Drivers Education Classes To Begin Here On May 22

Driver Training Course will be held at the Gorman High School for students in the Gorman area.

Students must be at least 14 years of age before tests are given.

Connally Proclaims Nursing Home Week for May 14-20

AUSTIN — Citing the role that nursing homes in Texas are playing in assuring a fuller life for the aged, the chronically ill and the convalescent, Governor John Connally has proclaimed the week of May 14-20 as Texas Nursing Home Week.

Noting that nursing homes and related facilities now number over 900 in Texas providing a bed capacity of 45,400, the governor noted that more new facilities for aged care have been constructed in Texas in the last six years than in any other state.

"New and modern homes and equipment, improved techniques, therapy, rehabilitation, and the dedication of its people have earned this progressive and rapidly growing health profession our confidence and respect," Governor John Connally said.

The Governor also cited the Texas Nursing Home Association and its member homes for their leadership and contributions in "the growth of the profession and higher nursing home standards which have resulted in the continued rise of patient care."

In his proclamation, the Governor urged residents to acquaint themselves with the services and contributions being made by nursing homes by visiting these facilities during nursing home week.

The Texas Nursing Home Association and its 535 members is joining with the 6,700 member American Nursing Home Association in urging residents to visit a nursing home for a few minutes on Mother's Day.

"Most nursing home patients are elderly women and many are without family or friends," said Arthur B. Taylor, President of the Texas Nursing Home Association. The best therapy they could have would be a friendly visitor from the world outside the nursing home doors. John M. Crawford, TNHA Executive Director, said that "nursing homes not only have broadened their potential for service, but they also have taken on an increasing role in the health care of the chronically ill, the aged and the convalescent of all ages."

Visitors also will have an opportunity to acquaint themselves with the problems, the progress and the potential for the future that the nursing home profession offers in the health care field.

WASHINGTON, D. C. - WHILE ATTENDING A LUNCHEON AT THE WHITE HOUSE for General Westmoreland, pickets out front on Pennsylvania Avenue could be observed through the window.

A YOUNG MAN WITHOUT BEARD, and cleaner looking than the others, dropped his sign "Get Out of Viet Nam" between his knees and cheered General Westmoreland as he passed in his car. He was just a little overcome but quickly recovered and again raised his sign.

IT JUST MIGHT HAVE BEEN HE WAS a hired maroher and "protester." There is now a business organized by three 18 and 19-year-old boys at George Washington University, called "Proxy Pickets." Now, anyone can have his own picket. If there is something going on which we do not like, these people will do our griping and protesting for us. If the weather is too bad, if we are too busy or too lazy, Proxy Pickets will furnish the protest.

IT IS REPORTED THAT FOR \$17 five pickets will march anywhere, protesting anything for an hour. For \$154, fifty pickets will spread the gloom. Proxy Pickets have a good location, being handy to the White House, the Capitol and other places where protesting is popular. The overhead should be fairly reasonable. Many of the signs can be used over and over again, which simply say, "I protest." Participants in some demonstrations seemingly need no reason - they just "protest" anything. We are entitled to ask who pays the expenses.

THE ADVERTISEMENT OF THE ORGANIZATION CONCLUDES, "Exercise your Constitutional rights of self-expression." Evidently it does have its principles because they say they will conduct only peaceful protests and that there will be no violence, no burning anything, and they will not picket for the communists.

MANY "PROTESTERS" HAVE "PROTESTERS." Those protesting the protesters, however, are usually not very well organized and the cause they represent is usually not as well known.

THUS FAR THERE HAS BEEN NO ORGANIZED PROTEST march against the inflammatory statements of Martin Luther King Stokely Carmichael or Cassius Clay. Those which have occurred have been on the fringes of other protest demonstrations.

LEGAL AND ORDERLY PROTESTS CAN BE MADE other than by street demonstrations.

PROTESTS HAVE BEEN MADE TO THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT to enforce what Laws we have against the desecration of our Flag, the burning of draft cards and the incitement of crowds by inflammatory statements. A Law is on the books against draft card burning, and legislation has been introduced to make the desecration of our Flag a clearer offense and carrying a greater punishment.

THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT REPLIES TO WRITTEN INQUIRIES with the opinion that "Any individual who calls upon his fellow citizens to disobey our Country's Laws, who advocates violence or who seeks to set one race against another does his Nation and himself a grave disservice." But, they say that whether statements made by these men can be suppressed depends on whether they fall outside the protection accorded to freedom of speech by the First Amendment to the Constitution. It is pointed out by an Assistant Attorney General that, "Congress shall make no Law abridging freedom of speech." Decisions involving this issue are quoted under the doctrine of freedom of speech and of the press, suscept-

ible of restrictions only when necessary to prevent grave and immediate danger to interests which the Government may lawfully protect.

THE DEPARTMENT ENDS ITS RESPONSE to a written inquiry that they are appreciative of the seriousness of the matter, and with judicial principles as a guide are reviewing actions by Carmichael and others to determine whether any applicable Federal Law is violated.

Spring is summer job hunting season for many high school and college students. Students who will be taking a job for the first time and will need a social security number were urged by R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager, to apply now and avoid the May and June rush.

He stated that, by applying

now, the student will avoid unnecessary delay. In late May and early June the number of applications for social security cards is four to five times greater than in the other months of the year and some delays occur. Since employers need to see a new employee's social security card before he goes on duty, getting the card late could cause a delay in starting work, and result in missing a good job opportunity.

Tuley concluded by advising students not to wait until school is out to apply for their social security numbers. Applications

may be obtained from local post offices or from the Abilene social security district office, located in the Federal Building.

Amazing Grace

The captain of a slave ship reads a book

An old windjammer tied up at Southampton. The captain staggered down the gangplank, paused and looked back at his ship. Then he disappeared up the ancient cobblestone street.

Capt. John Newton was only 23 years old but he had been to sea ever since his pious mother had died when he was 7. He had sailed with his sea-captain father, had done a trick in the British Navy, deserted, been caught, put in irons and whipped in public. Defiant, he signed on the lowest of all craft . . . a slave ship. He hardly knew how to read, but he knew the sea and it wasn't long until he was walking the bridge as master of his own slave, with a whip in one hand and a gun in the other.

John Newton wasn't drunk that day in 1784 when he staggered down the plank. He was sick . . . sick physically, spiritually and morally. Most of all he was sick of the filthy slave business. On a long voyage from Brazil he had read a book called "Imitation of Christ." Then came

a storm . . . a vicious storm that threatened for days to send him to the bottom. When the storm calmed he fell to thinking . . . thinking about Christ who Thomas Kempis had written about in his book.

Not an Englishman in His Majesty's Empire would have dreamed that Capt. John Newton would have quit the sea for the ministry. That is, not an Englishman except Capt. John Newton. But when he paused for a last look at his ship, that's exactly what the hard-boiled skipper had in mind.

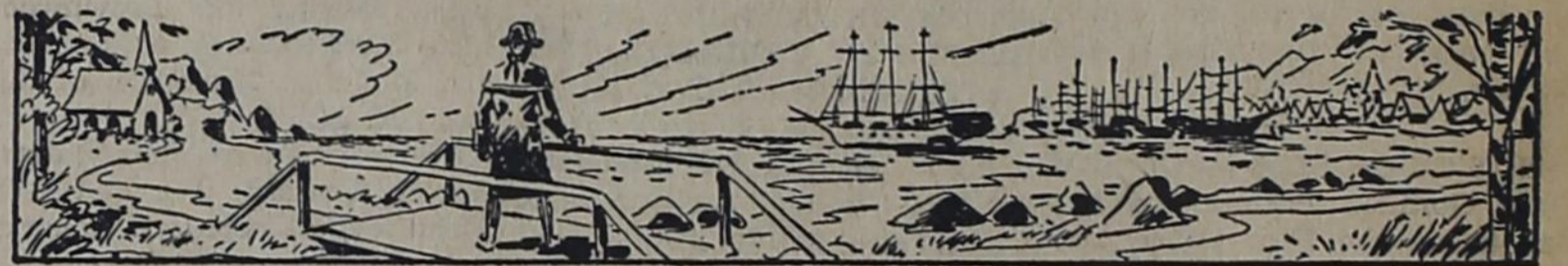
After 16 years of self education, John Newton was ordained and given a little church at the town of Olney. But he never gave up his sea garb. In the sunset of life, as pastor of one of London's greatest churches, he appeared in the pulpit dressed like a sailor—with a cane in one hand and a Bible in the other. But it was while serving his little church at Olney that he wrote . . .

Amazing grace how sweet the sound,
That saved a wretch like me!
I once was lost, but now am found.
Was blind, but now I see.

'Twas grace that taught my heart to fear,
And grace my fears relieved;
How precious did that grace appear
The hour I first believed.

Thro' many dangers, toils and snares,
I have already come;
'Tis grace hath bro't me safe thus far,
And grace will lead me home.

Mrs. Jordan's council report was followed by the program presented by Mrs. Wayne White on "Selection and Care of Silver."

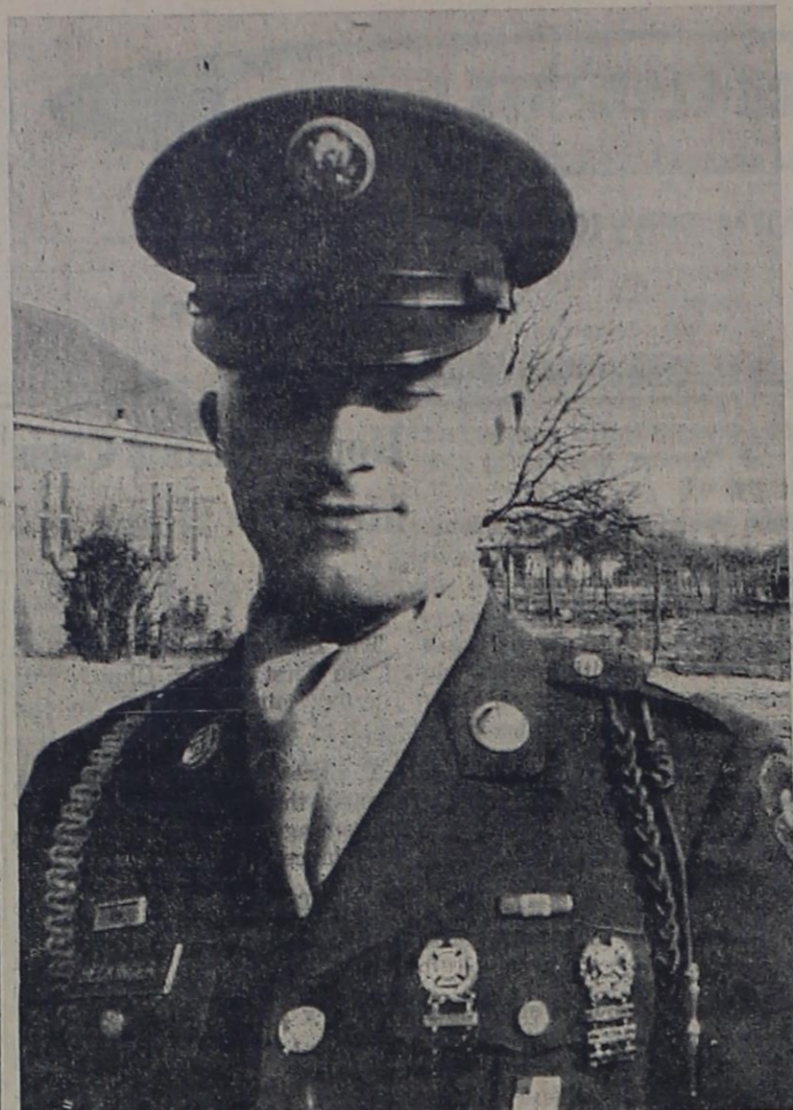
Mrs. Lee Bishop, recreation director, led the club in a most enjoyable game, "Weather Alphabet."

Mrs. Johnnie Burleson opened the meeting with a prayer.

Mrs. Burleson said that some of the girls make excellent nurse's aides. They are taught to clean and some make excellent help in homes. They are paid for this work and use the money to buy clothes. They appreciate having a dress that is not purchased by the state.

There is a club that some join and send a student who has no relatives to sponsor him, \$1 per month so they can buy at the Commissary. A member might also partly sponsor their clothes by sending them a dress occasionally.

Mrs. Burrows returned to Mexia loaded with material for their arts and crafts. Sherry Lou was heard to remark, "Mama! What if we have a flat." She is mother to then, and loves them as if she were their mother.

Mrs. Burrows said "Don't ever throw away any old lace, scraps, broken beads, cut glass, etc. They can always use these things." It was such a treat to hear someone who is so interested in that work to talk to us. The school is always open to visitors.

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"The Raving Foe, A Civil War Diary," Just Published

"THE RAVING FOE, A Civil War Diary, and List of 1,253 Prisoners on Johnson Island," Edited by J. C. Poe. 144 pages. Longhorn Press, Eastland, Texas. \$5.

A personal book, "The Raving Foe," contains the diary of Maj. James T. Poe, who as a member of an Arkansas Confederate Regiment, was a prisoner of war on Johnson's Island, Ohio. Maj. Poe, a cousin to the poet, Edgar Allen Poe, wrote the journal before, during, and after his service. His great-grandson, J. C. Poe, an Eastland florist, took the family heirloom and turned it into a combination adventure-reference volume, using the major's own accounts as the basis for the book, and including reproductions of documents and records pertinent to the saga.

The book contains a complete list of 1,253 prisoners on the Island, showing hometowns, units and places where captured. Born in 1829 in Alabama, Maj. Poe moved to Arkansas (Benton County) in 1856. He served two years in the Arkansas House of Representatives after the war and moved to Central Texas in '96. He died in 1913 and was buried at Long Branch in Eastland County, Texas.

Title of the book is taken from the Major's description of his enemy.

The diary gives a day-to-day account of his adventures and personal thoughts while in the service of the Confederacy.

This hard-bound volume is the first major work for the Longhorn Press, an Eastland County home-grown industry whose publishers are H. V. O'Brien of Eastland and J. W. Sitton of Cisco.

Rotation And Soil Fumigation Is Aid To Nematode Problem In Peanuts

COLLEGE STATION — Rotation with grain sorghum combined with soil fumigation are effective precautions against nematode damage in peanut crops, according to recent experiments by Texas A&M University.

On the basis of gross value per acre of Spanish peanuts harvested, wide differences were noted when the crop was grown continuously compared to benefits from rotation and fumigation.

Dr. W. H. Thames of the A&M Plant Science Department and B. C. Langley, superintendent of

the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station at Stephenville, conducted the experiments on sandy land heavily infested with nematodes. Grain sorghum for rotation was early hegar. Fumigation was at the rate of 10 gallons per acre of a dichloropropene material (Vidden-D).

In 1965, gross value per acre was \$30.20 for continuous peanuts; \$31.31, fumigated peanuts; \$59.42, peanuts following one year in sorghum; \$78.67, peanuts following one year in sorghum plus fumigation.

In 1966, gross values for the different rotations were: continuous peanuts, \$3.68; fumigated peanuts, \$10.92; sorghum followed by two years in peanuts, \$9.23; sorghum plus fumigation followed by two years in peanuts, \$18.25; sorghum plus fumigation followed by sorghum and one year in peanuts, \$62.48; two years in sorghum and one year in peanuts, \$64.26.

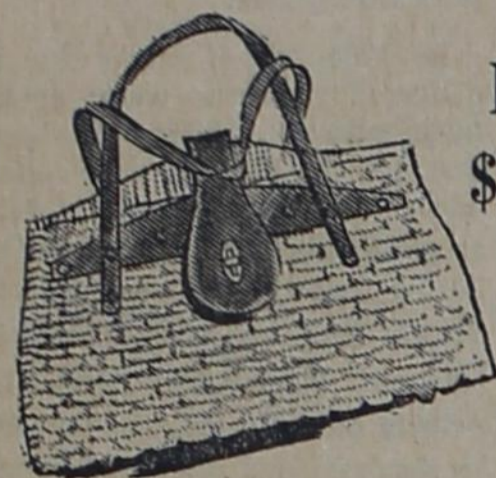

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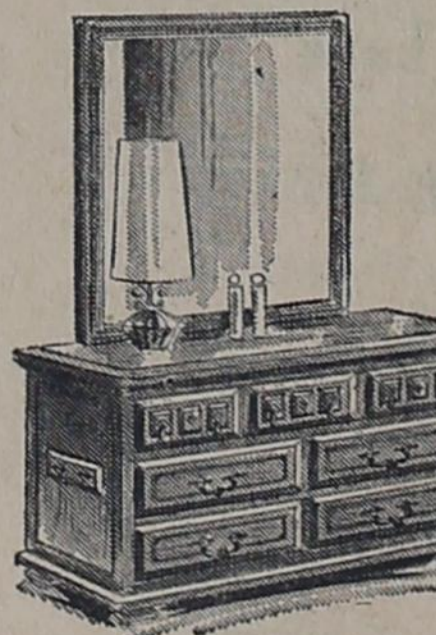

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County Agent Says Pecan Trees Need Spraying May 15-20

The rapid emergence of the adult (moths) of the pecan nut casebearer in Eastland County and surrounding areas indicate the optimum time for spraying pecan trees is May 15 through May 20. This date has been determined based on work and observation done by A. D. Ellington of Cisco; De Gordon, Eastland County Agricultural Agent; George Madden, Pecan Field Station in Brownwood; and Tom Denman, Cross Timbers Experiment Station at Stephenville.

The casebearer is the most destructive of all pecan insects. For effective control the insecticide must be applied from the time the worms begin emerging from the eggs and before they bore into the small pecans. The eggs are usually deposited on the tips of the small pecans.

The development of the casebearer is about ten days earlier than last year. Observations at this time on percent larvae and pupae development indicate that two applications may be required to achieve satisfactory control this year. If two spray applications are made it is suggested that the first application be made May 15 through 17 and the second about ten days later.

The insecticides recommended for controlling the casebearer are Sevin, Malathion, Toxaphene, and DDT. When two spray applications are made it is recommended that Malathion be used for the first application and Sevin for the second application.

The County Agent suggests that owners of pecan orchards check for eggs and nut penetrations next Monday, May 15. If the infestation seems very light wait until later in the week to spray. If only one spray application is made the recommendation is a mixture containing 2 pounds of Zinc Sulfate, 2 pounds of 80% Sevin and 1 1/4 pounds of Malathion per 100 gallons of water.

Zinc Sulfate should be added to all pecan sprays at the rate of 2 pounds per 100 gallons of Spray mixture to control rosette disease, a zinc deficiency common to pecan trees.

Be sure to wet the foliage of the tree thoroughly to make certain that the nut clusters are treated.

Oscar Schaefer, Cook community, former president of the organization, is chairman of the current membership drive of the association.

The meeting is open to the general public. Both men and women are welcome to attend the field day.

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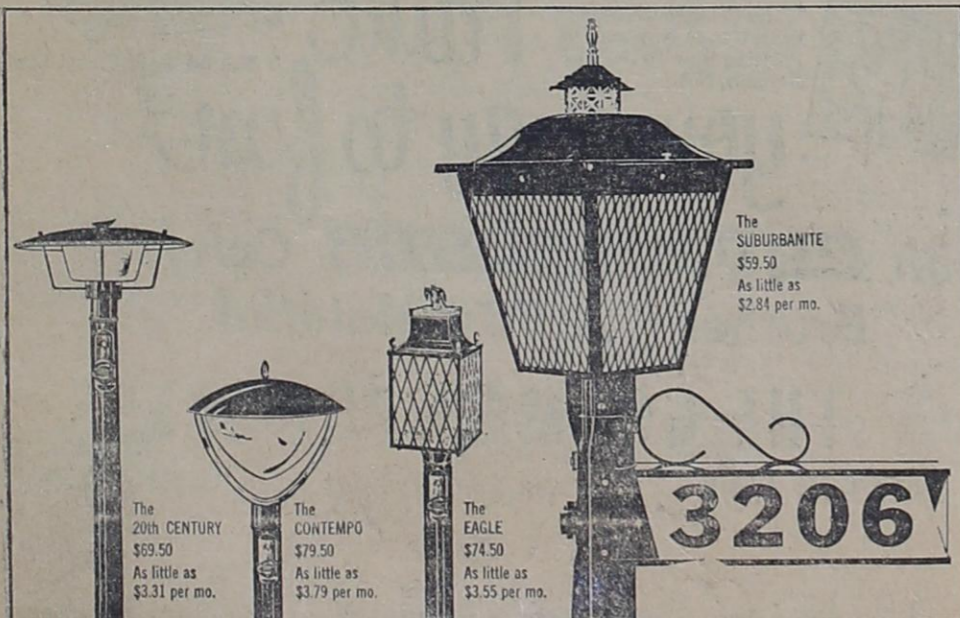


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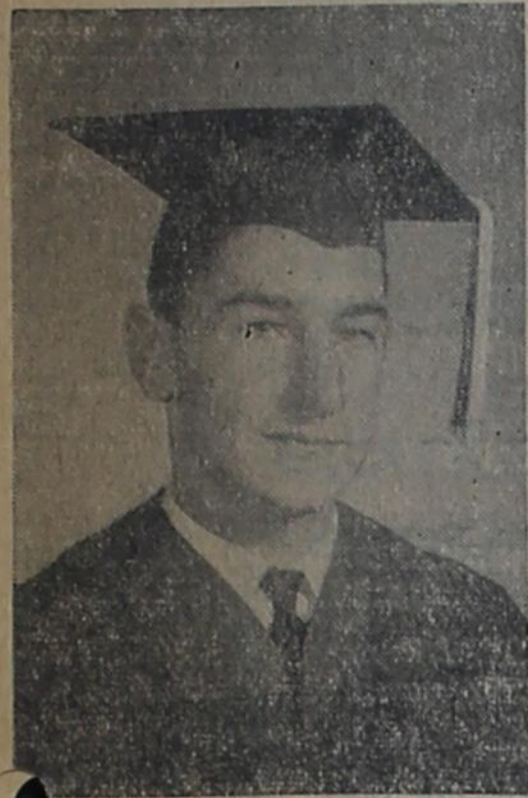
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LARRY DWAYNE SNIDER

His plans are to attend Tarleton State College this fall and plans to major in Mathematics and Chemistry in preparation for a possible career as a math teacher.

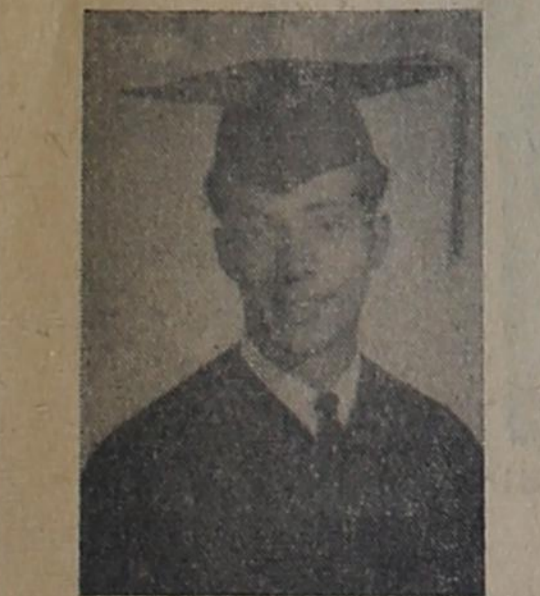

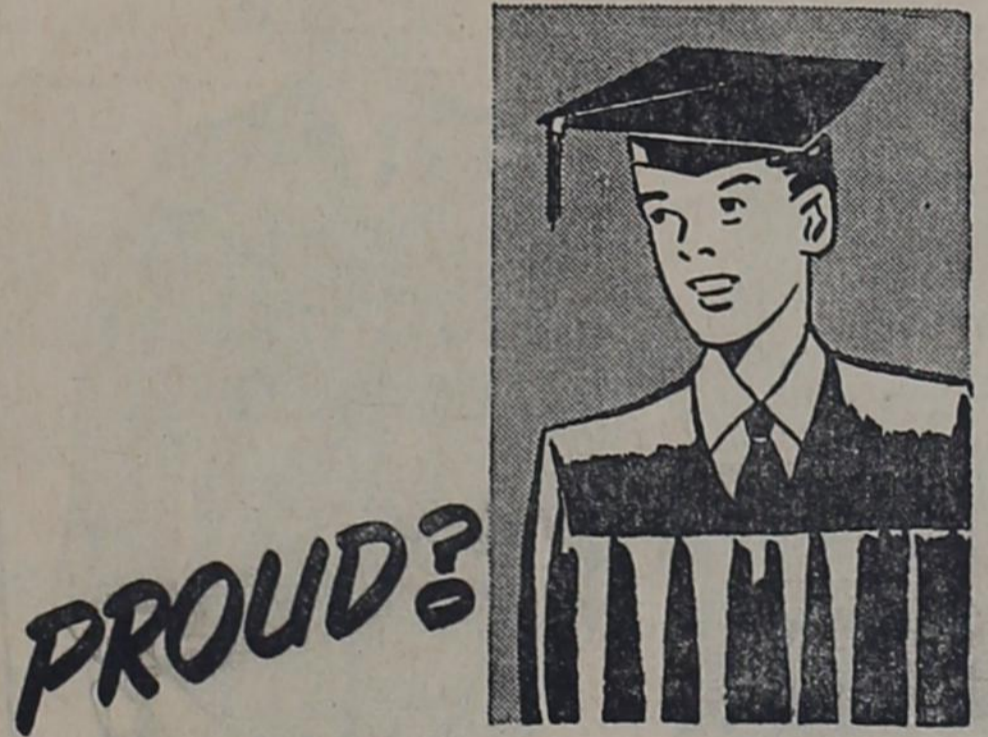
Lawndale Home For Senior Citizens observed Texas Nursing Home Week with open house on Sunday, May 14, from 2 to 5 m. p.
