Owner, Jim Weathersby has some excellent figures on rate of gain of cattle being fed on coastal bermuda, as well as information on rate of gain of cattle in the feed lot. Tour members can see Jim actually implanting cattle with harmones and can inspect a good set of feeding and working pens at this stop.

In addition, practices that can be seen on the tour are good examples of strip cropping in peanuts, coastal bermuda, grass waterways, brush control and range seeding of Ermelo lovegrass, and peanuts that have been fumigated for nematodes. An actual demonstration of a fumigating rig can also be seen on the tour.

Cornstalk Borer Posing Serious Threat To Peanuts

High populations of the destructive lesser cornstalk borer in Comanche and Eastland Counties are posing serious threats to peanut farmers. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said this week.

A Texas Department of Agriculture survey team has counted as many as two borer larvae per plant in the affected area, White said. The survey includes the Pioneer, Rising Star, Gorman, De Leon, Comanche, Gustine and Proctor areas.

"This is a matter of grave concern to peanut growers and quarantine officials, alike," Commissioner White said. "Last year, in Comanche County alone, the cornstalk borer caused an estimated damage to peanuts in excess of one million dollars. We need to take all necessary steps to keep down such an infestation this year."

Commissioner White urged farmers to immediately check for evidence of the borers in their peanut fields. The larvae is approximately 2/3 inch long, very active and is turquoise and black in color. The borer larvae lives in small silken tubes just under the ground surface. These silken tubes are attached to the roots and stems of the peanut plant.

Control measures can be found in the Extension Service Bulletin L-704, "Texas Guide For Controlling Insects in Peanuts." The bulletins may be obtained by contacting your local county agricultural agent.

"These control recommendations are effective when carefully followed," White pointed out. "If a grower suspects or confirms an infestation in his field, he should make every effort to get his control program underway as soon as possible."

307 STUDENTS ENROLLED FOR SCHOOL TERM

The Gorman Public Schools opened Tuesday, September 3, with an enrollment of 307 students. This is approximately the same number of students enrolled in the first week of school last year.

There are 113 students in high school with 20 registered in the senior class, 25 in the junior class, 34 in the sophomore class, and 34 in the freshman class.

Elementary grades have 21 registered in the First Grade, 22 in the Second, 21 in the Third, 21 in the Fourth, 20 in the Fifth Grade, 35 Sixth Graders, 24 Seventh Graders, and 30 in the Eighth Grade. Total grade school students number 194.

School begins at 9:00 a. m. and classes are dismissed at 4:30 p. m. Lunch is served to the first four grades from 11 to 11:30, the next four grades from 11:30 to 12:00 and high school from 12:00 to 12:30 p. m.

John Underwood, who voted in the very first election in Andrews and who resided their over 63 years, died Thursday August 29, 1968.

Funeral services for the retired farmer and rancher who came to Andrews in 1905, were held Saturday in Means Memorial Methodist Church with the Rev. Norman Grigsby, pastor, and H. L. Mathney of the Southwest Baptist Church of Christ, officiating. Burial was in the Andrews Cemetery under the direction of Singleton Funeral Home.

Born in Leon County on November 21, 1876, Underwood resided in the Jal area prior to going to Andrews. In the first election to determine the county seat, he and his brother were listed on the poll tax list as "squatters." They were homesteading four sections of land in the northwest part of the county. Mr. Underwood on his nineteenth birthday recalled that he "voted for Shafter Lake to be the county seat because it was a prettier site."

He resided in recent years at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Suggs of Andrews. Another daughter, Mrs. Vern Henry of Stockton, Calif., also survives along with three sisters, Mrs. D. R. Brown of Rochester, Mrs. Lucy Curb of Gorman and Mrs. Nannie Martin of Eastland; a brother, Noah of Gorman; 15 grandchildren; 32 great-grandchildren; and three great-great-grandchildren.

Rev. Bice has purchased 50 acres of land in Villagram, Mexico with his own money to raise corn to assist the people of Mexico. Two crops a year are planted and the tractor and tools are badly needed as deadline for planting is September 10.

Rev. Bice was a dedicated member of the Lakeview Baptist Church in Lubbock, and seemed to be happy serving as a teacher of the young people. He dedicated much of his time guiding the youth. However, busy as he was, he was not happy. There seemed to be something more the Lord wanted him to do. He began to have a desire in 1964 to go to

Mexico to start a home for orphaned children. He found this a hard decision to make because of his work with the Lakeview Church. He was also district manager for Sears and Roebuck with a very good salary. It was not easy to give up all this.



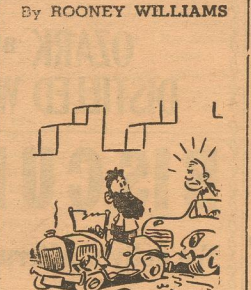

Camp Miniwanca

For two weeks in August I was privileged to stay at Camp Miniwanca at Stoney Lake, Michigan. With a name such as this everyone thinks of fun and games, but it isn't all fun; it's a school based on 4-fold development. Many people don't realize the importance of developing in all four ways, the physical, mental, social, and religious life.

This is a four year school and upon completion you graduate from it just as you do from high school or college. There were 28 who graduated this year. There were approximately 400 boys from all over the world. We stayed in shelters in groups of 7 and slept on cots. My shelter was the farthest from the meeting place and every morning I had to walk 1 1/2 miles to get to camp. This improved the appetite.

Transportation in the camp was all the same, by foot. The sand particularly impressed me because I thought Gorman was sandy land. At Camp Miniwanca no vehicle traveled if it wasn't paved as the sand was too deep. We arrived by truck and took everything else by foot.

We had many of our classes in open air circle formation, and had books which we used, notes we turned into instructors that were marked satisfactory or unsatisfactory, and returned to us for our use.

We began each day with a dip in Lake Michigan, clean up and inspection (by an Army Colonel, no less) and then a meditation period to prepare us for the day ahead of us.

What impressed me most was the camp workers, the people who took time out from their busy lives to help prepare young people for their life ahead. Famous people like Mark Pawlowski, olympic swimmer, his mother and

1969 Inspection For Vehicles Underway

AUSTIN — The 1969 vehicle inspection period began Sept. 1 in Texas according to Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting di-

rector of the Texas Department of Public Safety. "More than six-million vehicles are expected to receive the compulsory inspection prior to the April 15, 1969 deadline," Speir said. Inspections may be performed at any of the almost 5,500 vehicle inspection stations in Texas, each of which displays the official vehicle inspection station sign. Texas law requires inspection of the brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, steering (including power steering) and wheels and rims (not to include removal of the wheel from the vehicle) on all motor vehicles registered in the state. Special inspection provisions apply to trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers or mobile homes having a loaded gross weight in excess of 4,000 pounds.

The minimum fee is \$1.75. This does not include the cost of repairs or adjustments necessary to enable the vehicle to pass inspection. Speir said the new vehicle inspection sticker will be a two and one-half inch square replica of a DPS patrolman's badge with red background. Motorists are urged to have the 1969 inspection performed as soon as possible to insure that their vehicles are mechanically safe for fall and winter driving.

But just remember, someone has to train them because they will rule the world tomorrow.

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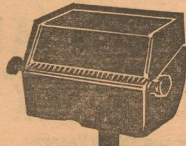

To cook on the rotisserie, place several birds on the spit in head to tail position. Fasten securely with holding forks. Brush with melted butter or margarine and sprinkle with salt and pepper or brush with barbecue sauce without tomato. Cook 20 minutes over medium setting, brushing occasionally with melted butter or margarine or barbecue sauce.

It's Time For... EYE CARE

PROTECTIVE REFLEXES OF THE EYE

There are many examples of eye protection reflexes. Blinking, for instance, is a protective reflex. In a wink the eyelids can be closed to shut out excessive light, or a foreign object.

Many contact lens wearers become more conscious of dust in the air. Sometimes they will close their eyes so rapidly they will catch a dust particle before it strikes the eye and they can feel it between the lid margins. The contact lens wearer's lid reaction is more sensitive because dust underneath the lens can result in great discomfort.

We have all seen photographs taken with a flash bulb that reveals someone with their eyes closed. It is incredible how fast the eye can react. Tearing is another good example of protective reflex. If a foreign object finds its way into the eye, the tears will well up immediately to wash out the particle. Tears are antiseptic and tend to negate the action of the foreign object. In warmer or dryer weather the tears increase automatically. This action is also protective. The pupil of the eye will react to different degrees of light. If there is very little light, the pupil will enlarge and if there is too much, it will dilate, or grow smaller. The reflex to dilate the pupil takes a little longer than the contracting action.



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

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
