Seriously though, I firmly believe that our school system does need a thorough over-look by government and by private citizens, and I hope that this one example will make you think a little.

Thank you, Randy, for your compliments - and also for taking time to write. Student unrest and restless people have built one of the greatest nations this world has ever known in a very short time. Of course, I am speaking of the Student Unrest that dreams and builds and not the "student unrest" that tears down, and has no belief in God or respect for anyone, including themselves. You speak of what I have accomplished with only a grade school education. For some reason, unknown to myself, the Good Lord favored me with good health and the ability to work fifteen to twenty hours a day, seven days a week. Also I was offered an opportunity in Gorman that I probably would never have gotten in any other town. The majority of business men and people of this area are due the balance of credit for whatever success I have enjoyed. Too, I was fortunate in having a Mother and Sister who were well educated and did their best to teach me. I might add that when I went home from school and told Mother I had quit I received a good lecture and a "padding" I still remember.

Just think what I might have accomplished if I had only taken their advice. Yes, I have always regretted being a "smart aleck" and quitting school. We all know our educational systems are not perfect. However, most of our teachers are striving to improve what they have learned so they can pass it on to students. You, with your "restless desire" will continue to learn and perhaps figure out how to present the generation following you a better method of absorbing the "THREE R's" as our generation learned them.

"There is a moral as well as an intellectual objection to the custom, frequent in these times, of making education consist in a mere smattering of twenty different things, instead of in the mastery of five or six." - Chadwick. As to the last paragraph in your letter, I feel humble at the position I hold and my constant prayer is that I will never mislead you or any reader of my column or the Progress. ## CONSTRUCTION WELL UNDERWAY ON HOUSING UNIT AT OLD HOTEL

The contract of sale has been signed between the Local Housing Authority and Turnkey Developers. This contract has been approved by The Department of Housing and Urban Development for the amount of \$296,205.00. Completion date is December 6, 1968.

This project, known as Texas 192-3, consists of converting the old Gorman Hotel into 20 Apartment Units for Senior Citizens. Also located on the ground floor will be a Community Center to serve existing units as well as these now under construction. Combined with the project will also be a landscaped parking area on the south of the apartment building for the use of the residents as well as visitors.

The construction is under supervision of the Federal Housing Authority and equals or exceeds all standard codes.

We, the citizens of Gorman, should be proud of the local Housing Authority and all others whose untiring efforts have made possible the other completed Non-Elderly and Elderly Apartments as well as this project of twenty Elderly Apartments. The first Non Elderly or regular units consisting of twelve apartments was merely a dream of a few citizens in the year of 1959. This dream became a reality in October of 1963 when the twelve Non Elderly or regular units were completed. This project was known as Texas 192-1 and was named "Brandon Place, in memory of the late Dr. J. B. Brandon, who was one of the individuals responsible for the first project. The second project, known as Texas-192-2, consisting of ten Elderly units was completed in May, 1965, and is located on the adjoining property and is included under the name of

"Brandon Place." These projects are proving to be self-sustaining and are NOT a tax burden of the local citizens. In the editor's conversation with a member of the local Housing Authority it was revealed that the LHA is planning to make application for additional Non Elderly or regular units within the near future. We, the citizens of Gorman, should support this movement and should at least say THANKS to the members of the Local Housing Authority for what they have accomplished without any compensation whatsoever.

During the editor's conversation with the LHA, it was mentioned that they would need a name for the new project - and they suggested to us that we might pass the word around and they would be happy to consider any suggestions. So, get busy and come up with some good name that would be fitting.

If you really want to know what is going on - just drop by the old Gorman Hotel and take a look. That is where the action is!

## Proctor Water Project Advancing On Schedule Plan

Othell Clark and Ross Wilson, directors representing Gorman on the Upper Leon River Municipal Water District, received a progress report from Hunter Associates, Consulting Engineers for the construction of the water facilities.

The report is that the reservoir is substantially complete; progress has been made on the pump stations, and the water transmission lines should be completed soon.

The progress of construction should increase sharply within the next 60 days due to installation of pipe and pump stations. The contractor on the transmission line plans to install over 4,000 linear feet of pipe per day, and to complete the pipe laying within the next 60 days.

Weather permitting, the project should be completed on schedule, which is September of 1968.

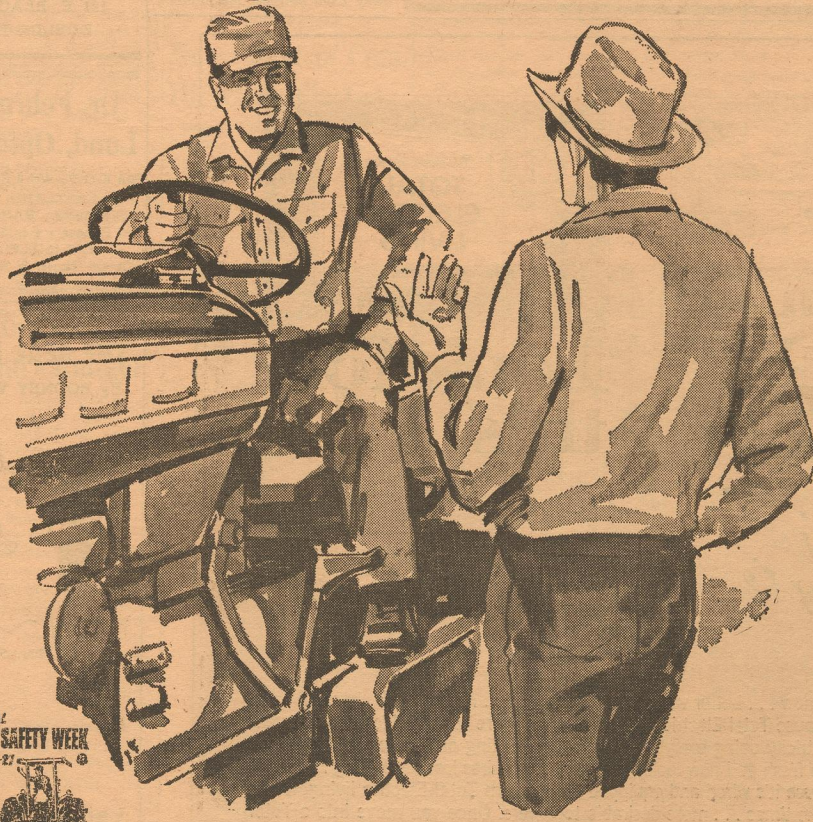

## WASHINGTON

"As it looks from here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. — IT SEEMS OUR GOVERNMENT, including all branches, believes that more money and more promises will cure the evils which we face.

THE GOVERNMENT HAS PROMISED more, both to our own people and to the outside world, than it can deliver. A day of reckoning one way or the other is not far off.

THIS PAST WEEK THE CONGRESS passed what is known as the "Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968" costing \$5-1/2 billion in this Fiscal Year. That, however, is not the whole story by any means.

THE BILL INVOLVES ABOUT 30 different subsidized programs and no one can give a satisfactory answer as to what it will finally cost in the years ahead. Estimates are fairly clear that 8 of the major provisions will cost between \$45 and \$50 million during the next 10 years.

THE BILL INCLUDES A SUBSIDY for rent payments, commonly known as rent supplement. It provides the difference between 20 percent of a home owner's income after deducting \$200 for each minor child and monthly mortgage payments. Market interest rates can be subsidized down to a minimum of 1 percent regardless of the going rates at the time.

ANOTHER EXAMPLE IS INSURANCE PROVIDED by the Federal Government to rebuild property destroyed by riots. Ur-

ban renewal with Federal grants and loans is provided but with this type of insurance any ghetto can be burned out and the renewal can be made under the insurance provision.

IN THE DEBATE ON THIS MEASURE the sponsors agreed that this is the answer to chaos occurring in many of our large cities but a few crumbs is provided for every nick and cranny of the entire country under some type of Federal program.

ALL THIS FOLLOWS THE LAW RECENTLY passed providing for a 10 percent surcharge tax increase together with a \$6 billion reduction in the current budget, together with the cancellation of \$10 billion in commitments already made.

HOW ALL OF THIS IS TO BE ACCOMPLISHED, while committing the Government to these huge outlays of expenditures in the future, is wholly inconsistent.

EVERY PUBLIC OFFICIAL, WHETHER A Mayor of a Town or the President of the United States, knows from experience how difficult it is to curb the momentum of expanding Government activity and we know that this portends the continuation of the levels of taxation higher than any of us want to bear. When Federal monies are available, pressures for every program mount.

AS THE CHAIRMAN OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE of the House of Representatives said last October "We want to pause in this head-long rush to ever bigger Government." In a statement Chairman Mills made at that time he said that "the real issue is whether or not the Congress will ever be able to focus properly on controlling the growth of Federal claims on the Nation's productivity capabilities over the years ahead. It is one thing to attempt to cope with immediate challenges but it is another to look at the long range results of committed spending."

THE INTEREST ON THE PUBLIC DEBT NOW exceeds \$15 billion and the debt will continue to expand unless there is established firm control over the course of future expenditures. What is needed and what is essential is a change in spending programs to bring responsibility to our Fiscal affairs. We should focus sharply on what the Government is to do, as well as how much it is to spend.

ANY REALISTIC APPRAISAL OF OUR NATION'S financial condition should make it crystal clear that Federal expenditures will increase with Federal activity. Expansion of Government activity may not in itself be improper. As natural changes occur, so must actions to meet it but we definitely should be sure that obligations to meet the demands of the future are what we want them to be and that it is the proper mission of the Federal Government.

MANY OF US ARE ALLERGIC TO THE APPOINTMENT OF Commissions to do something we should be doing ourselves but it may take some outside group to bring reality to get it further away from political machination.

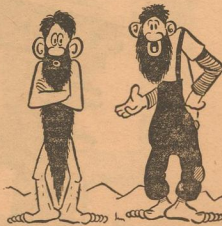

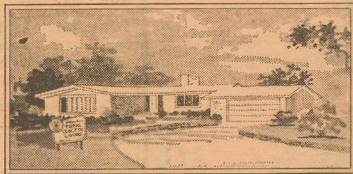

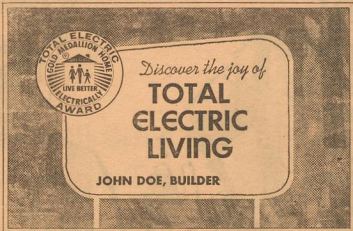
