






According to present plans, there will be three varieties of tomatoes that will be available Art Hennicke and family. for planting, the Pinkdeal, the Porter's Pride, and the new just eleased Nematex tomato. Each 4-H Club member can have as many transplants as he or she desires up to 4 plants of each variety. The seed will be planted and the plants started by one

of the adult leaders in the county After a boy or girl receives these transplants, they will plant them in a prepared garden and raise the plants until they have finished producing fruit. In July or August the boy or girl will ake a sample of several tomatoe off their vines and enter them a County 4-H Tomato Show The boys and girls with tomato projects will be able to enter at east two samples of each variety of tomato. In this and in future columns more information about growing tomatoes will be passed on to you so you will be able to do a better job of growing tomatoes when you receive your

ransplants in April. The care of a tomato project would be light (compared to the care of other 4-H projects) it could be done in town or in the country and would require very little space and very little fencng. The necessary things to be done with a tomato project would be prepare the ground for plantng by loosening the soil with shovel, hoe, tiller, or other simlar implement, fertilizing at recmmended rates, weeding the plants, pruning shoots, and spraying for tomato insects and diseases. In the next column, I will discuss more about preparing the




