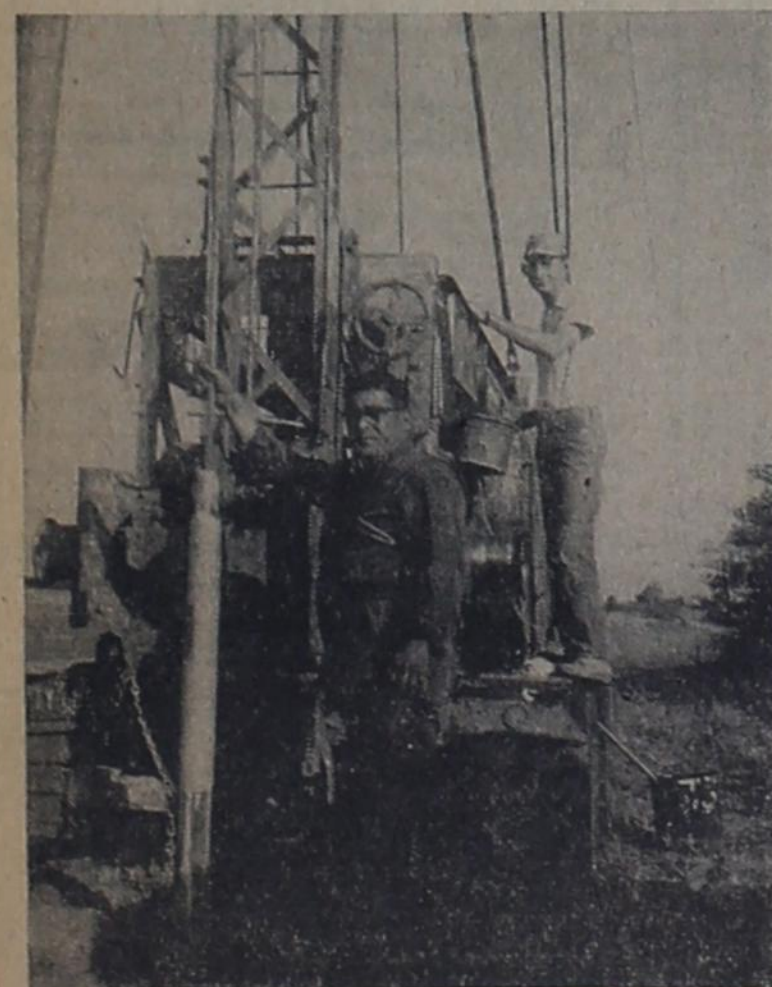
Elizabeth is an active member in the First Methodist Church and will enter North Texas State University this summer. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Parr.

Majorettes chosen were Debra Smith, Dana Weldon, and Mary Jay, with Tresa Duran as alternate.

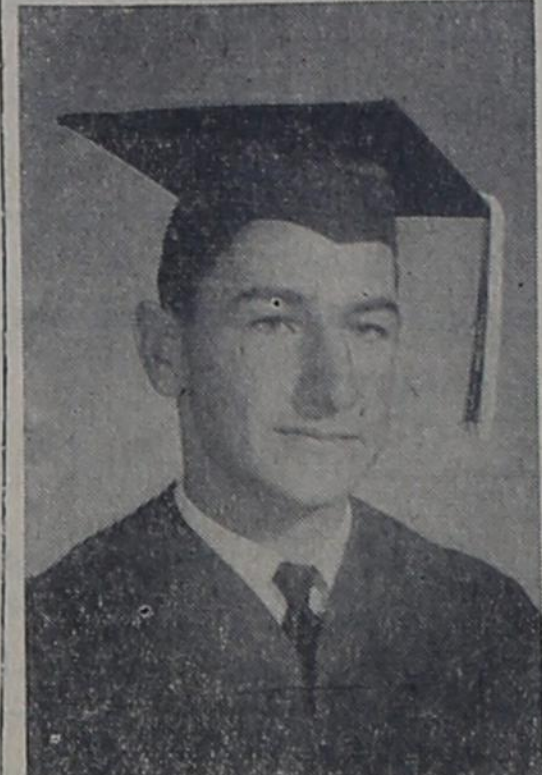

Arnold, Jr. It was simply cold weather, definitely not good for swimming, yet a principal subject of business was a report

on the Community Pool.

President, Mrs. Berenice Jeffs, conducted the business session when plans for the Cancer Crusade and a Rummage Sale were finalized. The Club has for sale, too, cook books, tooth brushes, and school days (a really compact and attractive little folder containing pockets for report cards, etc., for keeping children's records together).

Then Mrs. Jeffs reported from the Swimming Pool Committee that some approximately sixty trees had been set at the pool and that every tree is leafing out. She stated, too, that pipe has

been placed at the area for fence building. 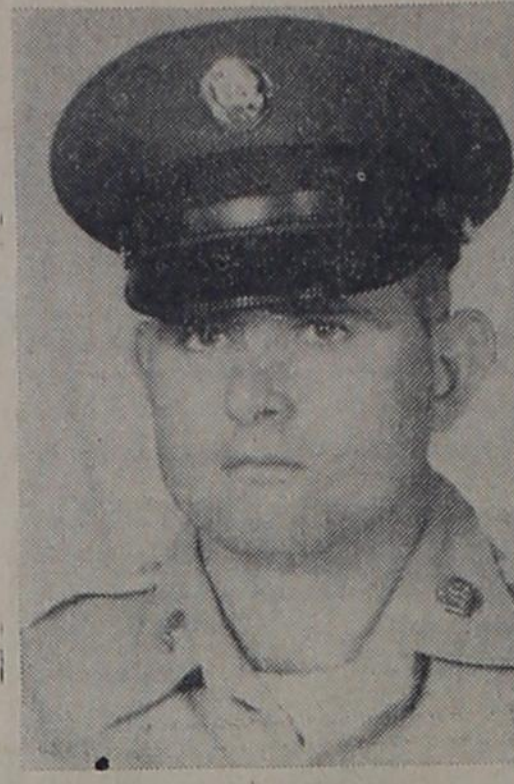
Giving some of the reasoning behind correct parliamentary procedure, Mrs. Revels continued by listing the strict regulations governing the requirement for becoming a registered parliamentarian — twenty hours of study, a chartered group, a two day long test, a year of instruction — it's no wonder that registered parliamentarians are few and earn \$75 a day. Mrs. Revels closed by listing a number of rules that should be followed in any group meeting; they were not intended to be humorous, but — anyway, the Woman's Study Club certainly does accomplish many worthwhile projects.

The second program part, introduced by Miss Pulley, was a brief history and a film of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs Headquarters Building presented by Mrs. J. S. Ripley.

The corner stone for the TFWC Headquarters was laid on January 11, 1932, and the then one hundred sixty-five thousand dollar structure, is worth well over half a million dollars now. Located appropriately in Austin, the building is beautiful in design of Southern Colonial constructed of red brick. As members viewed the colored pictures of both interior and exterior, Mrs. Ripley explained the functions and furnishings. In only two other states do the women own a State Club building, and, naturally, the Texas building is said to be the largest and most beautiful, even surpassing the General Federation Headquarters located in Washington, D. C.

Refreshments? Well, swimming, behaving according to Robert's Rules, and sightseeing through such a big building would make anybody hungry. And Mrs. Arnold had prepared the most beautiful concoction — all colors and flavors of ice cream dipped and then molded together to form a cake. When sliced, it was many colors and just as delicious as pretty. And there were mints, nuts, coffee, but the ice cream cake was the charmer. Then it took awhile to talk and drink a second cup of coffee, so it was quite late when everyone said good-night.

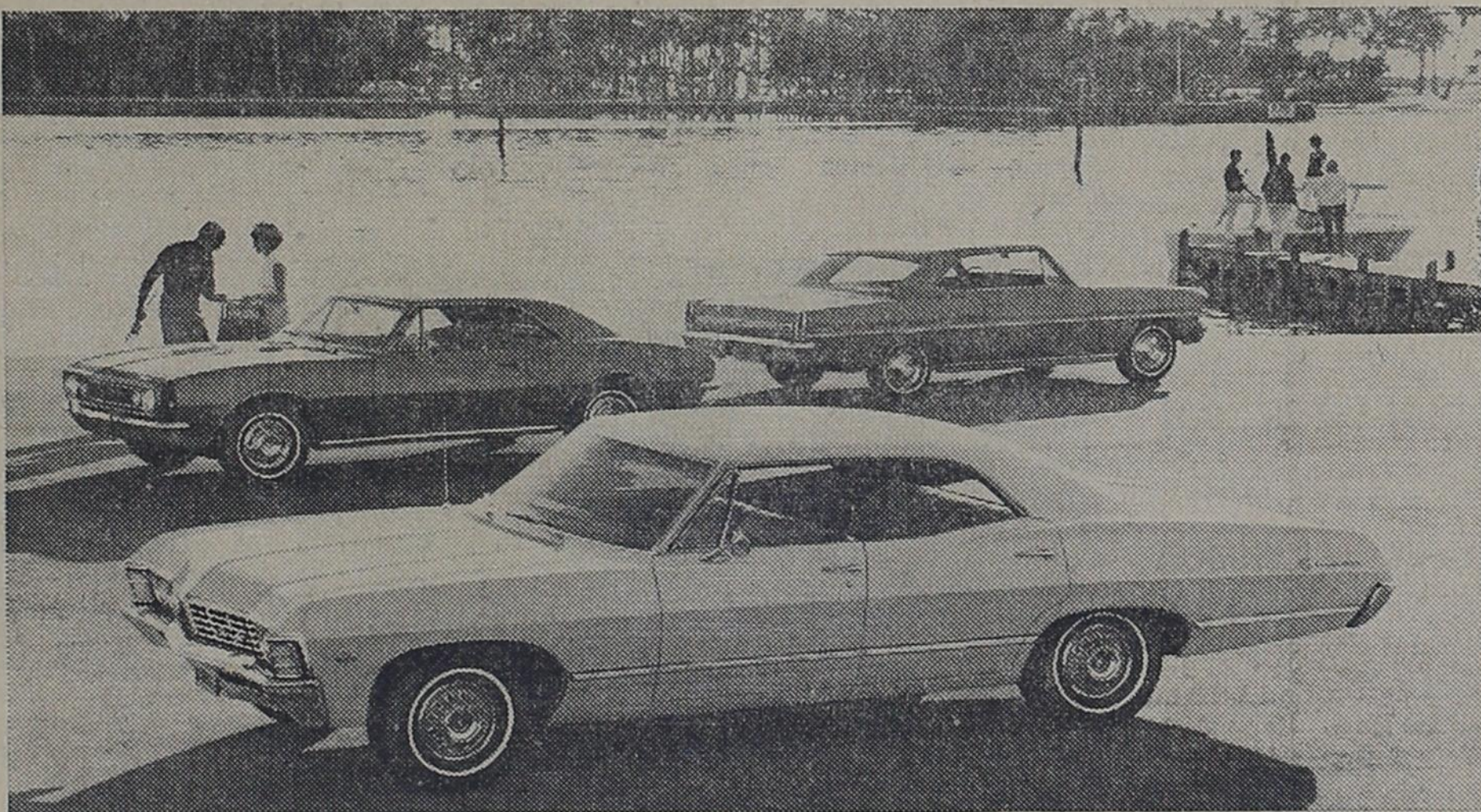

Secretary of State John L. Hill announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1967 and ends June 1, 1969, must pay the required fee and file a new application, oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1967 and May 15, 1967, inclusive.

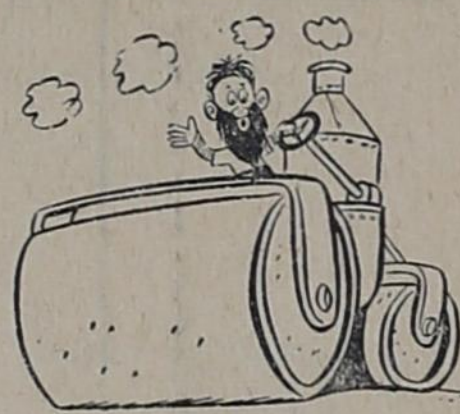
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
