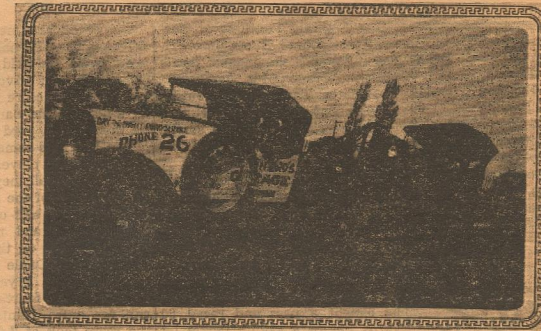

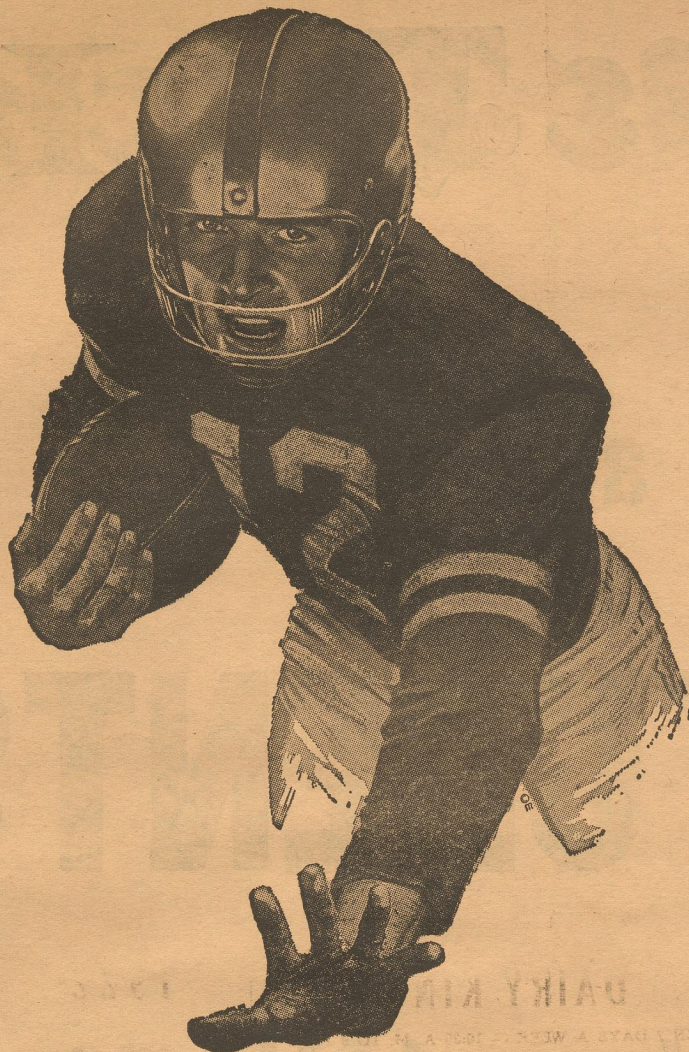

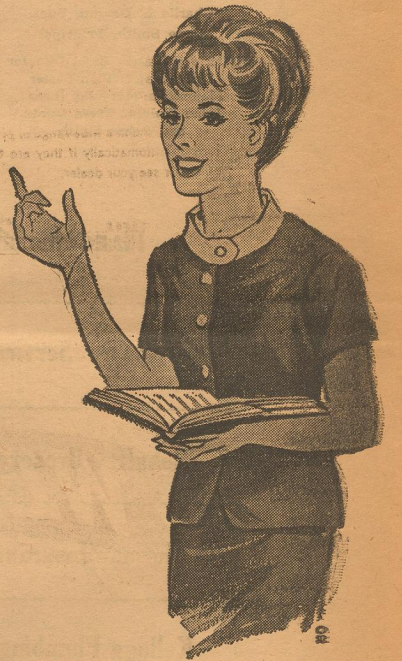

## Acreege Transfer Bill Momentarily Stalled In House

A bill, H. R. 11565, by Representative O'Neal of Georgia failed in late August to get the two-thirds majority required for passage under a Suspension of the Rules. The proposal, which would have permitted under certain circumstances, the sale and lease of peanut allotments within county lines received a majority of votes in the House, but failed to get the required majority. According to some late reports on the matter, the bill will not be brought up again during this session of Congress, but likely will be considered again by Congress early next year.

Under the proposal for the years 1968 and 1969 up to 50 acres could have been transferred by sale or lease within the county. If the normal yield to the farm to which the allotment was to have been transferred exceeds the normal yield for the farm from which the allotment was transferred by more than 10 percent, a downward adjustment would have been made in the transferred acreage.

Congressman Maston O'Neal says he will let the dust settle before deciding what course of

action to take on his bill to permit the sale, lease or transfer of peanut acreage allotments within counties.

Although the bill received a majority vote (208-146) in the House of Representatives last

week, it was defeated because it was brought up under procedure requiring two-thirds approval and prohibiting amendments.

Liberals in the House, led by Rep. Leonor K. Sullivan (D-Mo.), voted against the peanut bill as a

slap against the House Agriculture Committee leadership for holding up Food Stamp legislation in conference with the Senate, limiting the program to one year.

Congressman O'Neal said, "I was shocked and surprised at the outcome because all segments of the peanut industry and all geographical areas involved had joined in support of the bill after it had been amended in Committee to meet all objections.

"The opposition of big city liberals came as an unexpected surprise. I felt very disappointed to be the victim of a feud involving other people. It shows how vindictive the big city liberals can be, but I will not compromise."

The Second District Representative added, "The real feud was between Mrs. Sullivan, author of the Food Stamp bill, and Chair-

man Poage of the House Agriculture Committee over whether the Food Stamp Program would be for one, two or three years."

"I was not involved in the struggle which has resulted in Mrs. Sullivan's decision to fight every bill that comes out of Agriculture Committee with more than a one-year authorization."

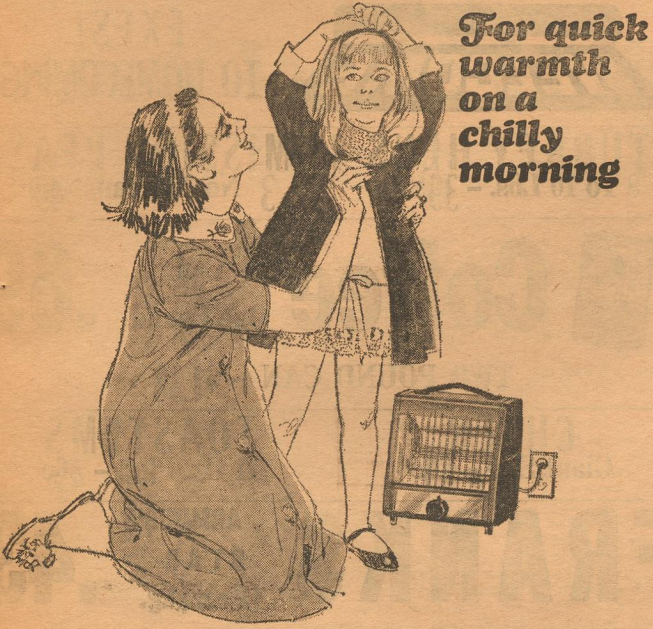
The O'Neal bill included a two-year authorization permitting the Secretary of Agriculture to approve the sale, lease or transfer of a maximum of 50 acres of allotments within counties from one farm to another.

The Bainbridge Congressman let it be known that he would not act impulsively in deciding the best way to win House approval for his bill.

"I am determined to take no chances which could result in possible harm to the peanut program itself," he added.
