### **VOTER REGISTRATION DRIVE IS** UNDERWAY DURING JANUARY

This week marked the opening of a statewide newspaper campaign organized by Secretary of State John L. Hill to promote voter registration in Texas. One feature of the registration drive in the publication of a popular to the publication of the publica is the publication of an applica-tion form which voters may cut out and mail to the county tax assessor-collector, who acts as the registrar for voters. The form is printed below, and publication will be recepted each versely division. will be repeated each week dur-ing January. The deadline for

will be repeated each week during January. The deadline for registration is January 31.

Hill has organized the registration drive in his capacity as chief election officer of the state, a title which the Texas Legislature conferred on the Secretary of State last year, along with placing upon him important new responsibilities in the administration of the state's election laws. In commenting on the drive, Hill said that one of his purposes is to publicize new laws affecting voting rights, which otherwise might go unnoticed by the average citizen.

One of the new laws enacted in 1997 makes registration necessary, for the first time in Texas history, for persons over 60 years old who live in rural communities and towns under ten thousand population. Herefofore, persons over 60 were, reguired to register only if they lived in city having more than ten thousand inhabitants. Many tax assessor collectors have expressed. ing January. The deadline for registration is January 31.
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In order to vote in statevide elections, a person must meet the following qualifications on the day of the election: he must be over 21 years old and must be a citizen of the United States; he must have resided in Texas for one year immediately preceding the election; and he must have registered for the voting year in which the election is held. In order to vote in local elections (county, school district, etc.) he must also have resided in the county for six months im-In order to vote in statewide ections, a person must meet the allowing qualifications on the ay of the election: he must be extitute of the United States; reclately receding the election. esidence in the city for six norths is required for voting in city election.

There were no outstanding bills on August 31 and the operating fund had a balance of \$3503.79. During the same two year period, a new school bus chassis has been purchased and a body rebuilt which was paid for in full at time of delivery. Scale is one of the most de-tructive pests of fruit trees. lamaging infestations develop efore growers are aware of the isect's presence, because of the nall size of the insects. They are timy orange, sac-like

small size of the insects.

They are tiny orange, sac-like nsects beneath light gray, wayy overings. The round coverings of the full-grown females measure 1/16 inch in diameter. The cale are usually found on the bark, but may also get on leaves and fruit.

One of the first symptoms of cale infestation is a decline in the trees' vigor, characterized by hin, yellow foliage. If the scale are not controlled the leaves fall from the limbs, cracking and

are not controlled the leaves fall from the limbs, cracking and bleeding of the limbs occur, and the trees die. Many of the frui-trees in Eastland County showed symptoms of scale infestation.

## KOKOMO NEWS Social Security

Now is the time to effectively control scale. Fruit trees should be sprayed now with a dorman oil spray. It takes 3/4 pint of 97% miscible oil in three gallons of water of four gallons of water. The miscible oil can be purchased at most farm supply stores.

It would be a good idea to spray all your fruit trees between now and February 1st with the dormant oil.

There were some growers who had trouble with brown rot on fruit lest year. This was especially true with appricots. The best control for brown rot on fruit is a spray containing microffine wettable sulfur. This should be sprayed on the tree during the pink bud stage, again at bloom stage.
