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Ben Barnes Is Candidate For Post Of Lt. Governor

AUSTIN, October 10 — House Speaker Ben Barnes announced

that he will be a candidate for Lieutenant Governor in next spring's primary election. Barnes made his plans definite at a Capitol press conference. He said that he would open state campaign headquarters in Austin, and would file for the post at the proper time.

Barnes issued this statement: "After careful consideration, I have decided to become a candidate for Lieutenant Governor in next year's primary election. This decision is not dependent upon future decisions or announcements by any other person. "In recent years, Texas has made tremendous gains in a number of important areas - in education, industrial expansion, water conservation, technical and vocational training, and in employment and rising income. I am proud to have had a part in these achievements as Speaker of the House of Representatives.

"Despite our dramatic gains, great challenges loom before us. I believe I can make a greater contribution to our state's future in these years just ahead in the important post of Lieutenant Governor. "I believe our State and our Nation now stand at a crossroad in history. At home and abroad, lawlessness abounds. The forces of terror and intimidation, arson and anarchy threaten as never before. In the streets of our cities, we are confronted with a doctrine that 'might makes right'. By positive action we need to reaffirm our total commitment to the rule of law and the right of every person to live in peace and to walk our streets without fear of being attacked.

"Today, as never before, the future of our dual system of government is in peril. The federal government has monopolized available sources of public revenue. Federal funds raised in our State are returned to us with obligations, conditions and requirements designed to make us subservient to the will and the whim of the master planners. We must rapidly correct this federal abuse of power

through an active and progressive state government. "The industrialization and urbanization of our State has brought untold benefits to our people. New jobs, higher incomes, and rising standards of living have flowed from these developments. However, with such benefits come burdens. Our metropolitan areas must provide governmental services for thousands of new residents. The close concentration of population and industry has made imperative the need for effective new programs to provide for mass transportation, recreational facilities, expanded technical and vocational training, economical government, and a fair and stable tax base. And, of central importance, our citizens must be able to breathe clean air and enjoy water from unpolluted streams.

"Let us focus more attention on the problems of agriculture. The farmer and rancher operate at the mercy of the elements and the market place. We need to develop new and expanded markets for Texas agricultural products. We should work for a strong, stable, profitable price structure for our farmers and ranchers. We need programs to retrain farm workers displaced by mechanization and to attract industry to rural areas. We need to revitalize the rural life in our State. "These are some of the major assignments that we face. It would be easy to ignore their existence or deny their importance. But such a course of action would lead only to decay and decline. Texas and Texans deserve more - and demand more - from their leaders in public life. As Lieutenant Governor, I shall do all in my power to see that we meet these needs and aspirations of our State. "This is not a task for any one man - or for any few men. We need the cooperation and help of all Texans - both in public office and in private life. As Speaker of the House of Representatives for two terms, I have learned to work in harmony and cooperation with the other 149 members of the House of Representatives. As Lieutenant Governor, I fully expect to work in harmony and cooperation with all the members of the Senate, and with all other officials at the Federal, State and local levels of government. "This is no time for pettiness or partisan politics in public life. The needs of the times demand concern, intelligence and vigor in the solution of our problems. These I pledge to give in full measure to the people of Texas as their Lieutenant Governor." Although still a young man, Barnes is one of the nation's most seasoned veterans in public office, with four elected terms to

the state legislature and two terms as Speaker of the House to his credit. From a humble rural birth in West Texas, he already has risen to the stature of one of the nation's most respected young statesmen. Barnes first entered public life in 1960 when he was 22. At that time he upset a favored incumbent to become state representative of the 64th district, now composed of Brown, Coleman, Comanche and Runnels Counties. After only one term, he was appointed chairman of the important Rules Committee of the House. He is only the fourth man in history to hold the Speakership for two successive terms, and when named by his colleagues in 1965, he was the youngest man since Reconstruction to hold that post.

Barnes recently was named vice president of the National Legislative Conference. He is also Chairman of the Southern Conference of the Council of State Governments, and recently he was appointed by President Johnson to serve on the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. Born in Gorman, Eastland County, Texas on April 17, 1938, he spent his early years in Comyn, Comanche County, and attended public schools in De Leon, where he was an honor student and all-state high school athlete. After attending Texas Christian University and Tarleton State College, Barnes transferred to The University of Texas, where he continued his high academic standing by being named to the Dean's list of distinguished students in the Business Administration school. Later he continued his education in The University of Texas School of Law. During his first year in college, Barnes married Martha Jane Morgan, and the couple now have two children - a nine-year-old son, Greg, and five-year-old daughter, Amy. While duties as Speaker requires Barnes to spend much of his time traveling throughout the State, he continues to devote attention to his small farm and ranch in Comanche County and to a construction company based in Brownwood. These activities have given him a keen insight into the problems of farmers and ranchers of the state, as well as to those of Texas businessmen. In 1965, Barnes was named one of five Outstanding Young Texans by the state Junior Chamber of Commerce. He has received honorary doctor of law degrees from both McMurry College and Texas Technological College. Speaker Barnes and his family are members of the Methodist Church.

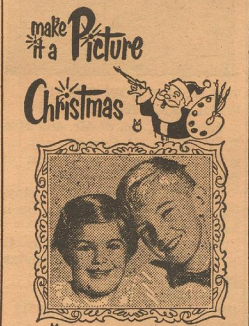

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A Look At Eastland Co. Agriculture

USDA-ASCS by Jesse G. Meredith I had the opportunity this week

to visit several peanut farms in the Gorman-Carbon area and attended part of the peanut tour. Maybe we have taken the pessimistic view toward our 1987 peanut crop. I have heard reports of yields exceeding 100 bushels on irrigated land. Gene Snider, in

the Kokomo area, reported over 100 bushels per acre on about 9.0 acres. Ronnie Love reported 75 bushels per acre on 27.0 acres, and D. B. Warren at Gorman reported 64 bushels per acre on 80.0 acres. This indicates a better than average crop for 1967. Our 5-year average is 25 bushels per acre.

I saw a dry land crop south of Cisco that the producer said would beat his 1966 yield of 63 bushels per acre.

The difference between an optimist and a pessimist is the fact that the optimist thinks everything is going to be good and the pessimist is afraid that he is right.

We have just under 32,000 acres planted in the county and hope for a late frost.

Mr. Charles Rogers, with the state Department of Agriculture, was in this office this week and is beginning his work on peanut marketing research. Mr. Rogers is stationed in De Leon and was recently appointed to the post he now fills. He has a varied experience in the field of agriculture and we in ASCS look forward to working with him.

Doc Parmer, who lives north of Cisco, was in the office this week and said that he was getting ready to sow his wheat. Recent rains make the prospects for a good fall wheat crop look good, 1967 was one of the worst years in history as far as wheat production in Eastland County. Very little wheat was even harvested. 1968 wheat allotments are 15 percent less than in 1967 due to the present wheat supply situation. Quotas are not in effect on wheat, but a voluntary wheat reduction plan is in effect for 1968 similar to the 1967 program. Cooperating farms will receive domestic wheat certificates on 40 percent of their allotment, which is 5 percent more

than in 1967. Domestic certificates are based on projected yields and will be valued at about \$1.30 per bushel.

Our 1968 Agricultural Conservation Program has been developed and approved locally and was submitted this week to our state office. We believe that it will be approved in the near future. Some new practices have been added which we believe will benefit conservation in Eastland County. We will tell you about the new practices when they are approved.

I talked to Ross Wilson in Gorman this week and he said that a field examination would be made on the Sabanno Creek watershed during the week of October 23-27. The examination will be made by the Soil Conservation Service. I have noted a great deal of enthusiasm on this project and I know that the project will finally be a reality.

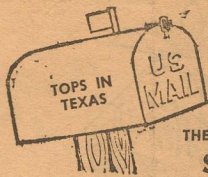
