HELPFUL ADVICE FOR THE WOMAN DRIVER

Whether or not your car can stop on a dime (and chances are it can't), a ten-cent piece can be a vital thing to have on hand in case your auto doesn't start. The most important tool you can carry in your car is a dime to make a telephone call to the nearest service station, the police or a friend.

When you need someone who can either come to your assistance or can help get assistance to you, it's a good idea to have taped two or three dimes to the inside of your glove compartment door so they'll be handy for such an emergency.

Then, before you go to a phone, lock your car, making certain there's nothing visible on the front or rear seats (skilled thieves can break into and strip a car in minutes). Next, make a mental note of your exact location - name of street, part of town, corner you are at or near, and approximate distance from prominent landmarks. Then get to a phone and call.

ADD SPIRIT TO HOME-MADE RELISH



What's easy to prepare, unusual to serve and makes a great gift? Why, home-made relishes, of course; preserved in extra spicy and high-spirited marinades. So, if you'd like to give your parties and friends a deliciously different kind of lift, try blending these recipes with liquor and spice and other things nice:

- Gin-uine Olives**
1 jar (7 oz.) green olives
1/4 cup gin
- Drain 1/4 cup of the brine from olives, replace with gin. Wash outside of jar and relabel in your own design. Cover. Marinate 24 hours or longer.
- Scotched Beans**
1 pound whole green beans, cleaned
1 cup water
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pickling spice
1/4 cup Scotch
- Cook green beans 10 minutes in salted water. Drain, reserving cooking water. Pack beans upright in tall, narrow glass container. Pour pickling spice and Scotch over beans. Fill container with hot cooking water. Cover. Marinate 24 hours.
- Bourbon Beets**
1 can (1 pound) sliced beets
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon sugar
1 tablespoon vinegar
1/3 cup Bourbon
- Drain beets, reserving liquid. Place beets in a glass container. Add seasonings, vinegar, Bourbon and beet liquid to fill. Cover. Marinate 24 hours or longer.
