Final Rites For Former Gormanite Held Wednesday

Charles W. Nichols, a former band director in the Gorman Schools, died Sunday, October 20 in Lemont, Illinois.

At the time of his death he was retired from school teaching, but directed the Lemont Municipal Band.

He was born in Glenwood, Iowa August 14, 1888. He attended DePaul University and Vandercook College, both in Chicago. He possessed both a bachelor's and master's degree in musical education.

He taught music in the Lemont Schools for 21 years and in others for a period of 11 years. He devoted his lifetime to music, having traveled with theatrical companies and professional musical organizations in his early days, and later specializing in town bands and public school music. "Big Hick," as he was familiarly known, knew and counted many musical greats of the past sixty years as friends and maintained a lively interest in all things musical throughout his lifetime.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. Wednesday, October 23, in Gerhart Funeral Chapel in Lemont, Illinois.

He is survived by his wife, Louise; two children, Robert Nichols and Roberta Randy; three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

other ten players on the Panther squad, the Big Red rolled up yardage so fast it was hard to keep it all added up without an adding machine. Their offense really got going for the first time in this game and jelled for an overwhelming offensive game.

The Panthers jumped on the scoreboard first in the initial stanza when they first got the ball after holding the Coyotes. The Big Red took the ball on their own 36 yard line and drove for a score in just 4 plays with Johnny Scitern breaking loose on a beautiful scamper off the left side, veering to his right and racing 36 yards to the promise land. Wesley Rogers ran for the extra points to make the score 8-0 with 8-11 left in the quarter.

The Panthers added another tally in the first quarter after taking over on their own 17 yard line and going to distance in six plays with Scitern again bringing the fans to their feet on a beautiful pass and run play from Wesley Rogers to Scitern for 70 yards and the TD. Doyle Shipman ramed the ball over for the two-pointer to make the score 16-0 with 3:28 left in the period.

The Panthers held the Coyotes again and took over on their own 3 yard line after a beautiful punt by the Coyotes. The Panthers had a rather long drive on this one, using 13 plays to cross the double strip. Again the Coyotes couldn't hold Scitern, who behind some crushing blocking from the forward wall, hit off the right side, broke loose and outraced the defense for the final 40 yards for the TD. The try for points failed and the score read 20 to 0 with 8:47 left in the second period.

The Coyotes got a drive going in the second quarter after recovering a Panther fumble on the Panther 36 yard line. They scored in three plays. After two passes were incomplete, a pass from Gibson to Steve Patrick was good for the entire distance of 36 yards for the marker. The kick failed, leaving the score at 20-6 with 4:15 left in the half.

The Panther received the kickoff and cranked up another drive before half-time going 60 yards in 11 plays, all on the ground, with fullback Doyle Shipman hitting for the final 3 yards off right tackle for the tally. Shipman also added the two pointer to make the half-time score read 30 to 6.

During the half-time activities Miss Brenda Butler was presented to the homecoming crowd as Homecoming Queen. Miss Barbara Williams was crowned as the 1968-69 Panther Football Sweetheart. Also Miss Tresa Duran was named as the Band Sweetheart and honored by the band.

Also being presented were runners-up in the homecoming queen voting, Michaelyn Porter and Mary Jay.

The teams played on rather

even terms for most of the third period until, with only 1:31 left in the stanza Johnny Scitern stepped in front of a Coyote pass receiver on the 40 yard line, swiped the catch and raced across the goal line for his fourth tally of the night. Try for points failed, and the score was 36-6.

The Coyotes added two more tallies in the fourth period to run their score to 20 points.

The Panthers added another score with 1:44 left in the game going 62 yards in 12 plays with the score coming on a picture-perfect pass from Rogers to Scitern or 22 yards. Mike Duran ran for the two pointer to make the final score read 44 to 20.

There was no question in anyone's mind that this was a total team effort with everyone putting everything together, both offensively and defensively for a well-earned victory in 19-B district competition.

Johnny Scitern led the offense with 123 yards on 14 carries for a whopping 8.8 yard average. Doyle Shipman, who was named "Headhunter of the Week," got 107 yards on 20 tries for a 5.3 average. Rogers had 63 of 10 trips for 6.3. Mike Duran got 32 yards on 8 carries for a 4.0, and Billy Self got 8 yards on 4 smashes into the line for a 2.0 average.

The Panthers will travel to Evant on Friday night in another important District 19-B district tilt. The Elks have a rather tough ball club, as shown by their play last week against the tough Hico Tigers. Game time will be 7:30 p. m. at Evant. 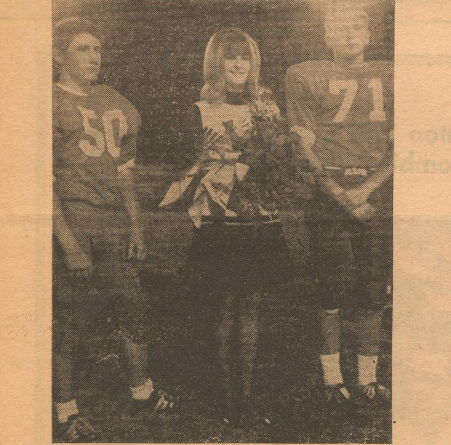

Progress Field Day And Beef Tour Set Oct. 30, W'utherford

Grass, hay and beef production in true abundance - - and all well documented - - will be on display at the 1968 Progress Report Field Day and Beef Production Tour at the M. J. Neeley Almaka Ranch near Weatherford on Wednesday, October 30. The tour will start at 2 p. m.

The field day and tour will be a report of progress on the 800-acre Renner Pasture System demonstration which is carrying 500 beef animals in its third year at the 2,500-acre Parker County ranch.

Results of extensive weighing of beef cattle on-and-off various grasses in the system - - Coastal Bermuda, Ermelo lovegrass and DeSoto grass - - will be a highlight of the tour. Some 800 acres of improved and native grasses have had full fertilization in 1968.

Plans for the field day and tour were announced today by Dr. C. L. Lundell, Director of Texas Research Foundation at Renner, and local sponsors of the event. They are the Weatherford Chamber of Commerce and the Hood-Parker Soil and Water Conservation District.

"Almaka Ranch is perhaps the best example anywhere in West Central Texas of the return of depleted crop and pasture lands to a state of profitable production," said Dr. Lundell, Director of the Foundation, which is supervising the project.

"We hope livestock producers all across West Central Texas will attend and observe the amazing response to fertility and management of both the improved forages in the system as well as the native and introduced grass species," he indicated.

Some 150 acres of mixed rangeland grasses, King Ranch bluestem, Side Oats grama, Blackwell switchgrass and Tejas Indian-grass, have been reseeded and are being utilized for grazing the first time this year.

One group of calves was born and weaned on cows that grazed only Ermelo lovegrass in 1968. The ranch's herds of both commercial and registered Angus cattle are being used to document beef produced by the established forages.

The energetic project is being sponsored through 1971 by a group of Parker County business firms and individuals. The demonstration is one of 23 pasture and rangeland projects at Renner's direction.

At the field day, Renner technicians and the ranch staff will explain to visitors the various cultural and management practices being used, and fertilizers employed on Coastal Bermuda, DeSoto and Ermelo lovegrass and their costs. Results of beef cattle weighing, and a discussion of what performance records are

telling the stockman will be presented.

Soils on the Almaka Ranch are Cross Timbers unit 7, and represent about 50 percent of Parker County's grazing lands, as well as many thousands of marginal lands throughout Texas' heartland.

Parker County currently is the leading county in the state in planting of Ermelo lovegrass, which is becoming one of the major forages for beef cattle. From a start with 15 acres in 1962, Parker County farmers and ranchers have planted a total of 25,000 acres, seeding 10,000 acres this year alone, according to Doyle Hutchison, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the Hood-Parker Soil Conservation District.

The bulk of Ermelo seeding has come during the past four years, he said.

In the Renner system at Almaka, each grass type is planted, fertilizer and managed in a pure stand. The three forages flourish at different times of the year thus providing the best 12-month system scientists have turned up to date for beef cattle.

Omar Burleson Announces Dates Summer Job exams

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Congressman Omar Burleson (D-Tex) said today that the Civil Service Commission is now receiving applications for the 1969 competitive examination for summer employment with the United States Government. The examination leads to eligibility for appointment to most temporary summer jobs at Grades GS-1 through 4, and also Post Office Clerk-Carrier PFS-5.

The demonstration includes 235 acres of Coastal Bermuda, 180 acres of Ermelo lovegrass, 90 acres of DeSoto grass and 150 acres of native grasses.

Almaka Ranch is located 11 miles northwest of Weatherford on FM Road 920 between Peaster and Poolville. Lloyd Ellenberger is ranch manager.

The tour will start promptly at 2 p. m. and will conclude by 4:30 p. m. Signs will direct visitors to ranch headquarters, starting point of the tour.

Those who are interested in the summer jobs covered may apply to take the written test on or before four filing dates - November 6, December 6, 1968 and January 3, January 30, 1969. Representative Burleson stressed that no application postmarked after January 30, 1969, will be accepted. If you miss the last test, you can not be considered for jobs filled by this application and for maximum consideration, you should apply early.

The Congressman noted that last year's eligibles, including those who were selected for a summer job, must take this new examination. The examination provides an opportunity to compete on a merit basis for a summer job. It will last 1 1/2 hours and will measure vocabulary, reading comprehension, abstract reasoning, and table and chart interpretation.

Any application forms needed to apply for jobs described in Civil Service Announcement No. 414 may be obtained from high school counseling offices, college placement offices, most post offices, and Civil Service Inter-agency Boards.

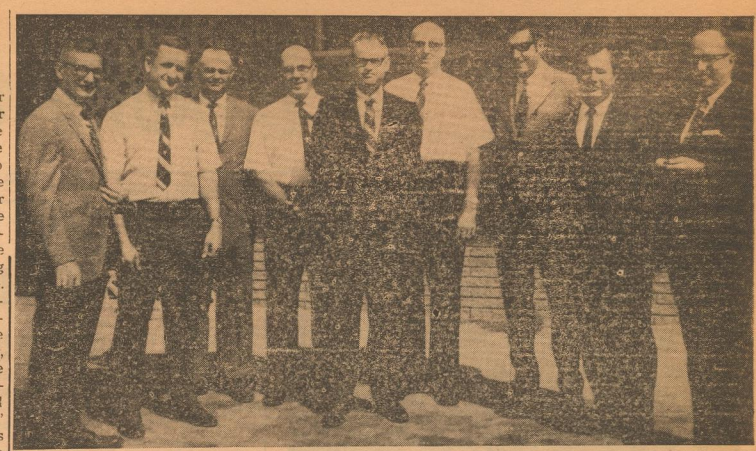

Mail Early And Avoid The Rush Urges Postmaster

This December the Post Office expects to deliver over twice as many individual pieces of mail as there are people on earth... more than 9.7 billion items of mail.

This will be the largest volume of holiday mail ever known. Clearly, if it is all to find its proper destination, there must be increased public cooperation.

For several years now the Post Office has been urging all citizens to use ZIP CODE. Most people have been assisting. The Post Office estimates that about 70 percent of the nation's first class mail now carries Zip Code in the mailing address.

However, the expected rush of Christmas mail highlights the importance of Zip Code.

Zip Code is an efficient, practical way to control and direct the flow of mail through our postal system.

But, even if every piece of mail delivered during the holiday rush carries Zip Code, it will take about 50 billion individual handlings to process the total volume.

According to Postmaster Baze, letters without Zip Code usually are handled an extra five or six times before reaching their destination. This creates unnecessary work which is wasteful of both time and tax money. If we are to expect the same efficient mail service characteristics of the past, despite the tremendous growth in population and demands upon the post office, it makes sense to head the annual plea to Shop and Mail Early and Use Zip Code.

The suggested mailing deadlines for assuring delivery before Christmas Day are:

Domestic gift parcels should be mailed before December 2 for distant states and not later than December 14 for local areas.

Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than December 11 and those for local delivery not later than December 16.

Christmas gifts to servicemen stationed in foreign countries should be sent according to these deadlines:

Surface Transportation (large parcels) November 9.

Space Available (small parcels) November 23.

Parcel Air Life - November 30.

Air Mail - December 11.

Election Ballot Change May Confuse Some Voters

Two factors may cause some balloting confusion in the November 5 general election, election officials in Texas forecast this week.

The two factors are:
1. A new State law has inserted a new top line on the paper ballots so that persons desiring to vote a "straight party ticket" may do so by making one mark. This new line is expected to confuse not only the "straight ticket" voters, but also the "split ticket" voters.
2. "Split ticket" voters are expected to be more numerous than ever before, especially since there is a third party, the American Party, and it has candidates for only President and Vice-President and no other offices.

Voters are cautioned to be certain that their ballots are properly marked so that their intentions will not be subject to interpretation by election officials.

The "scratch" method of voting, which some people prefer, is still permitted. However, voters using this method are cautioned to be certain to mark through all names in all three party columns for which they do not wish to vote.

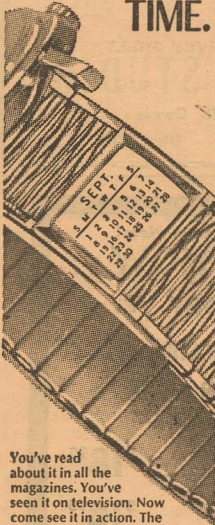

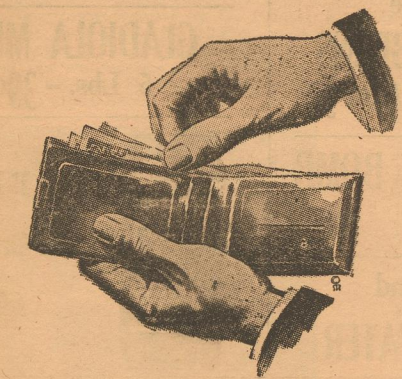
