## HUD APPROVES \$315,812 IN LOW RENT HOME PROJECT IN GORMAN

Housing Urban Development has approved financial assistance contract for purchase of 20 low rent homes in Gorman. Highrise dwelling units will be constructed in the old Gorman Hotel on Roberts and Fisher Streets, and will be developed by Turnkey Developers of Houston. Homes will be purchased through HUD's new turnkey concept by Housing

Authority of Gorman. The amount allowed the Housing Authority cannot exceed \$315,812. The loan will be repaid from proceeds and sales of local authority's long term bonds to private investors.

The announcement was made by Congressman Omar Burleson. Ruth McKenzie, Gorman Housing Authority executive secretary, said the construction will begin as soon as the tenants of the Gorman Hotel can be moved from the building.

BFW Construction Co. of Temple will have the contract for the project of the elder care units. Completion of the building is scheduled for September 30.

## Luther F. Yates Addresses Lions At Luncheon Meeting

Luther F. Yates of Abilene, in his address to the Lions Club members Tuesday luncheon at the Brown Jug Steak House, told the group of pharmaceutical research, its performance and its promise for the future.

Molecular biology, he said, has given medical researchers brand new leads into the difficult areas of birth defects and cancer. Experimental work on animals with viral infections has raised "the possibility that in the future we may be made immune not just to specific virus diseases, but to many different kinds of viruses with but a single treatment."

The prospect of startling new pharmaceutical breakthroughs comes on top of many astonishing gains made in recent years, he said. "About three out of four drugs in use today were not even known 15 years ago."

He traced the dramatic death rate reductions which antibiotics and other modern drugs have made possible among those who contract such diseases as rheumatic fever, influenza, and tuberculosis. He also recounted the history of highly successful community-wide polio prevention programs resulting from development of the Salk and Sabin vaccines, cited the personal, social and economic benefits stemming from use of tranquilizers and psychic energizers in treatment of the mentally ill.

Yates noted that total U. S. drug industry research investment for 1966 was over \$400 million, and that a majority of his own company's \$25 million research and development budget for 1968 will be spent on drug studies.

"Drug research is still one of the riskiest enterprises known to man," he said. "It takes an average of five years and more than \$5 million to develop a drug to the point of marketing it, and even after it gets on the market, it is often made quickly obsolete by a new drug."

It is understandable, he pointed out, that the pharmaceutical industry is anxious to maintain progress-sparking incentives afforded by the traditional U. S. patent system. This system, he said, gives the "drug manufacturer assurance that the time and money spent on developing a new drug will be to some extent protected."

Yates recently participated in an advanced speech training program held by Chas. Pfizer and Co., Inc., at the Marriott Motor Hotel in Dallas. He is professional sales representative for the Pfizer Laboratories Division, which markets antibiotics, vaccines and medicinals.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THE FOLLOWING IS A SHORT SPEECH MADE ON THE FLOOR OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES preceding the consideration of the Civil Rights Bill passed by the House of Representatives last week:

"Mr. Burlison. Mr. Speaker, obviously the House is proceeding today under sensitive circumstances. Frankly in my opinion we should not be in session at all and specifically, we should not be considering the legislation before us under prevailing conditions.

"There is not a Member here who would not assume that I am opposed to the pending bill but let me say to those of you who support it that you would do well for the country to wait for a more sober and a more calm atmosphere to act than is the obvious case at the present time.

"I think if I were for this so-called civil rights bill, with its open housing feature, I would not want to cast my vote for it while soldiers and marines are having to stand guard in front of this Capitol. I resent threats of force and duress in anything and if I had to legislate under such conditions I would walk out of this Chamber and not return.

"There is a way to honorably and with courage meet this issue, since apparently it is going to be acted on within the next hour or so. That is, to send this measure to conference with the Senate. Let differences between the House and Senate bills be resolved and brought to each body for approval or disapproval under more calm circumstances.

"This matter has no deadline except the threats of those groups who look for any excuse to riot and demonstrate. If it is not this, it likely will be something else. When the drums call they will be there and it is high time we challenge the drummer.

"It is a sad commentary on this Congress if it yields to the pressures of the moment. I for one had rather yield my seat in this House than to do so."

THE RESULTS OF THIS LEGISLATION REFERRED TO is now well-known to everyone from press reports.

AS ONE WHO HAS ALWAYS TAKEN PRIDE IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE Congress as the greatest deliberative body in the world, there is reason today to be ashamed of its actions. The shame is not only the results of the vote but also because the House legislated under pressures and threats wholly and completely un-American.

ON THE VOTE, 89 DEMOCRATS AND 106 REPUBLICANS stood firm against approval. 152 Democrats and 77 Republicans voted to pass the Bill. As a part of the influences under which this legislation should not have been considered was the fact that flags all over the Nation were flying at half-mast for a man who had never held any official position and the Presidential Proclamation ordering the action was without precedent.

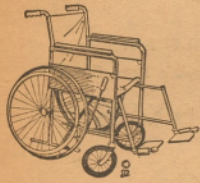

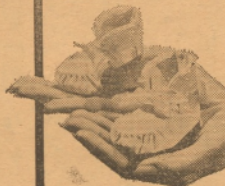

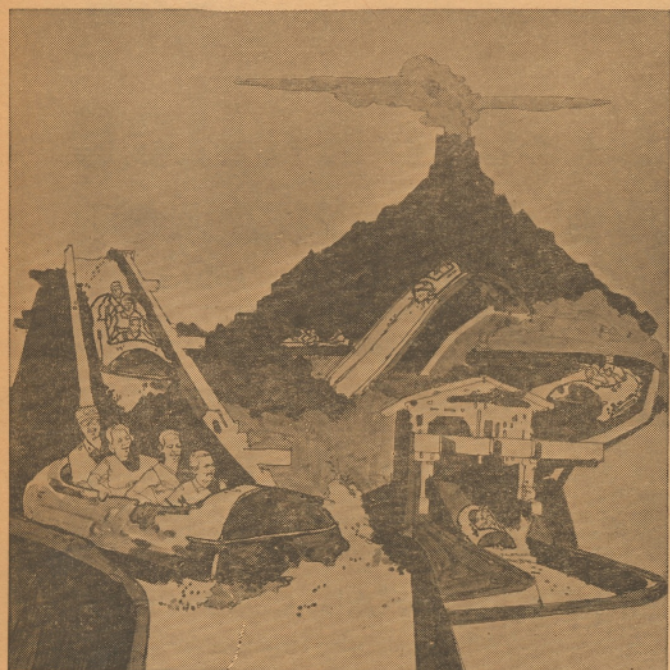
