



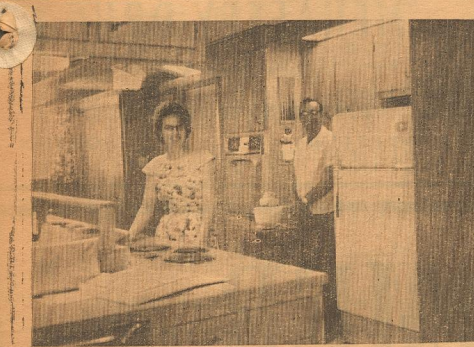
New Home For SWPGA May Be Completed By August First

Gorman Peanuts Install New Scales

New scales and scale house have been installed at Gorman Peanuts, a Division of American Cold Storage Corp. The new equipment will take care of peanuts dried at the Gorman plant, eliminating all congestion of green peanuts and dried peanuts being weighed at the same time.

The tall tower houses a large elevator that will convey the peanuts from this area straight to the warehouse or to the sheller. The conveyor is approximately 210 feet long. This will speed up drying by a good 25 to 30 percent over last year, and less handling.

New trailers have been built for use on the new dryers built last year and to convey the peanuts to the dump pit.

Gorman Peanuts are completely renovating the office space of their building and installing new equipment that will assure quicker service for payments to the farmers.

One more Pneumatic sampler is in the process of being installed and this will speed up sampling of farmers stock peanuts.

Gorman Peanuts will be ready for the bumper crop of peanuts that the area farmers are expecting this year.

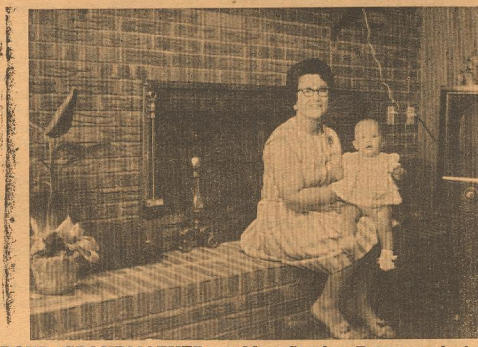
MRS. J. TECSON, CHILDREN RETURN FROM GERMANY

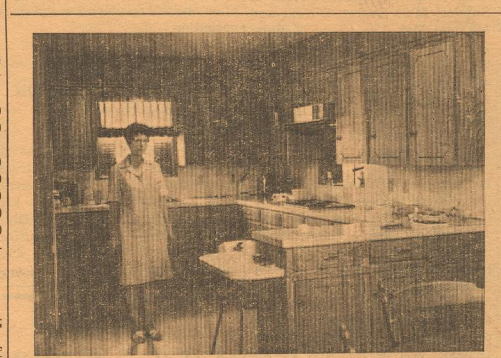
Mrs. Tecson and children were in Germany 18 days. The military dependents were not evacuated until all the oil company families had been returned home.

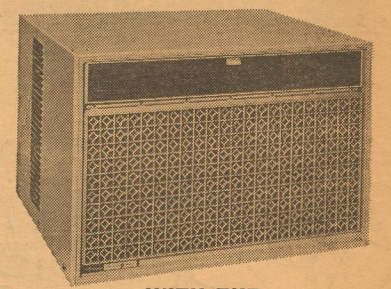
