorman Independent School District will choose two men out of the five candidates on the ballot in the trustee election to be held Saturday, April 1st, at the High School building.

Two of these elected will serve regular three year terms now held by Joe Bennett and Gabe Wright. Joe is seeking a first elected term, having served the past two years as an appointee. Wright did not seek re-election. Other names on the ballot will be Billy Earl Simpson, J. O. Jackson, Jr., A. D. Pittman and John Scitern.

Voters are reminded when voting, that only two names are to be left on the local school portion of the ballot. Also on the same ballot will be the name of Melvin Adams, unopposed for County Trustee At Large.

Election judge will be Mrs. Dorothy Hatcher and clerks will be Mrs. Betty Overstreet, Mrs. Estelle Craddock, and Mrs. Donnie Parker. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Tuesday, April 4th., residents of Gorman will choose two City Commissioners, each to serve two year terms.

Seeking re-election for Place One is C. O. Revels and is opposed by Buddy Blair. Arlon E. Smith, seeking re-election for Place Three, is opposed by Tom Broom.

The City Election will be held in the Fire Hall with M. F. Allen serving as election judge and clerks will be Mrs. Dorothy Hatcher and Mrs. Viola Eaker.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

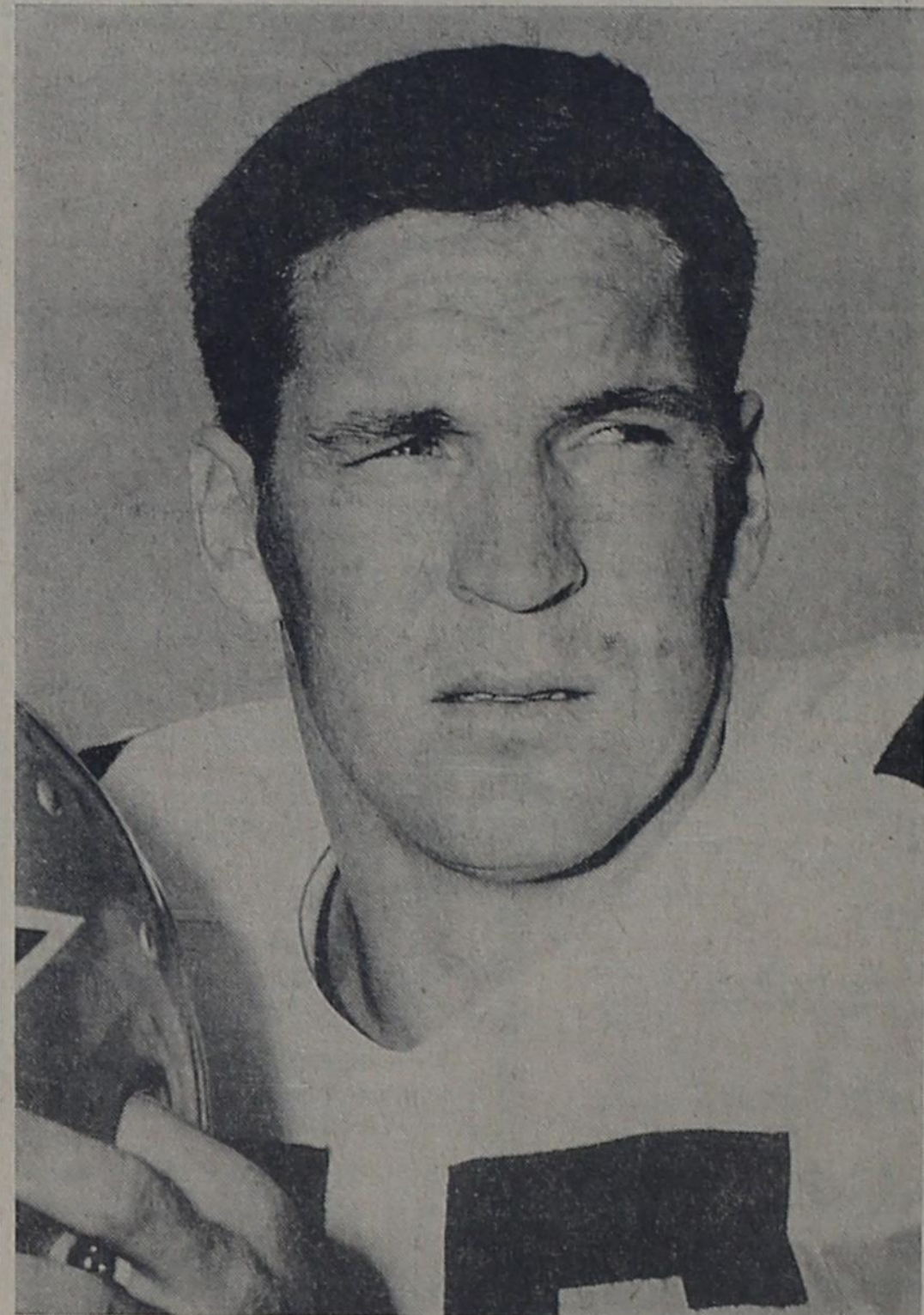

Local Street Paving To Get Underway Soon

The Gorman City Commission has purchased an ample stockpile of top grade gravel for paving and repairing city streets.

Work will begin immediately on street paving projects that the former city commission obligated themselves to do some months ago.

This paving project includes the street facing the Lawndale Nursing Home and of the Community Swimming Pool. There will be approximately two blocks of paving and base ramps on the south and west sides of the nursing home and possibly ramps at the swimming pool.

The street to be paved will begin at the home of W. C. Browning and will extend west to the Lawndale Home and to the end of the street at the swimming pool.

Mayor Check Smith stated that other streets will be paved in the near future, and that the gravel the city has purchased is of the quality that will make good foundations for paving and that the commission feels fortunate in being able to purchase this quantity and quality of gravel.

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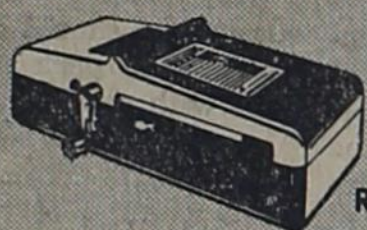

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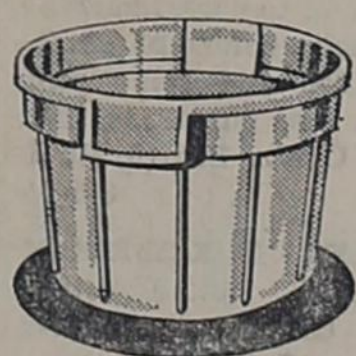
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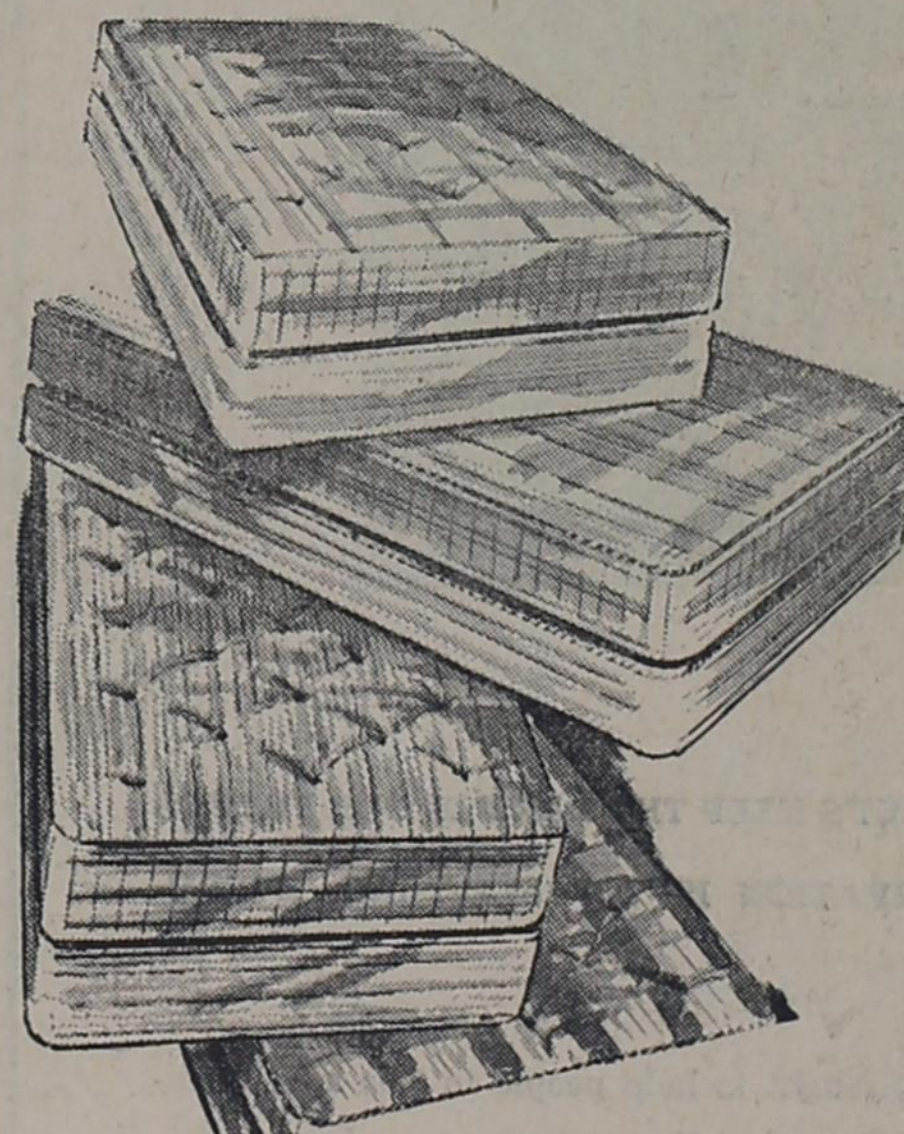

**Woman's Study Club
 Sponsor Traffic Safety
 Program For School**

"Last year was one of the worst years on record since traffic accident records have been kept; 3,400 people were killed on the highways of Texas."

Dan Nowlin, Safety Officer, Texas Department of Public Safety, Abilene, Texas, made the above statement during a pro-

gram sponsored by the Woman's Study Club of Gorman on March 28, at 9:30 a. m. in the High School Auditorium. School classes of the 5th grades through the 12th as well as members of the school faculty and members of the Woman's Study Club were present for the program on Traffic Safety.

Officer Nowlin's topic was "YOU" and the true stories he told of accidents he has investigated made each student and adult present stop and ponder on the advisability of practicing

safe driving. Only last week he investigated an accident in which three teenage boys attempted to outrun the police. They succeeded for a short distance but because of the excessive speed they were traveling their car began to turn end over end, the boys were thrown out of the car like cord wood - now one of the boys has no nose nor a left eye. One of the boy's ribs were so badly broken that they were protruding about 4 inches from both sides of his chest.

Because of the bad example of previous drivers, the Legislature in Austin is now considering a new Traffic Safety Program. Under the new program each driver under 25 years of age and each driver over 65 years of age will be required to have a re-examination of his driver's license every 4 years. Licensing would only be permitted from age 16 with Driver's Training and from age 18 without Driver's Training.

Mr. Nowlin said that if a person is aggravated or frustrated then they are definitely a dangerous hazard when they get behind the wheel of an automobile. When the desire to drag race hits you, just get out of your car and run a foot race. It is much safer. The proper attitude is necessary to make a safe driver. Practice good discipline while in a car, be properly seated and drive defensively.

In closing Dan Nowlin said the Department of Public Safety is here to protect your life and property as well as others against dangerous drivers. High-

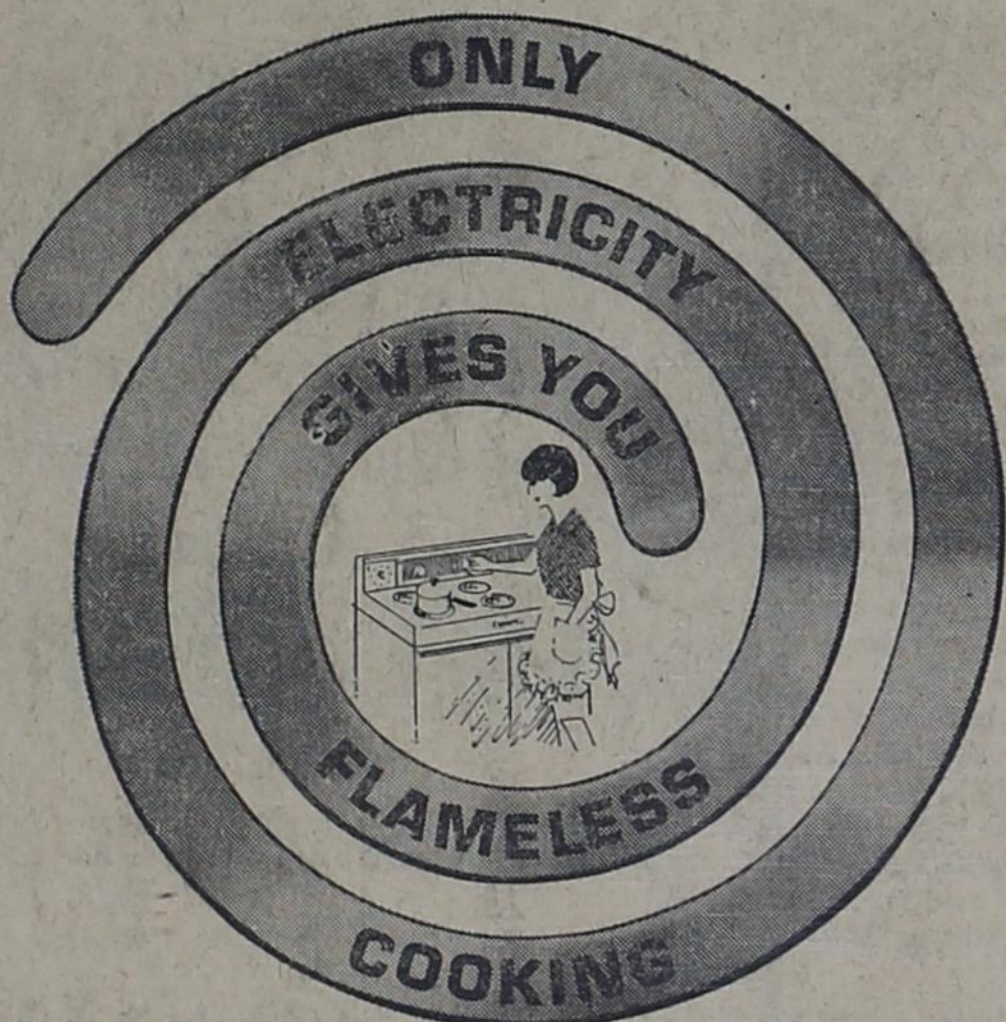
