SABANNO WATERSHED QUALIFIES FOR FIRST 4 STEPS OF PROJECT

The Sabanno Watershed Association met October 26th at the Brown Jug Steak House for the purpose of the sponsoring organizations and interested individuals to meet with the State Survey Team to discuss their findings of a four day field examination of the Sabanno Watershed Project.

Ross Wilson, Chairman of the Sabanno Watershed Project, expressed the appreciation of the Watershed Association group to the State Survey Team for conducting the four day field examination. Mr. Wilson then introduced Mr. Irvin Poff with the Soil Conservation Service, Stephenville, Texas. Mr. Poff explained to the group of 32 the purpose and the feasibility of the Sabanno Watershed Project.

Mr. Poff, introduced Mr. Snider with the State Survey Team, who stated that he appreciated the manner in which the local people had assisted the State Survey Team during their four day field examination of the watershed. He further stated that the State Survey Team had found the Sabanno Watershed Project to be feasible under Public Law No. 566 and gave a detailed explanation as to the extent of the coverage under this law. He explained three aspects that our watershed project

Mr. Flinn was a member of the Four Square Gospel Church and a veteran of World War 1, and a retired machinist.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Allen L. Flinn of Seattle, Washington and Lewis R. Flinn of Nucla, Colorado; and a sister, Mrs. Katherine McCoy of Schenectady, New York.

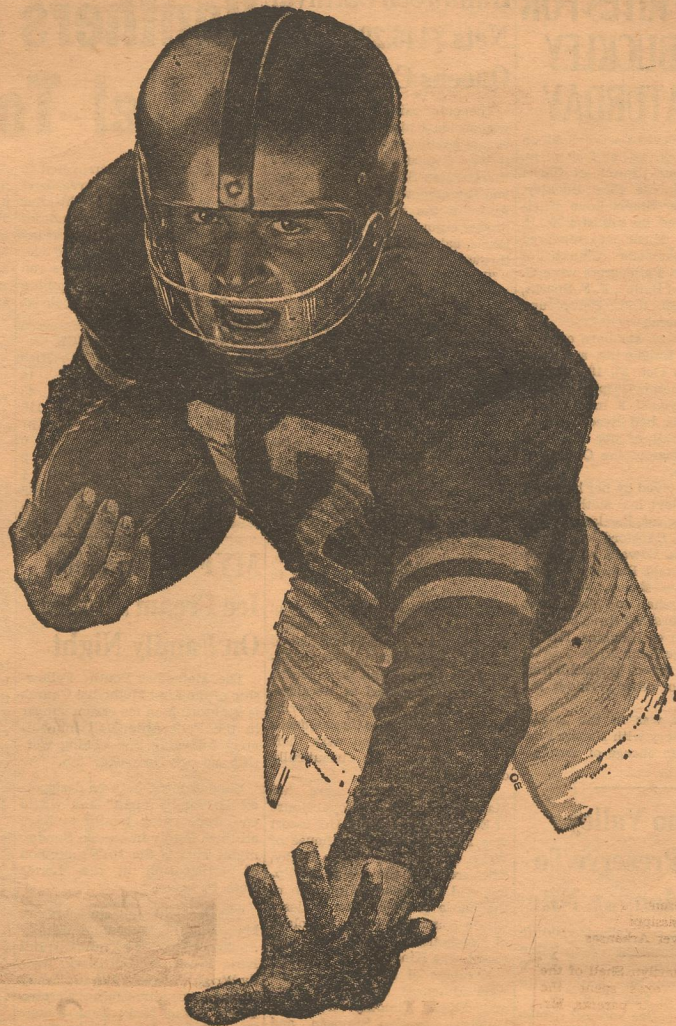

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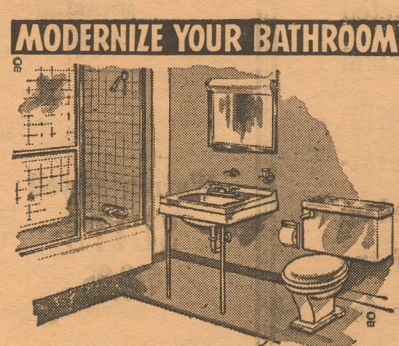

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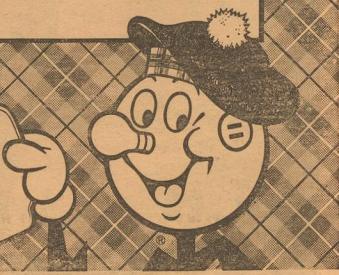
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
