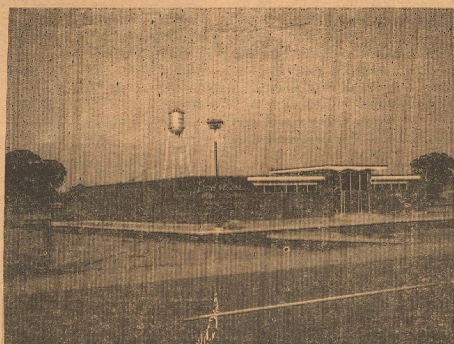


NEW SWPGA OFFICE BUILDING IS SET FOR OPEN HOUSE AUGUST 28



The new office building of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association is completed and open house will be held from 7 to 9 p. m. Monday, August 28th.

The building, located on the De Leon Hwy. 6 east, is an all steel and brick structure which makes it practically fireproof.

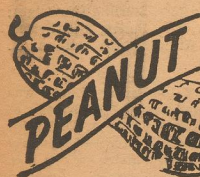
The modern artistic building of chocolate-colored brick with red trim is most attractive. The building has 6,450 square feet of office space and an 1,130 square foot courtyard. The courtyard could very easily be converted into office space if the need should arise. The building has central heat and cooling, two executive offices and a directors room which will seat from 25 to 30 people.

Paved parking space is available to employees at the side and back of the building with the front reserved for visitors.

The building was constructed by B&W Construction Company of Bryan at a cost of \$131,000 dollars.

SWPGA employs from twelve to fifteen persons regularly and more at the peak season. Gorman is the central location of the industry which SWPGA serves.

The present building which was built in 1940, is in the process of being leased to an industry-related business.

"Gorman Growth Up To Civic Leaders" States Chamber Of Commerce Speaker

Bob Browder, with the Area Development Division of Texas Electric Service Company in Fort Worth and guest speaker at the Chamber of Commerce dinner on Tuesday night, told the people that "Gorman is a town that gets things done, and has accomplished more than any small town in the West Texas area." He also emphasized the many qualifications that Gorman has that could attract industry. He further stated that "small communities can compete for industries and Gorman has more to offer than most West Texas small towns." He said Gorman had a good water supply, railway facilities, and people that wanted to work. That is workers who wanted to give a day's work for a day's pay, which is very attractive to any manufacturer or industry. He stated that our main asset was the product, our Peanuts, and the peanut facilities that

we have here, plus the fact that more and more young men are entering the field of agriculture. "What Gorman wants and does is up to you as civic leaders," he said.

Browder told the group that Gorman would continue to grow because it is a town with civic enthusiasm and that his department would continue to work for and with the people of Gorman for area development and improvements.

The Gorman Public Schools will begin registration on Thursday, August 24th. Seniors will register Thursday between the hours of 9 to 11 a. m. Juniors on Thursday between the hours of 2 and 4 p. m. Sophomores on Friday, August 25 between the hours of 9 and 11 a. m. with Freshmen registering from 2 to 4 p. m. on Friday.

Registration of the Elementary School students will be Friday, August 25, beginning at 8:30 a. m. Classes will begin on Monday, August 28, at 8:25 a. m. with a full days of school. Buses will run about twenty minutes later than they did last year. Lunch room will be in operation on Monday.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 93, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 93. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

The first records that the school had on record in Comanche was in 1879. The first teacher's name was William Billips. The school, at that time, was a four months school. The salary for the first month was \$31.50 and the last month he was paid \$8.40.

In 1920 Mrs. Maudie Pittman Nabors was the teacher and in 1921 Miss Delia Wall taught.

In 1939 R. V. Lesley, C. L. Mohon, Jr., Chesley Atchison and Miss Loreta Allen taught. It was a four teacher school then and had a lunchroom. Mrs. Dale Brownlee was the lunchroom lady.

When the school was sold in 1952 it was sold to Herman Tomlinson of Hamilton and the lumber was used to build a church.

At the homecoming this year two teachers were present, Mrs. Maudie Nabors and C. L. Mohon, Jr.

There were approximately 90 people in attendance.

When the school house was sold Mrs. C. E. Atchison wrote the following poem in memory of the school and all the good times the students, teachers and all the people that passed through the doors of Oliver Springs School.

"The Old Country School House"

At last, the school house has been sold

Its needed here no more
Its being leveled to the ground
Each wall, the roof, the floor
Somehow a sadness comes to me

My eyes are dimmed with tears
Its held so many memories
Of all those happy years.
Seems I can see my childhood friends
