GORMAN STUDENTS TAKE TOP HONORS IN DISTRICT UIL EVENTS

Gorman High School shorthand and typing students won top honors in the Interscholastic League District 9-B competition held in Eula on Saturday.

Connie Park won first place in typing and Jean Munn second. Elizabeth Parr took top honors in shorthand with a grade of 97.25 and Carolyn Clark placed second with a grade of 96.50.

Mrs. Rowena Wilson, typing and shorthand instructor in the Gorman Schools, stated this was the hardest tests she has seen given in the 12 years she has entered students in the Interscholastic League competition.

This is a very fine record for the Gorman girls and also Mrs. Wilson. She has never failed to have first and second place winning students in District and Regional competition, and they always place in the top five and above in State competition.

Gorman Public Schools Burglarized Monday

The Gorman Public Schools were burglarized Monday night. Entry was made through the back door of each of the buildings by jamming the locks.

The portable safe in the office of the Superintendent in the High School building had been moved to the girls rest room and the door broken open. The safe contained about \$15.45. The office desks and storage shelves were ransacked and \$15 of personal money was taken. Also the office of the principal and the secretary's desks and file cabinets were ransacked.

The burglars failed in their attempt to enter the large vault in the office of the Gorman Independent School District Tax Office in the grade school building. Considerable damage was done to the brick wall around the vault and to the floor of the study hall located on the second floor above the vault, as an attempt was made to gain entry to the vault from the top. Also money from the cold drink machine in the building was taken.

The break in was discovered by Mr. Walter Steele, school custodian, when he arrived at the school for his usual chores around 6:45 a. m.

L. E. "Lefty" Sublett, Sheriff of Eastland County, and his deputy, Loy Williams, are investigating the burglaries.

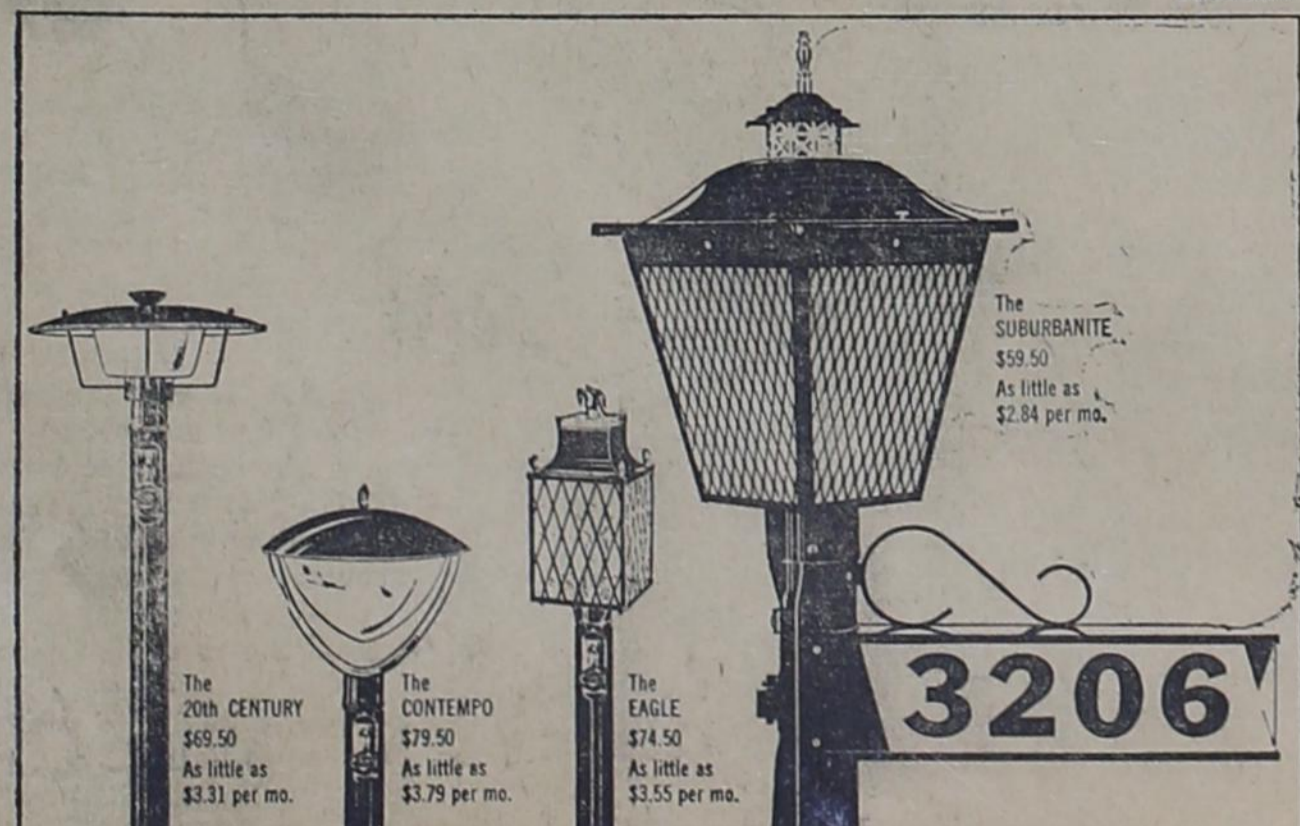

He was married to Glenda Roach and the father of two children. His family live in Beeville. He was a native of Visalia, Calif.

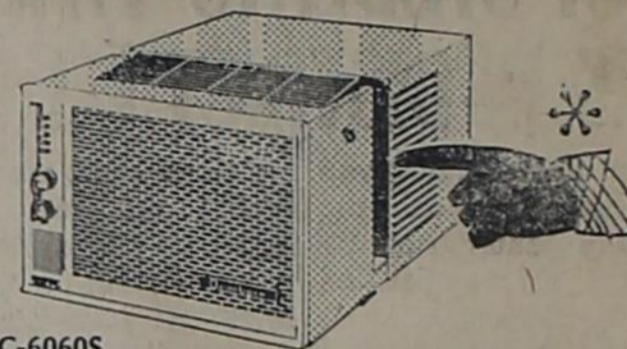
