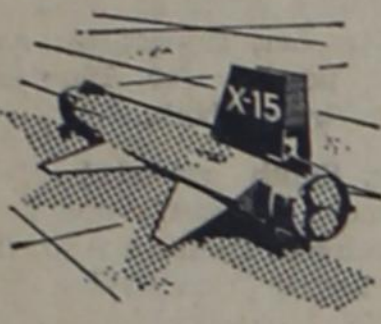

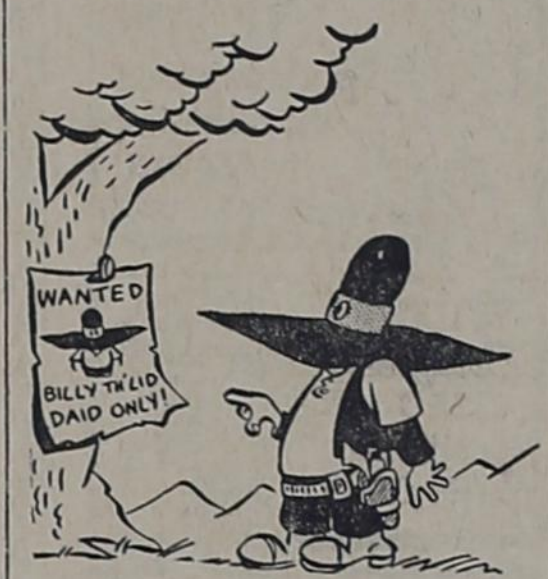
"Absolutely Murder" Draws Large Crowd

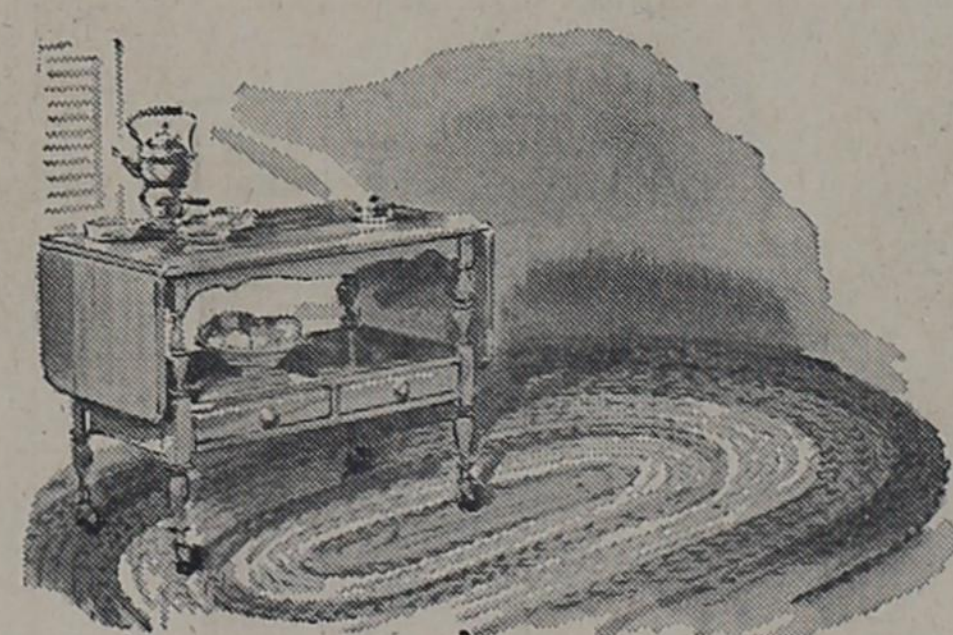

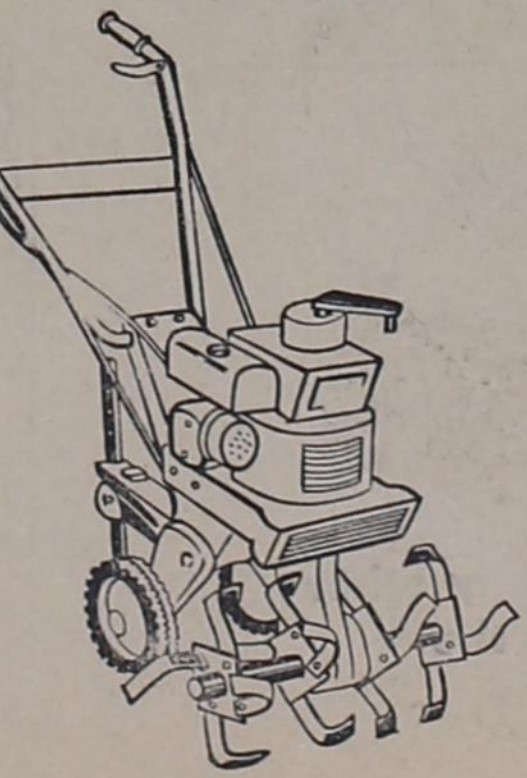

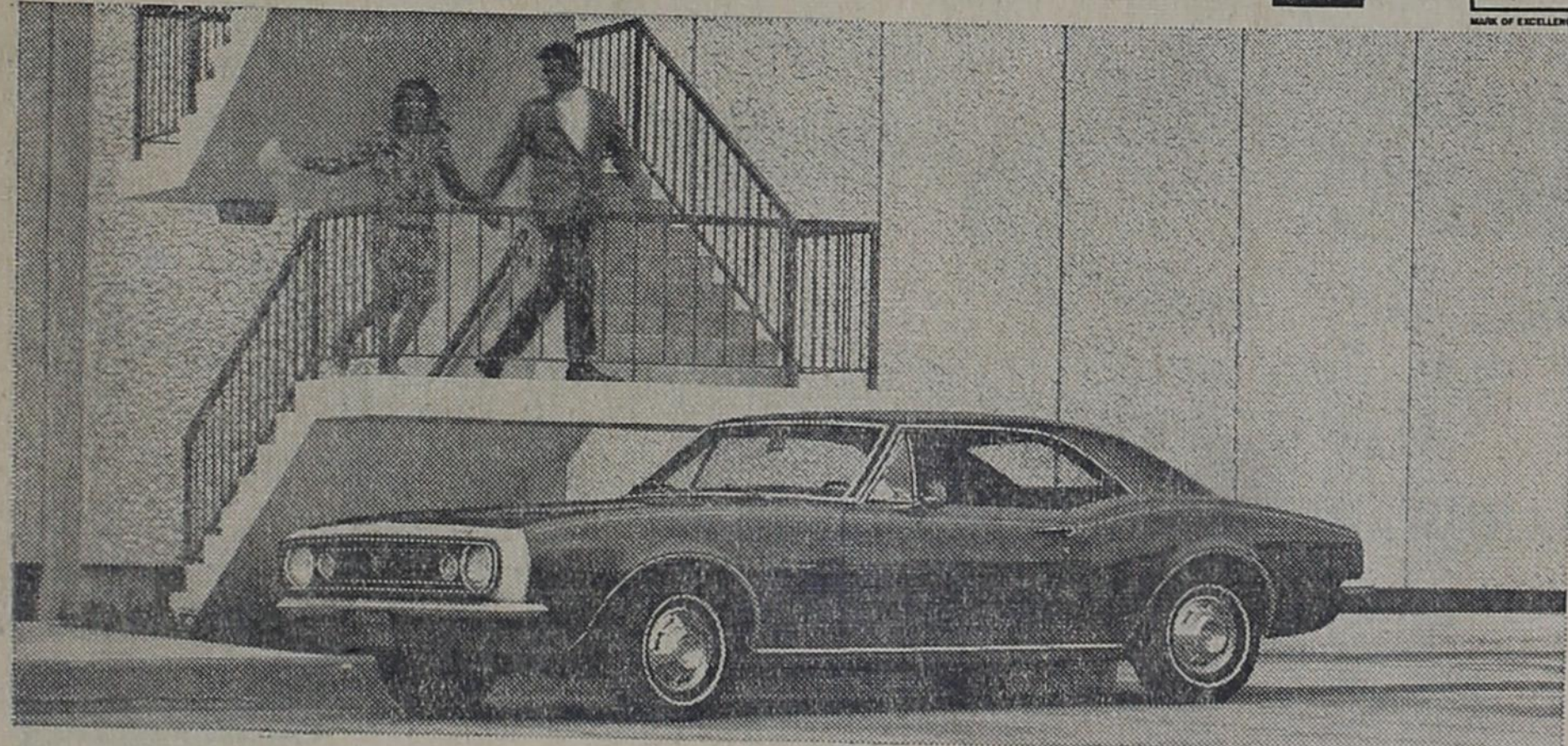
