

Still another factor of major concern is the possibility that Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program officials at Mission may not know just how serious the situation is in the southern tip of the state, where high waters, a month after Hurricane Beulah, still make it impossible for many ranchers to check their herds for screwworms.

The week ending October 21 was the biggest one, casewise, thus far in 1967, with a record 170 positive cases confirmed in Texas. The previous week, 133 new cases had been confirmed in 1966, the peak week was that of October 8, when 197 cases were confirmed. A downward trend was seen after that time last year, however, and cases declined rap-
