Secretary of State John L. Hill announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1967 and ends June 1, 1969, must pay the required fee and file a new application, oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1967 and May 15, 1967, inclusive.

Mr. Hill emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the Application to the Secretary of State.

Each person applying for a commission as Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States and of Texas and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The required Application Forms may be obtained from the County

Secretary of State Hill further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1967.

Section 1 of Article 5949 - As Amended (Qualification of Notary Public) Upon receiving notice from the Secretary of State of such appointments, the County Clerk shall forthwith notify all persons so appointed to appear before him within fifteen (15) days from the date of such appointment and qualify as hereinafter provided.
