

JESSE LEACH ELECTED AS BOARD PRESIDENT OF SWPGA FOR '67-'68

Jesse Leach of Holdenville, Oklahoma, was elected Association president succeeding D. B. Warren of Gorman. Named vice president was E. A. Walker of De Leon. Roy Gentry of Shawnee, Okla., Cecil Bynum of Pleasanton and Barton Scott of Binger, Okla., were elected directors.

Specialists discussed ways and means to increase peanut production and harvesting, irrigation, drying and peanut marketing at the annual meeting Friday of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association at Tarleton State College.

Over 300 peanut farmers from Texas and Oklahoma registered for the day-long program.

The group was welcomed to the college by Dr. W. O. Trogon, president of Tarleton. Ross Wilson, manager of the association introduced visitors and gave the purpose of the meeting. In his annual report of SWPGA which administers the peanut price support program for the Department of Agriculture in States west of the Mississippi, stated that SWPGA stored a record 100,966 tons of farmers' stock peanuts in 1966.

Wilson told the members that 293 tons were sold under the terms of the 1966 sales policy to shellers, for edible and 40,667 tons were sold by Commodity Credit Corporation through the association for domestic crushing into oil. A total of 59,971 tons were sold to CCC for crushing.

and for export purposes. Thirty tons were delivered to SDA, ANS, for experimental shelling purposes.

Dr. C. Wendell Horne, plant pathologist, Texas Agriculture Extension Service, told the farmers that growers were losing approximately 30 per cent of total production because of plant diseases, and could materially reduce this loss through proper use of fungicides and adoption of improved production practices.

Southwestern Peanut Pacesetter Club certificates were awarded 27 growers who produced at least 1,500 pounds of peanuts per acre on dry land or 4,000 pounds under irrigated. Area winners were V. L. Files and George Warren and Dan Chester of Comanche County. W. H. Starr and Lee Starr of Eastland County.

Other speakers included Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer, TAES' Agronomist Ben Spears of TAES, Dale King of Anson, assistant to Congressman Omar Burleson. Phillip J. Hamman and W. S. Allen of TAES and Leland Tripp, agronomist, Oklahoma Agricultural Extension Service.

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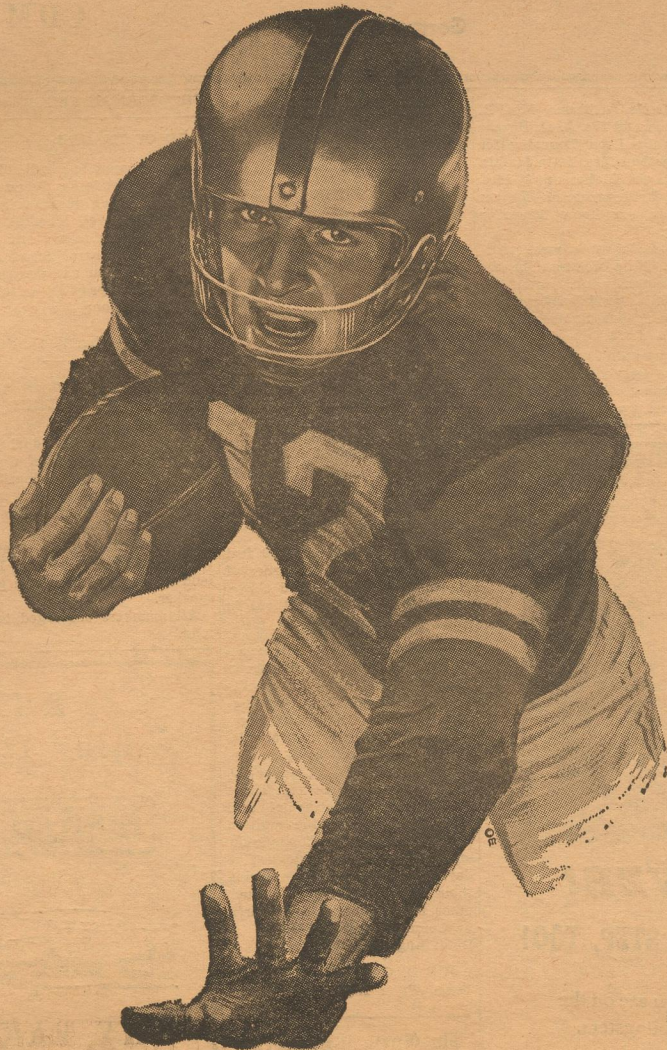

MANDATORY JAIL SENTENCE FOR SOME TRAFFIC VIOLATORS

A fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500 plus imprisonment for not less than 72 hours nor more than 6 months is the new penalty for driving while a drivers license is suspended or revoked. TEXANS FOR TRAFFIC SAFETY say this provision has long been needed as a positive step toward keeping dangerous drivers off the streets and highways.

NEW DRIVER LICENSE GOOD FOR FOUR YEARS

Operators licenses issued after January 1, 1968, will be good for 4 years and will cost \$6. Presently, \$3 is charged for a two-year license.

TEXANS FOR TRAFFIC SAFETY point out that the cost of a two-year commercial operator's license will be \$9 and the charge for a two-year chauffeur's license will be \$12. Provisional license will be in effect until the 21st birthday of the driver and the cost will be determined by multiplying the number of years it will be ineffect by the annual rate charged for the type of license the young driver will be using.
