## Peanut Marketing Quota Program '68

USDA has announced its intentions to make the determination as directed by law with regard to the 1969 national marketing quotas, acreage allotments and the date of referendum. Specifically the issues are as follows:

1. The amount of the national marketing quota.
2. The amount of the national acreage allotment.
3. The amount of acreage to be reserved from the national acreage allotment for new farms.
4. The date or period of the referendum on whether such referendum should be conducted at polling places rather than by mail ballot.

Anyone wishing to express their views with regard to these subjects should address them to the Director, Policy and Program Appraisal Division, Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service, USDA, Washington, D. C. 20250. Suggestions must be submitted and postmarked not later than September 9, 1968.

## Ted And Gene Snider Bring First Load Of '68 Crop Peanuts To Gorman Peanuts

Peanut harvest in the Gorman area began last week with Gene and Ted Snider bringing in the first load of the season on Wednesday, August 21.

The peanuts were being harvested because of a disease called southern blight was ruining them. The disease was causing them to come off the vine.

The 30 acres harvested yielded 600 bushels with a grade of 61 SMK. The grade sample was taken by Truett Coffman, Texas Federal Inspection Service grader. The grade showed 61 SMK, 1%

If no solution can be reached with the teacher, then go to the building principal, and if no solution is reached there, then take your problem to the superintendent, who will make an effort to help you reach a solution. If no solution can be reached through this channel, the superintendent will make arrangements for you to present your problem to the School Board. Most problems can be solved by a conference with the teacher. High school students will have a handbook that will explain the basic policies of the high school. One last bit of advice, if you don't already know your child's teachers, come by and meet them. Don't wait until Public School Week to visit your school.

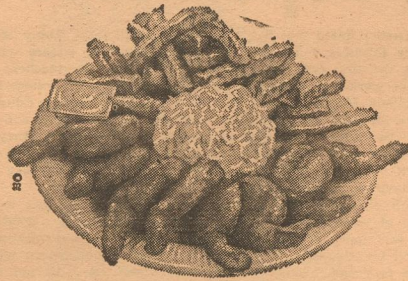

# THE GORDON DESDEMONA SPOT NEWS

By Dee Gordon,

Several home owners have reported having problems with their fruitless mulberry trees. The leaves have spots, turn yellow and eventually fall off the trees. This is very common to fruitless mulberry throughout the county. It is caused by Septoria leaf spot. This is a fungal disease of mulberry trees which is very damaging to the leaves in certain years. I have mailed some of these leaves to the Extension Plant Pathologists. They suggest spraying with a Maneb type fungicide to control the leaf spot disease. Some of the trade names of Maneb are Manzate, Dithane M-22, MEB and MnEBD. The trees should be sprayed several times at two week intervals. Avoid wetting leaves on the trees when watering the lawn.

Peanut harvest has already begun in Eastland County. I saw peanuts being harvested last week in the Kokomo area. The peanuts were being harvested because a disease called southern blight was ruining them. It seems that southern blight is causing much damage to peanuts this year. Some farmers are having to harvest early because the southern blight is causing peanuts to come off the vines.

All four Extension agents are attending the biennial state Extension conference at Texas A&M University, August 26-30. The theme for the conference is "Working Toward Perfection in Extension Education Programs."

In addition to outstanding speakers for each of the morning sessions, each Extension worker will have an opportunity to participate in three different special training programs during each afternoon session.

The week spent at A&M is a part of our continuing professional improvement program which is aimed at making the work of every Extension employee more efficient and productive.

Due to the competitive price, wheat could become a suitable substitute for feed grain in the livestock ration.

Up to 50 percent of the grain portion of the ration may be wheat. More than this is not advisable since wheat is a heavy feed and forms a paste in the mouth and stomach of the animal.

Protein from wheat can be used as satisfactorily as protein from other sources in balancing a ration. Wheat has about 105 percent the feeding value of corn.

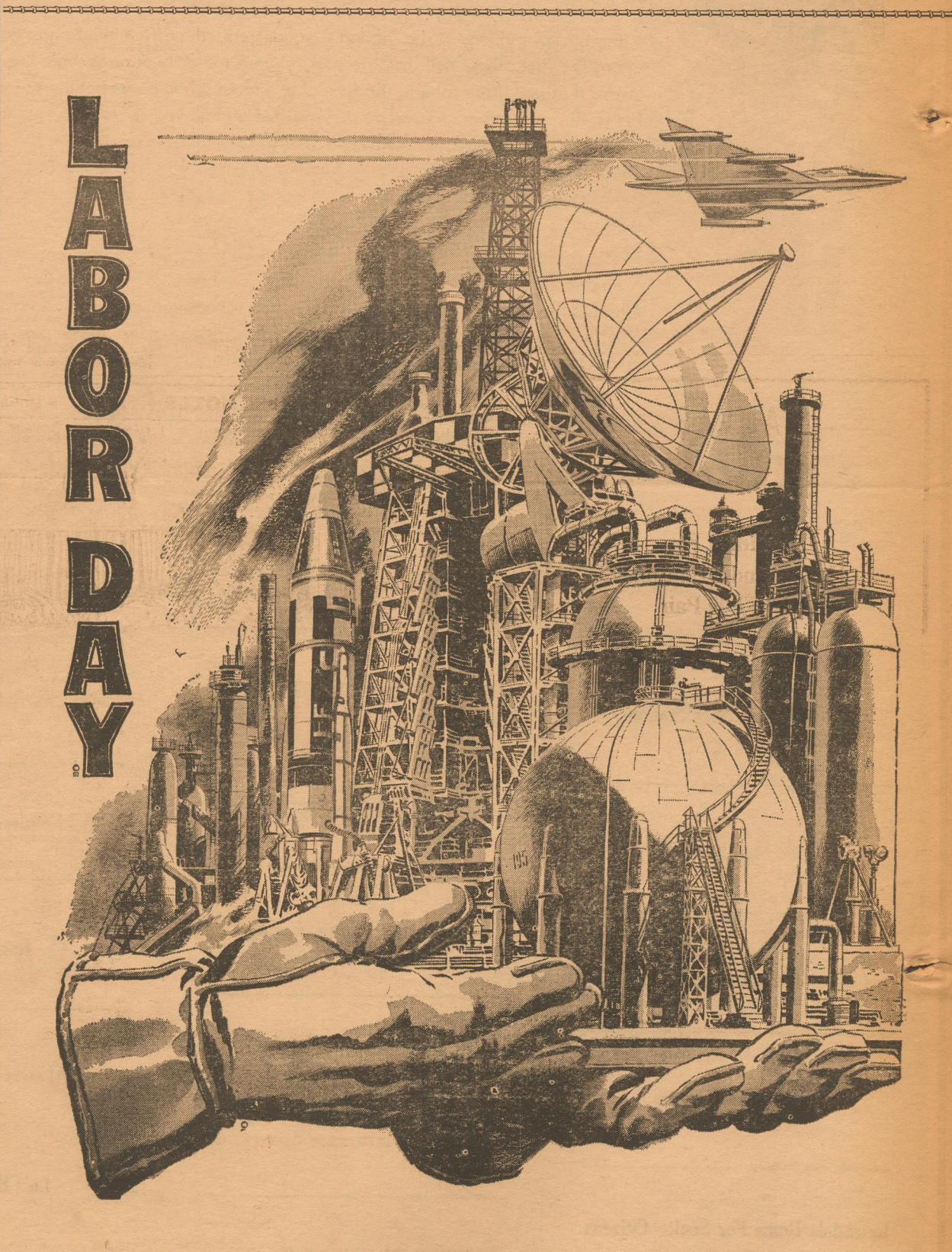

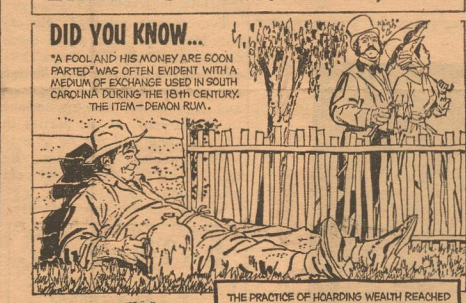

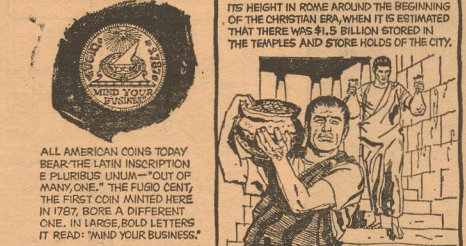

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### DPS Estimates 46 Texans To Die On Holiday Weekend

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the DPS estimates 46 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the Labor Day weekend.

"This is the last holiday weekend of the summer, and thousands of motorists traditionally take to the highways for an outing," Speir said. "It is indeed tragic that so many men, women and children will become victims of motor vehicle accidents during an otherwise happy period," he added.

Speir said the Department of Public Safety will use all facilities and personnel at its disposal in an effort to reduce the predicted death toll. A special "Operation Motoreide" will be activated at 6 p. m. Friday, August 30, and continue through midnight Monday, September 2. During this period, all uniformed DPS officers and equipment will be used on the highways to enforce traffic laws.

"Many other groups such as the local police and sheriff's department, the trucking industry, and the Jaycees will be cooperating in this effort to promote safe driving during the holiday," Speir noted.

For example, the Texas Motor Transportation Association and its Texas Council of Safety Supervisors will sponsor a holiday road patrol during the Labor Day weekend to assist stranded motorists.

Jack Bryan, TMTA safety director, said some 40 cars marked "Holiday Road Patrol" will be used in the program. These will be manned by the safety directors, safety supervisors and safety engineers of the trucking industry who comprise the membership of the Council. Personnel participating in the road patrol will work as volunteers.

The Jaycees will provide rest stops for motorists in many areas of the state. Texas Safety Association said W. F. (Bill) Leonard will coordinate efforts of over 12,000 Junior Chamber of Commerce members in operating some 200 "rest stops" for serving free coffee to fatigued drivers.

### It's Time For... EYE CARE

LIGHT

Ever since men first looked at the sun they have marveled at the phenomenon of light. It is difficult for us to realize that our heat-giving planetary neighbor is 93 million miles from us. Since light travels at the speed of 183 thousand miles per second, it takes less than 8 minutes for that light to reach us.

Light, because it travels at this tremendous speed and is part of an energy band, can be harnessed for many uses. We are just beginning to understand how to do this.

Light has many qualities that add to its mystery. For instance, white light has all of the colors in it. The colors of the spectrum are red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo and violet. Red has the longest wave length and violet, the shortest. If you extend past the violet end you reach the ultra-violet area. On the red side we have the longer wave lengths which are the infra-red spectrum. So, on either side of the light band is irradiation and heat. Both of these are a part of the complete energy spectrum.
